# **Employees** To Change Quarters

Employees of the City of Hereford may start moving into the new city hall in less than two weeks. City Manager Dudley Bayne said Thursday

Work on the water department and tax office is completed, and the rest of the building may be ready within a week. according to Bayne.

The \$730,000 building is being paid for with federal revenue-sharing funds. City commissioners authorized construction of the city hall last year and gave the job to contractor C.B. Thompson of Lubbock.

Workers are putting the finishing touches on the administrative wing, including the commission room, today. Telephones will be installed in the building and electricity will be hooked up by this weekend. Bayne said.

The city manager said that tile, carpet and ligh fixtures will be installed in the police department sometime next week.

"A lot of them (city employees) will move the following week. As far as the water department goes, we're trying to not interfere with billing time. We'll start billing the 19th so we hope to move the computer and get started by the 18th. Bayne said.

Hopefully, he added, "we'll all be moved by Christmas."

After all departments are in operation in the new building, located west of the old city hall, the previous quarters will be torn down for additional parking

# Guzman Guilty Of Murder

CANYON -- A 47th District Court jury early this morning found Eleazar Guzman guilty of murder in connection with the July 28 stabbing death of Brian Dodson in Amarillo.

Guzman, who resides in Hereford, had shown no emotion during the two-day trial, but wept after the verdict was read. The jury deliberated from 8:30 p.m. Thursday to 12:20 a.m. today before reaching the verdict.

The punishment phase of the trial was scheduled to begin this morning.

Guzman and Bobby Castillo, also of Hereford, were charged with killing Dodson, who was stabbed four times on the parking lot of south Amarillo discotheque Scotland Yard and died aout seven hours later at Northwest Texas


Charges against Castillo were later

Jurors rejected defense claims that Guzman acted in self defense. They also rejected the lesser offense of involuntary manslaughter by finding Guaman guilty of murder. He could receive up to a life prison sentence.

A purported confession that Guzman gave Amarillo police officers three days after the stabbing was entered into evidence Thursday by Randall County District Attorney Randall Sherrod.

The statement, read aloud in court. Guzman allegedly said that he and "the

guy" had argued, then fought. "I don't know where I hit him, He didn't make any sounds." Guzman said (See TRIAL, Page 2)

Opening day will kick off a month-long season in the Panhandle, with hunting continuing through Jan. 6, 1980.

According to The Brand's fifth annual "Magic Triangle Pheasant Forecast" which was published in mid-November. 'sportsmen may be in for some of the best pheasant hunting they've encountered since the colorful species became fair game in the local area years ago."

population in the Texas Panhandle. Deaf Smith County led the Panhandle in the pheasant count with a total of over 10 birds per mile recorded.

A whopping 320 percent increase over the 1978 count was recorded in one area of neighboring Castro County.

Organization-Minded Cantu 'Not Shy'

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's regime announced today that within 48 hours it will make a statement on a spy trial date for some of the 50 American hostages at the U.S. Embassy and that death sentences are possible.

The government also struggled to put down a rebellion in the northwest by the nation's biggest ethnic minority, the Turks, whose spiritual leader said he supported the insurgents' fight for "freedom and their rights."

The announcement on a trial date declaration was made by Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh, who also said those Americans not suspected of spying will be released "as soon as possible," and that arrangements were being made for all the captives to be vis-

However, a spokesman for the student holding the Americans militants contradicted the foreign minister. "We will release nobody, nobody at all' unless the deposed shah is returned to Iran, and "we have made no decision on the visits," the spokesman said in a telephone interview.

State Department spokesman Walter Ramsay told reporters in Washington that scheduling trials for the hostages was "absolutely outrageous. They (the Iranians) had no business taking them hostage and they have no business putting them on trial.

"Our position is that all the hostages should be released. We welcome the news that visits to the hostages may be arranged and we hope they can be arranged soon.

There have been persistent, but unconfirmned reports that about eight hostages have been under intensive interrogation during the past two weeks.

The Americans were seized 34 days ago. Asked if he thought the hostages would be sentenced to death. Ghotbzadeh said: "I hope we don't reach that extent. But on the face of the earth anything is

possible. The foreign minister gave no specific date for the planned release, or say how many hostages might be freed. But he said there were two types of hostages those who did not "work in espionage

and those who are guilty of espionage.' Of the latter group, he said, "I don't think those people are going to benefit

from diplomatic immunity.'

