# **Carter Prepares 'No Frills' Tax Plan**

### **Authorities** Investigate Fire, Fight

#### **By PAUL SIMS Managing Editor**

Tommy Franklin, 40, of 1628 18th Street, was charged today with assault on a police officer following a complicated early-morning incident, which left two men in the hospital with stab wounds and a trailer house burned to the ground.

Franklin was hospitalized after sustaining knife cuts on his arms, legs and throat and a stab wound in the side. Monty Lawrence, 30, also of 1628 18th. was treated for a stab wound in the side after reportedly walking from the trailer house to the hospital.

The Hereford Volunteer Fire Department received a call of a fire at the trailer house at 5:40 a.m. today. Police and county sheriff's deputies also went to the scene, where officer Reuben McGilvary was attacked outside the burning home by Franklin


According to Chief Deputy Art Burton of the sheriff's office, Lawrence walked to the hospital for treatment of his wound before the fire department and law enforcement officials arrived. Franklin was taken by ambulance to Deaf Smith General Hospital after assaulting McGilvary

"The only charge we've filed is assault on a police officer, Burton said. "We may have self inflected wounds on one and accidental on the other.

He added that the sheriff's office is investigating the possibility that Franklin may have tried to commit suicide and Lawrence was accidentally stabbed.

We just don't know yet what actually happened. And we don't know if arson was involved

Fire Marshal Jay Spain said the fire "is under investigation." He said the house was "totally involved" by the time the fire department arrived.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter, trying to pry some form of tax-cut legislation from a congressional committee, is offering a compromise which, for the time being, scuttles his campaign pledge for tax reform.

Administration sources said the Carter plan, presented to House Democratic leaders on Wednesday, calls for a "no frills" \$15 billion to \$20 billion tax reduction for next year.

Although the compromise is a retreat from Carter's earlier demands for tax reform legislation, the administration source said Carter was not abandoning the effort and would seek changes in the tax code later.

As part of the agreement with the Democratic congressional leaders. the administration received assurances that there would be separate floor votes on some of the "reform" proposals. congressional sources said.

These sources, who asked not to be identified, saw Carter as apparently trving to trade off the reform proposals for a chance to get the tax cut bill out of the House Ways and Means Committee, where it has languished for months amid a dispute over cutting capital gains taxes.

The administration source, who also asked to remain unnamed, said that Carter remains firm in his opposition to a cut in capital gains taxes on profits from the sale of such items as homes and stocks.

'That's the sticking point in all of this the capital gains tax." said a committee source Wednesday night. He said the administration is gambling that the offer to leave the reform package out of the bill may sway enough Democratic votes in the committee.

A spokesman for Rep. Thomas P. . O'Neill, D-Mass., said the House speaker was ready to push for the Carter compromise. But a Ways and Means source said committee chairman. Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., was going to "wait and see" how the proposal was greeted by committee members.

The source noted that there are still a number of other compromise proposals before the committee including one offered by Rep. James R. Jones, D-Okla., which would include a partial cut in capital gains taxes

Session Decision May Be Near

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) It appeared today that Gos. Dolph Briscoc. pondering hours of talk with legislative leaders would decide before the weekend whether to call a special summer session. to cut taxes.

It Gov Bill Hobby and Speaker Bill Claston both favor a 30 day session. probably starting July 10

Republican gubernatorial candidate Bill Clements also urged the governor tocall lawmakers back to town "to providemeaningful tax relief."

Clayton said he had talked to Attorney General John Hill, the Democratic nominee for governor, by phone to assure him we want his participation in the process."

In a Chamber of Commerce address in Dallas Wednesday. Hill said he favors the special session and thinks legislators ought to address themselves to at least four areas of tax reform.

