

Women-Owned Firms Welcomed by PASS

An all-out effort to register women-owned businesses has been announced by the Small Business Administration Procurement Automated Source System (or PASS).

When registered with PASS, the small business owner will be notified when contracts are open for bids or proposals on government and prime contractor jobs.

In the spring of 1979, President Carter signed a national Women's Business Enterprise Policy of Affirmative Action. This executive order, No. 12139, is aimed at aiding women-owned businesses. Of major importance is the inclusion of women-owned businesses in the Small Business Administration PASS program.

Registration with PASS is free and entirely voluntary. The small business owner needs only to send name and address of her business to: PASS, 3212 Smith Street, Suite 103, Houston, Tx. 77006; or contact the local Small Business Administration office for more information.

Women-owned businesses represent 4.6 percent of the

nation's businesses and their receipts represented only 0.3 percent of the total receipts of all business firms in America, according to 1975 figures. Women's total share of prime contracts has been approximately 0.1 percent or less than \$100 million out of a total annual federal procurement figure of almost \$100 billion.

PASS will permit, with one registration, access to more than 300 major procurement offices of the federal government and prime contractors throughout the United States. As of fall, 1979, only 100 women-owned businesses had registered with PASS. The Small Business Administration has pledged full participation of women in procurement activities by locating and assisting women-owned businesses and adding 15,000 women-owned firms to PASS in 1980.

In fiscal year 1977, the federal government awarded contracts totaling \$68 billion of which only \$16 billion went to small business. President Carter has directed an approximate doubling of federal prime contracts to women-owned firms in 1980 to at least \$150 million.

Child Abuse



DEAR ANN LANDERS: You recently printed an excellent letter from a "Nurse in Oshkosh." Her remarks about child-abuse were directed to the judges in this country. I, too, hope they will take a hard look at each case and make sure they don't perpetuate a nightmare by returning children to abusive parents.

Another side to this sad story needs to be told. My letter is directed to every doctor and nurse who may not realize the vital part they could play in ending the tragedy of child abuse.

Treating, healing and loving

these children is not enough. You must get involved with our courts. I've seen a number of cases fall apart because after weeks of investigation, "expert witnesses" would not say, "Yes, this child was abused."

Too often, the doctor will say, "This is a classic child abuse case," but he won't sign an affidavit because he is afraid of being sued or he feels the witness fee he will be paid for his testimony is not enough to justify cancelling a patient's appointment.

It's a shame that this lawsuit-happy nation has created an atmosphere in which a doctor has to worry about being slapped with a malpractice suit every time he gives a medical opinion. Judges can do very little without the help of the medical profession. Tell them, Ann. -- A Legal Secretary

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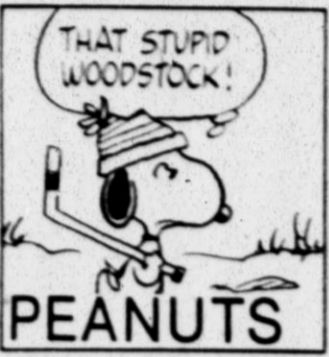

