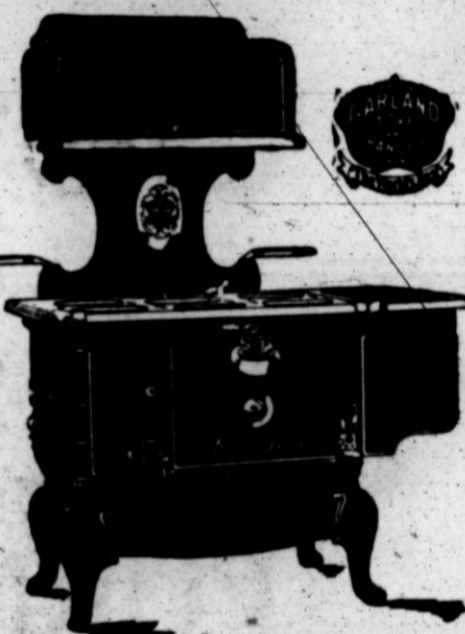

With a splendid good dinner at the Northern Hotel a la 50 cents each for the members and a three-hour sitting, adjourning to the secretaries office, the directors of the Commercial Club spent a good deal of time talking, and transacted some routine business matters.

Those present were: Messrs. Gough, Oberthier, Lipscomb, Elliston, Elliott, Fuqua, Holman. Chairman Knight was out of the city.

It would warm your cold feet up a little if you, who are criticising the directors of the club, should attend one or two meetings at the Monday noon sessions. No one is barred—the only requisite being that you pay for your own dinner unless some director has an extra silver coin for you.

Capitol Syndicate Litigation.

Another move was made last week, says a Chicago dispatch, in the legal battle begun conducted by Mrs. Margaret C. Babcock, to set aside an agreement between the Capitol, Freehold, Land and Investment Company, a \$15,000,000 corporation of which she is a stockholder, and a syndicate composed of Charles B. Farwell, and Abner Taylor.

She filed a petition in the circuit court asking for an accounting, and making a claim against the estate of John V. Farwell and the others a share in the profits, which have accrued during the time the property has been operated by the syndicate said to amount to nearly \$6,000,000.

Mrs. Babcock filed a suit in 1906 to set aside the contract, entered into between the company and the syndicate whereby the latter was to take over and operate the property of the company, which is in the Panhandle of Texas, and comprises about 3,000,000 acres of land, with cattle and improvements, and were to receive all of the profits accruing therefrom. Mrs. Babcock insisted that it was not a legal contract, but Judge McEwen ruled, in favor of the company, declaring that too long a time had elapsed after the making of the contract to brake it.

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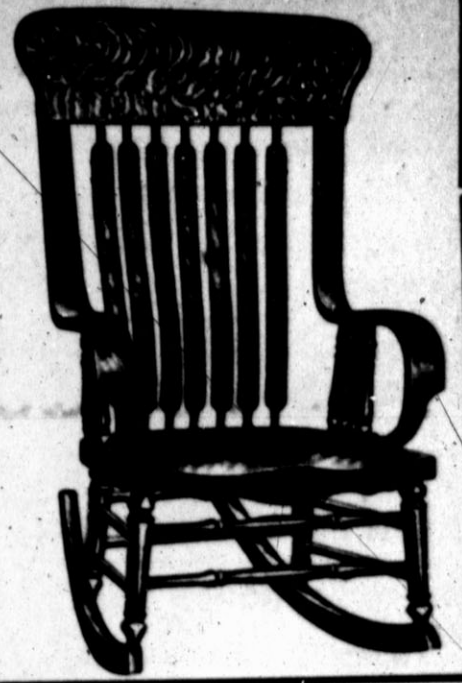

As a little souvenir, Mrs. Burks presented each child with a handsome little booklet as they were leaving for their homes.



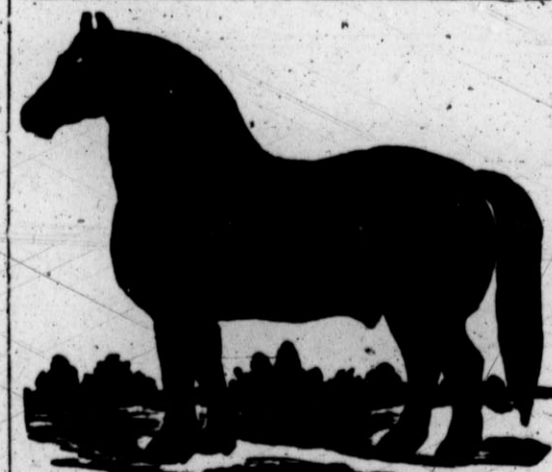

SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS SESSION

Many Subjects of Importance Discussed—Tax Levied—Bonds Signed—List of Teachers Completed.

