President Tightening Screws on Iran

President Carter tightened a few more economic screws on Iran and promised military action if the American hostages aren't freed. Portugal set an example for the richer and more powerful European allies by cutting off all trade with Iran. And Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini again defied them all.

Carter banned U.S. imports from Iran Thursday, ordered the freeing for U.S. use or sale of impounded military equipment purchased by Iran and said he would seek congressional authority to pay reparations to the hostages and their families out of more than \$8 billion in Iranian assets he froze in November. He also barred financial transactions with anyone in Iran, except those involved in journalism, and presented Americans other than journalists from traveling to Iran without U.S. government permission.

He told a news conference in Washington he was considering banning shipments of U.S. food and medicine to Iran and blocking its use of Intelsat, the international communications satellite. And he warned that if non-military action did not result in the freeing of the 53 American hostages held in Tehran, "then the only next step available that I can see would be some sort of military action which is the prerogative and the right of the United States under these circumstances."

Aerial mining of Iran's ports at the head of the Persian Gulf appeared to be the most likely military action. U.S. naval warfare specialists said A-6 attack planes like the ones that mined North Vietnam's ports could easily do the job from the two U.S. aircraft carriers now in the Arabian Sea.

The main objective would be to close the oil export terminal at Kharg Island, where tankers load up for Western Europe and Japan.

Portugal supported Carter Thursday by stopping trade with Iran, barring Portuguese ships from taking goods there from nations whose governments have embargoed those items, and halting financial deals and participation of Portuguese firms in Iranian industrial projects.

The Portuguese government, which imported 21 percent of its oil from Iran, said the embargo would remain in effect "until the release of the hostages." held in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran and the Iranian Foreign Office since Nov. 4.

While America's nine allies in the European Common Market continued to delay, their representatives in the European Parliament urged the nine governments to consider breaking diplomatic relations with Iran, as Carter did April 7. on allied action is expected Monday, when the foreign ministers of the nine countries meet in Euxembourg.

But Khomeini, the leader of the Iranian revolutionary regime, and Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh scoffed at Carter and the U.S. allies. They said Iran would counter any sanctions or naval blockade. Khomeini urged the Iranian people to be ready to defend the country if attacked.

"Iran should not be beset by fears because they want to besiege it economically or militarily. We are not afraid of an economic blockade," the Shiite Moslem patriarch told "popular mobilization committees," Radio Tehran reported.

President Carter and Ronald Reagan scored more victories in party skirmishes in the West, but as politics goes, it also was a day with something for everyone. Well, almost.

Carter came out on top Thursday in the Idaho Democratic caucuses, and Reagan won at North Dakota's state Republican convention. That added to their large delegate leads over party rivals.

But Reagan's chief GOP rival, George Bush, also picked up some delegates in Arkansas.

And John Anderson's supporters got the go-ahead to put him on the ballot in Massachusetts as an independent, with the Illinois congressman clearly leaning more and more toward making a run outside the two-party system.

And Edward, M. Kennedy? Well, President Carter's chief opponent got to hear the famous fable of how the tortoise, by dint of perserverance, finally passed by the rabbit who, perhaps

grinning, took an early lead in the race but then pooped

Kennedy grinned himself as he sat cramped in a tiny desk listening to the moral of the story in a Philadelphia elementary school classroom. He later told an interviewer: "I didn't get into the race to lose."

Lose he did, however, in Idaho's district caucuses. Carter gained 48 percent of the vote to Kennedy's 30, with 22 percent uncommitted. That would give Carter eight of Idaho's 17 delegates to the Democratic National Convention, and Kennedy five. Four would go

as uncommitted delegates. Reagan picked up 12 delegates at the North Dakota state Republican convention, with one going to Bush and four uncommitted.

At the same time, Bush gained the support of six Arkansas delegates to the Republican National Convention who previously had been uncommitted or pledged to candidates no longer in the race. Their switch gave the former U.N.

ambassador eight of that state's 19 delegates. Reagan has nine, and two still are uncommitted.

