



City of Spearman Projects Update

As I stated earlier, we would keep you updated when it was announced that Spearman was looking toward obtaining Certificates of Obligation for infrastructure projects.

As you might have read in the classified section of the Reporter-Statesman over its last two issues there were the notifications of intent to issue the CO's. This is one of the first steps in the process.

Last Friday Spearman's financial advisor has started the application to the rating service's in order to obtain a credit rating. The application is also made to municipal bond insurance companies to determine the possible use of bond insurance. It has been some time since Spearman has had any large amount of debt. We are in some ways in comparison to someone that has

The bond insurance helps with obtaining a good credit rating and will help lower the interest rate we will be charged for our loan. The city is in good fiscal condition and we should earn a good credit rating.

I have had a few people ask about paying for a large portion of the water and sewer projects out of the city savings. The answer is that we do not have that amount of savings. Some of our savings are already spoken for by the State. Since the City owns and operates the landfill we are charged by the State to keep on hand the money that it would require to close and clean the landfill to EPA standards. We must have this money as if the landfill would be closed at almost anytime. Cur-

rently we are required dedicate close half a million dollars.

Let's continue with the timeline of the C.O.'s. Five Charged After \$200,000 in Pipe Stolen

Five men have been arrested in a crime spree that covered much of the Panhandle and netted more than \$200,000 in stolen property

The men are accused of stealing irrigation pipe in Randall, Potter, Deaf Smith, Hansford, Moore and Oldham counties, said Sgt. Patrick McBroom of the Randall County Sheriff's Office, one of the chief investigators in the case.

McBroom said numerous sheriff's offices, the Department of Public Safety, Texas Rangers and investigators from the Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association cooperated in the probe

Police rounded up the five men in three counties Friday on warrants on engaging in organized criminal activity, a first-degree felony. Teal Ray Bennett, 28, of Vega; Terry Chad Kile, 43, of Tulia; and John Kelly Walden, 19, of Vega, were booked into the Randall County Jail. Jarod Dalton Hudgens, 28, is being held in El Paso County. Stephen Allan Smith, 24, is being held in Gray County. Bond for each has been set at \$100,000.

Police said there may be more arrests.

Farmers reported thefts of irrigation pipe to Randall County in late March. McBroom said he contacted other counties to determine if they'd experienced similar thefts. He found there had been several in Hansford prior to those in Randall.

"I contacted the recycling centers in town and told them to notify us of any aluminum irrigation pipe brought in," McBroom said. He said recyclers are required to photocopy identification documents

from anyone who sells metal. Randall County Criminal District Attorney James Farren said the

penalty for engaging in organized criminal activity is from five to 99 years in prison, and it can carry up to a \$10,000 fine.

He said the value of the stolen material far exceeds \$200,000. "We think evidence will show an elaborate set of events," Farren

said. "Evidence will show there is a very active market for metal used in things like farm-irrigation pipe." Farren said Randall County will have jurisdiction over prosecution

of people involved in the thefts. Special Ranger H.L. Dempsey, who works as an investigator for the

association, said the thefts involved large quantities of irrigation pipe. The thieves were able to steal entire trailers loaded with pipe.

"They stole the pipe trailers too," Dempsey said. "The pipe had been

loaded on trailers by the owners.' tion cooperated in the probe.

Six Indicted on Charges of Stealing Pipes

A Randall County grand jury handed up indictments against six men Wednesday for their alleged roles in a series of thefts that took place throughout the Panhandle, court records show.

Five of the men were arrested last week. The sixth is still at large.

The men are being held in three counties on charges of engaging in organized criminal activity, a first-degree felony. Teal Ray Bennett, 28, of Vega; Terry Chad Kile, 43, of Tulia; and John Kelly Walden, 19, of Vega, are being held in the Randall County jail

Jarod Dalton Hudgens, 28, is being held in El Paso County. Stephen Allan Smith, 24, is being held in Gray

Bond for each has been set at \$100,000. The grand jury indicted a sixth man, Chase Fain, who police have not captured.