He suggested that if the session is called, it should address repeal of the 4 percent state sales tax on residential utility bills; consider tax assessments on small farms and ranches on the basis of productivity and not market value; consider an increase in inheritance tax exemptions on farms and ranches from \$60,000 to \$200,000; and consider establishing a mandatory \$5,000 school district property tax exemption for elderly

#### homeowners.

Hill proposed delegating a "reasonable amount" of state oil and gas taxes to local school districts to relieve district property taxes.

Hill said he spoke with Clayton last week on the idea of a special session, and he told reporters he was "not concerned" with the cost of an off-year legislative meeting

"It doesn't matter whether Goy. Dolph Briscoe or Gov. John Hill passes special legislation in favor of the taxpayer." he said.

**Congressmen Seek Import-Sugar Hike** 

WASHINGTON (AP) - Eight members of Congress want President Carter to make foreign sugar more expensive in this country, a move that would help domestic producers while raising costs for consumers and business.

Six senators, led by Russell Long. D-La., and Frank Church, D-Idaho, and two House members are meeting with Carter today to present their arguments for placing higher tariffs or import quotas on foreign sugar.

Such a move would be intended to drive up the price of imported sugar and make domestically produced sugar competitive on the U.S. market. The impact, measured in millions of doi!ars, might mean a few extra pennies a pound for supermarket shoppers and much more for the profit margins of big soft drink companies.

Several sources described the White House meeting today as a last-ditch effort to avoid a major clash between the president and senior congressional Democrats.

Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland, a former member of Congress from Minnesota, is working frantically behind the scenes to find a compromise that might defuse the situation.

However, one congressional source who asked not to be named said, "You can't watch this too long without getting the feeling that Bergland has been cut out of the pattern on sugar policy.

Members of Congress from sugarproducing states want the government to be peg the domestic sugar price at about 17 cents a pound and to make sure that imports do not enter the country at a lower price.

Heightening the significance of the struggle is the effect that sugar prices

Carter, who first asked Congress to cut taxes by \$25 billion, later reduced that figure to \$20 billion and in the latest proposal appeared ready to accept \$15 billion

From the first, the reform proposals in Carter's tax package have been the focus of comtroversy.

Among the changes Carter had wanted were sharp reductions in tax writcoffs for business entertainment - the so-called

Refiners are now able to buy imported sugar for a little more than 13 cents and pound, about 11/2 cents below the price of U.S. sugar.

Both Calderas and his mother resided at 206 Bennet when the murder occurred. Mrs. Calderas was dead at the scene, according to Justice of the Peace Glen Nelson, who ordered an autopsy.

### 51% of All Farmers Signed Up for Program

WASHINGTON (AP) - A final signup report by the Agriculture Department shows that 51 percent of the nation's eligible farms have been enrolled in federal acreage control programs aimed at curbing the production of grain and cotton this year.

Ray Fitzgerald, administrator of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said Wednesday that 1.2 million farms of more than 2.3 million which were eligible have been signed up in the programs.

Although just slightly more than half of the eligible farms were signed up, those account for 72.3 percent of the nation's total eligible crop acreage, Fitzgerald said

The final report showed that slightly more than 24 million acres will be taken from crop production this year under the wheat, feed grains and cotton acreage programs

The Carter administration wanted at least 22 million acres of cropland taken from production this year under the programs.

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) - The Army and Air Force plan to fire \$2 million worth of ammunition Saturday for President Carter's benefit when the commander-inchief visits here Saturday, the Austin American-Statesman reported today Fort Hood officials would not confirm

#### **Ex-Military Wife Can't**

#### **Garnish Benefits**

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - It's tough, but there is no way former wives of retired servicemen can sue the United States for garnishment of retirement benefits, the Texas Supreme Court said Wednesday.

The decision applies only to Texas cases where retirement benefits are considered community property.

Dorothy Stelter and Robert Stelter were divorced five years ago in El Paso. She received the right to 35 percent of his retirement checks, but Stelter left the state and stopped making payments.

Unable to obtain enforcement of the decree by Texas courts, Mrs. Stelter sued the United States government. She wanted her husband's retirement checks garnished, with the government mailing her share to her each month.

