





THE county seat election in Wheeler county is not a settled thing after all. One box was thrown out in the official count, thus giving a majority to the old town of Mobeetie. A contest in the courts will likely follow.

THE New Year special edition of the Dallas News was something immense. Consisting of 120 pages, it was the largest paper ever put out in Texas, or perhaps in the whole South. Tax Collector Patman visited Jericho, Giles and Rowe last week as a matter of accomodation to tax payers, and that his trip was appreciated is shown by his receipts. He spent one day only in each place. At Jericho he collected about \$300; at Giles, \$500, while at Rowe his collections amounted to more than \$1000.

Rev. C. C. Bearden has bought the newly constructed S. C. Chesnut home and Mr. Chesnut is building another residence on a nearby lot.

Experimental Feeding.

T. S. Bugbee is now feeding 150 big steers under the direction of the Agricultural Experimental Station people at Bryan. The steers are divided into three lots of fifty each. One fifty is being fed on ground kaffir corn with a small proportion of cotton seed; another bunch is getting ground kaffir with cotton seed meal, while the third section is being fed the ground kaffir alone. The experiment has only been under way about two weeks, and as yet comparative progress is hard to estimate.

Mr. Bugbee has shipped a car of threshed kaffir to the A. & M. College where it will be used in feeding experiments down there. He will thresh this year some 35,000 bushels of this grain, from an acreage of about 1500 acres. He has his own mills for grinding the grain, with steam power.

The Banner-Stockman will have more to say about his feeding operations as soon as results are perceptible.