How does Congressman Thornberry vote? Does he actually represent you, and how you would vote if you were our representative?

I was moved to write this, after reading his answers to the questions posed to him and the other candidates in a recent publication. The first thing that bothered me was how he said he has "voted for term limits every time he could", yet he has been in office some 16 years. If he truly believed in term limits, why would he continue to run? Clearly, it's because he keeps winning, and the pay and lifestyle isn't half bad. Personally, I am against term limits, because we already have them. If we don't like a candidate, we can simply vote them out. The problem is that we don't. Congress on the whole has an approval rating in the teens, yet they get reelected over 2/3's of the time. So, there is a disconnect between what we think about Congress, and how we see our particular representative. Our problem seems

rooted in the fact that we vote for the party we support, and not the actual voting record of the incumbent running. Congressman Thornberry is a Republican, and because most of us in District 13 are Conservative, that's how we vote. Thornberry

thing. His votes aren't for good bills, or against bad bills, but rather in-line with the GOP. While this may seem like a good idea to party loyalists, I think it is a horrible idea for good governance.

a representative who votes in favor of what is best for America or at least their district, regardless of who proposed the legislation. Congressman Thornberry has voted 'against': requiring candidates to disclose who donated to their campaign, gender employment discrimination, aid to state medicare and teacher employment funds, while not even voting at all on the extension of unemployment benefits. He voted against providing loans for energy efficiency programs, whistle blower protections for off shore drilling workers, a program to prevent or reduce infant mortality, national bridge and highway inspection and reconstruction, and to increase food safety regulations. Now, none of those votes means that he was actually opposed to those things, just where they came from or possibly what else was attached to those bills. While at least some of the things he's voted against sound like good ideas, voting with Democrats is a big "No-No". And this is the



Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

"God be merciful to me, a sinner!", a prayer we should all repeat as we study Jeremiah 14: 1-22, Psalm 84, 2 Timothy 4: 6-18, and Luke 18: 9-14.

Jeremiah begins this passage with a form of lament. Israel is in a drought and the people have disregarded God's commandments. The people recall that God is not a stranger to them, that God should not act as a confused person, because of God's righteousness, God should help them because of his covenant with their ancestors. The Lord answers with judgment that the people have not restrained their feet as they ran away from his commandments, and followed false prophets. The people then confess their sins again and beg God not to break the covenant (law fans note: Israel already broke it). The people's conclusion: "Our help is in the name of the Lord".

The Psalmist sings a song of ascent, going to the Temple. The song is to a living, active God, and the reason for singing is that God's presence is in the Temple. He sings that the presence of God makes a dry valley a place of springs. Listen Christian, we cannot live outside God's presence.

Paul completes his "testament", "I am already being poured out as a libation...". The end of Paul's life is coming sooner than later. Paul states that he has fought the good fight, finished the race, kept the faith. He anticipates a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the Righteous Judge, will give him on that day, as he will for all who have longed for his appearing. Paul recounts all that God has done for him in his ministry and the many perils from which he has been saved. He ends in praise, "To him be the glory forever and ever. Amen." This is the earthly end of the disciple life.

Jesus tells the Pharisees a parable about the Pharisee and the Tax Collector. The Pharisee goes to the temple to pray, and prays, "God I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of my income." The Tax Collector standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, saying, "God, be merciful to me a sinner!" Jesus tells the Pharisees that the tax collector was 'justified' before God, not by his merit but by God's mercy. "All who exalt themselves shall be humbled, but all who humble themselves shall be exalted." Which one are you, dear Christian? The Pharisee told the truth, but he did not rely on God to justify him; in his eyes he was already 'just'. When we try to divide humanity into "righteous" and "unrighteous" by our own judgment, we fall into the same trap as the Pharisee.

May the Holy Spirit bless you to embrace humility.




On Tuesday, October 12th, I had something great happen, and I would like to share it with everyone.