Another Republican hopeful, Rep. Philip Crane of Illinois, dropped out of the race Thursday, which will likely benefit fellow conservative Reagan. Crane said he would campaign for the former Calilfornia governor as a 'mainstream conservative candidate."

Both Reagan and Carter were far ahead in the races for their party's nomination's even before the delegate? skirmishes.

Reagan had 372 of the 998 needed for nomination, to 72 for Bush and 57 for Anderson. Rep. Anderson told reporters, meanwhile, that while he hadn't made a final decision to drop out of the Republican race he was "leaning strongly" toward an indpendent run for the presidency.

Carter had 925 of the 1,666 required to nominate a Democrat, and Kennedy 470.

For the first time. Carter indicated Thursday that his patience is running low and that military action may be in the offing. The president set no timetable, but some of his aides have said he will make a decision after mid-May on whether to resort to military means.

"Interruption of commerce to Iran is the kind of step that would be available." Carter told a news conference.

But neither Carter nor any of his questioners mentioned the possible consequences to the American hostages, who have been held since Nov. 4.

The possibility that the militants might retaliate by injuring or killing some or all of the hostages has loomed large in the concerns of Pentagon officials. Defense Secretary Harold Brown mentioned that possibility recently as "a real drawback" to military action.

The naval warfare specialists indicated they believed an attempt to block the Strait of Hormuz, the narrow entrance to the Persian Gulf, would be a less desirable way of blockading Iran than by an aerial mining operation.

Specialists, who asked to remain anonymous, sounded confident that A-6 attack planes could carry out such an operation with little or no loss by striking swiftly and without warning. Such planes would be launched from either or both of the U.S. aircraft carriers now in the Arabian Sea.

A-6 and A-7 attack planes were used nearly eight years ago to mine Haiphong and six other North Vietnamese ports. keeping out Russian and other supply ships until American helicopters removed the explosives the following year.

It is kown that there is a supply of mines aboard the carriers and other ships of the U.S. squadron now in the-Arabian Sea, but additional supplies might have to be flown to those ships to support a major blockading effort.

The main objective of any U.S. aerial mining probably would be Kharg Island, off the Iranian coast. Kharg Island is a main terminus for Iranian oil pipelines and tankers load up there before heading for Western Europe and Japan.

Strategists indicated mines also might be dropped to plug access to two other ports that lie on relatively narrow waterways, Bandar Shahpur and Bandar Mashur. .

For Vandalism

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Parents are liable for damages of up to \$5,000 each for each act of vandalism committed by their children, an appeals court here has

The Fort Worth Court of Civil Appeals ruled that Clifford Buie and Mrs. Marion Stephens owe \$15,000 in damages and more than \$4,000 in attorney fees because their 12-yearold daughters damaged three newly completed homes Nov. 30, 1975.

Court records showed that the two girls caused damages estimated at \$22,473 when they closed drains and turned on faucets in the newly completed homes.

In making the ruling Thursday, the appeals court rejected claims that a new provision of the Texas Family Code was unconstitutional.

The new provision specifies that "a parent or other person who has the duty of control and reasonable discipline of a child is liable for any property damage" resulting from willful or malicious conduct.

The provision applies to any child in Texas who is at least 12 years old and not yet

The owner of the property is entitled to recover "actual damages not to exceed \$5,000 plus court costs and reasonable attorney fees," according to the provision.

Buie argued that the \$5,000 limit should be placed on all acts committed during an episode of vandalism.

But Associate Justice Joe Spurlock agreed with the earlier ruling by State District Judge Harold Craik that the \$5,000 applied to each act, not all acts committed during a single episode of vandalism.

Buie had argued that a child could bankrupt a parent by damaging numerous during a buildings destructive episode. He said this was unfair because a parent would have no opportunity "to discover the malicious conduct and discipline the child" between each act.

