Grand jury may receive statements . . .

Investigation continues in juvenile case

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department is continuing investigation into a juvenile officer's alleged beating of a Spearman youth with a baseball bat last week.

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin said Tuesday that statements were still being taken from witnesses. "It looks like the statements will probably be taken to a grand jury, but that will be up to the District Attorney," he said.

He added that evidence gathered by his office will probably be presented to the District Attorney late this week, on Thursday or Friday, and a determination will be made as to whether the evidence will be taken to a grand jury.

J.E. "Chunky" Blackburn, 84th

District judge and member of the Hansford-Ochiltree County Juvenile Board, said Tuesday that Jim Layman, assistant juvenile probation officer, has been "...suspended ... relieved of his duties temporarily, pending complete investigation of the matter."

The other two members of the juvenile board, Hansford County Judge Jim Brown and Ochiltree County Judge J. Kenny Norris, could not be reached for comment.

Layman's suspension resulted from allegations that he struck a Spearman youth with a baseball bat after the youth escaped from him and Robert Bond, Ochiltree County Treasurer, during transportation to the Potter County juvenile facility. The juvenile was being transported to Amarillo last

Thursday, and the trio had stopped at an Amarillo restaurant.

According to the sheriff, the juvenile apparently escaped from the men by running away from the restaurant's restroom facility. He then made his way back to Spearman and returned to his home, and his father contacted juvenile authorities Friday morning. McFarlin said that when Layman and Bond arrived to take the boy into custody, he attempted another escape and his father apparently tackled him.

Layman is alleged to have struck the youth several times with a baseball bat as the youth's father held him down. The juvenile was taken to Hansford Hospital and admitted for observation, then trans-

ported Saturday to the juvenile facility in Amarillo, according to reports.

Previous reports of the incident had indicated that the juvenile was being transported to Amarillo originally by Layman and another juvenile officer, Geraldine Bond, who is the wife of Robert Bond, the Ochiltree County Treasurer. Sheriff McFarlin said Tuesday that those reports were erroneous, and that Geraldine Bond was not involved in transporting the juvenile.

Other reports had indicated that the youth escaped from the restaurant through the restroom window, but McFarlin said he ran away after coming out of the restroom through another door.

Protest school finance plan . . .

Pringle-Morse CISD reps travel to Austin

Tom Dortch, Allen or Mark McCloy and Jon Jarvis will be joined by Pringle-Morse CISD Board President Bob Womble in traveling to Austin Jan. 15. They plan to meet with the Robin Hood Forum Committee about the new school funding plan put into effect this year, according to Roy Harris, Pringle-Morse CISD superintendent.

At the meetings the Pringle-Morse group will be joined by other property tax payers from other Texas school districts around the state. The information they will receive will have to do with the effectiveness of the new school financing plan and what they can do about it as tax payers.

The Robin Hood Forum is a co-

alition of representatives from schools who feel the new school finance law is not working. The members of the Forum are schools who are property rich but have a high population of students who are on the lower end of the socioeconomic scale. Pringle-Morse's neighboring district, Sunray, is a member of this group.

The Robin Hood Forum indicated its position on the school finance plan in the following news release, dated Dec. 18, 1991.

Representatives from property-wealthy school districts are maintaining that not only is school funding legislation passed earlier this year unconstitutional but also fails to provide the promised funding equity.

More than 50 districts banded together in a group called the "Robin Hood Forum" and filed a suit challenging the constitution-

ality of the law which was upheld by a lower court. The suit is ex-

Jobless rate 3.3 percent

Hansford County's unemployment rate stood at 3.3 percent for the month of November, according to figures from the Texas Employment Commission.

TEC figures show that during the month of November, Hansford County had a total civilian labor force of 3,660 persons. Of that number, 3,541 were employed and 119 persons were jobless.

Statewide, TEC Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said that in spite of some rather ominous economic possibilities, the state's unemployment rate actually improved somewhat. Texas posted a 6.8 percent average for November, down from 7.2 percent in October.

