Texas crop, weather report

Some parts of Texas received amounts," he said. much needed rain this week; other parts went begging, reported county agents with Texas Cooperative Extension.

"We finally got rain where we needed it; most of the planting is done," said Kyle Stewart, Extension agent for agriculture in Armstrong County.

A few producers were still trying to finish up some spots and replant, and some cotton failed and was replanted as well, Stewart noted.

"We still need more moisture, however, at the subsoil (level)," he "Recent rains have helped the

area tremendously," said Justin Scott, Extension agent for agriculture in Cochran County.

"While the rain has been sporadic, it has been generally wide-

Burton Williams, Extension County, reported, "Parts of Hansford County received rain last week, but pastures remain 'extremely' dry. What little dryland crops were planted never emerged.

... (There were) reports of up to 2 inches; other parts of the county? nothing."

In Dawson County, however, severe drought conditions persisted, said Jeff Wyatt, Extension agent for agriculture.

"North of Lamesa, dryland crops are non-existent," Wyatt said. "Irrigated crops continue to show signs of stress. ... Precipitation is needed soon for any chance of a

good crop for Dawson County." A somewhat gloomy picture held true for Glasscock County too,

for agriculture.

With drought conditions persistagent for agriculture in Hansford ing, "none of the dryland cotton emerged and has been 'disastered out'," Royall said.

"Disastered out" refers to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Crop Disaster Program. Under the program, crops become eligible for disaster payments if crops cannot be planted or production is drastically reduced by adverse weather or natural disasters.

"Drought conditions continue in Wilbarger County. (There's) not much to report except for dry weather with milder temperatures this past week compared to previous week," said Langdon Reagan, Extension agent for agriculture based in Vernon.

"Cattle herds continue to be sold off due to lack of forage and water. spread with local heavier said Rebel Royall, Extension agent Pray for rain!" Reagan said.

City of Spearman renews gas contract

The current contract between the City of Spearman and West Texas Gas will expire at the end of August.

The City has entered into a new contract, which will begin on September 1, 2006. The new 24-month price will be \$10.65/mcf (1,000 cubic ft).

Toward the end of 2004, the City entered into a one-year agreement to purchase natural gas at a price of \$6.57/mcf. (The City's transportation cost is \$1.15 per mcf, which brought the cost at the meter to \$7.72/mcf.) When gas prices began to rise throughout the Texas Panhandle, and the country, Spearman was not affected.

When that contract expired, the City again entered into an agreement to purchase natural gas at a price of \$9.70/mcf. Natural gas prices reached prices in excess of \$10.40/mcf during 2005, but thanks to the City of Spearman, Spearman resident's were not affected.

The best defense against high natural gas prices is a good offense. Winterizing your home or business, lowering the thermostat, adding insulation, caulk around windows and doors, etc. can all lessen the impact of a higher utility bill.



Words from Faith & Grace by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

In the sixth week of Pentecost, we study the God who has intervened in our world in Amos 7:7-17, Psalm 85, Ephesians 1:1-14, and Mark 6:14-29. Amos, a former herdsman and tree farmer, is recruited in Judah as a prophet for the Lord in Israel.

Amos sees a vision of God standing by a wall with a plumb line. The wall is Israel and God is measuring Israel's "trueness". The words translated "plumb line" can also be translated as the metal, tin. Tin and copper were used to produce bronze to forge the swords of war. So Amos is to bear a message that Israel is found wanting and will fall victim to war. Amos' message is unsettling to the King of Israel's priest, Amaziah. Amaziah tells Amos to go be a prophet in your own land; the King of Israel did not want to hear that his kingdom was going to be overthrown and the people carried off in exile. Despite the wishes of the King and the King's priest, the words of God spoken by Amos were true.

The Psalmist sings a song of reconciliation to God. He reminds God that he has forgiven Israel before, and he implores God to forgive Israel again. Thus, we see glimpses in our Old Testament lessons of God's 'mystery", God's plan for the world.

Paul sets forth the basic tenets of the Christian faith in the first fourteen verses of Ephesians. Paul calls himself an apostle and by this he is saying that he "belongs to Christ", he was sent by Christ, and any powers that he displays are given to him by Christ. He wishes the grace and peace of God on the Ephesians. This is more than mere nicety. "Grace" is the undeserved Gift of God, salvation. "Peace" includes in its meaning all things that are necessary for the higher good of the individual addressed. Paul tells us that Jesus has "ransomed" us from the world; Jesus has forgiven our sins; Jesus has provided us with the "Sophia" [the intellectual knowledge necessary to satisfy the mind] and with the "phronesis" [the practical knowledge which allows us to get on with day to day living]. He tells the Jewish Christians that they are the adopted children of God; he tells the gentiles that when they received the word, they too received the Holy Spirit and are marked with His seal; so that, all in the faith community are one in Jesus Christ and all are children of

When we understand this, we understand the "mystery" of God's plan

In Mark, Herod Antipas, the King, racked with guilt believes that Jesus is the resurrected John the Baptist. The Nationalists of the time believe Jesus to be Elijah returned, the fore-runner of the Messiah. The Religious of the time believe that Jesus is a prophet, one who can speak directly the