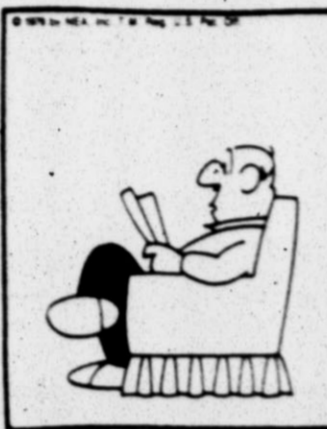

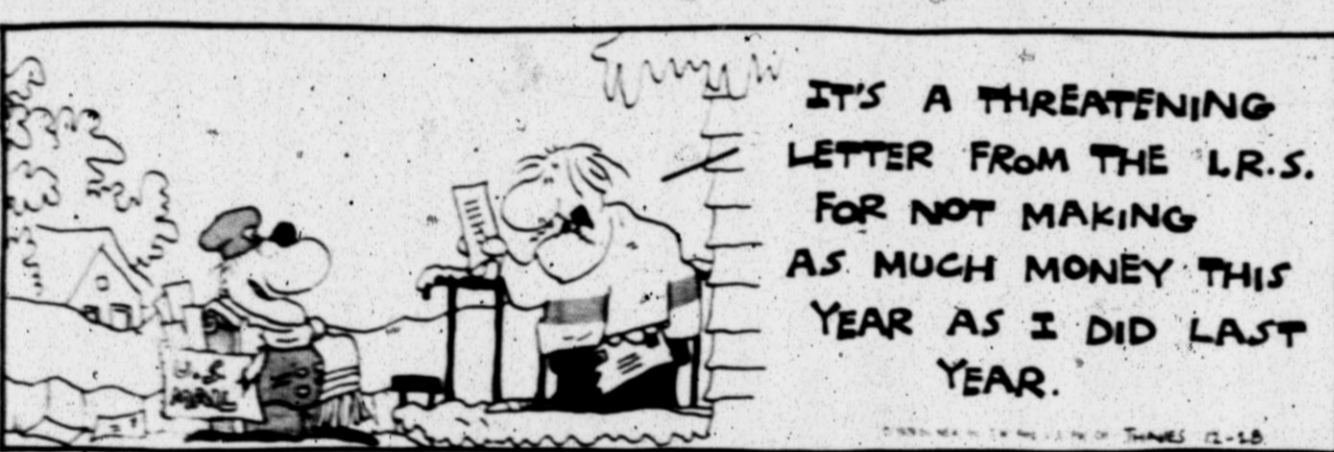

Coal Plant May Be Constructed

DALLAS (AP) — Dwindling Texas energy supplies have prompted Texas Utilities Co. to consider constructing a West Texas power plant fired with Rocky Mountain coal.

Company officials say transportation costs make energy generated from Rocky Mountain coal more expensive than electricity from Texas lignite or nuclear power, but the situation likely will change by the late 1980s.

The company has a huge reserve of low-grade East Texas lignite coal, but the officials say that supply may not match consumer demand in another decade.

"We already have a considerable amount of lignite committed to other plants," said Ray Ward of Dallas Power & Light, a Texas Utilities subsidiary. "In the long range, you just have to be prepared."

Other Texas electric companies already have begun to import coal from strip mines in Rocky Mountain states, but the ever-increasing cost of rail transportation has caused legal and regulatory disputes.

Texas Utilities hopes to reduce transportation costs by building a plant as close to the supply as possible.

The company is looking at several locations in Ward County, just west of Midland-Odessa in the heart of West Texas' oil fields.

One advantage Texas Utilities may have is subsidiary Chaco Energy Co. of Albuquerque. Chaco plans to start mining at one site in 1983, and is obtaining permits for another location.

Eventually, Chaco expects to mine 12 million tons of coal a year — enough for three or four large power plants.

Ireland Decade Branded as Brutal

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Soon, perhaps within days, someone in Northern Ireland will become a macabre statistical milestone — the 2,000th fatality in a decade of bloodshed and insurrection.

By police count, the official death tally in the conflict is 1,992. When the toll caused by the spillover of sectarian violence into the Republic of Ireland, England and Europe is added, the total tops 2,150.

In the tight-knit communities of Northern Ireland, which has a population of 1.5 million, the killings have touched everyone. Since August 1969, nearly one family in five has had a member killed, maimed or wounded.

The Catholic McCartan family of Belfast has lost six sons. The 2,000th victim could be anyone. But chances are it will be a British soldier, a militiaman, a police officer or a prison guard. They're the main targets these days.

But many of the victims have been men, women and children in the wrong place at the wrong time — playing in the street, drinking in a bar, shopping with the kids, sometimes even watching television at home.

"Nowhere is really safe," said a senior police officer said. "No one is beyond the killers' reach."

The Irish Republican Army, which is heavily Catholic, is fighting to end British rule in Northern Ireland, where pro-British Protestants outnumber Catholics 2-1.

The IRA seeks to reunite the province with the overwhelmingly Catholic Republic to the south. Against them are British security forces and Protestants bitterly opposed to being dragged into an all-Ireland republic in which they'd be outnumbered 3-1 by Catholics.

The first official fatality of "The Troubles" was a 30-year-old Catholic, John Gallagher, shot dead Sept. 8, 1969, in Armagh when Protestant policemen trapped behind a barricade fired into a crowd.

The Lighter Side

CARLTON, Wash. (AP) — Actress and Washington rancher Stella Stevens has wanted to direct a movie for 20 years and now she's getting her chance.

Filming is under way in South America on a documentary "The American Heroine." The movie will feature women of all ages, said Ms. Stevens, including those who have led inspirational or heroic lives.

Others in the film will talk about the role of women as they embark upon the era of the 1980s.

Ms. Stevens is reportedly financing the film with her own money. The former Playboy centerfold hopes to offset some of the cost by selling "American Heroine" T-shirts next spring featuring a neck-to-waist shot of Ms. Stevens in a wet T-shirt.