However, the November rate is exactly the same as that recorded a year earlier, which Nabers said "... appears to be just one more indication of a totally flat economy."

She said that much of this employment increase is due to hiring for the holiday season. Three-fourths of the November job additions were in retail trade.

Lowest unemployment rates were in Bryan-College Station, with a 3.9 percent rate, Victoria with a 4.6 percent rate, Austin with a 4.7 percent rate, Amarillo with a 5.2 percent rate, and Abilene with a 5.6 percent rate.

Highest November unemploy-

ment rates were recorded in McAllen-Edinburg-Mission at 18.7 percent, Brownsville-Harlingen at 12.5 percent, El Paso at 10.5 percent, Laredo at 9.6 percent, and Longview-Marshall at 8.4 percent.

Bank expansion on schedule

The expansion of the First National Bank, Spearman has been slowed by the weather and the holidays, but, according to bank president Don Townsen, construction is continuing on schedule.

The expansion will be both above and below ground. The above-ground portion will be 52'-2" by 30'. The below-ground area will be a

26'-5" by 12'-8" storm and fire storage area.

The above-ground area will have a 30' by 16' public meeting room. The rest of the area will be split into office space for additional bank personnel, a computer data processing area and additional lock box space. Townsen says it will double the size of the current loc-

box area.

Townsen outlined two reasons for the expansion. He said that the bank needed more room to be able to follow procedures outlined in the new banking regulations, and the bank needed the room to be able to offer new services to its customers. He said the bank would like to expand its small business support services.

Roy Harris resigns

Roy Harris resigned his position as Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District Superintendent, effective Dec. 23, 1991.

According to Harris he resigned the position to take a position as field representative for the Texas Education Agency. Harris will act as liaison between the agency and 35 school districts in the Panhandle of Texas. He will operate out of offices in the Region XVI building in Amarillo. "I hated to leave the district but this was an opportunity I couldn't pass up," said Harris.

According to Harris the district

has hired Jack Weldon of Gruver to be interim superintendent while the board begins the search for a permanent replacement for Harris. Weldon was superintendent of the Gruver schools for 16 years before his retirement a few years ago.

Harris indicated he expects to do a lot of traveling in his new job. He hopes to be able to smooth over the relationship between the schools of the Panhandle and the TEA in Austin. "This is part of Education Commissioner Skip Meno's plan to move people out of Austin and put people in a territory that they know," said Harris.

"For the Boys," starring Bette Midler, James Caan, George Segal, Patrick O'Neal, Normal Fell and Christopher Rydell, is big, heartfelt and personal. It is a bold sweep of a movie in the grandest of Hollywood proportions.

It sets out to tell a moving story within the framework of showcasing its stars (Midler's, mostly) enormous talents, both dramatic and musical - and it succeeds wonderfully. Director Mark Rydell has the word epic in mind here, and by the conclusion of the film's 148 minutes - which fly by almost too quickly - he has given the audience a fusion of living, loving and singing during a span of five decades in the lives of his characters and the country in which they - and we - live.

Bette Midler is back doing what she does best here: singing and flaunting her saucy self in front of us. And James Caan has little trouble holding his own while sharing the stage with her. But soft-shoeing is not all these two can do. Each has great dramatic moments in "For the Boys" - moments that almost rival the musical numbers they belt out. The film succeeds on many levels; it's funny and sad, large and intimate. More than anything else it takes seriously the art of entertaining.

The Women's Division of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce will be in charge of the decorations again this year.

