It is from this meager beginning that our great nation took root. On this Thanksgiving Day I hope we will remember the courage and acrifice of these people. Let us also reflect on the qualities that served them as they built this na discipline, and a strong faith in God caused them to survive Those that were lazy and refuse expelled by the leadership under policy of - "If you do not work, you do not eat." All were required to move from the safety of the fort and establish their homes independently. The policy worked and the colony survived. Hopefully, we can relearn the lesson of the past. If we can, we will have blessings for which to be real ly thankful.