The court said the United States could be sued only with the consent of Congress. It said a federal garnishment law applied only to alimony and child support - not to community property.

It is "unfortunate the Act of Congress is worded as it is," the court observed. But with no alimony law, "Texas spouses are not protected as are spouses in other states where they may bring a garnishment suit against the United States to recover alimony or support payments.

#### **Bentsen** Continues

#### Angel Dust Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen.Lloyd Bentsen continued his crusade against Angel Dust, telling his colleagues that it had killed more than 100 persons last year and "warped beyond repair" the minds of hundreds more.

The Texas Democrat urged approval of his bill seeking to reduce the availability of phencyclidine, also known as PCP or Angel Dust.

'Most victims of PCP succumb to the strange dissociations-disorientation effects exerted by the drug," Bentsen said. He testified Wednesday at a joint hearing of subcommittees on juvenile delinquency and alcoholism and drug abuse.

'People die from PCP not so much by overdose, but by jumping off buildings and bridges, down elevator shafts, or by drowning - in one case in less than four inches of water in a shower." Bentsen declared

"A typical examle would be the case of a young man in Los Angeles who leaped from a second-story window while under Honored for Work the influence of PCP, crashed through a wooden fence prior to striking the ground, got up, undressed, went back into the building and dove to his death from an upstairs balcony," Bentsen continued.

"While we have relatively reliable figures on the number of deaths attributable to PCP abuse, there is no firm evidence available on the number of minds warped beyond repair by this readily available, easily manufactured animal tranquilizer. But we do know that PCP is capable of inducing extreme psychotic behavior in users.

## **Genealogy Said To Be Most Fascinating Pastime**

ton in the family closet doesn't seem to matter, says James A. Funkhouser, genealogy enthusiast and chairman of general and public services studies at Edison State Community

College here. 'People are more interested in the individual today," Funkhouser says. "That's one reason why family-tree tracers find an uncle who died a pauper or a cousin who was a horse thief just as fascinating as a great-grandparent who knew Abraham Lincoln."

Funkhouser, who teaches a non-credit course in genealogy at Edison State, believes the revival of interest in family roots began long before the book by that title took America by storm

'We've become a nomadic people," he says, "and our family ties are more fragmented than they used to be. Finding out more about your family gives you a feeling of belonging, of being tied to a certain locality at a certain time. Call it 'roots' if you want to

But Funkhouser doesn't total-

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ly discount the effect the book "Roots" had on increased interest in genealogy - especially among black Americans.

> "The book certainly showed that blacks could also trace their ancestry although it is a long and difficult process because of sketchy records," he savs

> Funkhouser believes other reasons for increased interest in "second cousin Tabitha" include the bicentennial, which aroused a heightened interest in history among Americans. and more emphasis on ethnic groups such as Polish Americans and Italian Americans. Whatever the reason, though, Funkhouser thinks the hunt for

ancestors an intriguing business "You have to have a bit of

Ellery Queen in you to be a genealogist," he says. "You look for clues to solve the mystery. The only difference is the mystery concerns people who once really lived.'

How and where do you find these clues? Quiz everyone in your family for things they can tell you; then consult family records like the old Bible, famipapers, journals and photos. Finally, go to the public library and to the original records, Funkhouser advises.

There are numerous repositories for this sort of thing," he notes, "such as county court records, state archives, church, land and probate records, federal censuses and military records. Area records go back to the days of settlement, if something like fire hasn't happened to them. The original col-

onies were required to keep vital records but states didn't start keeping them until the

mid-19th century or even as late as 1900." What happens when you've traced back as far as you can in this country? "Overseas ancestors are harder to trace." Funkhouser says. "The ideal thing would be to go abroad and continue the search but this isn't practical for most people. There are, however, some guides to overseas research available from genealogical publishing houses." If you want to know more about your family but you don't want to do the research your-

self, there are companies and individuals who will accommodate you, Funkhouser points out. However, there is a risk in this, he warns. Some people are legitimate and some are fake genealogists who would just as soon as not create a mythical Aunt Minnie who came over on

the Mayflower. It is important to know whom you're dealing with. This method is also expensive and takes the fun out of your own detective work, he adds.