Ghotbzadeh also announced that arrangements were being made for all the hostages to be visited in order to show the world that allegations the captives have been mistreated are untrue. Some of the hostages have not been seen by neutral observers since the day the embassy was seized Nov. 4.

The Moslem militants holding the captives have vowed to keep them until President Carter extradites Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi to Iran to stand

, WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's unemployment rate dropped from 6 percent to 5.8 percent in November. a clear sign that the economy remains healthier than most forecasters have expected, the government reported

today The Labor Department said total employment rose by 350,000 jobs during the month, while the number of jobless persons in the labor market fell by 140,000 to just over 6 million.

During the past five months, the jobless rate has moved like a yo-yo, rising from 5.7 percent in July to 6 percent in August, back down to 5.8 percent in September, up to 6 percent again in October and back to 5.8 percent.

The pattern has been a welcome

surprise to the Carter administration, which had predicted that unemployment would rise well above 6 percent because of an expected recession that some economists believe already has begun.

The Labor Department said most of the decline in unemployment in November occurred among women and blacks, the same two groups most affected by a rise in unemployment during October.

Bregger said the recent fluctuations in the overall jobless rate stem from changes among the part-time work force. while unemployment among full-time workers has remained steady since the

Overall, the department said employment in November totaled 97.6 million out of a labor force of 103.7

The department said most of the employment gains during November occurred among adult women and white workers. A large portion of the new jobs were among white-collar sales workers.

During the past 12 months, employment has increased by 1.9 million, but most of that growth occurred during the first few months of that period. Adult women accounted for three-fourths of the vear-long growth.

The government gave the following breakdowns of seasonally adjusted unemployments rates for different population groups: -Adult men: 4.3 percent in

#### Administration Meets With Families

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Carter administration is meeting today with the families of Americans being held hostage in Tehran amid hints from Iran that some captives soon will be released and others given dates for trial as spies.

The revolutionary government's announcement that trial dates will be set for some of the 50 Americans brought no immediate reaction from the State Department, which is bringing the family members here for briefings on the crisis.

The department invited one member of each hostage family to the session several days ago. and is flying out-of-town relatives to Washington at government expense.

The relatives were expected to meet with Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance and other officials

#### Can Deny Permits

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) -A state judge - who made it clear he has no use for the shah of Iran or the Ayatollah Khomeini - says an anti-shah rally here oculd escalate into violence that would have local and international repercussions.

State District Judge Peter Mchael Curry ruled Thursday that city officials could deny parade permits to Iranian students who sought to protest the presence of the deposed monarch at nearby Lackland Air

The city also denied a permit to Ku Klux Klansmen who planned a counter-rally. The KKK had only planned to counter any Iranian demonstration, and city officials said they feared violence clashes and possible retaliation against the 50 American hostages in

During the debate, the judge told the San Antonio College student that he would not argue on behalf of either the shah or the current Iranian ruler.

## **UT Study Shows Companies Hurt with Restrictions**

AUSTIN. Texas (AP) - A University of Texas study shows United States Oil companies would be affected in widely different ways by restrictions on

Viewing the international operation of multinational oil companies en masse obscures significantly diverse crude oil importing practices." the authors said.

Dr. George Kozmetsky, UT business dean: Hossein Askan. professor of international business; and A. Thompson Reichert, a former research associate in the graduate business school, wrote the report.

They studied the 20 largest oil companies that have foreign operations and completed their work before President Carter halted oil imports from Iran.

Although dependency figures for our nation may appear to be critical when a particular exporting nation restricts its output, the impact of such restrictions is less important for the United States as a whole than it is for specific companies." the report said.

It said. for example, that Phillips draws 70.8 percent of its imports from Nigeria, Sun 39 percent from Algeria and Exxon 40.1 percent from Saudi Arabia.

In that year one of the village's collective farmers came across a bone bigger than any he'd ever seen before while he was digging a cellar. He showed the hefty bone to a local schoolteacher, who in turn notified officials in Kiev.

The newest site for excavation wasn't found simply by accident, but instead by drilling down into the ground at intervals over a wide area and examining the soil cores for bone fragments and vestiges of prehistoric human culture.

When the soil samples indicated a promising spot, a bulldozer was brought in to clear off the top 6.2 feet of earth. After that, a team of a dozen archaeologists proceeded with meticulous digging by

Along with mammoth bones, the site has yielded an assortment of Paleolithic stone tools. chips of flint, amber beads, red ochre used for coloring and other human artifacts.

