Asked as to what insects or pests the fruit was in danger of Mr. Dor-
sey sta:d that the cantaloupe louse was the only pest which had
bothered him. This under the leaf and sucks the life
out of the plant, and is in its attacks though mostly encountered in wet seasons. The best plan for handling the pest is
to have the men cultivating the field watch closely for such plants as are affected, and when one is found to dig it up by the roo
bury it between the rows. As to labor, one man can plant