Appeals judge Spurlock agreed that a parent could face financial ruin if a child went on a destructive spree, but he said the appeals court determined that the Texas Legislature intended to allow each property owner a chance to collect up to \$5,000 in damages to reimburse him for his losses.

Lance Lawyer Says Client South's Finest

ATLANTA (AP) . While a juror wiped away tears, the lawyer for former federal budget director Bert Lance said a conviction on bank fraud charges would ruin "the reputation, the life and the character of one of the South's finest men."

Defense attorney Nickolas Chilivis finished his closing argument in the 14-week trial on Thursday with an appeal for acquittal on all 12 counts against Lance. President Carter's longtime friend and first budget officer.

Attorneys for three co-defendants were presenting their final arguments today before prosecution rebuttal. U.S. District Judge Charles Move Jr. planned to charge the jurors, then send them home for the weekend. Deliberations are to begin Monday.

Mohammed Sharif and other Afghan rebels interviewed here in northwest Pakistan 45 miles from the Afghan border said they knew of no one who suffered permanent physical injury from a Soviet gas attack.

A 28-year-old farmer turned guerrilla. Sharif said Soviet helicopter gunships dropped red, vellow and green gases in late March on Sukhrod. a town in eastern Afghanistan.

Hatch Gets Death Sentence in Oklahoma

EL RENO. Okla. (AP) - A Utah drifter who denied his involvement in the murders of a minister and his wife was handed a death sentence here Thursday afternoon.

Canadian County District Judge Floyd Martin recommended Steven Keith Hatch, 26, die by lethal drug injection for two first-degree murder convictions in the slayings of the Rev. Richard B. Douglass and his wife.

Disaster Areas

Declared in Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Gov. Dave Treen has declared six southeast Louisiana parishes disaster area and says a state of emergency exists on four others because of widespread damage from last weekend's rains - 14 inches and more in some areas.

Meanwhile, the Slidell area was getting soaked again by an overflowing Pearl River.

The governor's proclamation Thursday was a necessary step in getting federal disaster assistance for the flood-stricken areas.

Listed as disaster areas were Assumption, Jefferson, Lafourche, Orleans, St. Bernard and St. Charles parishes. A state of emergency was declared in those parishes as well as in Ascension, Livingston, Terrebonne and St. Martin.

Trees, said the six parishes delcared disaster areas sustained a total of about \$50 million in property damage from flooding. Studies are not complete in the four where emergencies exist.

Weather

Highs were to be mostly in the 70s and 80s except in Southwest Texas where readings were expected to reach the 90s.

A few low, patchy clouds were reported along the gulf coast before dawn, but the remainder of the state had clear skies and cool temperatures.

Early morning temperatures were mostly in the 40s and 50s. Extremes ranged from 35 at Dalhart in the Panhandle to 67 at McAllen in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

HOUSTON (AP) - For too long, the United States has worried too much about what people in other countries think of us, Republican presidential hopeful Ronald Reagan says.

"Now is the time to realize we don't care if the world likes us or not. We've got to do what's right for us," Reagan told a rally of 800 supporters Thursday night at downtown Houston hotel. The former California governor spoke earlier Thursday to an airport rally in Nederland, Texas, before flying to Houston. He was to continue to San Antonio after further campaign appearances in Houston today.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -President Peter Flawn of the University of Texas at Austin and two Mexican officials have agreed to a facultystudent exchange to promote development of joint scientific and technological research.

Texas A&M is expected to join the program Friday with the signature of President Jarvis Miller.

Dr. Joe Neal, director of UT's International Office, the three-year agreement will involve Mexicans from 48 regional technical institutes. Fifteen Mexican faculty members also will be selected for the program, which begins in September.

