WATER TALK AT COMMERCIAL CLUB

D. L. McDonald Talks Water and Undergoes a Cross-Question About Irrigation.

At a meeting of the Commercial Club Tuesday night in the basement of the First Christian Church, the water question occupied most of the time. D. L. McDonald was present and made a most exhaustive report of the two wells he has put down and gave out some valuable information about the water supply, wells etc. Many questions were propounded to him by those present.

His report as to the water supply was quite gratifying, giving the opinion of experts whom he had had here to investigate the conditions.

He further stated that he believed wells with a capacity of 3000 gallons per minute could be developed, and advised the installation of wells for each 160 acres, saying that experts had advised against wells for less acreage. To reduce the acreage means an increase of cost proportionally.

Mr. Lipscomb chairman, announced that Mr. G. W. Brown of Arkansas had been in the city and had made a proposition to the Club to build the North & South line of railroad. His proposition in short was this—that Hereford give a bonus of \$75,000 and right of way thru the county, that he would put up a cash bond in the sum of \$20,000 before the citizens were asked to subscribe the bonus as a guarantee that he would build the line. Mr. Brown is at Vega this week.

Mr. Lipscomb announced his resignation from the board of directors of the Club and declared an election in order to fill the vacancy. Messrs G. A. F. Parker and J. H. Bowers were nominated, Mr. Parker being elected. The meeting adjourned.

Miss Griffith at Dimmitt.

Miss Millicent Griffith who has rendered valuable service in gathering news for The Brand during the summer months left Saturday for Dimmitt where she has a position as principal of the Dimmitt Public School. She conducted this school last year and her work was eminently successful and the pupils and patrons were so well pleased that the board of trustees gave her a unanimous vote to return. Not only have the patrons at Dimmitt shown their appreciation of her good work by a re-election, but voted bonds for a Fifteen Thousand Dollar building and a special tax to maintain the school. The children and teachers are now happy in the actual occupancy of that building. Miss Griffith is an educator of no mean ability. Her experience as a teacher and executive ability in school affairs has given her rare opportunities. Her energy combined with the ability makes her pre-eminently fitted for the school room. Her instruction not only covers the text book but reaches out into that higher moral plane.

While still connected with The Brand as a partner, she has been loaned to the good folks at Dimmitt for another school term. The Brand force wishes her fair weather and feels safe in predicting the most successful school.

IRRIGATION MEETING

Number of Farmers Hold Session and Discuss Water Supply, Cost of Pumping, etc.

Pursuant to call a number of farmers and others to meet at Club offices Wednesday afternoon to talk over the proposition of D. L. McDonald to put down a few wells. In substance his proposition is this—that he will put down the wells, install the necessary machinery, develop the wells and put everything ready to turn on the water for a stipulated price per well, according to the depth that he will endeavor to furnish the money to install the plants, taking a deed of trust on the farm to secure payment, provided as many as 5 or 6 would give him contracts. This is necessary as, a heavy drilling machine will have to be purchased.

Several have indicated that they would enter such an agreement.

It will be necessary to get up these contracts at once, so that he would have time to put all the wells in working order this fall and winter.

Constitution and By-Laws of City Federation of Women's Clubs of Hereford, Texas.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

NAME: The name of this organization shall be, "City Federation of Women's Clubs."

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT: The object of this club shall be,

FIRST—To promote by every possible action and influence, the establishment of sanitary and beautiful surroundings at home and in the City.

SECOND—To encourage growth and maintenance of public parks; reservations, open squares, or play grounds, by which the townspeople may enjoy proper facilities for recreation and pleasure.

THIRD—To create and foster an interest in the planting and care of trees, flowers, shrubs, and vines for the beautifying of homes and of parks and play grounds.

FOURTH—To advocate such laws and regulations as will prevent the mutilation or improper removal of trees, flowers, or shrubs which are planted in places of public recreation or trees along the streets of our City.

FIFTH—To endeavor through strenuous efforts to cause the permanent removal of unsightly signs and billboards and especially about public parks and play-grounds. If removal is impracticable, to work for such uniform legal regulations as shall make signs and bills as sightly as possible.

ARTICLE III.

OFFICERS: Its officers shall be: a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Parliamentarian.

ARTICLE IV.

MEETINGS: This Club shall meet each fourth Friday of each month from May to May inclusive. Twelve members shall constitute a quorum tho a less number may adjourn from time to time. The Club shall hold an Annual meeting upon the Fourth Friday in March. Special meetings shall be called by the President and the Secretary.

all other members of the club of such special meeting.

ARTICLE V.