HOBOKEN, N.J. (AP) — Woody Allen now has a New Jersey tie to go with his New York tie.

Allen finished a day of filming his latest movie in the train station here Thursday and then traded quips with Gov. Brendan Byrne who presented him with the New Jersey tie.

"Thanks very much," Allen said as he took the navy blue tie embroidered with a tiny blob shaped like New Jersey. "Now I have a New York tie and a New Jersey tie."

Byrne replied, "The New Jersey tie is on the right side of the Hudson."

"The New York tie is stained already," Allen said. "It was when you got it, probably," quipped the governor.

Fire Hits in Strike

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — An eight-day work slowdown by city firefighters claimed its first casualty when a newly completed, unoccupied \$5.5 million retirement home was destroyed by fire hours after National Guard troops were called in to help man fire stations.

The blaze Thursday night forced temporary evacuation of about 100 residents of a nearby nursing home, but no one was injured.

Among the 75 persons who fought the fire were police, some regular firefighters and Guardsmen mobilized under an emergency order by Gov. Joseph Teasdale.

Teasdale declared a state of emergency earlier Thursday as firefighter ranks were thinned by dismissals, suspensions and sickouts in an escalation of a contract dispute over salaries.

He called on firefighters to stop "this illegal strike," and said city officials could no longer guarantee public safety.

By noon Thursday, 33 of the city's 900 firefighters had been dismissed, more than 200 were given three-day suspensions to be served after the emergency is over and 232 firefighters had joined the sickout, which began Wednesday. City officials said the dismissals and suspensions were for refusal to work over time.

Abnormally high sick calls continued late Thursday, but city officials said confusion and personnel shortages hindered tabulation.

Shortly after midnight, 500 Guardsmen were assigned to 15 fire stations being manned by city police. Guard officials said some troops would provide security and others would bolster police firefighting squads.

The city's 18 other fire stations were staffed by firefighters still working, city officials said.

Washington Briefs

WASHINGTON (AP) — A panel of energy experts says the energy situation in the United States is at a crisis level and poses a major threat to national security.

Charles Ebinger, director of the Energy and National Security Program at Georgetown University, called Thursday for the United States to promptly cut petroleum consumption.

One step he urged to reduce consumption was raising gasoline prices to \$2 to \$3 a gallon. The U.S. energy situation "is a major national security threat," Ebinger said, "and it is time to stop playing politics with it."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumers can look forward to "reasonable" meat prices in 1980, predicts the American Meat Institute.

The industry group said Thursday that beef supplies should decline further next year, but pork and poultry are expected to be in greater supply. That should mean, said the group, that "prices for meat will be reasonable." C. Manly Mulpus, institute president, said overall meat consumption in 1980 will probably average about 181 pounds per capita, compared with 181.2 pounds in 1979.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Shirley M. Hufstедler, the nation's first education secretary, says there is no "glib formula" for achieving school integration.

Mrs. Hufstедler, who was sworn in Dec. 6 to head the new Education Department, said Thursday busing should not be the first step authorities take in an effort to achieve school integration.

"I have been very firmly on the side of racial integration of the public schools," she said. "But these devices must be examined community by community to find out what is likely to optimize racial peace, racial integration and a thoughtful consideration of the educational values that are available to each child."

Arafat: Billy Bought

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Palestine Liberation Organization chief Yasser Arafat says Billy Carter, brother of the U.S. president, has been bought by Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy. Beirut newspapers reported today.

Arafat fired the latest salvo in the PLO's three-week-old war of words with Khadafy's radical regime in a Wednesday night opening a nursery set up by the Palestinian Red Crescent, the PLO's equivalent of the Red Cross. Excerpts from the speech were reported today in the Beirut press.

Without mentioning Khadafy by name, Arafat was quoted as describing the Libyan leader as a political midget who "may be able to buy beer merchants or Billy Carter."

Storm Hampers Rescue Divers

KETCHIKAN, Alaska (AP) — Stormy seas hampered efforts by Navy divers to explore an overturned ore freighter that is leaking diesel fuel in the Pacific, and authorities said there was little hope for the Taiwanese crew.

A second body from the 741-foot Lee Wang Zin was recovered Thursday, but diving plans were thwarted by 45-knot winds and 15-foot seas. A small storm was approaching the area, with winds expected to remain at 40-50 knots and seas at 10 to 15 feet today, the National Weather Service said.

Coast Guard Cmdr. Ray Spoltman, federal on-scene coordinator, said the grounding of the freighter Thursday might make it easier for the 25-member diving team to approach from calmer water on the vessel's lee side to check for bodies or survivors from the 30-member crew.