Sunset Commission **Eyes Security Firms**

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Complaints against security guards might be reduced by prohibiting them from carrying handguns when offduty, says the staff of the Sunset Advisory Com-

A staff report Thursday noted the Texas Board of Private Investigators and Private Security Agencies received 1,246 complaints last year and added:

"Analysis of complaint files revealed that a significant number of the complaints against commissioned security officers involved abuse of commission privileges which allow handguns to be worn to and from work.

"One method of addressing this problem is to further restrict authority to carry handguns in transit to employment. This can be accomplished by requiring that handguns be inaccessible when a security officer is traveling to and from work, and that handguns may be worn only while the security officer is actually on duty."

The report presented three possibilities - abolishing the board, reducing the scope of regulation and transferring its functions to the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas Commission

on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education: continuing the board, with changes; or continuing the board, with fewer duties.





California Detectives **Investigating Deaths**

LOS ANGELES (AP) -The so-called Freeway Killer may have picked up where the Trash Bag Murderer left

Southern California detectives are investigating the possibility that 38 young men and boys slain since 1972 may all have been victims of the "new" killer.

The "old" killer is serving 21 life terms in San Quentin state prison. "Trash Bag Murderer" Patrick Wayne Kearney, 40, was convicted of three slayings in Riverside County in 1977 and pleaded guilty to 18 more in Los Angeles County in 1978.

But police had once put the death toll in the homosexual Trash Bag Murders as high as 34. The sexual overtones of 11 murders committed between December 1972 and January 1976 at first led police to confuse at least one of them with the Trash Bag

Murders. The 11 victims included about connecting the cases. homosexuals or bisexuals, and authorities said some had been brutally castrated or found with stakes or branches pounded into their rectums.

But these murders were' never attributed to Kearney, whose victims were mutilated and disposed of in green plastic trash bags. Some authorities now believe the 11 slayings may have been the first work of the socalled Freeway Killer:

Most of the 38 deaths now being attributed to the Freeway. Killer were hitchhikers who were strangled or smothered, although others died of bludgeoning, stabbing or drug overdose.

Five of the victims were young Marines. Others were schoolboys waiting for a bus. They ranged in age from 12 to 25, and their nude bodies have been dumped near major thoroughfares in Los Angeles, Orange, Ventura, San Diego, Riverside, San Bernardino and Imperial counties.

Only one of the slayings since 1976 has involved sexual abuse, which is why the 11 who died between 1972 and 1976 were not included in the early stages of the investigation.

Dr. Albert Rosenstein, an Orange County forensic psychologist who has studied accounts of many of the murders attributed to the Freeway Killer, says the likelihood is "very high" that the 38 slayings are related.

"There are gross similarities in the ages of the victims, their physical appearance, the fact they are hitchhikers, the manner in which the bodies are dumped, the sexual pathology, the drugs found in their systems, the fact that specific freeways are so often involved, the fact that most of them are strangled or smothered." Rosenstein

He theorized that the killer, like all of his victims, is white.

However, law enforcement authorities remain cautious. "The investigation into five murders (in Orange County) since 1978 has intensified, and we're sharing

information with 13 enforcement agencies from other counties." Sheriff's Lt. Wyatt Hart.

"We have six investigators working 12 to 16 hours a day and we've received numerous calls and leads from the public. But we still cannot say these (30-odd murders) are connected, much less the five we have here on the front burner, or three more we're also looking at that date back to 1976."

Hart noted that there is no evidence of a homosexual link to any of the eight unsolved Orange County murders.

But only last August 1979, in neighboring San Bernardino County, 17-year-old Mark Shelton of Westminster was killed, the cause of death listed as shock from the pounding of a stick into his body through his rectum.

Other law enforcement officials are also skeptical

"We're monitoring five cases here since May 1979 for any link among the five as well as 18 we've heard about in the multi-jurisdictional (Southern California) area," said Los Angeles County sheriff's Capt. Walt Ownbey. 'But I must emphasize we don't have any evidence linking them. In this county alone, we have 35 to 40 dumps (murder victims dumped alongside roadsides) every year.

