Hansford Weathers Storm

Heavy rain, lightning, tornadoes and baseball size hail struck Hansford County in the early morning hours of Wednesday, September 18, 1996. The Spearman Police

Department received a Sever Weather Warning and went into Weather Watch mode at approximately 11:23 PM on Tuesday evening. Hansford County Sheriff's weather watchers were sent out, Spearman Fire and Ambulance Service, and the Spearman Police Department were also dispatched for Weather Watch.

Hansford Hospital patients and Hansford Manor residents were moved to safety in the inner halls of the hospital.

Several tornadoes were reported in the Spearman area. According to Police Chief Larry Kenealy, one tornado was seen down Highway 759 South, about five miles from Spearman. one five to six miles south of town, near Highway 207, and one in the northeast corner of the county.

In Spearman and Morse, sirens sounded twice for tornadoes and once for all clear.

Spearman City Hall, Hansford County Court House and Spearman High School served as shelters.

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin was astonished that

the golf ball to baseball size hail did such a small amount of damage. McFarlin's vehicle was pounded by the hail, but received no apparent damage.

Deputy Sheriff Allen Mires was patrolling when lightning struck so close that his car shut down.

Bails of hay were reportedly struck by lightning and the burning smell was noticeable

throughout the day, Wednesday. Amazingly, there were no reports of injuries and most crops received very little damage.

We received heavy flooding in all areas of town especially on the East side. There were cars flooded out on the streets in several areas of town. Horse Creek flooded 100 to 150 yards beyond its banks and the Palo Duro Lake level is currently at 50'

11" and rising.

Throughout the night, George Young and the staff of radio station KRFD kept the community informed about the weather situation. Said George, "The great thing is that the crops are still in the field and as soon as it dries out, we will have a great harvest."

We received between four and four 1/2 inches of rain.

Cattle had broken in the door to get at feed stored in the house and damaged the floor. Part of the foundation was gone, so the whole house sagged in that direction. She dried her tears and moved into the basement to cook for Harley and the carpenter. Every time they hammered, a little dust sifted down on Maude and Mary.

Harley tried to make life easier for Maude. He was in Stratford for parts and saw the first gasoline powered washing machine to be brought to Stratford. The dealer wanted to keep it for a demonstrator, but Harley bought it for Maude. The family attended church in Gruver first at the Bank Building (now Gruver Floral), then at the Gruver School Auditorium, then at Community Church, finally at the Gruver United Methodist.

The Alexanders moved to Gruver in 1959 to 702 Garrett. Between 1958 and 1968, Maude and Harley decided to see the world. They went to Europe, the Caribbean, "Around the World with Cotten John," Tahiti, South Pacific, Australia, New Zealand, Alaska, Canada, Russia, and South America. They had lots of fun and made many new friends.

Maude and Harley celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary in December 1969 surrounded by their large family and many friends.

Mary was married to Walter Hart in 1942. He was killed in WWII in May 1945 on Luzon in the Philippines. Mary married David Long and has four children: Patrick, Melissa, Stephen, and Homer Philip.

George Alexander was born in 1923 and died in 1935.

Frances married William R. Murrell in 1947 and has four children: Harley, Mike, Mindy and Walter.

David Alexander is survived by three children: Doug, Deanne, and Dee. Harley passed away in 1972.

The saddle on display at Fort Zulu belonged to Vina Cator Hawpe. It was donated to the Museum by Marshall Cator. Vina was the daughter of Les Cator. The children of the early Panhandle all seemed to own horses and saddles. A lot of them rode to school on their horses.

The spurs Vina wore are with the saddle. The saddle and spurs have a lot of detailed tooling. A pocket attached to the back of the saddle was convenient for storing small items. This saddle must have been special made for Vina.

A similar saddle sold for \$20.90 in our 1902 Sears Catalog, but still doesn't have the special features of Vina's saddle. Spurs similar to her cost \$2.25 per pair in 1902.

Vina became a nurse in her adult life. Pictures of her and her sister Josie, as nurses, have recently come to the Museum and will be on display soon.

Kay Snider, of Dumas, the great-granddaughter of Jim Cator, recently sent me a pack of papers pertaining to her ancestor. These will soon be available at Fort Zulu for everyone to see. They will be in the Cator notebook.

One of the papers is a copy of an article that ran in the Spearman Reporter on December 23, 1937. It was a story taken from Jim Cator's own handwriting. This story was very exciting! He started it by saying that he and his brother Bob, also a friend, left England, March 22, 1871 on the Steamship "Wisconsin." They were quarantined on the steamship for 5 or 6 days, as one of the passengers had smallpox. The story goes on to tell how they got to the Panhandle. They even walked part of the distance. Jim tells so many interesting things about life in this area in the 1870s that you'll want to go by to read about this. Kay copied a lot of pictures for the Museum also. Kay is the wife of Bobby Snider, son of Vance and Irene Snider, Spearman's own. She has been very gracious to send us this information. Thanks from all of us, Kay!





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
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