# Go Up in Low Periods

Import Quotas May

WASHINGTON (AP) - A new method of computing annual quotas of beef that Australia and other foreign countries can ship to the United States has taken another step forward in Congress.

The Senate Finance Committee approved the measure Thursday by voice vote. It would automatically allow more foreign meat into this country domestic hamwhenever burger supplies decline.

Called a "counter-cyclical" program, the House passed a similar bill 352-48 on Nov. 14.

The Congressional Budget Office estimated that the legislation's impact on consumer food prices over a 10-year period "would be about neutral.

Ten years is about the length of the normal cattle cycle - the time it takes for producers to reduce herds in response to an oversupply and depressed prices, and then to rebuild them

For example, after cattle inventories peaked five years ago. producers reduced herds dramatically and only recently have gradually begun to rebuild them. It will be several more years, at least, before U.S. beef output is able to increase substantially

With farmers and ranchers, keeping more sows now for breeding, fewer of them are being slaughtered. Those traditionally provide much of the U.S. hamburger supply.

Thus. U.S. hamburger supplies are relatively tight now. but so are supplies from traditional foreign sources. Their cattle industries are on much the same cycle as U.S. producers because the existing law encourages a worldwide pattern.

Present law, enacted in 1964, requires fresh, frozen or chilled meat imports to be reduced when domestic supplies of those meats decline and consumer prices rise. Presidents can and usually have - suspended or increased the import quotas

Those moves, however, have always prompted complaints from the cattle industry that presidents are hurting their chances to make enough money in tight-supply years to stay in business.

President Carter, who vetoed a similar bill in November 1978, has said he would sign the 1979 version even though it gives him less authority to set aside quota formulas than present law.

Under the bill, at least 1.25 billion pounds of meat would be imported each year. That is 50 million pounds more than required by this year's multilateral trade package, in which the United States agreed to allow at least 1.2 billion pounds of the quota-type meat enter each

Carter, acting under the 1964

law, suspended quotas for 1979 and settled on "voluntary restraint" agreements with 14 foreign suppliers - led by Australia and New Zealand - to :: allow no more than 1.57 billion

pounds into the U.S. market. The bill forbids quota suspensions or increases if prices are falling and cow-beef production rising, except in times of natural disaster, national emergencies

or "market disruptions." According to the Agriculture Department, U.S. beef output by commercial packing houses will total about 21.1 billion pounds this year, down 12 percent from 1978.

Officials say "not much change in beef production is expected" in 1980 but that larger supplies of pork and poultry will help offset the lag in beef



# Cowboys, Eagles Both Stumbled, Now in Saturday Showdown

PHILADELPHIA (AP) They both stumbled over three straight losses, but neither the Philadelphia Eagles nor the Dallas Cowboys fell flat.

The Eagles recovered from their tailspin to upset the Cowboys 31-21 in Dallas last month and have since won three straight to become the first National Football League team to earn a playoff berth.

The Monday night loss to the Eagles was the first of three games in 10 days for the Cowboys. Dallas lost all three to fall a full game behind Philadelphia in the National Football Con-

ference Eastern Division. With 10 days' rest after the Thanksgiving Day loss to the Houston Oilers, the Cowboys simplified their offense, got their running game going and took a 28-7 win from the New York Giants last Sunday to end their skid.

It all becomes academic Saturday, when the Eagles, 10-4, host the Cowboys, 9.5, in a nationally televised rematch.

In another game Saturday, Denver is at Seattle in a game that will help decide whether the Broncos or San Diego take AFC West Division honors. The Chargers face the Saints at New Orleans Sunday

"The game against Dallas is for all the marbles," said Eagles tight end Keith Krepfle.

'If we win it, we have a good chance of winning the division." said Dallas Coach Tom Landry. "And if we lose it. there's a chance we won't even be in it (the playoffs).

Dallas is still one game behind the Eagles, tied with the Washington Redskins, who the Cowboys play at home to close

"I don't even know all those tie-breaking things, but I know Slated Here we're going to the playoffs. said Eagles Coach Dick Vermeil after Philadelphia guaranteed itself at least a wild-card playoff spot with a 44-7 win over the Detroit Lions last Sunday. .

"A game like that helps us from a momentum standpoint going in against Dallas." Vermeil said. "Beating the Cowboys once in a season is tough enough, but beating them twice in the same year is next to im-

'Now we'll raise our sights a little and see if we can't win the conference championship.

