By The Associated Press Iraq raised its price of oil to \$26 a barrel today, starting what may be a new round of price increases among members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

The decision by Iraq, the secondlargest producer in OPEC, was reported by industry sources, who said the boost was retroactive to Dec. 1.

The move came as Venezuela, which was host to the OPEC conference that failed to reach agreement on oil prices earlier this month, was planning to announce its own pricing decision.

lraq produces 3.7 million barrels a day but exports relatively little of it to the United States. It has raised production substantially over the past year.

Venezuelan Energy Minister Humberto Calderon Berti declined in Caracas on Thursday to say what his country's new price would be. But he had told reporters last week the new price "may be \$26" a barrel.

Venezuela is the supplier of 3.5 percent of U.S. oil needs. It had joined with Saudi

# For Assault Hereford police are looking for a

29-year-old Mexican-American who allegedly raped a 14-year-old girl at gunpoint Wednesday night in Veteran's Park.

Police said today that a warrant had been issued for the arrest. of Robert Ortega, whose last address was listed at 234 Ave. A. Ortega could not be located late Thursday after the warrant had been issued, according to police.

Police are alleging that Ortega and the girl, who reportedly had been introduced to him by one of her friends earlier Wednesday evening, were in a car when she told him she wanted to go home.

Ortega reportedly refused to drive her home, and instead took her to Veteran's Park where he produced a pistol. He allegedly raped the girl twice.

Ortega then reportedly drove the girl to S. Kingwood, north of W. Highway 60, where the two sat for two or three hours before he fell asleep. Police said the girl then escaped from the car, walked home and called police around 7 a.m. Thursday.

The juvenile was treated for bruises to the head and face at Deaf Smith General

Hospital. Police said Ortega is also wanted for violating his probation in Oldham

The airport in Kabul, the Afghan capital where thousands of Soviet troops were flown in over the past few days, was believed closed, so there was no immediate way for correspondents to confirm reports of active Russian fighting. to take over the presidential palace and radio station Thursday night.

But witnesses said in telephone calls to diplomats in New Delhi, India, the Russians fought Afghan troops guarding Radio Kabul, knocked out two Afghan tanks, captured the complex and took soldiers prisoner in 31/4 hours of battles that ended at 11 p.m. with MiG-21 warplanes criss-crossing the skies.

They described Kabul as quiet but tense today with morning traffic resuming unimpeded by Russian soldiers who were seen throughout the mile-high Afghan capital.

"It was the largest Soviet troop movement outside Eastern Europe since World War II," one source said of the in-

flux of Russian troops. "You can see it almost as a Soviet invasion of Afghanistan - taking Kabul and then putting their man in power."

Karmal was immediately declared Afghanistan's president and general secretary of the central committee of the ruling Khalq Party and named his cronies to important positions.

The coup was the third in 20 months in the landlocked, mountainous Central Asian nation that borders Moslem fundamentalist Iran on the west, and for the moment it entrenched Karmal, a former deputy premier variously described by Western diplomats as a Soviet "puppet" or "stooge.

Amin, the man he replaced, also was a pro-Soviet communist who grabbed power in a palace shootout in September that killed his pro-Soviet predecessor, Nur Mohammed Taraki. But Radio Kabul said Amin was executed almost imme-

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Iran's foreign minister angrily demanded spy trials for the U.S. hostages if America pushes for U.N. sanctions against his country. At least 10 of the captives were reported rebelling against their captors, and there was no sign their jailers would free any of them.

The United States has interpreted every Iranian "good gesture as a sign of weakness." Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh told reporters Thursday night. He referred to Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's decision last Friday to allow three American clergymen to have Christmas visits with the hostages and President Carter's announcement that America would seek U.N. sanctions against Iran in a bid to pressure the release of the captives.

Ghotbzadeh remained silent on the Carter announcement until after the three visiting clergymen left Iran Thursday morning, but he was clearly angry when he gave his country's official reaction to the plan.

"All of a sudden we realize their (America's) whole propaganda is absolutely ridiculous." Ghotbzadeh said. "Now they are going to the Security Council just because they know in January the composition of the council will be different, and this is not acceptable to us.

"If the United States continues to put pressure on us...l don't see any usefulness in having this grand jury. It is better to have the normal trial of the hostages," he said.

Ghotbzadeh has been pushing 'a proposal to convene an international "grand jury" to hear Iranian grievances against the United States, with the hostages appearing before it as witnesses, but "not as the accused."