MEMBERSHIP: The members of this club shall consist of members of a federated club in Hereford.

Any member absenting herself from regular meeting of club without a reasonable excuse shall be fined the sum of 25 cents for each absence. By reasonable excuse is meant the following; callers to detain; absence from city; moving; and sickness.

ARTICLE VI.

AMENDMENTS: The Constitution or By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a three fourth vote of members present provided notice of said amendment has been given at preceding meeting.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

PRESIDENT—The president shall preside over all meetings and conduct them by a formal order of business. She shall appoint all Committees, call special sessions and at the close of the Club Year she shall deliver an annual address.

VICE-PRESIDENTS: Shall perform the same duties as the president in her absence, in the order as elected.

SECTION II.

RECORDING SECRETARY: Shall keep a correct record of all meetings and take minutes at each meeting, also keep names of members. She shall keep names of all committees, and those serving upon same, and furnish the Chair with a list of same; also keep copy of Order of Business for the Chair.

SECTION III.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: Shall do all the correspondence for the club, receive and read all letters pertaining to club interests and preserve all club papers, and give written report a f year's transactions by her.

SECTION IV.

THE TREASURER: Shall receive, collect, hold or pay out all moneys, subject to order from the President acting upon the pleasure of the club. Shall keep an account of all funds received, end of all paid out, and render a bi-annual report to the club. She shall notify all members who are in arrears.

SECTION V.

It shall be the office of the Parliamentarian to keep posted upon "Rules of Order" and see that meetings are conducted under such.

SECTION VI.

Election of officers shall be by ballot. The person receiving the largest number of votes shall be declared elected.

Any vacancy occurring shall be filled at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs and election must be by ballot.

Election of officers shall be for one year, save the Parliamentarian who shall be elected for three months.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION I.

DUES:—Each separate club shall pay into the treasury at the rate of twenty-five cents per member, annually.

FROM ACROSS THE PACIFIC

Miss Laura Edwards Writes Newswy Letter From Korea, Now a Province of Japan.

Songdo, Korea, August, 5, 1910.
My Dear Lena:

I think it surely must be my time to write to you. It has been so long since I have heard from you.

I am now at Songdo taking a little vacation. I left Seoul July 20 and came here to visit our Missionary friends.

On July 27, a party of twelve of us consisting of the three young ladies who work here, their three Missioaries from China and myself and two young gentlemen Missionaries and Mr. and Mrs. Weems Missionary, went up to Mountain City, a summer resort up among the mountains about 12 miles from Songdo to spend a few days resting.

Oh! the scenery there is beautiful beyond description, it is most excellent by the Rockies of our own America. While there we stayed in an old Buddhist Temple, near which was high rugged mountain peaks, between which rushed beautiful clear cold mountain streams with great noisy falls.

We climbed high mountains, waded and swam streams, read, talked, sang and prayed in groups, ate slept and rested and returned to Songdo

after six days strong, happy and fresh for work again.

It is delightful to be here in our beautiful large three story rock school home with Misses Lowe and Nichols and Johnson and the visitors from China, but my work is calling me back to Seoul. I will go back to that great city next week, Monday or Wednesday.

Being the only one of our Woman's Council Representatives in Seoul I will not live in our ladies home there during this month but will stay in Mrs. Gerdine's home until September 1. Then I will open my house again and get ready for the new ladies which I will entertain until our Annual Conference which meets September 15.

Oh! we need workers so much. How each station would rejoice to have at least all of the four which are to be divided among our four stations where we have work.

What are you planning to do this fall? I suppose that Hattie and Jennie are in New York now, and Clara also. Early in the Spring Jennie wrote me that most likely Clara and yourself would go with them this summer, but no one has ever written me whether you did or not but somehow I just think you are at home and are perhaps preparing to go to school—may be the training school this fall.

I am anxious to get a letter from home. It has been so long since I heard from any of you. Write and tell me all about all the family and what they are doing and

expecting to do.

I will send you some pictures of Miss Lowe and myself made in Korean clothes also some of Mrs. Ross and me while on our country trip. I have just been asked to meet some Korean women who are in for a "sight see" and show them about and give them some Gospel Messages so I will make this letter short and mail it at once.

Making Good.