'People today are terrifically desirous of sex and in need of sex, therefore if you don't satisfy their sexual appetite they have a hard time believing that you really love them," he writes.

"So sometimes we have to satisfy that appetite to prove to them that we really care and we're concerned and that we love them."

The advice is part of a new compilation of Berg's "love letters" currently mailed to possible recruits, seeking to enlist them as members with pledges of a 10 percent tithe of income, a \$10 monthly or other regular contribution.

The group, founded by Berg in California in 1968, is now scattered in 70 countries, according to a recent study by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, and currently claims 8,000 young people be-

Alternatively called the "Children of God" or "Love Family." it is one of numerous new religions that sprung up in

They've undergone a sharp

decline, according to findings of a survey of religion wriers across the country, made by the Rev. Martin E. Marty, a church historian of the University of Chicago Divinity School.

"Ninety-three percent saw these groups sliding at the decade's end," he reports in the current ecumenical weekly, Christian Century.

But the "Children of God" or "Love Family," with units and mailing addresses in many countries, still is actively pursuing members, as indicated in the new mailings, advocating sex as an evangelistic tech-

"Flesh can satisfy flesh, but only spirit can satisfy spirit, and we soon found that we had to give of both to 'satisfy all their needs according to His riches in glory'," Berg writes, along with drawings of couples in close

The current mailings come from Zurich, Switzerland, where Berg now apparently re-

The B'nai B'rith report says the group's materials are a mixture of biblical misquotations, sex, predictions of earthly doom and "anti-Israel, pro-Arab propaganda steeped in crude anti-Semitism." It also regularly denounces all histori-

# Padre Island Firms Seek Damages

WASHINGTON (AP) - South Texas government and business representatives have put their case before a House panel considering a measure that would offer federal compensation for damages caused by the massive Ixtoc I oil spill.

"Our business community has suffered great losses through no business decision made by our business people and for which no insurance can be purchased," Kirby Liljendahl of South Padre Island said Thursday at a House subcommittee hearing

The beach town was among the hardest hit by the scarcity of tourists during a peak summer

period. A bill introduced by Rep. Joe Wyatt, D-Texas, would authorize up to \$80 million in federal funds to compensate for damages or losses caused by oil that arrived on Texas beaches from the Mexican well.

Ralph Thompson of the South Padre Island Tourist Bureau estimated that hotel occupancy rates dropped from about 100 percent to 30 percent as news of the oil threat spread.

He said the start of the winter tourist season would show how effectively a publicity campaign has spread the word about the oil-free beaches.

Although winds and currents' changed to drive the oil back toward the south, the spill in the Bay of Campeche continues and the reversal of currents in the

spring could threaten the Texas

coast again. 'This time it may not go away. after a month," Wyatt said. "It might last all summer."

Texas officials threw their support to the compensation Lawsuits have been filed by

the state's attorney general, local governments and private organizatons seeking millions of dollars in damages. Doug Caroom, representing

Texas Attorney General Mark White, said federal comensation would relieve the infernational repercussions stemming from the pending

Any recovery for damages that the federal government later received from private companies, the Mexican national oil company or the Mexican government would replace the expenditures of the

compensation fund. The state of Texas' suit does not name the Mexican national oil company as a defendant. Caroom predicted, however, that it would be likely for the company to be named in the suit and relatons with Mexico could suffer as a result.

"Litigation of this sort is nev-

er pleasant," he said. 'He said another advantage of federal compensation would be a speedy resolution to the claims that face long and complex battles in the court.

Frank Cox, representing Texas Gov. Bill Clements, also endorsed the bill.

State Sen. A.R. "Babe" Schwartz of Galveston said the compensation program effectively would spread the damages among all American taxpayers for the sake of better international relations, instead of forcing the Texas coastal residents to bear the brunt.

"These people were all innocent victims of a spill over which they had no control," Schwartz said. "The oil that came up to the beaches virtually destroyed the tourist season. A subcommittee of the House

Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, which met this fall iin Crpus Christi to hear testimony about the causes and effects of the lxtoc I spill, held the

hearing on Wyatt's bill. The Texas congressman, whose district includes some of

the areas hardest hit by the

spill, denied that the compensation fund might jeopardize the effort to develop a compehensive bill to help victims of all oil spills.


POLLY'S PROBLEM


