

### Geo. Melton Dead.

George Melton, aged about 42 years, died at the residence of J. T. Patman in this city last night. Mr. Melton came to Clarendon from near Waco about a year ago, and bought the A. M. Smith farm four miles east of town. For the past month the family has been afflicted with a series of fever cases, Mr. Melton himself being one of the victims. He was brought to town last evening so as to be nearer his physician, but when he arrived it was seen that he was in a greatly exhausted condition and his death followed within a few hours. The funeral was held at the Baptist church at 11 a. m. Deceased leaves a large family.

Justice court was kept pretty busy the first of the week. Almost the entire neighborhood of Bray was here as witnesses or principals in cases where complaint had been filed against about a dozen of the younger generation who were charged with disturbing the peace. **EXCHANGE WILL OPEN**

Prices of Selling Sheep and Hogs to Be Reduced Two Dollars Per Carload.

The Co-operative Live Stock Company, incorporated at Denver last July, began business in Kansas City this week.

The company had its inception last April at the annual meeting in Denver of the American National Live Stock Association, when it was decided "to take action against the recent advance in commission charges for the sale of live stock at the various markets." Stock was sold only to live stock producers and feeders and no one person was permitted to hold more than fifty shares.

The company will, it is said, reduce the commission on sheep and hogs \$2 a carload, and will boycott the exchange of commission men in Chicago and St. Joseph.

The commission price on cattle will be the same as that charged by the Kansas City Live Stock Exchange.

**Frisco Earthquake.**

In all 452 persons lost their lives as the result of the disaster of April 18. The local Health Department so stated in a formal report sent yesterday to the State Board of Health.

Of the victims, 266 were killed by falling walls, 177 perished by fire, seven were shot, and two died as the result of ptomaine poisoning, due to eating "emergency" canned goods of poor quality; 420 are believed to have been white, eighteen Chinese and four Japanese. Eleven were less than a year old.

The figures given relate to the deaths proved to have taken place.

The figures relative to males and females and races of the victims were compiled to June 30. Since then ten deaths have been reported, making the total to date 452.

## PUBLIC SCHOOL OPENING

Term of 1906-07 Begins with Larger Enrollments Than Last Year Had.

September 3, marks the opening of Clarendon Public School.

Every room in the building almost without exception is crowded. Everything so far seems to be moving off with the utmost harmony. The children seem to be in the best of humor and each appears to have learned perfectly the "first lesson." The teachers for their part are wearing glad smiles, every one.

Our new teachers, Misses McLean, Burdette and Cole, seem to be adapting themselves to their

new surroundings admirably, and we prophesy a pleasant and successful year's work for them.

Significantly speaking, the grass in our Public school yard, will not grow for almost a year to come and the Clarendon public School swings into the rush of progress with a boom!

She received quite a number of presents from her guests. Soon after the death of his father young Lawton returned to this country with his mother and sisters and they have since made their home at Pewee Valley. After his return here he enlisted in the First Battalion artillery, Kentucky state guards.

Mexico has awakened to the fact that unless vigorous measures are taken to prevent the wholesale destruction of her forests the country will soon be treeless.

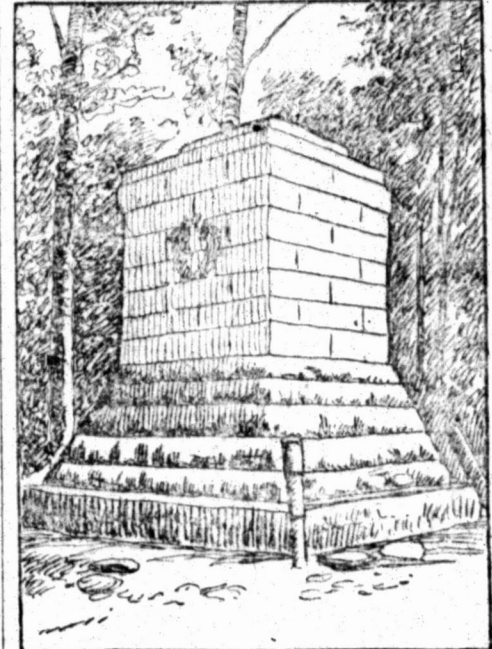
### First \$1,000,000 Policy.

The first \$1,000,000 policy ever issued was taken out in 1897 by George Vanderbilt, at the age of 35, in the Mutual. It was a 20-payment life, 20-year distribution policy, that is, he is to pay a yearly premium of \$35,000 for 20 years. At the end of that time he will receive a paid-up policy of \$1,000,000 and a cash dividend. If the policy had been taken out 20 years ago, at the same age, he would have paid by this time the sum of \$700,000 in premiums, which at four per cent. compound interest would amount to nearly \$1,085,000.—World's Work.

## STEUBEN TO BE HONORED.

**Congress Votes Money for Monument to German Baron Who Aided Revolutionary Patriots.**

Utica, N. Y.—The fact that an appropriation has been made by congress for a monument to Baron Frederick William Steuben, to be erected at Washington, and the selection of the sculptors, Albert Jaegers, Adolph S. Weinman and Henry Herring, to compete for the honor of making the design, become of interest to German residents of this country who a few years ago were engaged in erecting a monument over Baron Steuben's grave, in the town of Steuben, Oneida county. They finally succeeded in this object, and when the monument is

completed in Washington it will be the second one to this great general, who gave so willingly of his talents and means to the struggling colonists in their war of the revolution.

After the close of the revolutionary war Baron Steuben spent considerable time in New York, living on a farm that was then in what was known as Jones' Woods, near the East Fifty-seventh street of the present day. After long delays on the part of congress to pay him his salary, a grant was finally made to him of a tract of 16,000 acres of land that came to be known as Steuben Patent, and was situated in the northern part of this county. Here the baron built a small, plain house, furnishing it with his camp utensils and the remains of his military chest, and the closing years of his life were mostly passed in this place. He died in 1794.

He had often requested that he be buried under one of his own trees, and that his grave should be left to become overgrown with such shrubs and trees as might spring up naturally.

In 1872 several German societies in New York city erected a monument over the grave. This monument stands directly over the grave of the dead warrior, and bears only the word "Steuben" as an inscription. The dense woods upon all sides give it a strange appearance, and the visitor is struck with the loneliness of the surroundings.

### Dog-Shearing Motor.

On the banks of the Seine recently considerable surprise was caused by a perambulating motor for shearing dogs. The engine is two and one-half horsepower and can shear six dogs an hour. There is little doubt that before long this means of clipping will be generally adopted.

### Girl's Invention.

A 15-year-old girl, of Brussels, has invented a portable turn-table for reversing the direction of motor cars. The apparatus is fixed on the chassis, which has a driving-wheel at each end and is worked by an electric motor. It has been patented.

### Retort Courteous.

"Hold your tongue for a fool," growled Mr. Naggs, who was trying to absorb some information from his paper.

"Oh, very well," rejoined his better half. "I didn't know you wanted to talk."—Chicago Daily News.

### Sardines in Japan.

Careful as the Japanese are in the use of food, they have neglected the sardines abundant off their coasts, using many of the little fishes for fertilizers. Now they have begun to can sardines in oil and they hope to compete successfully with France in foreign markets.

### Temporary Mast.

The "jury mast" has nothing in common with a jury except its derivation from the same word "jour," the French word meaning day. The jury mast is one which is put up temporarily—for a day—just as a jury in its legal term meant a tribunal summoned for a short period only.

One is a statue of the late President Kruger that never reached Pretoria and lies in a yard at Durban. ## BRYAN MAKES COMPARISON

Talks to Republicans in Jersey City Audience About Making of Vast Fortunes
