The condition of the roadbed on the Denver demands attention. Wrecks are getting to be entirely too numerous, and if something is now existing a terrible catastrophe will undoubtedly result at no very distant day, wherein scores of people may be killed. The equipment of the Denver is now said to e first-class; elegant trains pulled best types are being rum; heavy best types are being run; heavy
steel rails prevail over the entire road; and yet the condition of the roadbed is such that these trains are being ditched with a frequent and monotonous regularity. So lucky, in that no one has been injured; but this state of been can not go on forever, and sooner or later a wholesale slangliter will result.
The engines and trains are simply too heavy for the roadbed so say many experienced railroad men. Something should be done. If the officials of the road will not rebuild their roadbed to a condition of safety the people along the route should take the matter up with the railroad commission by petition It is not right that hundreds of lives should be endangered every day.