He put forward the plan after the Shah of Iran left the United States for sanctuary in Panama, a move he saw as a victory for Iranian determination. The Iranian militants who seized the U.S. Embassy in Tehran Nov. 4 have demanded the shah be returned for trial or all the captives would be tried as spies.

Before they left Iran, the clergymen, who met with 43 of the hostages, urged conciliation on both sides to end the 55day-old U.S.-Iranian standoff.

The clergymen arrived in the United States Thursday night and said they would relay messages from the hostages to their families today. They also planned to discuss the situation with American and Iranian officials in Washington.

"We must find subtle enough overtures of good will to be signs of some movement, without suggesting a give away." the Rev. William Howard, a Baptist from Princeton University, told reporters in Tehran.

Howard was joined on the three-day mission by the Revs. William Sloane Coffin and Thomas Gumbleton. But it was Howard who saw the largest number of hostages - 21 - at the occupied embassy compound on Christmas Day.

He told reporters 10 of the captives

were "clearly rebellious spirits," who "said sort of snappy things to their guards (and) let it be known their will had not been broken.

"They said things like 'What do these guys (the militants) know?" Howard said after his rare glimpse behind the guarded embassy walls.

For example, he noted that the militants barred their captives from any political discussion with the visitors. but "one guy said (to the guards) 'Can I ask a question about the Rose Bowl, or is it too political for you?"

Howard, who did not name any of the hostages he saw, said five or six of them "might have had teary eyes, some signs (See IRAN, Page 2)

# Iran Denies Moving 7 Hostages

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Moslem militants occupying the U.S. Embassy denied reports today that seven American hostages had been transferred from the compound to a maximum security jail. The official Pars news agency also denied distributing the report.

First word that Pars was carrying the report came from the NBC-TV correspondent in Tehran, who said Pars got its information from the French news agency, Agence France Presse.

The French news agency dispatch came from Chartres. France, and quoted a French legislator just returned from Tehran as saying the hostages had been transferred to Tehran's Evin Prison, probably for health reasons.

newspaper L'Echo Republicain, circulated by Agence France Presse. lawmaker Nicholas About gave no indication of the source of his information. He was not immediately available for elaboration.

He was one of three French lawmakers who recently returned from a selfinitiated fact finding tour to Iran. One of the lawmakers had earlier claimed that three of the hostages would be released before Christmas.

About reiterated that claim, saying he understood the decision was taken at a meeting of Iran's Revolutionary Council on Dec. 20-21.

"When that decision was taken, it was presented to us as a gesture of good faith toward France," he said.

About is a legislator from the district of

Yveline, which includes Neauphle-le-Chateau, the Paris suburb where Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini organized his return to Iran and the fall of the Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi.

# Farmer Expenses Gain Along with Prices

WASHINGTON (AP) - Prices of crops and livestock at the farm rose an average of .13.8 percent this year, one percentage point less than their gain in 1978, according to preliminary figures by the Agriculture Department. But farm production expenses, posting

a sharp gain over last year, continued to increase as well. The statistics, published Thursday,

also showed striking changes in the way prices for some commodity groups changed during the last two years. In 1978, for example, prices of

livestock and their products - which includes poultry, milk, wool and related items -, rose an average of 24 percent But this year, according to the figures,.

those prices increased only 18 percent. One significant difference has been this year's hog market. With slaughter up sharply, prices are down from 1978. That helped cool the increases in prices of cattle and some other items.

Prices of crops this year increased 8.3 percent, according to the statistics, compared to a gain of 6.3 percent in 1978. Crops, of course, include all the grains, oilseeds, cotton, tobacco and others grown by farmers.

The general figures do not show variations for specific livestock or crop prices and are useful mainly in showing changes from one year to the next,

Another indicator that is important when prices are discussed involves farm production expenses which, as in other sectors of the nation's economy, have felt the crunch of inflation.

According to the preliminary figures. farm production expenses jumped 14.6 percent this year, compared to a gain in 1978 of 8.7 percent.

No change was made in USDA's earlier estimate on 1979 net farm income - \$32 billion against \$27.9 billion in 1978, not allowing for inflation.

The net income figure was derived from USDA's estimate of total "cash receipts" of farmers, some \$130 billion

this year against \$111 billion in 1978. with allowances made for inventories. That boosted gross farm income to \$146 billion this year from \$126 billion in 1978. Production expenses this year were

estimated at \$114 billion, leaving a net of

\$32 billion, according to the figures.

