The Hereford Cotton Gin is advertising in this issue the fact that it is desired that all Bollys be brought in next week on Monday and Tuesday only. Open cotton will also be handled on these days, but Manager Tillotson says if all the bollys for the week are brought on these two days he will make special preparation to handle them and give better service.

The cotton continues to roll in to Hereford and up to Friday night a total of 145 bales have been ginned, all told, according to figures obtained by The Brand.

At noon Friday the price ranged from .3250 to .3350. Thirteen bales were waiting to be ginned, and several Price & Hough to carloads were being loaded for ship-

Even With \$50,000 Hospital Bonds County's Public Improvement Tax Will Be Only Five Cents After 1929

It was shown in The Brand of last Friday to what extent indebtedness of the county can be reduced in the year 1924 by the tax to take care of permament improvements of twenty cents on the \$100.00, which has already been levied for the year 1923. And it was shown that this indebtedness could be so much reduced that the same tax for permanent improvements of twenty cents on the \$100.00, if levied in 1924, would not only take care of the other indebtedness falling due in the year 1925, but would take care of the interest on a \$50,000.00 bond issue for a hospital, and pay \$1,000.00 on the principal, as the following statement will show:

In 1925 the interest to be paid on courthouse warrants will be Courthouse warrants due in January, 1925.

Interest due on \$3,513.35 (jail repair warrants) Jail warrants due in April, 1925 _____

_ 1,756.66 If the hospital bond issue of \$50,000 is authorized: Interest at six per cent on this amount due in 1925

The same old twenty cent tax which has been levied for several

So it will be possible to pay out of this twenty cent improve-ment tax levied in 1924 all of the debts due in 1925 above enumerat-ed and have a balance left in the fund of

One hospital warrant due in 1925

The same twenty cent tax for public improvements levied in 1925 to take care of the debts maturing in 1926 will easily take care of all of the debts due that year, including the interest that may accrue on a hospital issue of \$50,000.00, and pay another installment of \$1,000 on the debt. It will wipe out the last of the three warrants issued for the improvements made on the jail.

In 1929, six years hence, the last warrant due on the courthouse will be paid, and when this is done the tax for public improvements can be reduced to five cents on he \$100.00, as the hospital warrants will be the only interest bearing warrants outstanding.

State Highway Ass'n Will Care For Marking Roads

The following information has been received from Captain J. D. Fauntleroy.

"In addition to the State taking over the maintanance of all State Highways Jnuary 1, 1924, the State Highway Department will also take over the marking of all state highways on January 1, 1924, under the direct supervision of the sixteen district engineers, details of which are as follows.

The improvement tax of 20e on the \$100.00 now being levied, if continued during 1924 and 1925 will take care of a hospital bond issue and also take care of the county debt.

A reduction of the improvement tax to 16c on the \$100.00 levied for the years 1926, 1927 and 1928 will continue to take care of the hospital bond issue and the out-standing county debt.

In 1929 the last court house warrant will be paid leaving only the hospital warrants charge-able gainst this improvement fund and the tax can then be reduced to 5e on the \$100.00.