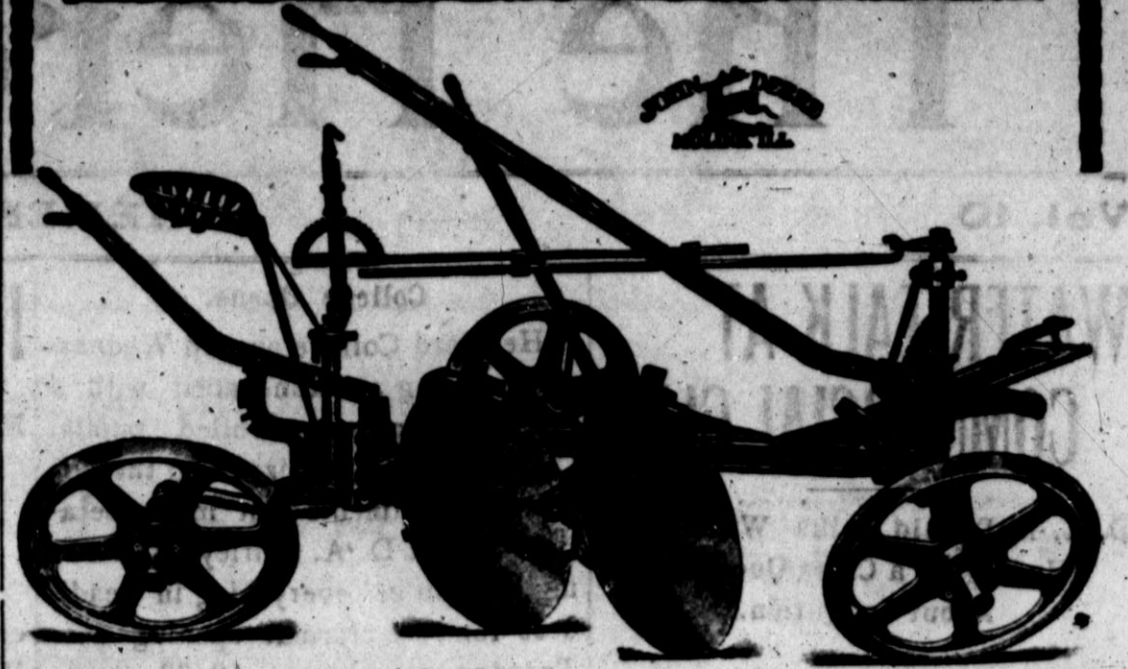

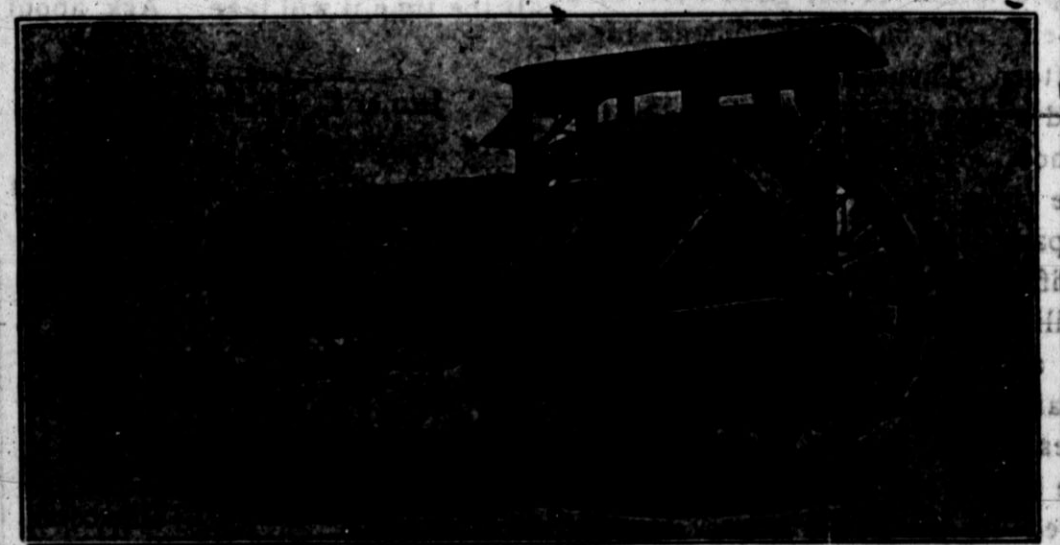

You are Hereby Comanded to summon James Stanek by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 69th Judicial district; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said 69th Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the County Court of Deaf Smith County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Hereford, on the first Monday in October A. D. 1910, the same being the third day of October A. D. 1910, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 30th day of August A. D. 1910 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 267, wherein W. G. Broyles is Plaintiff, and James Stanek, Henry Farmer and Eli Dunlap are Defendants, and said petition alleging that on the first day of February 1910 the defendants James Stanek and Henry Farmer executed and delivered to the plaintiff their promissory note, whereby they promised to pay to the plaintiff or order at Hereford, Texas, twenty days after the date thereof, the sum of six hundred dollars with interest thereon at 10 per cent from the date of said note. That said note further provided that if it should not be paid when due, that 10 per cent additional should be added as attorneys fees. That it has become necessary to place said note in the hands of attorneys and to bring this suit, and that the attorneys fees stipulated for in said note is a reasonable fee for the service to be rendered.