Some specific research centers are the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., and the Genealogical Society of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, which has conpiled genealogies and statistics on microfilm.







WASHINGTON (NEA) - In a recent interview program for the Voice of America, political analyst Richard Scammon was asked to speculate for his overseas audience on the probable identity of the 1980 Republican

autoence on the probable identity of the 1560 Republication
presidential nominee.
"I can't tell you who he will be," Scammon replied, "but
I think I can describe what he'll be.
"He'll be in his late 40s or early 50s, articulate, a good
campaigner, a middle-of-the-roader, probably but not
necessarily an officeholder. Most important, he'll be
someone with the time to campaign for it over these next two years.

Up to the last second, the name conjured up by Scammon's description was at the tip of the tongue — Senate Minority Leader Howard H. Baker Jr., R-Tenn. But

Scanmon put his finger on Baker's greatest single weakness as a presidential prospect — time to campaign. The more influential and successful Baker becomes as Senate GOP leader, the more tightly he seems tied to Capitol Hill. And that is not where presidential nomina-

Capitol Hill. And that is not where presidential nomina-tions have been won in recent years. There are advantages to his high visibility in Washing-ton, to be sure. Of all the Republicans mentioned in 1980 speculation, Baker is the only contender apart from "old" pols Ronald Reagan and Gerald R. Ford to make a blip on the public opinion polls. Furthermore, his track record as GOP leader and his smooth fit with Scammon's other criteria — age, experi-ence, campaign skill, moderate ideology, etc. — have made Baker the morning-line favorite of Republican financial backers who bet on presidential politics. In his Tennessee re-election campaign this year, Baker, who faces only nominal opposition, has already collected more than \$550,000 — much of it from the New York financial community and the Fortune 500 corporate world. Conventional wisdom holds that Baker risked a perma-nent breach with the Republican right wing when he helped

nent breach with the Republican right wing when he helped

### Baker's political gamble

President Carter win ratification of the Panama Canal treaties, and blew a golden opportunity to garner Jewish support when he backed Carter's Middle East arms sale package.

In the long run, however, both decisions could well pay off politically, for they established Baker's credentials as a "statesman" and paved the way for him to criticize more important aspects of Carter's foreign policy — such as a new SALT treaty — without being accused of mere partisan carping.

partisan carping. Carter's own pollster, Patrick Caddell, sees foreign policy as a potential trouble spot for the president, and Baker is moving skillfully to capitalize on the weakness. "I think the president got off to a wobbly start in foreign policy generally," he said in a recent interview. "It's his weakest point today." Which brings us back to Baker's own Achilles heel — time to campaign, to translate his on-paper advantages into primary support and convention delegates. Of all the major GOP contenders for 1960, Baker has done the least traveling this year on the peas-and-chicken

done the least traveling this year on the peas-and-chicken circuit. He will have somewhat more time once his own re-election to the Senate is accomplished, but as long as he remains minority leader he will inevitably be pinned to the Capitol for days and weeks on end.

Capitol for days and weeks on end. Some of Baker's supporters believe he should relinquish the leadership post next year to devote more time to a presidential campaign, but the senator insists he has no intention of doing so. Both Jimmy Carter and Richard Nixon campaigned flat out for two full years before the presidential election, and George McGovern very nearly matched them even while serving in the Senate.

If Baker clings to his time-consuming job as minority leader, thereby tying himself to Washington, it could prove his biggest political gamble to date.

