For Teachers, Parents, and Puplls Communication From Prof. W. R. Silvey.

The public authorities are using their best endeavors to make the public school subserve the educational needs of the public in elementary and high school work. This it must be doing to a very lurge extent, since the enrolment uring the first month almo qualed
The first great duty of a teacher is to teach, not merely to enter ain. The teacher, who accepts half learned lessons, encourages idleness in his pupils rather than study. The fear of displeasing pupils sometimes prevents the weak teacher from making the necessary demands upon his pupils to secure good results.
We hope parents will carefully thly report cards of their children as they are sent them These usually give a correct index of the progress pupils are making in school. Encourage as far as possible, the children to study at

When parents find fault with the teachers they destroy any in fluence that the teacher may have over their children. Teachers are sometimes at fault, but as a class they are the most conscientious wrker that can be found
The boy or girl, who is indiffer ent about being late at school of mornings and noons is not much in earnest about lessons. Tardiannoyance to the school; it furannoyance to the school; it fur-
nishes an example that no excuse can justify. Pupils should be trained in the habit of punctuality as a business virtue.
"The greatest good to the greatest number" is a principle that should apply to school work as well as other things. The teacher who is forced to devote a large part of her time to one or two unruly pupils is exhausting the energy that should be given to the greater number in the room. If such pupils can not reform they parents.

them to contain 15 per cent sugar them to contain 15 per cent sugar in the beet, 16.30 per cent sugar in
the juice, and 82.90 per cent coefficiency in purity, this latter being the per centage of sugar in the solid matter in solution in the

Mr. Harrell had one acre plan ed in sugar beets on what is known as dry up-land, which received no irrigation other than that received by nature. He had some beets which weighed over 8 pounds. The seed was furnished by the Rock Island Railroad Co., for the purpose
of testing the Gray county soil as of testing the Gray county soil as
to its adaptability for the culture of sugar beets. The above test is considered by sugar beet experts to excellent.-McLean News.