"It's not difficult to find similarities in five dumps a year - young boys, old men or young women. And you have to remember that 90 percent of murders are done in only four ways: you shoot them; stab them, strangle them or blunt-force them.'

Ownbey noted that the only common thread in the Los. Angeles County cases was that the bodies dumped near highways were nude.

"People are more inclined - due to the recent history of multiple murderers like Son of Sam, Hillside Strangler and the Trash Bag Murders - to read things into them (the so-called Freeway Killer murders)," he said. "Maybe it's a sign of the times."

The most recent murders typify the variety of victims chosen by the Freeway Killer.

- April 11: Nude body of Steven John Wood is found in a Long Beach affey near a freeway ramp. The 16-yearold Bellflower boy, reported missing by his parents, was

strangled. - March 25: Nude, strangled body of an unidentified boy is found near downtown Los Angeles near a freeway. The boy, 14-17 years old, was a runaway. "The way they come to California, he could have been from anywhere," said

Los Angeles police Detective Lou Guttierrez.

March 23: Two strangled teen-age boys are found in Cleveland National Forest near Ortega Highway in Orange County. Glenn Norman Barker, 14, of Westminster was last seen waiting for a bus the day before his body was found along with that of 15-year-old Russell Duane Rugh II of Garden Grove, who was last seen hitchhiking.

All three companies were named as defendants in more than \$371 million in suits filed since lxtoc 1 blew out June 3 in the Bay of Campeche, about 500 miles south of Brownsville.

SEDCO, a firm founded by Gov. Bill Clements and held in a blind trust for him since he took office, leased the drilling platform used by Permargo to drill the well.

A computer's voice is now greeting long distance callers at coin telephones in Hereford.

The computer's voice, which is not a recording but a voice produced by a computer, is part of the new Automatic Coin Toll Service

The female-voiced computer is programmed to tell coin telephone customers the amount of money needed to complete 1-plus Long Distance calls, said Southwestern Bell spokesman John Cooke, business office super-

"The computer also tells customers when the initial calling period is over and how much money to deposit for longer calls," Cooke said.

'The computer is programmed to calculate the cost of a call and then verbalize that calculation to the customer. And, like operators, the computer is polite, saying 'please' and 'thank you'", he added.

"The system was designed provide faster coin telephone service and help us hold down costs," he said. "Increasing call volumes normally require the addition of operators from one year to the next, but ACTS will help reduce the number of new



Cey Has Big Day To Break Slump

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Typical of the early season, Ron Cey has turned a miserable start into a rather fast one in less than 24 hours. All it took was a couple of big days at the plate.

Cey, who collected just two hits in his first 23 at-bats this year, had a' double, two singles and two runs-battedin Wednesday night as the Dodgers pounded out 14 hits in whipping San Diego 10-4.

On Thursday afternoon, in the Dodgers' home opener, the stocky third baseman had two singles, a towering tworun homer off Nolan Ryan and four RBIs as Los Angeles whipped Houston 6-4.

Cey has hit safely in his last seven offficial at-bats, just two short of his club record. He has reached base safely in his last 11 appearances at the plate with four walks to go with the seven hits.

His once-anemic batting average is now an even-.300 and he has eight RBIs in as many games.

The Dodgers won their second straight contest despite seven stolen bases by the Astros, which equaled a club record for a nine-inning game. Joe Morgan tied a team standard with three of those steals.

A two-run single in the eighth inning by Cey off dsing pitcher Dave Smith, 1snapped a 4-4 tie and chabled reliever Jerry Reuss. 1.0, to pick up the victory. Reuss allowed one hit and one run over the final three innings.

