## Couple Gets Double Whammy Involved in Two Vehicle Accidents on Same Day

A Guymon, Oklahoma woman and a Gruver man were involved in two separate accidents in two different vehicles within a 45 minute time-span, Saturday, July 3.

The first accident occurred at approximately 9:30 p.m. when a 1993 Lincoln Town Car driven by Angela Byers, 20, skidded out of control, going over the curb, and striking the support poles of a porch on the Hicks/Seagler Office at 118 Main Street in Gruver, according to Gruver Police Chief Dee Mayfield and Gruver Police Officer Rodney Nickel.

The vehicle, which was owned by Amanda Earl, was completely totaled in the incident. Both Byers and her passenger Robert Winston Griffin, 23, of Gruver, were not injured in the accident.

Earl was issued a citation for Failure to Maintain Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance while the driver was charged with Hit and Run and Failure to Report An Accident charges.

The building suffered exten-

sive damage, but no figures have been reported.

Less than an hour later, a 1999 red Ford Mustang driven by Griffin was involved in a rollover 8,2 miles south of Gruver near State Highway 136, one mile south of mile marker 38 at approximately 10:15 p.m.

A blowout to the front left tire propelled the north-bound vehicle off the left-hand side of the roadway where it rolled over one and a half times, coming to rest on its top.

Although Griffin and Byers, his passenger, stated they were wearing seatbelts at the time of the accident, both were thrown from the convertible vehicle.

The two were transported by Gruver EMS to Hansford Hospital. Griffin's injuries at the time of the accident were termed "non incapacitating" by investigating DPS Trooper Ed Languor while Byers' condition was termed "possible injuries."



"Forever Fourth Grade"

A little girl named Donna slipped into my mind today, unannounced. That was always her style, even from the first. She would just suddenly be there one minute and gone the next.

The first time Donna made her appearance was in fourth grade when I was a beginning teacher.

Both Donna and the fourth-grade were something I had never imagined as a new college graduate with hopes of teaching high school journalism and English.

But when there were no openings for the latter in our hometown, I accepted a position to teach fourth grade reading and English.

While it was not the age group I had anticipated and" Little House on the Prairie" books were not quite "Romeo and Juliet," it was love at first sight when I encountered a room full of brighteyed, giggly girls, and boys whose front teeth were as big as their

Any disappointments I may have had were totally compensated by the countless drawings they produced in my honor, the sweet penciled notes left lying on my desk, their big bear hugs, and the precious insights they gave me into a ten-year old's world.

The class and I soon nestled in and became a little family. We were happy, and life was good. After Christmas break, our class grew by two students when Dina

and Donna joined us.

Dina, with big dark eyes and shiny hair, spoke virtually no English, but was placed in fourth grade, I was told, "because she had been in fourth grade in Mexico. "Donna had a cute impish face framed with wildly tousled, sun-streaked hair, a forerunner of today's punk.

While Dina could do math well, she required every extra minute II could find during the day to help her with her reading. Donna, on the other hand, was totally incapable of working on fourth-grade level in any subject and spent the day disrupting the class with wild, piercing shrieks of laughter and deeds of mischief.

Since there were not many remedial classes for students in 1974, I sought help by sending Donna to the principal. The principal talked to Donna about her behavior, but talk did little to answer Donna's problems. As a new teacher, I found my best solution was to sit Donna's desk alongside my own in order to squelch outbreaks in the bud and give her additional help on her assignments.

As the days passed, I soon looked forward to the 35 minutes a day, Donna was in remedial reading, when life was once again sane, and I could help Dina with English using a Richard Scarry picture book while the rest of the class completed their work.

Then it happened in the last six weeks of school, Donna disappeared as quickly as she had come. I never saw or heard of her again, Even the office personnel had no idea what happened to Donna or her family. It was nearly as if she had never been there.

As the years passed, I kept up with my fourth grade students with a large scrapbook in which I pasted their little handwritten notes notes to me and the ones intercepted to fellow classmates. Valentines with red crayon "I love you," and newspaper clippings of their achievements in high school and beyond They went on to become fine parents and good citizens with careers of their own. Dina, who became an honor student, later moved to a neighboring town and eventually became a nurse.

Several of of my fourth graders I see every week, some not as often. I have enjoyed seeing them grow and mature and become adults with children of their own. I am proud to them and smile at the tiny part I may have had in their success.

But "seeing" Donna always makes me sad for the little girl with the wild mop and impish grin that time left behind.

Fraternity Receives High Praise at Convention

West Texas A&M University's Texas Theta chapter of Phi Delta Theta, a men's social/service fraternity, received five awards including a coveted Gold Star Award—at the brotherhood's 2004 General Convention June 24-27 in Marina del Rey, CA...

Phi Delta Theta has 165 active chapters in 43 states and six Canadian provinces, and only 32 received Gold Star Awards this

The Gold Star Award is the big one, though. The Texas Theta chapter was originally chartered at West Texas A&M in 1964. After a brief hiatus from the campus, it was recharered on Dec. 6, 2003, and its 40th anniversary reunion is planned for later this month.

"The Texas Theta chapter represented West Texas A&M University very well at the General Convention," M. Keith Brown, WTAMU's director of alumni relations and adviser to Texas Theta, said. "According to representatives from the fraternity's General Headquarters, it is rare that a new or recently reinstated chapter receives the Gold Star Award.


Thursday morning was filled with hard work on the Olympic games since the next day was be the big day. The residents really worked hard.




