Merchants Pay Good Prices for Pro duce and WIII Take All the Farmer Brings in.

In talking with a local busines man the other day he made the statement that Clarendon merchants were paying higher prices for all kinds of farm produce than any other point of which he had knowledge. He cited several instances, showing that the farmer bringing in his produce received more money for it than the same stuff could be shipped and laid down here for. "Furthermore," he
stated, "Clarendon merchants are stated, "Clarendon merchants are
buying enormous amounts of counbuying enormous amounts of coun-
try produce this season. There is not a farmer in Douley county who cannot realize on anything he has raised if he will only bring it to town. Every pound of kaffir corn, even," went on the merchant "will be sold this season, and anywing be sold season, and any ling else whis one farmer has in a marketable condition will be taken off his hands as ${ }^{\text {a }}$ soon as he cares to sell." The gentleman then went on to say that only the day before he had checked out $\$ 1000$ to farmers for their products, and the Saturday before that his checks for the same purpose amounted to more than $\$ 1500$. "And it was not all for cotton, either," he added. Further illus trating his remarks the statement was made that to his knowledge his house and one other local firm ad paid out already this season to he farmers for Indian corm to he alone bout $\$ 5000$, and were still buying having shipped to date some thirty cars of corn with orders for more All this sounds good to the

Banner-Stockman, and shows that prosperity is ours. There is just one suggestion, however, that we would like to make to the farmers concerning the marketing of their stuff: that is to find out before
bringing the produce in just when bringing the produce in just when the buyers would prefer to have it.
This, of course, refers particularly to the "smaller" items-poultry for instance. The same merchant we have quoted above states that frequently he is crowded with poultry at a time when he isn't ready to ship, and again he will want to make shipments and will be unable to get the birds. His suggestion is that in such matters the farmer should make lis date for delivery on the occasion of his last previous visit to town.

## Those Sugar Beets.

W. H. Patrick informs us that lie has had quite a number of tests made on the sugar beets grown in Donley county last season. It will be remembered that Mr . Patrick procured at his own expense a quantity of seed and distributed same among the farmers who applied for it to give the growing of sugar beets a test. The results of the planting where proper attention was given were good, and a splendid yield was evidenced.
Mr. Patrick se
Mr. Patrick sent a lot of the beets to sugar men in Colorado and had them tested for sugar. The
results showed that the Donley county beet averages up with the Colorado beet in per centage of sugar. There were eight tests made and the average was 15.25 per cent sugar, and 74.50 per cent purity. The party making the tests stated also that the beets sent had not been properly grown, the samples showing that the ground had not been broken deep ground to much of the beet lideng growing out of evidently growing out of the ground. The lests, however were satisfactory, in that they proved that this soil is suitable for the growing of the beets, and with an accessible marke the industry could be easily
