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

included. Taxpayers with existing agreements are not subject to this new fee. However, if they default on the agreement or have to renegotiate the terms of the agreement, they will be charged a \$24 user fee.

Budget officials estimate that over 2.7 million installment agreements will be entered into in fiscal year 1995 with estimated fees to be collected of \$116.1 million. In FY 95, it is projected that 150,000 agreements will be restructured, resulting in \$3.6 million collected in fees. Mr. Scott, IRS Director, said, "Fees will not be used as a general supplement to appropria- and Boyd, but they destroyed where they will have the greatest impact in meeting our mission statement. We will be allowed to keep up to \$199 million from collected user fees in FY 95 to pay for the cost of the services.'

A law passed in 1952 allows government agencies to charge user fees. Information concerning these new fees can be found in the February 14, 1995, Federal Register.

Odors from hog farms are made up of more than 150 gases, which can be carried for a mile or more. Ammonia gas is released from the barns and lagoons. The ammonia returns to earth in rain and contributes to the pollution.


Studies have shown that flies are attracted to hog operations from miles away and tend to swarm and breed within a two mile radius of

The recent scientific studies show that up to half of existing lagoons leak. When the first hog farms were started, they didn't have any seepage, but the older they get, studies show that contaminants from the open lagoons are getting into the underground water. One hog farm installed a monitoring well near a waste lagoon. The first few months yielded nothing unusual, but three months later the level of ammonia nitrogen, a by-product of urine, suddenly jumped from a normal level to two parts per million to 18. Later to 27, then 57 and finally to 178 parts per million, so this proved that the lagoons were contaminating the underground water.

This is not only an environmental issue, but a public health issue and that means your health. The biggest threat comes from nitrates, which can remain in the soil for decades. In infants, nitrates in drinking water, can cause melhemoglobinemia, or blue baby syndrome, which is some times fatal.

Think about it. The big corporations are in the hog operations to make money, not friends. They can move out if its not profitable and leave our land and water with contamination.

People say it won't bother me, its not close. Just don't be surprised if one is not built southwest of your town.