Terry Puhl gave Houston a quick 1-0 lead by hitting Don Statton's first pitch of the game for his second homer of be season. Cey's first homer the year capped a four-run tos Angeles outburst in the hird against Ryan, but the Astros chipped away with runs in the fourth, sixth and eighth innings to tie the

score. Steve Garvey singled to ad off the Dodgers' eighth d Dusty Baker, another hot tter, followed with a round-rule double. Cey then ounced his game-winning it just inside the third-base

"I've played long enough and I've been through these things before so I wasn't worried," said Cey about his urst 23 at-bats. "I wasn't swinging the bat for the most art like I was capable. We pened against the Astros and they got me out with good pitching.

"My timing was off, I was eing over-anxious and not being as selective as I

Baker had two doubles and yet another hot Dodger hitter, Reggie Smith, doubled and singled. Baker is hitting .438 while Smith is sizzling at .513.

Ryan, the Astros' celebrated free-agent, was hit hard by the Dodgers, allowing eight hits and four runs in six innings while walking three and striking out five.

"I'm disappointed I'm not throwing the ball better than I have," said the hardthrowing right-hander. "Basically, I'm a slow starter but I ought to be throwing better than I am right now."

Victimized by the seven Houston steals was Derrel Thomas, who was catching in only his third big league game. Many of the thefts came despite accurate throws and Thomas was praised by both friend and foe after the

"The catcher did a heck of a job," said Sutton, who allowed five hits and three runs in six innings. "He had the misfortune to be working with a guy who has one of the slowest deliveries around and no move to first. I'm very impressed with what a tremendous athlete he is."

"It is really gratifying what a tremendous job Derrel has done behind the plate," said Los Angeles Manager Tom Lasorda: "He made some great throws. They've got some outstanding baserunners and there were some very close plays."

Thomas is catching because of injuries to Steve Yeager and Joe Ferguson.

In the vernacular of human beings, the fillies and mares are still doing the dishes and mopping up the floors while the guys are having a ball at places such as the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes.

But every once in a while - once in a generation - a feisty filly will come along and demand through sheer track performance a matchup with the colts.

That has now happened in the case of undefeated. Genuine Risk, a pretty chestnut with a blaze of white on her forehead, named to go against favored Plugged Nickle and 10 other colts in Saturday's Wood Memorial at Aqueduct, a test for the Kentucky Derby May 3.

Should she make a favorable impression, Genuine Risk conceivably could be pointed to the Louisville classic, the first of the 3-year-old Triple Crown

Shades of the tragic

Ruffian. Genuine Risk, owned by Mrs. Bert Firestone and trained by Leroy Jolley, is undefeated in six starts and has won \$131,445, running against speed animals of her own sex. She was sired by Exclusive Native, who also sired Affirmed. She is untested in an established race against colts.

As a guide to the enormity of her task, it may be noted that in all of the 105 years of the Kentucky Derby only one filly has managed to win. That was Regret in 1915 -65 years ago. The last even to compete was C.V. Whitney's Silver Spoon in 1959, finishing fifth.

Although Genuine Risk is undefeated, she has not fired the nation's imagination as Ruffian did five years ago. Yet there are a couple of unusual coincidences in her latest venture.

She will be ridden by Jacinto Vasquez, who was on Ruffian that fateful July day in 1975 when the fabulous filly broke down at the three-quarter pole while leading Foolish Pleasure, the Derby champion, in their heralded \$350,000 match race at Belmont Park.

Carter Expects Boycott Support

President Carter expects a surge of support next week for the boycott of the Moscow Olympics, even though there was little indication of added support for the United States position Thursday.

Carter told a news conference that European allies will make "a strong rush of support" for the boycott and it will be a "heavy propaganda and psychological blow" to the Soviet Union for its military intervention in Afghanistan.

Among the countries Carter apparently is counting

on to stay away from the Summer Games are Canada, Italy and Great Britain. But Canadian Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau has steadfastly refused to speak out in favor of keeping Canada away from the Olympics, and he did so again Thursday. Instead Trudeau is biding his

time while attempting to gauge the amount of world support for the boycott.

The Italian Olympic Committee withheld for another month any decision on a boycott and asked Italian athletes to keep training.
