Section 2. 



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

be used. As to using tertilizer the speaker had experimented a little and found that a fertilizer would cause the melons to come in sooner, but he did not consider the benefits derived thereby to be very great.

In conclusion Mr. Dorsey advocated a good strong association and each member putting in from 5 to 20 acres; would not recommend planting less than 5 acres, and said that even if a total failure occurred the planter had not lost Fork and Turkey much money, whereas if the crop was properly handled it would beat anything else the farmer could plant as a money producing crop. Stated that three years ago he planted 45 acres, hired all the work done and then cleared over \$4000 on the crop. He said it was a crop that required the most exacting care, but when properly handled it was a sure winner, and he strongly recommended that an acreage of at least 200 acres be planted here.