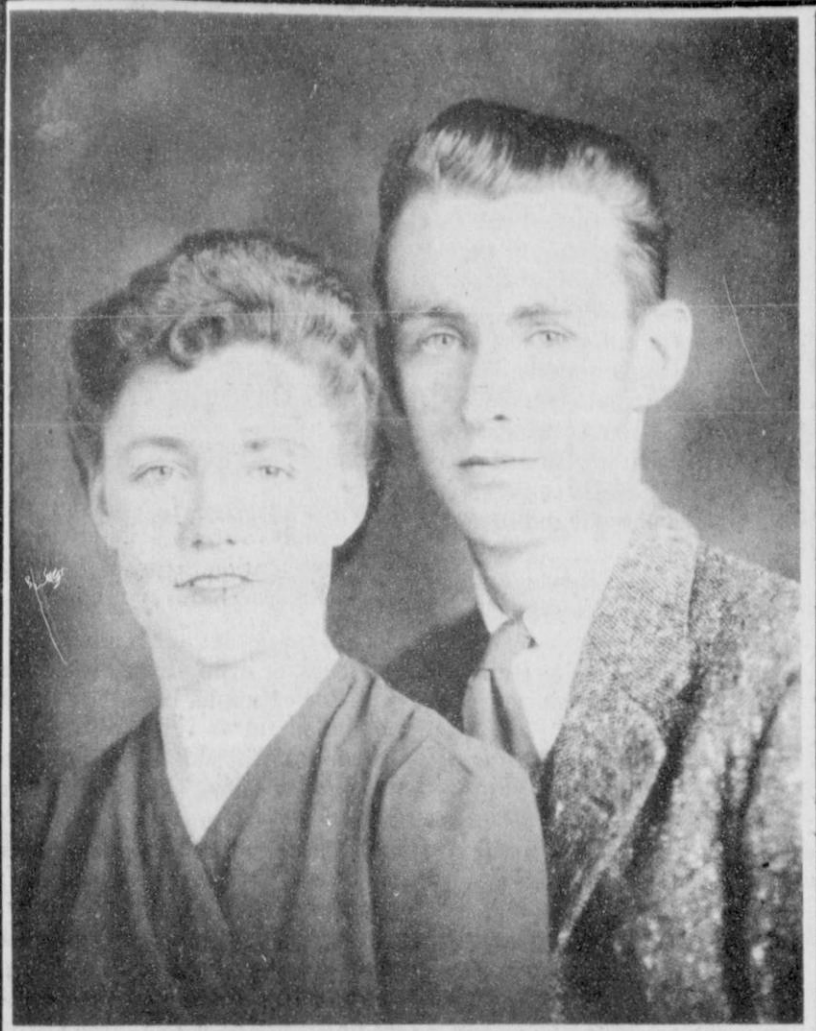

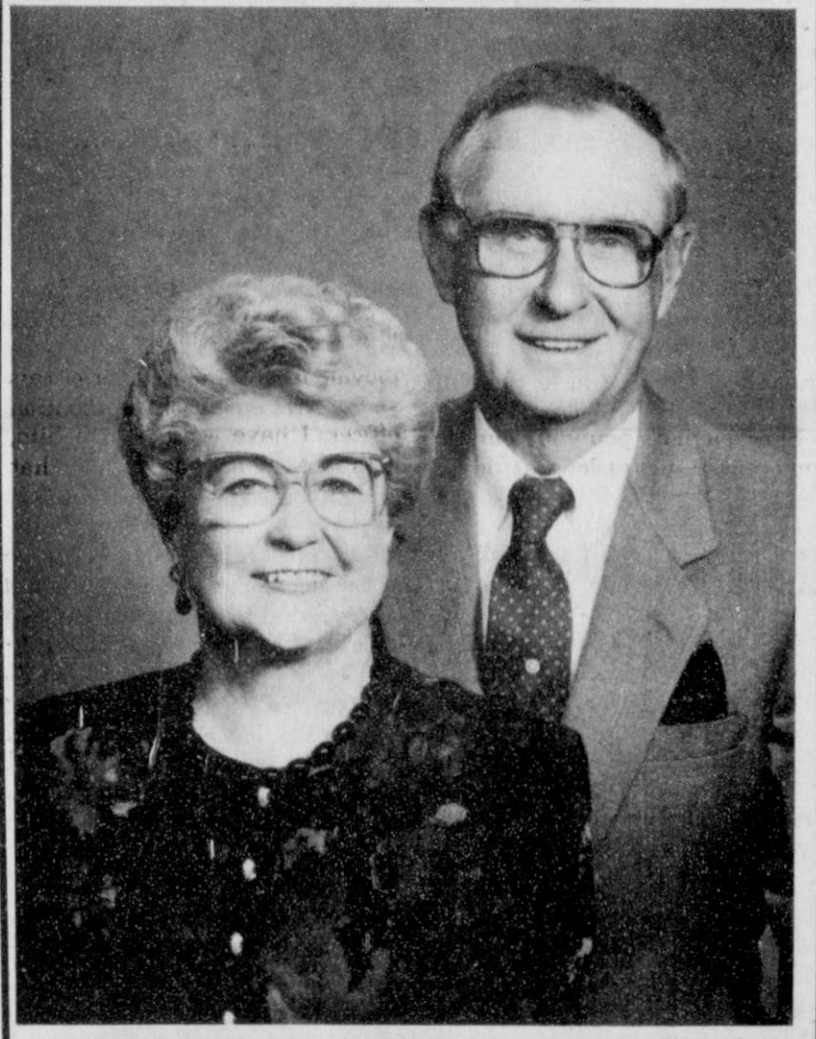

Modifying Recipes For Fat

If you must reduce the fat and cholesterol in your diet, it can be accomplished through careful planning.

First, define your dietary goal. If you want to cut calories, you need to know what ingredients contribute the most calories. To cut fat, sugar or sodium, or to increase fiber, you need to identify the ingredients that contain these components — calories, fat and cholesterol.

Fat is the most concentrated source of calories. Each gram of fat supplies 9 calories, compared with 4 calories per gram of protein or carbohydrate and 7 calories per gram of alcohol. Reducing the amount of fat in a recipe is the most effective way to cut calories.

Fatty acids are the basic chemical units in fat. They are either saturated, monounsaturated, or polyunsaturated. All fats in foods are mixtures of these fatty acids.

Saturated fatty acids are found in the largest proportions in fats of animal origin such as whole milk, cream cheese, butter, meat and poultry. They also occur in large amounts of coconut oil and palm kernel oil.

Monounsaturated fatty acids are found in large amounts of olive oil, peanut oil and canola oil as well as in many margarines and solid vegetable shortenings.

Polyunsaturated fatty acids are found in the largest proportions in fats of plant origin such as liquid vegetable oils (safflower, sunflower, corn, cottonseed, and soybean) and margarines and salad dressings made from them.

Cholesterol is a fat-like substance found only in foods of animal origin. Significant sources include egg yolks, meats (particularly organ meats), butter, cream, cheese and whole milk.