Diesel oil from the ship spread over 100 square miles of ocean, and major oil-spill equipment was being brought to the scene from Seattle by the cutter Munro, which also has a large sick bay, Spoltman said.

Officials say they have no estimates of how much of the estimated 370,000 gallons of oil already had leaked, but Spoltman said the amount of oil believed to be on board posed a major threat to the marine environment. As of Thursday night, the oil slick appeared to be moving out to sea and was breaking up in heavy weather.

Search and rescue officials had said some crew members might have been trapped in air pockets when the ship overturned suddenly on Christmas Day.

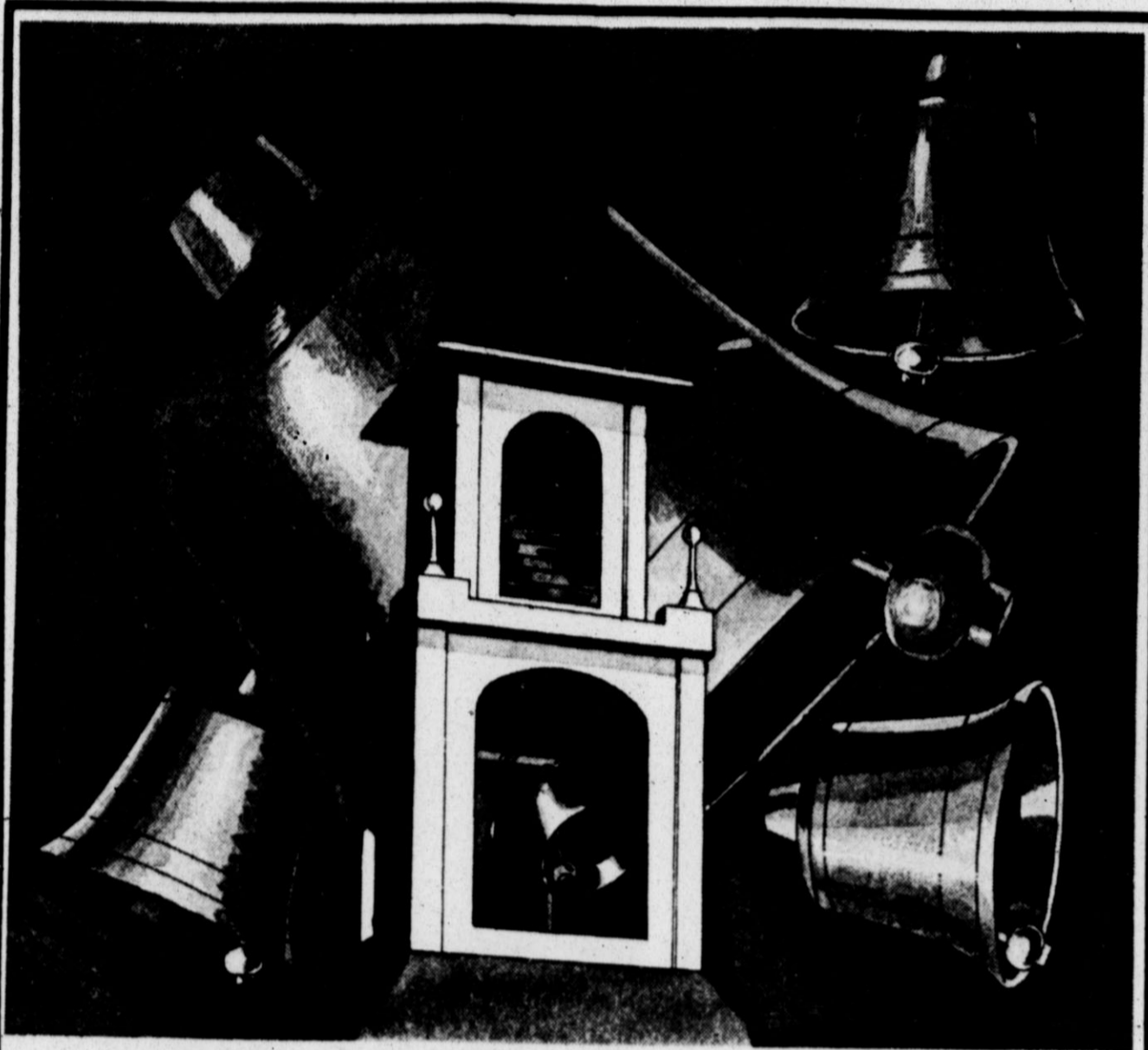
