

### \$11,000 PROFIT IN 3 YEARS

That is the Increase in Value on Two Sections of Panhandle Land in Three Years.

From the Claude News we obtain the information that John Scott, a prominent citizen of the Goodnight community, has sold his place there and will return to the "old country." The News says:

"John Scott of Goodnight sold his three-section ranch this week to Mr. Hudson, of Potter county. The ranch consists of one school and two patent sections. Consideration, \$11.00 per acre. In April, 1903, Mr. Scott purchased the two patent sections, paying for both \$2,500. In this sale he realizes \$14,080—a clear profit of \$11,500. For the school section he gets \$11 straight, Mr. Hudson assuming the debt to the state. The purchaser sold his Potter county land in order that he might secure a home where he could have the benefits of church and school privileges and grow fruits and grain crops of all kind. Mr. Scott is an old-timer and is now reaping the fruits of his faith in the plains country. He and his estimable family expect to return to the old country about the first of October."

## AT B. Y. P. U. ENCAMPMENT

Miss Irene Burdette Writes of a Visit of a Clarendon Crowd to the Camp at Probst.

Thinking that perhaps the many readers of the Banner-Stockman would not be averse to reading a few lines on the above subject I submit the following:

There is no need to say that our merry crowd of ten had its patience well tested while waiting for the northbound Denver. But three hours riding took us five miles beyond Amarillo to Probst. At this place we "pitched our tents" and prepared for one week's outing.

The encampment is in a sub-irrigated valley, nestling between two elevations (may we say mountains? That is the chief characteristic of the plains—the absence of mountains). It is bordered on either side by running streams. Along these streams we find the stately cottonwood rearing heavenward. These make excellent shade.

One luxury we enjoyed to the utmost was bathing and wading in these running streams. In fact one felt as though he had found the "fountain of perpetual youth." A glimpse at a mirror, however, soon convinced him that there still remained the traces that Time had made.

There is a large lake on the grounds, and the committee hopes to have it dotted with boats next year.

The mountain lying to the east was quite a center of attraction. You would see the young as well as the old strolling at its base, and others laboriously climbing to its top. Each was well paid for his trouble, for after having once surmounted the difficult passage one had such a commanding view of his environments.

Quite a number had their cooking utensils along and enjoyed their sweets cooked on "camping out" fires. Others, who wanted rest, took their meals at the restaurant, while some who stayed in Amarillo went out on the "dinky." It made two trips daily.

Besides feasting physically upon the healthful atmosphere of the plains we were well fed mentally and spiritually. At 10 a. m. each day we heard a lecture on Sunday school work by Rev. Brittain of Waco. We are sorry that more Sunday school instructors did not hear these, for no one who listened could return to his respective class without having more of a teacher's spirit. At 11 all ears were lent to Dr. B. H. Carroll of Waco. Words are inadequate to express how much good his lectures did. At 3:30 p. m. the young were highly entertained by Rev. Kendall, the B. Y. P. U. lecturer.

If the above lectures can be excelled, it must be by the sermons delivered by Rev. George McDaniels of Richmond, Va.

It made us sad to depart and leave so many good things, but each made himself a solemn promise that he would go next year the very first day and stay until the last. Clarendon had the honor of being the best represented of any.

You are all invited to go with us next year.

We had a kodak and made some fine pictures, but none of them can compare to the picture hung on memory's wall.

**RANCH AND CATTLE SALES**

Many Transactions in the Canyon City Country of Late Reported by Canyon City News.

Dr. Howell has sold his ranch in Swisher county, 19 sections, to Cunningham & Green, land agents of Amarillo, at \$8 per acre for the patented and \$7 for the state lands. It brings him something over \$91,000 and he retains possession to January 1st.

J. G. Cruikshank's calves, about 65, shipped week before last and put on the Kansas City market Monday of last week, netted him \$8.05 each.

The E. W. Neese crop of wheat, 20 acres, was threshed out this week making 576 bushels or nearly 29 bushels per acre. He sold the wheat for \$403 to U. S. Guber.

Geo. C. Long was in town Tuesday on his return from a trip to Kansas City. He left for Bovina again Wednesday. He informed our reporter that the National Live Stock Company lands, which he has been handling at Bovina have all been sold and that he will wind up the business connected therewith by Sept. 1st. These lands, 65,000 acres, have all been disposed of within the last three weeks and at prices varying from \$10 to \$15 per acre and largely as the result of newspaper advertising.

C. T. Word, through L. C. Lair, sold 4 sections, the remaining portion of his Castro county ranch, Wednesday to G. A. Kaseman of Albuquerque, N. M., at \$8.50 per acre, a total of \$21,760.

M. N. Gallagher's calves, 88 head, a few yearlings included, shipped and sold at the same time as J. G. Cruikshank's, brought him \$8.50 per head, net.

J. M. Black and W. C. Baird have bought the L. S. Carter remaining three sections including his nice home place, at \$16,000. Mr. Carter talks of moving down about Lockney.

L. S. Carter has sold his cattle, some 220 head, to John A. Wallace at the following prices: Cows and calves, \$22.50; fat cows, \$18.00; steer yearlings, \$15.00; heifer yearlings, \$12.00. From all report, this was an extra bunch of cattle, all high grade Herefords and in fine condition.

**TROUBLE FOR A PRINCE.**

Russian Husband of Grant's Granddaughter Faces Revolt of Peasants on His Estate.

New York.—Much interest has been excited in this country in the uprising which is reported to have taken place among the peasants on the estate belonging to Princess Cantacuzene, mother of Prince Cantacuzene, because of the latter's marriage to Miss Julia Dent Grant, daughter of Brig. Gen. Fred D. Grant, U. S. A., and granddaughter of Gen. Ulysses S. Grant. It is said that the peasants have refused to plow the land and have driven away the employes of the estate.

These extensive land properties are at Poltava and are said to be held by

the Dowager Princess Cantacuzene, and will be inherited at her death by Prince Michel Cantacuzene, her son, whose marriage to Miss Grant was such a great social event at Newport, R. I., several years ago.

The prince and princess, upon their return to the famous estate in Russia after the wedding, were welcomed by the peasants in the quaint custom of offering bread and salt as presents. Arches were erected and decked with sheaves of wheat and poppies, in honor of the homecoming of the prince and his American bride, and the prince was carried on the shoulders of the peasantry to the castle, flaming torches lighting the way.

The Cantacuzenes contemplated visiting the United States, but the present troubles will probably interfere with their plans. They are now living, it is said, in Paris or some of the European cities.

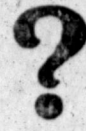
