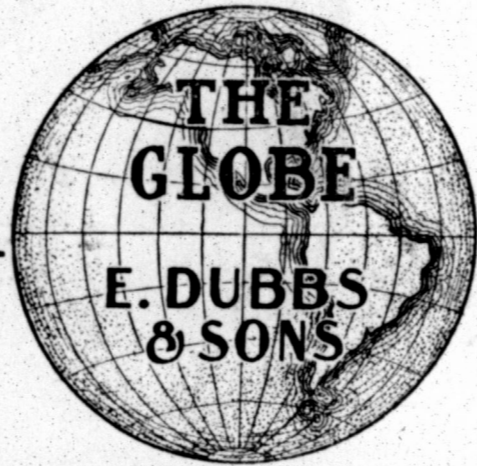

THE DISTRICT JUDGESHIP

Some Facts Concerning Governor J. N. Browning and His Candidacy for That Office.

In the opinion of the Banner-Stockman the race for the district judgeship of this judicial district is one of the most important before the people at the coming election. Some of our readers are not perhaps aware that a former Clarendon citizen is a candidate for this office; such readers will be found among the recent settlers who are not well acquainted as yet with the old timers of this country—the men who have made the Panhandle and whose names will go down in history, reflecting all the glory achieved by this glorious section of the Lone Star State. The man to whom we refer is ex-Lieutenant Governor J. N. Browning, of Amarillo.

Governor Browning is a typical Westerner who has given his early manhood and prime of life to the development of the Panhandle and Northwest Texas. His career has been unique and is a forcible illustration of the rewards of energy, perseverance and honesty of purpose. He landed in Stephens county, Texas, a youth of seventeen years. His capital was his sturdy health and willingness to work. He at once became a cowboy and wielded the lasso for nine

years. During these nine years his love for reading was gratified to as great an extent as was consistent with the demands of his employment. Under the advice of Judge C. K. Stribling he began the study of law in Shackelford county, Texas, was admitted to the bar in 1876, and has been actively engaged in the practice of law since that time. He moved to Mobeetie in Wheeler county, Texas, in 1881, and was the first District Attorney for the Panhandle District. He was elected to the Legislature in 1882 when the district, on account of the sparsely settled condition of the country, comprised sixty nine counties, taking in Wichita Falls, Seymour, Albany, Baird, Abilene, and Colorado City. He served the people of the district in the House of Representatives for eight years, and made a record in the Legislature touching the great school land problem and other vital questions such as to touch the entire State. At the time Governor Browning entered the Legislature the prevailing opinion throughout the State was that Northwest Texas and the Panhandle was an arid desert and suitable only for stock-raising, the country being then occupied almost exclusively by cattleraisers. His policy in the Legislature on the land question was shaped by the faith he has always had in agricultural possibilities of the Panhandle, his opinion being that this

section of the State was a fit abode for a thrifty farming citizenship, and was never intended as an exclusive and vast cattle range. The stockmen had a strong lobby at every Legislature asking for a law granting them the right to an absolute lease of the State school lands for stock-raising purposes.

Governor Browning espoused the cause of the actual settler, and by his powerful arguments made on the floor of the House, based upon his actual experience and knowledge of the country, the Legislature reluctantly yielded and permitted a provision to be inserted in the law that the lands should at all times be subject to sale to actual settlers, notwithstanding the stockman's lease. To him and to his untiring energy and devotion to duty we today owe our gratitude for the present advanced and prosperous condition of the Panhandle country. Had he courted the favors of cattle corporations and the clientele of the wealthy he might have been richer in this world's goods, but poorer in the real wealth that comes of the solace of duty faithfully performed.

Ever since Governor Browning first entered into public life he has been known as "Honest Jim Browning," a sobriquet justly deserved, for he was indeed an honest man. He served his people at an actual sacrifice of time and money for it is a well known fact that the state does not pay its

members of the Legislature enough to pay their actual and necessary expenses while attending the sessions. He retired from the office in 1892 and devoted his attention to the practice of his profession, but never over-looked an opportunity to keep before the public the great possibilities of the Panhandle. In 1898 he was elected Lieutenant Governor of the state and re-elected in 1900. In filling that office, like all the others he has held, he did so at an actual sacrifice of time and money, for the Lieutenant Governor's salary is the same as that of a member of the Legislature.

For twenty-five years he has resided in the Panhandle and the lime light has been turned on his public and private life all these years and no man has naught to truthfully charge against him. He has all the time been and is still recognized as the head of the bar in the Panhandle. Governor Browning was a resident citizen of Clarendon from 1888 to 1896 and a more honest, upright and devoted man to the best interests of the town and community never lived among us. He filled the measure of a just and upright citizen. He is now a candidate for the Democratic nomination for district judge and has submitted his name upon the solicitation of a host of friends who appreciate his public service and who know the ripe experience, the innate honesty and the high degree of competency he

would bring to that office. His friends ask at the hands of the voters of this district such consideration of his claims as would intelligently influence their action at the primary election to be held on the 28th of July, and we heartily join in the request. He is a man whom to know is to trust and whose devotion to principle is as unswerving as his loyalty to the masses. The intelligence and caution of the people are reflected in the election of such men to high and responsible offices.