To choose the best approach, it is helpful to understand how fat functions in a recipe and what happens if you modify it. First, you can either eliminate the ingredient, reduce the amount or substitute a

more acceptable ingredient.

Fat:
* Provides flavor and richness
* Improves texture and tenderness in baked goods
* Promotes flakiness and lightness

Eggs:
* Provide structure and tenderness

* Act as thickener and emulsifier
* Act as leavening agents when beaten

To Decrease Total Fat and Calories:

* In casseroles and main dishes, cut back or even eliminate added fat. For example, browning meat in added fat is unnecessary because some fat will drain from the meat as it cooks. Use a non-stick pan or cooking spray.

* Saute or stir-fry vegetables with very little fat or use water, wine, or broth.

* To thicken sauces and gravies without lumping, eliminate fat and instead mix cornstarch or flour with a small amount of cold liquid. Stir this mixture slowly into the hot liquid you want to thicken and bring it back to a boil.

* Chill soups, gravies and stews and skim off hardened fat before reheating to serve.

* Select lean cuts of meat and trim off visible fat. Remove skin from poultry.

* Decrease the proportion of oil in homemade salad dressings. Try one-third oil to two-thirds vinegar.

* Use reduced-calories sour cream or mayonnaise, or to reduce fat further, use plain low-fat or non-fat yogurt, buttermilk, or blended cottage cheese instead of regular sour cream or mayonnaise for sauces, dips and salad dressings. If a sauce made with yogurt to prevent separation.