Don't sell him short. His name is Earl Weaver. He is manager of the Baltimore Orioles, considered by many the best strategist in baseball. While the Yankees and Red Sox are slugging it out, Earl and his overlooked minions could take it

The Orioles, who lost millions of dollars' worth of talent in the free agent draft and made no effort to enter the high-bidding sweepstakes, have assembled a young, aggressive team intent on destroying the legend that championships can be purchased.

Through Tuesday's play, they had won 17 of their last 18 games and moved into second place in the AL race, behind the fence-rattling Red Sox and ahead of the feuding Yankees, the defending world champions. How have they done it?

"No mirrors," insists Weaver, a puckish, round-cheeked dugout wizard whose genius is compared with that of the late Joe McCarthy. "Just good pitching and defense."

There is another factor strongly in the Orioles' favor. Except for pitcher Jim Palmer, a three-time Cy Young winner, there is no recognized superstar on the squad. What other gilded talent the Orioles had socked away in the closet was gobbled up in the free agent draft.

Well, yes, it had been. Confronted by uncertainty or doubt, it was said, consumers would sit heavily on their folded wallets or keep their pocketbooks clasped. But it has not been happening.

"Even as a busboy or a waiter, and when others learned who I was, it was months that was gone. I think they



# Holding Down Beef Prices May **Endanger Domestic Production**

COLLEGE STATION - Consumers, concerned over recent increases in the price of beef at the supermarket, need to look closely at the situation facing cattlemen before cheering government proposais to import more beef and force retail meat prices down, economists and marketing specialists at Texas A&M University caution.

"Short-term action to hold down beef prices now will result in less domestic beef being available during the 1980's." the TAMU economists warn in a position paper analyzing the present cattle situation.

The paper looks at the domestic and international situation, the outlook through 1980, the relative positions of consumers around the world. the effects of inflation, the demand for beef, and the effects of supply upon producer income. It was prepared by Dr. John A. Hopkin, head of the department of agricultural economics; Dr. Donald E. Farris, professor of agricultural economics, and Dr. Ernest E. Davis, Extension livestock marketing specialist.

President Carter's move to relax the beef import quota as a means of helping control inflation came as a surprise "to many who have watched the beef industry suffer a four-year worldwide depression," the TAMU economists said.

Recent increases in retail beef prices "were a market reaction to a complex set of forces; but said. mainly the result of a four-year



reduction in cattle herds caused by adverse economic and weather conditions," the ecomists stated.

prices in the U.S. have been regulated by market forces with relatively little government control. If the rules of the impersonal market are to apply in periods of burdensome supplies as occurred in 1974-77, then it follows that they should

be allowed to apply when supplies are shorter and prices are higher," the economists stated.

obviously is in other sectors of the economy." The share of disposable income spent for beef in the U.S. in 1977 was only 2.13 percent, the lowest in more than 20 years, they explained. The demand for beef, the TAMU economists said, "de-

pends mainly on personal income or the consumer's buying power." They cited studies in Texas and California which showed that with each 10 percent increase in income, the average American increased beef consumption by about 10 percent, but that a 10 percent increase in beef prices caused only a six or seven percent decrease in beef consumption.

The average consumption of red meat by each American was 195 pounds in 1974, the economists noted. This was more than any other country except Australia, New Zealand and Argentina. In addition, the average U.S. consumer ate 50 pounds of poultry.

Surveys taken in capital cities of the world Nov. 2, 1977 and March 1, 1978 showed that only Mexico City, Ottawa, Canberra, Brasilia and Buenos Aires paid less for beef in the retail store. Last November, for example, a pound of chuck roast which sold in Washington for \$1.09, cost \$1.58 in London, \$3.11 in Rome, \$7.87 Tokyo, and 43 cents in Buenos Aires, one of the major

"U.S. Consumers get one of the world's best beef bargains," the TAMU economists said. "An important\_part of this bargain, however, represents a 'subsidy' of American beef consumers by cattle ranchers and farmers, who have had chronically low income for 21/2 decades except for 1972 and 1973."