That to secure the payment of said note, the said James Stanek executed and delivered to the plaintiff a chattel mortgage in writing dated Feb. 1st, 1910, by which he conveyed to the plaintiff and created a lien on the following described personal property, viz. One horse mule 6 years old, not branded, weight 1200 lbs., one mare mule 7 years old, not branded, weight about 1200 lbs., two bay horses, weight about 1200 lbs each, neither of which were branded, about 6 years old, one black Spanish Jack about 15 hands high and 9 years old. That said mortgage was on the 5th day of March, 1910, filed and deposited as a chattel mortgage in the office of the County Clerk of Deaf Smith County, Texas.

That the defendant Dunlap claims to have a mortgage on the same, or a part of the same property and is attempting to subject it to the satisfaction of a debt which he claims to be owing him by the said Stanek, although the plaintiffs mortgage is prior and superior.

That on some date since since the 5th of March, 1910, the defendant Dunlap seized and took possession of and converted to his own use and benefit the two horses included in plaintiffs mortgage which were worth four hundred dollars.

Plaintiff prays for a judgment for his debt, interest and costs and for a foreclosure of his chattel mortgage, and in the event the Court shall find that the two horses included in plaintiffs mortgage have been converted by the defendant Dunlap, then that he have a judgment against said defendant of the value of said horses.

Austin Letter.

Austin, Texas, September 16.— Those who are accustomed to think of Texas only as a country of magnificent distances and to regard the people as primitive in their pursuits should visit the state Capitol at Austin and view this splendid triumph in architecture, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association. It is the seventh largest state Capitol in the United States and approaches the national capitol in area and exels it in grandeur. It is the seventh largest building in the world. It was built exclusively from Texas materials and stands as a magnificent monument to the matchless and varied resources of our great state. To erect this building the state gave the contractors a block of counties equal in area to the grant which King James gave to the Earl of Warwick in 1630 to establish a colony in America and which is now the state of Connecticut. A description of the building follows:

The Capitol Building measures 600 feet from East to West; from North to South it measures 287 feet; from the ground to the top of the dome 313 feet; the Texas Capitol is 6 feet higher than the National Capitol, the latter being only 307 feet; the outside of the Texas Capitol is built of the finest red granite secured from the quarries in Burnet county, Texas; the quality and beauty of the material are equal to any in the world; wainscoting in the Capitol is of Oak, Cherry, Walnut, Pine, Ash, Cedar and Mahogany; the total length of the wainscoting is eight miles; the building alone covers three acres; the floor space in the building covering 20 acres; the Capitol was built by a Chicago firm of Contractors who received 3,000,000 acres of Panhandle land for compensation; construction was begun on the building in 1882 and completed in 1886; in the grounds of the Capitol there are 22 acres, 4 acres of walks and 4 acres of drives; among the attractions of the grounds at our state capitol are artificial lakes, plants and flowers of all kinds monuments of Confederate soldiers, the Alamo, Firemen and Texas Rangers.

The capitol building and surroundings are inspiring and elevating and have largely to do with instilling into the law maker's a spirit of progress and development which is now taking firm hold on the people.

Will Fly Across Ocean.

Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 14.— Walter Wellman, who declares that he will attempt to cross the Atlantic ocean in the dirigible airship America, has announced the personnel of the crew which will accompany him.

Melvin Vaniman will be chief engineer. He was with Wellman in the unsuccessful attempt to reach the North Pole from Spitzbergen last year. Murray Simon, navigating officer of the steamer Oceanic of the White Star line, will be navigator of the America. Jack Irvin will have charge of the wireless outfit, which is depended on to keep in touch with the shore and to summon assistance if accident should overtake the craft. Louis Loud, a trained mechanic, who has had actual experience in air navigation, will be assistant engineer, and Fred B. Aubert, a youth of 20 years, will be the sixth member of the crew. The exact date of the sailing of the America has not been announced, but it is said that it will be within a few days.

Wins Silver Set.

Miss Alta Conklin who lives with her parents some 7 miles southeast of town wins the set of silver knives and forks offered by the Brand for the nearest guess to the population of Deaf Smith County.
