## Experimental Feeding.

 T. S. Bugbee is now feeding 150 big steers under the direction of Station people Bryan The Station people at Bryan. The fifty each. One fifty is being fed fity each. One fifty is being fed on ground kaffir corn with a smah proportion of cotton seed; another bunch is getting ground kaffir with cotton seed meal, while the third section is being fed the ground kaffir alone. The experiment has only been under way about two weeks, and as yet comparative progress is hard to estimate.Mr. Bugbee has shipped a car of threshed kaffir to the A. \& M. College where it will be used in feeding experiments down there. He will thresh this year some 35,0oo bushels of this grain, from an acreage of about 1500 acres. He has his own mills for grinding the grain, with steam power.
The Banner-Stockman will have more to say about his feeding operations as soon as results are perceptible.