At the office of the secretary the school board of the Hereford Independent School met Monday night and transacted much important business. The following members were present: L. Gough, Geo. W. Irwin, J. L. Fuqua, W. B. Beach, J. O. Jenkins and W. B. Palmer.

The next session of school is to open Monday, September 13th, and four scholastic months will be taught before the Christmas holidays.

The expense budget for next session indicated that a levy of 40 cents on the \$100 would be necessary to maintain the school for the full term of nine months. Then 10 cents additional must be assessed to provide a sinking fund for the payment of the building bonds.

Superintendent Wray presented a course of study which was approved and ordered printed for the use of the pupils and teachers. The course provides for eleven grades; four grades in the high school, three in the grammar school and four in

the primary. Secretary Holman reported that all teachers who had been elected had accepted as follows: E. H. Wray, Superintendent; R. A. Robertson, of Runge, Principal; S. H. Cannon of Kentucky, teacher of Latin; Mrs. E. H. Wray, teacher of English; Miss Grace McGarr, English and Geography; Miss Roxye Ivey, History; Miss Frances Stroud, English and Mathematics; Miss Frances Turroutine, 4th Grade; Miss Esther McGill of Denton, 3rd Grade; Miss Roberta Roby, 2nd Grade; Miss Olive Elder of Pilot Point, 1st Grade.

By motion and agreement, it was decided that no "unders" would be received into the school, but that the "overs" up to 19 years of age inclusive would be received free. Chairman Gough announced that he voted "no" on admitting "overs" free and asked that the same be recorded in the minutes.

The question of new buildings brought considerable discussion. It was decided to spend an all-day session, Monday August 30th, discussing plans and on that day invite architects to submit plans.

It was reported that the printed bonds had been received and it was ordered that the president and secretary of the board sign them and forward to the state department for registration and approval.

W. B. Beach, chairman of special committee, reported that the old building could not be removed from the lot, but would have to be torn down. There upon it was decided

to erect a board wall between the old building and the new building while being erected, and put the new building as near the center of the block as possible.

The County Assessor, J. W. Ford, was present and reported that the total valuation of the property in the Hereford Independent School District was \$1,957,820, exclusive of the railroad property. There are about 11 miles of the Santa Fe line in the district which is to be valued at \$5,000 per mile with \$3,000 per mile for intangible assets, all of which added to the other property will give \$2,045,820 as a total valuation.

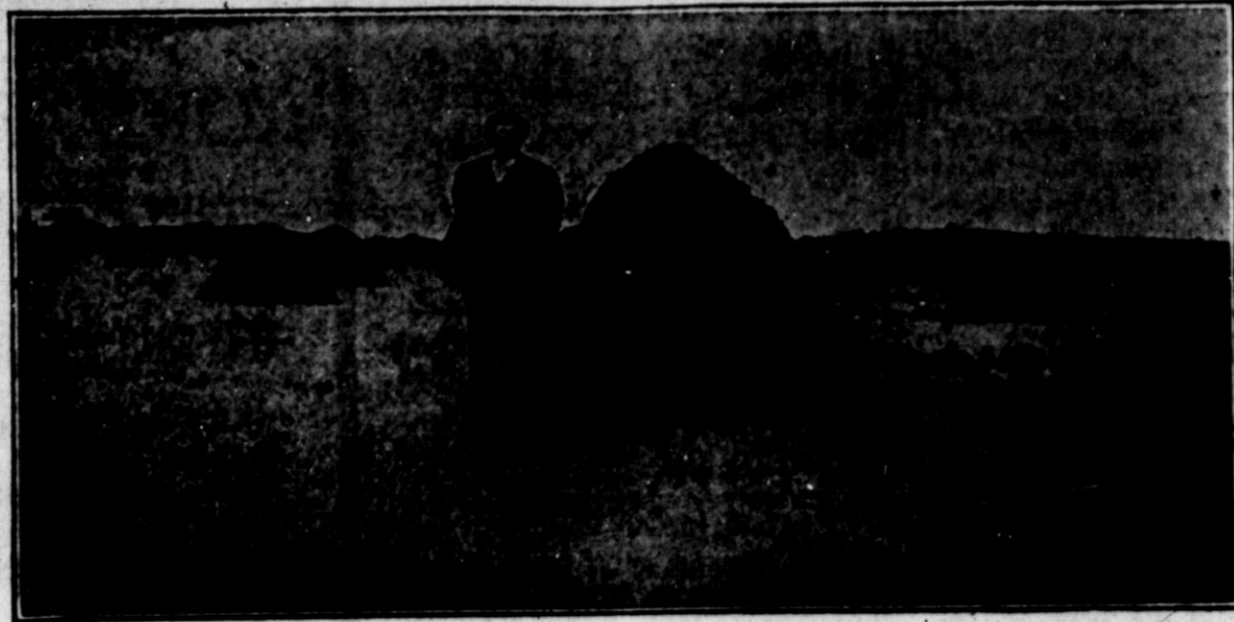