"As prices advance in 1978, there is no need for producers to sell productive heifers or cows, if they have feed," the paper noted. Thus, the available supply of beef for hamburger or manufacturing is sharply reduced around the world.

"It is characteristic of the cattle cycle that beef marketings must be reduced for two to four years while the production capacity is being rebuilt," the three economists said.

"In short, there likely will be less beef not only in the U.S., but throughout international markets. Because of this, even lifting U.S. import quotas will not guarantee that more imports are available."

#### WASHINGTON, D.C. - The decision by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) on the cotton dust standard is another example of excessive and inflationary regulation by big government. National Cotton Council President Lon Mann commented.

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


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

### **Prisoner's Death To Be Probed**

body, according to a report filed WASHINGTON (AP) - A by El Paso County Medical Justice Department source confirmed Wednesday that a federal grand jury will investigate the case of Larry Lozano, a Mexican-American found dead in his Ector County jail cell in Odessa.

The authorization was given last week, the source said, to take sworn testimony from sheriff's deputies. There was no indication when or where the grand jury would be convened.

Lozano's death was ruled accidental by an Odessa inquest jury April 12 after hearing testimony from sheriff's officials and several pathologists.

Lozano died Jan. 22. Several inmate witnesses said he had been beaten by law enforcement officers.

Sheriff Elton Faught had initially said Lozano died from self-inflicted wounds he suffered when, he banged his head against a padded cell wall.

However, deputies testified at the inquest that they had to use excessive force to subdue Lozano after he became violent and this led to his death. The Dallas Times Herald

reported Wednesday that Attorney Griffin Bell and his top assistants have not determined whether to seek federal indictments against any law enforcement officers although the FBI has developed information about possible violations of civil rights laws in connection with the death.





Ordinarily, the unchallenged verdict of any one court becomes a legal precedent.

If you were to go to court today refusing to pay your income taxes your attorney would cite two cases: "The Government vs. William Drexler 1970" and "The Government vs. Norbett Steiton 1978." In each of these cases the defendant was accused of paying no taxes on his income. Each defendant sought and got

a jury trial. And in both cases the federal court jury decided in favor of the defendant. The jury, in effect, agreed that "the IRS has no legal right to collect It may be because in two

taxes." Can anybody take his tax case to court and win on similar grounds? Mr. Dexler, himself a former lawyer, says "yes." When the tax man demanded to look at his books Drexler cited the Fifth Amendment; he refused on constitutional grounds to produce his financial records -- and got away with it.

Let me say that others who have tried something similar have ended up in federal prison.

Drexler says that those who went to prison were not properly prepared, not entirely; familiar with their own constitutional rights.


A principal point which, Dexler made in his defense was that the Constitution authorizes the Congress to levy and collect taxes--but does not authorize the Congress to delegate or transfer that right to the IRS or anybody else.

So what Dexler did was to file tax return each year. responding to all questions with Fifth Amendment objections.

Not many Americans would like to see the chaos in our country which Italy sufferswhere almost everybody thumbs his nose at the tax collector.

But what these court cases and state referendums are providing is a forum through which a long-silent majority can express their resentment. against having their hard-earned money used for the support of the indigent and the immoral at home and abroad.

The voters are educating the government -- and you watch! Politicians of both parties are falling over one another in their eagerness to respond.

### **Murder** Scene **Requires Warrant**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Police may not conduct an extensive search of the scene of a murder without a court warrant, the Supreme Court ruled Wednesday.

The court unanimously overturned a narcotics conviction against Rufus Mincey Jr., who was accused of killing an undercover narcotics agent during a raid on his apartment in Tucson, Ariz., on Oct. 28, 1974.

Mincey also had been found guilty of murder, but that conviction was overturned by the Arizona Supreme Court on grounds the judge had improperly instructed the jury about criminal intent.

In Wednesday's ruling, the Supreme Court held that a search of Mincey's apartment.