* Use skim or low-fat milk instead of whole milk. For extra richness, try evaporated skim milk.

To Decrease Saturated Fatty Acids and Cholesterol:

* Use two egg whites or an egg substitute product instead of one whole egg. In some recipes, you can simply decrease the total number of eggs.

* Use margarine instead of butter. Look for margarines in which liquid vegetable oil is the first ingredient.

* Use vegetable oil instead of solid fats. To substitute liquid oil for solid fats, use about one-fourth less than the recipe calls for. For example, if a recipe calls for one-fourth cup (4 tablespoons) of solid fat, use 3 tablespoons of oil. For cakes or pie crusts use a recipe that specifically calls for oil because the liquid fats require special mixing procedures and different proportions of sugar.

CRP benefits pheasants

Ring-necked pheasants are benefiting from CRP. Food is usually plentiful in the corn and sorghum producing regions of the High Plains, but undisturbed nesting and wintering cover is often in short supply.

CRP grasses have given pheasants a chance to get a strong foothold in the Texas panhandle. Mixtures of tall introduced or native grasses have created ideal nesting, roosting, and winter cover. Thus enhancing pheasant populations.

Birds raised in captivity are poorly adapted for survival in the wild. Good habitat management remains the key to abundant populations of wild birds.

Besides being beautiful to look at pheasants have economic benefits too. Pheasant-hunting rights typically are leased on a daily basis. Day-lease prices in the area currently average \$70.00 to \$100.00 per gun the opening weekend then pro-rate down the following weekend.

Hansford County Landowners are doing a great job of Wildlife Management and should be commended for it.

Programs and services of the Hansford SWCD and Soil Conservation Service are offered on a nondiscriminatory basis without regards for race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marital status or handicap.

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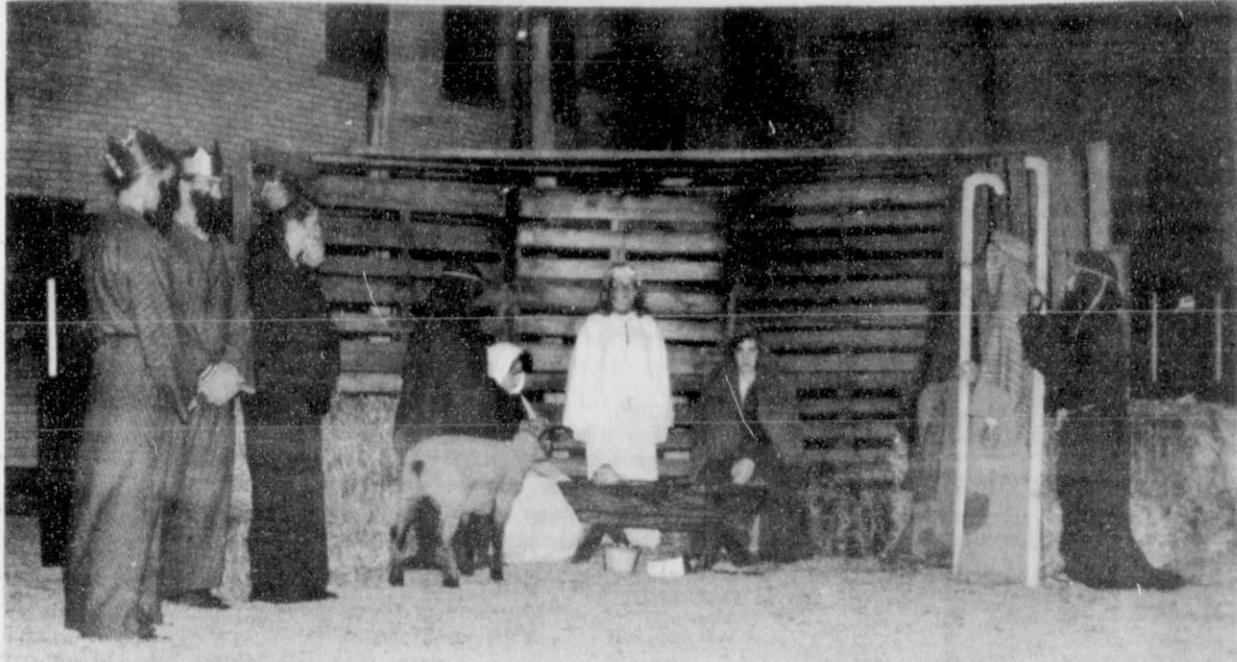