Last year, production expenses totaled \$98.1 billion, leaving farmers' net in 1978

at \$27.9 billion, the report showed. Although department economists are

cautious about making flat predictions for 1980, they have said net farm income could fall next year by as much as 20 percent because of further increases in production costs.

# He's 1069 to All but Michigan High Court

ST. PAUL. Minn. (AP) - The number 1069 is not acceptable, but One-Zero Six Nine might be OK, the Minnesota Supremé Court ruled today in denying a Minneapolis man's legal bid to be named a number.

Michael Herbert Dengler, a former social studies teacher, has been calling himself 1069 for five years, saying the numerals have "personal significance" and relate to his philosophy of life.

He got his bank, the Social Security Administration and several state agencies to recognize him as 1069, which he pronounces as One Zero Six

But a utility company and the Minnesota Drivers' License Division wouldn't go along unless the numeral

had court approval, and two years ago Dengler filed suit seeking a legal name change. Two years before that, he was rebuffed by the North Dakota Supreme

In its unanimous ruling, the Minnesota Supreme Court said Dengler is free to call himself 1069 as a commonlaw right, but noted the American social and economic system is geared to identifying individuals by letters rather than numbers

"If he chooses to adopt a name which simply suffects himself to contempt, ridicule and inconvenience, he has a common law and statutory right to do so," s said Justice James Otis for the Supreme Court.

In suggesting a spelled out number,

such as One Zero Six Nine, the court said in a footnote that the first and last words would be phonetically the same as a name such as "Juan Nyen."

The court upheld a February 1978 decision by District Court Judge Donald Barbeau, who said it would be "dehumanizing" for any person to be known only by number. The judge likened it to the numbers tattooed on prisoners in World War II concentration camps.

To allow a legal name change to a number "would hasten the day in which we all become left in a faceless number." Barbeau said, also quoting from Shakespeare: "Who steals my purse steals trash ... He that filches from me my good name robs me of that which .... makes me poor indeed."

Dengler, divorced with two children living with their mother, is described in court records as a naturalized citizen, born in Germany. He was not available for comment on today's ruling.

In arguments before Barbeau in October 1977, Dengler's attorney, Stefan Tolin, said his client lost his teaching job in Fargo, N.D., because of

the name issue. The Supreme Court said Dengler, as 1069, could seek redress in the courts if any "substantial right" is refused him

because of his numeral-name. Up to now, Otis said, he has suffered only "trivial and self-inflicted in-

convenience."

### Russians Said

### Instrumental in Coup

WASHINGTON (AP) - It could hardly have been coincidental that the reported coup in Afghanistan followed a dramatic builden of Ressian troops, including combat forces, according to U.S. antibysts.

Officials said the Russians apparently were instrumental in ousting a nationalist-minded communist leader Thursday in Afghanistan in favor of another Martist who "will be in lockstep with the Soviets."

Defense Secretary Harold Brown estimated at a Florida news conference that Soviet military strength in Afghanistan has reached perhaps 10,000 men. That is about double the figure previously used by the State Department.

Reports reaching here indicated Russian troops were directly involved in street fighting in the capital city of Kabul haformation was said to be sketchy

Radio Kahul said Babrak Karmal, a former deputy prime minister, had overthrown a regime headed by Hafizuliah Amin. Several hours later, the official Soviet news agency, Tass, quoted Karmel as denouncing Amin's regime as a dictatorship and an agent of American imperialism."

U.S. analysts described both Karmal and Amin as communists, but said they were members of rival factions.

### For Texas Panhandle

#### By The Associated Press

A new surge of snowy weather, poised high over New Mexico, threatened to dump more snow on the Texas Panhandle today and Saturday.

The National Weather Service issued a winter storm watch and travelers' advisories for Northwest Texas for tomight and Saturday. Meteorologists said accumulations of snow between 1 and 3 inches were expected in the state's northwest corner by Saturday.

Elsewhere, a large canopy of clouds covered the state today.

A stationary front stretching from Wichita Falls to Del Rio divided the state into two temperature ranges. Northwest of the front readings were in the 30s and 40s, while to the southwest, temperatures climbed into the 50s and 60s. At 4 a.m. it was 33 in El Paso and 68 in Brownsville.

The only area reporting clear skies was the region west of the Guadalupe

The NWS said a storm system that scattered some snow across Northwest Texas Thursday weekend early today, but another storm, boiling in the upper atmosphere over New Mexico, was a threat of more snow.