Early history of ranching in this area

On April 10, 1883 at a Cattle Grower's Association Convention in Dodge City grazing rights to pasture land north of the drift fence that runs along the north side of the Canadian River to the Texas state line was set up. Five people: the three Cator brothers, who came around 1873, Paddy O'Neil, who came around 1879, and S.C. Tyler, who came around 1879, gained rights to live in Hansford County and run about 3500 head of cattle. They could each fence and live on one section of land and graze on areas around this section. The 777 or Ranch & Land Company got the grazing rights to the rest of the land in Hansford County and also the land all the way south to the Canadian drift fence. They could graze 7000 cat-

Our ranch, 7 (seven bar) in northeast Hansford County, was the north part of this ranch area. There were a few stopping spots for people going to Dodge City from places like Adobe Walls and points south. My granddad, Emil Knutson, always said that the original house on our place was one of these stopping places, and I think another was about where the Palo Duro Dam is today. These stops had some feed, supplies, and food for travelers and their animals. This was about the middle to late 1870's.

The old ranch house had some major renovating done in 1898 and at that time a stucco plaque was put on the west end of the house. When my grandfather told my grandmother, Cora Stedje Knutson, that they would be remolding the house she suggested that they just bulldoze it into the creek. The remodelers had to go in and remove all the old adobe that was between the 2 ft. thick walls. There were plenty of snakes that had crawled in between the walls.

I don't know my history very well but I have heard that some of this state land was given or traded to railroad people who sold the land and with the money they built railroads. Some of the land was given or traded to people who in turn sold the land and used that money to build our

In the twenties my grandfather, Emil Knutson, broke out grass in the northwest part of Hansford County where he farmed. He had a ranch at Rosebud, New Mexico and in the spring of 1942 he horse-traded that ranch for what is now the 7 ranch in northeast Hansford County. They trail drove their cattle from Rosebud to Hansford County in April 1942. This

trading of the ranches worked out good for him because his grass was now much closer to his farmland. With the fuel, tire, and, oil shortage during the war, distance was a big factor.

My brother and I started partnering with my grandparents, Emil and Cora Knutson, in the early 1970's. After my grandfather's death in 1974 my brother and I started leasing the ranch. We got in the cattle business in time for some market excitement and problems. My brother and I partnered until about the late 80's when my wife and I started leasing the place from my family.

The cook-off was started in the late 1990's when our friends and us were together and decided that we didn't have much entertainment up here in the Panhandle. So we thought we would get together and have a picnic, cook some ribs and brisket, and, have some good fun and fellowship. We started out with 15 or 20 people and one cooker and it grew from there. We have cleared out a bigger area along the Palo Duro creek, close to the old ranch house, and fixed up a bigger and better picnic area. In 2001 we realized that we could put up a donation bucket and use the money for hospice and other organizations that needed money. We got a few hundred dollars. Then we decided to focus on giving the money to someone in our county, Hansford, that had an illness and needed some financial help. People heard about the cook-off and wanted to participate in various ways such as donating meat, contributing items to be auctioned off, bringing their cooker and cooking, or just by coming and eating.

We now have about 20 cookers and feed around 350 people and we have found some entertainment that is fun and is also beneficial someone.

A short history of the cookoff

Our cook-off started because in this area we sometimes have to make our own entertainment and a bunch of us were sitting around Benny and Jackie Wilson's pool one evening and were wondering what we could do for fun. I don't remember who but someone suggested that we cook some ribs and we, Paul and Barbara Stavlo, volunteered the 7 (seven bar) ranch for the event. That first year we did not collect money we just sat around and ate. The next year more people came and we sat out a bucket for donations to the Hansford Hospice, and collected a couple hundred dollars. The first year we held the event for a person, in 2002, it was for Art Salazar. It was due to the success of this year that we decided to make this an annual event. We have held the cook-off for Toni Atwood, who was battling cancer and won, for Mandy Lusby, who is need of a heart and lung transplant, and for Albert Avila, who has Huntington's Chorea. This year we are cooking for three people, Becky Freeman, who has cancer, Bob Shill, who has cancer, and for Jon Olsen, who had a non-malignant tumor removed from his head and spine.

Our Pronghorn Antelope are unique for their speed as they are classified as the fastest land animal in North America and as second fastest in the world. The African

Everything I read on the pronghorn mentioned their speed and agreed about their being the fastest North American animal. But it made me stop and think of a story in Charley Newell Shot! by Cleon Roberts where 2 greyhound owners each felt he had the fastest dog. They set up a race on the plains west of Granada, Colorado in 1874 to see which dog could catch an antelope first. When the judges, using field glasses, spotted an antelope about a mile distant, they showed it to the greyhounds, and then loosed them at the same time. They ran neck and neck toward the antelope who seemed to just watch the dogs until they were within a half a mile of it. Then it started run-

ning away. According to this story, the dogs caught the antelope and killed it with one a clear winner.

This made me wonder if some greyhounds weren't faster than antelope.

According to the web site Athletic Animals, greyhounds are the third fastest animal and better accelerators than antelopes. But antelopes are the fastest animals over distances greater than a quarter of a mile. So greyhounds would not normally be able to catch an antelope with a one-mile head start. However, antelopes are also quite curious. So perhaps the antelope in the story did not run when it should have and was overtaken by the great acceleration of the greyhounds.