The Story of Rizal Park

During a trip to Manila, Judy and I took a guided tour through Rizal Park which overlooks Manila Bay.

The park is named for Jose Rizal, a Philippine national hero, who was executed by the Spanish in 1898.

In one area of the park, there is an underground bunker complex which was used by the Japanese as a dungeon for allied prisoners of war, mainly Filipinos.

The P.O.W.s were tortured and starved. The bodies were pushed out a back door into Manila Bay and floated out to sea.

According to Philippine news reports, all prisoners, with one exception, died. One prisoner, Ferdinand Marcos, somehow escaped. These reports helped perpetuate the story that this macho soldier was a great national hero.

In one end of the bunker was a room where the Japanese stored all their gold in the country. After the war, all the gold disappeared without a trace.

pected to be ruled on by the Supreme Court any day.

"This new law adds another layer of bureaucracy and, in the end, increases property taxes in almost every district in the state," said Superintendent Marion Czaja, Glen Rose.

Also research being conducted by the Robin Hood Forum indicates that while the new law has hurt programs in the wealthier districts it has not significantly helped the poorer districts.

"The bottom line is that the state of Texas is once again pushing its own responsibility to adequately fund quality education down to the local taxpayer," said Bill Reaves, superintendent in Palacios ISD. "Nobody is really a winner under this plan because it still fails to deliver a sufficient amount of money to poorer school districts so they truly can make a difference. At the same time, it simply levels down higher spending schools to a

state-imposed standard of mediocrity."

Many of the poor districts that received additional money through the County Education District (CED) distribution report that their local property taxes have also increased with little or no improvement in their education programs.

"This is not a rich against poor issue. Any way you cut it, the burden falls on local taxpayers whether they reside in a poor district or a rich district," said Andrews ISD Superintendent James Pennington.

The majority of these property-wealthy districts are small, rural and comprised of working class folks, with moderate-to-low income. Also, minorities represent a significant high percentage in some districts.

"We cannot sit back and allow erosion of the quality education that we have worked so hard to deliver to students in our districts," said Czaja, who is chairperson of the Litigation Group that is spearheading the Robin Hood Forum.

"We must inform taxpayers of the serious implications of this legislation on the future of education in this state. We also will enlist the support of citizens and business leaders to push for a revitalized state commitment to public education," Czaja said.

With a Supreme Court decision on the constitutionality of the leg-

islation expected any day, members of the Robin Hood Forum are hoping that the Court will overturn the law and abolish the County Education Districts (CEDs).

"We believe that the present law is unconstitutional because the taxes collected are redistributed by the CEDs amount to state ad valorem taxes in violation of a constitutional ban on such taxes," Czaja said. "If the Court rules in our favor and a special session is called, the legislators can look again at the issues without the crowded agenda of a regular session. The future of our state will be determined by our level of commitment to each child in every district. I believe our state can fund quality education."

As Attorneys James George and Hugh Lowe have written, we can do that "...with a new tax system that taxes real wealth in a real world and supports the schools from all the wealth available in Texas. When our legislators ran for office, they said they wanted to go to Austin and work for us.

"If the Supreme Court declares the County Education District Tax unconstitutional, the people of Texas should not be required to pay \$4.5 billion in taxes they do not owe because the Legislature or Governor believes the task too hard or that the task requires too much courage. The times are too hard to ask Texans to make such a sacrifice."