### Young Boy Killed By Great Danes

DALLAS (AP) - A funeral was held today for a 5-year-old boy who was mauled by two Great Danes as he rode his new bicycle down a country road at his grandfather's farm in East Texas.

A team of four doctors at a Terrell hospital worked almost three hours Wednesday in an futile attempt to save Michael Wayne Nichols of Mesquite, the son of Dallas police officer Johnny

Kaufman County deputy sheriff Alton Ashworth said the boy was attacked as he rode the bicycle, which was a Christmas present, at his grandfather's farm near Wills Point.

The grandfather said it happened in just a minute or two," said Ashworth.

The deputy said Billy L. Nichols began looking for his grandson within minutes after the youth rode down the road and found the boy in a ditch with the Great Danes still attacking him.

By the time he (the grandfather) got down there, they had-just chewed him up." Ashworth said.

Hospital administrator D.L. Malcomb said the youth suffered multiple lacerations, deep gashes and broken bones, including ribs.

Officials said Thursday that by Jan. 1. there will be an estimated 2,309,130 farms, a decline of about 1.0 percent from 2.332,690 at the beginning of this year.

The annual decline in farm numbers had ranged from about 1.5 percent to 1.8 percent since 1975.

Total land in farms as of Jan. 1 was estimated at more than 1.046 billion acres, a decline of 2.35 million acres from last Jan. 1, the report said. The average farm size was shown at

453 acres, compared to 450 acres last Jan.

A farm is defined as "a place which has annual sales of agricultural products of \$1,000 or more.

One USDA official, who asked not to be identified, said he believed much of the slowdown in the farm numbers decline was due to inflation, that some farms qualified as farms which probably would not have had \$1,000 in annual safes in

"You don't have to sell much these days to have a gross sales of \$1,000 a year," he said.





The Irish Republican Army, which is heavily Catholic, is fighting to end British rule in Northern Ireland, where pro-British Protestants outnumber Catholics 2-1.

The IRA seeks to reunite the province with the overwhelmingly Catholic Republic to the south. Against them are British security forces and Protestants bitterly opposed to being dragged into an all-Ireland republic in which they'd be

outnumbered 3-1 by Catholics. The first official fatality of "The Troubles" was a 30-yearold Catholic, John Gallagher, shot dead Sept. 8, 1969, in Armagh when Protestant policemen trapped behind a barricade fired into a crowd.

The first British soldier skin was gunner Robert Curtis, 20, shot by IRA snipers while on patrol in Belfast's Turf Lodge district on Feb. 5, 1971.

Since then, the Army has lost 327 dead - its costliest campaign since the Korean war plus 95 Ulster Defense Regiment auxiliaries.

# Storm Hampers Rescue Divers

KETCHIKAN, Alaska (AP) - Stormy seas hampered efforts by Navy divers to explore an overturned ore freighter that is leaking diesel fuel in the Pacific, and authorities said there was little hope for the Taiwanese crew

A second body from the 741foot Lee Wang Zin was recovered Thursday, but diving plans were thwarted by 45-knot winds and 15-foot seas. A small storm was approaching the area. with winds expected to remain at 40-50 knots and seas at 10 to 15 feet today, the National Weather Service said

Coast Guard Cmdr. Ray Spoltman, federal on-scene coordinator, said the grounding of the freighter Thursday might make it easier for the 25-member diving team to approach from calmer water on the vessel's lee side to check for bodies or survivors from the 30member crew.

Diesel oil from the ship spread over 100 square miles of ocean, and major oil-spill equipment was being brought to the scene from Seattle by the cutter Munro, which also has a

large sick bay, Spoltman said. Officials say they have no estimates of how much of the estimated 370,000 gallons of oil already had leaked, but Spoltman said the amount of oil believed to be on board posed a major threat to the marine environment. As of Thursday night, the oil slick appeared to be moving out to sea and was

breaking up in heavy weather. Search and rescue officials had said some crew members might have been trapped in air pockets when the ship overturned suddenly on Christmas



FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) A federal judge says the City of Dallas must pay \$62,002 in fees to lawyers who represented blacks and Hispanics in a lengthy legal battle over city council district boundaries.

U.S. District Judge Eldon Mahon directed the city Wednesday to pay \$25,230 to the Dallas Legal Services foundation to pay the non-profit, organization for the 628 hours it spent representing blacks.

