



RECONSTRUCTION OF PARMER COUNTY, TEXAS

R. W. Talley, Who is Now Located
There, Writes Interestingly
of its Possibilities.

BOVINA, Texas, April 23. EDITOR BANNER-STOCKMAN, Clarendon, Texas:

DEAR SIR:—This county borders on New Mexico, and the Pecos Valley railroad runs diagonally through the county from the northeast corner to the southwest. There was not a house to be seen a few months ago, but quite a good many have been erected since Christmas.

On the south side of the railroad no lands have been put on the market in the way of small tracts. Last August the first piece of land smaller than 50,000 acres sold, and it has since been re-sold at over 100 per cent profit to the first purchaser. The county has been owned entirely by the XIT, or Capitol Land Company. Bovina is the biggest shipping point for range cattle in the world. Over 1000 cars have been ordered for this place for the month of April. One man shipped out 99 cars last week for which he received a check for \$99,412,50, promptly putting same down irto a pair of muddy ducking pants as unconcernedly as if it had been only a few pennies. Another \$50,000 deal will be shipped out today.

The town has some of the extremes to contend with as well as to enjoy. It is the only post office in the county. We have no doctor; we have no drug store; no saloons; no gambling houses; and not a grave yard in the county. In fact, not very much town yet, But we have a bright future for a nice town of a few thousand. It will be the county site of Parmer county. Surrounded by a country without as much as one bad section of land in the whole county. On the main line of the Santa Fe railread from Chicago to California, and only a few miles from the main line from Galveston to California.

All the lands are red or dark chocolate, with some sand, but not enough to blow in the least. We have an experiment farm near this place that has fine wheat, oats, barley, alfalfa, potatoes, etc., etc. Infact it has almost anything growing that will grow in Donley county or in the Panhandle. The lands are very much like the lands of Donley county, except this is ALL good and no sand to contend with. Lands are selling almost as fast as they can be surveyed, and is cheap considering quality and location. This land has never been speculated on, and only one supplement to be made to abstract since the state turned loose her title.

This town has the honor of having one land man, and if the next twelve months holds as good as the one just past he will take off his hat to all his old friends when they call around for congratulations. I have a good location and a good contract, but not so good but what I am always willing to whack with Donley's best people, especially those who have stood with me through thick and thin (mostly thin, however.)

If this fails to land in the waste basket I will try you another pop of two.

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


