### NOTICE OF COUNTY HOSPITAL BOND ELECTION

(The State of Texas )  
(County of Deaf Smith )

To the Resident Property Taxpaying Voters of Deaf Smith County, Texas:

Take Notice that an election will be held on the 20th day of December, 1923, within Deaf Smith County, Texas, to determine if said county shall issue bonds and if a tax shall be levied in payment thereof, in obedience to an election order entered by the commissioners court on the 16th day of November, 1923, which is as follows:

On this, the 16th day of November, 1923, the commissioners court of Deaf Smith County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof in the courthouse at Hereford, Texas, all members of the court, to-wit:

W. M. Megert, County Judge  
C. J. Paddock, Commissioner Precinct No. 1.  
J. E. Hill, Commissioner Precinct No. 2.  
H. A. Gray, Commissioner Precinct No. 3.  
J. C. Allred, Commissioner Precinct No. 4.

being present, and passed the following order:

There came on to be considered the petition of Mrs. Nettie Price and 154 other property taxpaying voters of said county, praying that an election be ordered by this court to be held on the 20th day of December, 1923, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified taxpaying voters of said county the proposition of issuing bonds of said county in the sum of \$50,000.00 for the purpose of establishing and equipping a County Hospital within said county; and

Whereas, it appearing to the court that said petition was properly signed by more than ten per cent of the legally qualified property taxpaying voters of Deaf Smith County, and is in all respects in compliance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

It was moved by Commissioner J. E. Hill, and seconded by Commissioner C. J. Paddock that there be submitted to the qualified voters of said county who are property tax payers therein, the proposition for the issuance of the bonds of the said county in the sum of \$50,000.00 for the purpose of establishing and equipping a County Hospital within said county, the election to be held on the 20th day of December, 1923; the motion carried by the following vote:

Commissioners C. J. Paddock, J. E. Hill, H. A. Gray, J. C. Allred, voting AYE; and None voted No.

Thereupon the following Election Order was adopted:

Whereas, the County Commissioners Court of said county deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said county for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

Therefore, be it ordered by the Com-

missioners Court of said county that an election be held on the 20th day of December, 1923, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted.

"Shall the Commissioners Court of the County of Deaf Smith, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said county in the sum of \$50,000.00, payable serially or otherwise not to exceed thirty years from the date thereof, with option of redemption at any time after ten (10) years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of establishing and equipping a County Hospital within said county as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Statutes of Texas, 1911, and amendments thereto, and Chapter 39, Acts 1913, Regular Session.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be as follows:

Precinct No. One: Place, Courthouse in Hereford; Presiding Officers, E. B. Black and Jim Robinson.

Precinct No. Two: Place, Courthouse in Hereford; Presiding Officers, J. O. Newell and Homer Wilkinson.

Precinct No. Three: Place, J. O. Robinson's Residence; Presiding Officer, G. W. Wilson.

Precinct No. Four: Place, Strams School House; Presiding Officer, J. M. Chapman.

Precinct No. Five: Place, Union School House; Presiding Officer, A. R. Norman.

Precinct No. Six: Place, Ford School House; Presiding Officer, V. T. Glenn.

Precinct No. Eight: Place, Messenger School House; Presiding Officer, R. R. Bussell.

Precinct No. Nine: Place, Bippus School House; Presiding Officer, Geo. Bippus.

Precinct No. Ten: Place, Daniels School House; Presiding Officer, W. J. McLean.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Statutes of Texas, 1911, and Chapter 39, Acts 1913, Regular Session, and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said county shall be allowed to vote.

All voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"For the Issuance of Bonds."

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"Against the Issuance of Bonds."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order signed by the County Judge of said county and certified to by the County Clerk of the said County shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The county judge is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the places designated for holding said election at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The County Judge is further authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said county and which notice shall be published once each week for

five weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.