The judge also ordered Dallas pay \$22,345 to James A. Johnston, \$9,757 to Edward B. Cloutman III and \$4,170 to Walter Irvin. All three lawyers represented blacks. And he ordered the city to pay \$500 to the Mexican-American Legal De-

The legal battle erupted in 1971 when blacks and Hispanics argued electing the council on a citywide basis diluted minority

voting strength. Mahon ordered Dallas to implement an 8-3 plan, with eight councilmen elected from singlemember district and three elected at large. That plan was rejected by an appeals court but recently upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court.

DALLAS (AP) - Dallas Mayor Pro Tem Bill Blackburn says the city should pay the hospital bills of a bystander wounded by police gunfire last January during a shootout with drug store bandits.

Michal Leavitt was shot in the groin and the foot last Jan. 12 when undercover agents thwarted a drug store holdup.

Blackburn said Wednesday he will reccomend the city pay Leavitt's medical bills which total \$7,200.

One person was killed and .17 others were injured when two gondolas on the Swiss Sky Ride fell about 65 feet into the midway crowd at the fair Oct. 21.

Commission attorney Eric Stone said in Washington Wednesday that the subpoenas were issued to persons "involved in the manufacture, control, distribution and retailing of the ride."

The hearing is designed to gain information about the accident and to determine if the commission has jurisdiction to inspect the ride.

Fair officials refused to allow commission officials to inspect the ride and later filed suit in federal court challenging the commission's jurisdiction in the

# **POLLY'S POINTERS**

Shell still smells

**Polly Cramer** 

DEAR POLLY - My brother brought back from the Cape a beautiful conch shell but it smells terrible. I have soaked it in ammonia and all sorts of cleaning fluids but the pungent fish odor remains. If I do not get help I am afraid it will go to waste. — SAD SHELLER DEAR SAD SHELLER — Perhaps the animal is still

in the shell. Soak it in liquid bleach for several days and during that time swish the shell around to be sure the bleach gets all the way down inside. When removed rinse well with clear water and put outdoors to thoroughly dry in the air. Check for effect of the bleach on the color of the shell.

Another remedy is to soak for a few days in full strength rubbing alcohol and then flush it out well with clear water — POLLY

DEAR POLLY - Water stains on draperies disappear by following these directions. Make a paste of baking soda and WHITE vinegar and spread on the stains. Hang out in the sun and then wash in suds to remove the stains. — GRACE

DEAR READERS - I am sure many of you will welcome this suggestion as we have been asked this question so many times and I did not have a satisfactory solution. Grace wrote that the paste dries very quickly so if there are many stains to cover it is better to mix several small batches than too much at one time. - POLLY

DEAR POLLY - I wonder if N.G.T. who had mildew spots on a beaded movie screen has ever tried using a commercial mildew remover. Spray it on and when it is dry the mildew vanishes. I do hope it works as well for her (or him) as it has for me. It is also great to use on grout around the bathtub. - FLO

# **Bonds Changed** To Up Buying

NEW YORK (AP) - The interest in Series EE bonds can bond division has made a wellpublicized New Year's resolution, the better, it is said, to serve the diminishing, disgruntled bond-buying public.

It is changing the desginaname of Series EE bonds, from U.S. Savings Bonds to U.S. Energy Savings Bonds. It is changing the denominations; it is changing maturities too.

While 7 percent is a full percentage point more than that envisioned when the bonds were revealed a year ago, it does not, as has been suggested, double your money in that time

DEAR POLLY — Recently I bought an old-fashioned desk chair that swivels, rolls and bends backwards. It is the best chair to use at my sewing machine that one could imagine. -

DEAR POLLY - Women who like to cover their eyes to keep the light out while sleeping should buy simple black Halloween masks and cover the open eye slit with black material. Blinders sold at the department stores for this purpose are so expensive and these masks work just as well and only cost

pennies. - D.G.S. DEAR POLLY - Mrs. C. asked for a way to remove the odor of cigarette smoke from her apartment. I have found that burning an oil lamp filled with kerosene is the best way to rid a house of unpleasant odors, smoke or food. - SARA

DEAR POLLY - When one earring of a pair is lost save it Such odd earrings can be clipped or hung on small Christmas trees and make unusually pretty little ornaments. - MARY DEAR POLLY - When I have cream that will not whip I add the white of an egg, chill and then it whips.

hard I place a pan of water in the oven.

To remove the kernels or meat from pecans I pour boiling water over them and let them stand until cool. I hammer the small end of the nut and they are easy to shell. - EDNA