MR. TALLEY WRITES AGAIN

More Information About Parmer County, Going Somewhat Into Detail This Time.

BOVINA, Texas, May 10.
EDITOR BANNER-STOCKMAN.

DEAR SIR:—I have many inquiries like the one from Rev. L. K. Billingsley, pastor M.-E. Church, Atlantic City, and thinking an answer to him, as well as his letter, would be of some interest to your many readers I herewith give you same in part only:

"R. W. TALLEY,

Bovina, Texas.

"Dear Sir and Friend:—On the 9th of March wife and I ran down to Bovina with the S. U. W. Land Co., and I purchased one-half section five miles west of your town. I think it one of the choicest half-sections thereabouts. My brother has a large family of twelve children, ranging in age from 25 down to 10 years. Two of them are teachers and have been for some years. One is a S. S. superintendent, another is Epworth League president, some of them are in the church choir, several of them high school graduates, and all of them are charming young people and a great help to the social life of any community.

"Our plan is for my brother and one of his sons to go down soon to open out the farm, build a house and barn, fences, etc., then break out and get ready for fall wheat the entire 320 acres, and later the balance of the family would follow. I would like to have you answer quite definitely a few questions as I do not wish to make any mistake in this venture.

"1st. Can I hire land broke and planted to kaffir and maize.

"2nd. What would be the cost per acre?

"3rd. If I should get traction engine and outfit would I be able to secure breaking more than my half section? Would be glad to get the outfit if I could get enough to justify making the start.

"4th. What crops have actually been raised; yield, etc?

"5th. What fruits are growing, and the outlook?

"6th. What crops are grown on the Campbell Model Farm?

"7th. Prices at Bovina for lumber, wire, nails, brick, etc?

"8th. How late can kaffir and maize be planted for feed?

"Three friends of mine have purchased one-half section each adjoining mine, and one has option on all of the section just north of mine and is almost certain to take it this week. They will all want to fence and get ready to put in crops this year. Others are expecting to go down soon and buy. They would all make first-class citizens.

"Thanking you for any information, etc."

I made him this reply:

"1st & 2nd. Sod breaking is \$1.50 per acre and teams are very scarce. I know of more than 1000 acres that could be contracted at that price. Breaking and planting has been done by some for \$2.10 per acre.

"3rd. An engine with gang plow outfit would be in demand for sod breaking, etc., or plowing fire guards on the right-of-way for the railroad. Also for these big pastures, for they all plow and burn out wide guards for their own protection.

"4th. Corn last year 35 bushels on XIT ranch. Wheat 32 bushels by Humphries. Millet 36 bushels, oats, kaffir, maize, alfalfa, all made

good crops the last three years on the Star ranch.

"5th. Peach, pears, grapes, cherries, mulberries, all are now full and look to be in good shape for a fine crop.

"6th. Wheat, oats, barley, rye, broom corn, maize, kaffir, two kinds millet, Indian corn, sorghum, sweet and Irish potatoes and all the garden stuff. Forest and shade trees and some fruit trees set recently and all looking well.

"7th. Siding \$32; ceiling and flooring \$33; dimension \$30; cedar shingles \$3.75; wire \$3; nails \$4; brick \$15.

"8th. Kaffir and maize as late as June 10 to 15."

This only shows what one man's ideas will lead out to. Rev. Billingsley's questions are duplicated by many people from all the northern states, mostly from Iowa and Illinois. One of our men sold seven sections last Thursday; others sold from 40 acres to 640. I do not know but two northern men that came down that did not make a deal of some kind or other.

One of the troubles here is we cannot get the land in small enough lots to do just as we would like. I feel sometimes that if I was a Jay Gould I would buy the whole "dam(p) thing, (we have just had a big rain), and cut it up to suit the other fellow.

I am "long" and fear the waste basket; shorter next time, if I do not have to quote a preacher.

City Council.

The city council met in regular monthly session Monday. Besides the regular routine work, allowing accounts, etc., it was decided to accept the water company's system of fire mains for fire protection, and an order to that effect was entered. The big ranches out in West Texas are being steadily cut up and sold in small bodies to the people who are flocking into that section in search of homes. The big ranches were the direct cause for the settlement of this section, but for years they have held it back. If the JA, XIT and Matador ranches were to put their lands on the market at the same time

the Panhandle would once again see one dollar and, land the end sought would be farther off than ever. The big ranchman holds the Panhandle at his mercy. If he turns loose the bottom will fall out and many will suffer—but he won't turn loose.

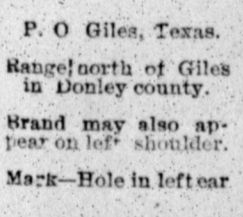
