Letter From Miss Laura Edwards

MY DEAR JENNIE:

While at Songdo during our annual conference I started a letter to you and almost finished it just expecting to add my appointment and other conference news but somehow misplaced it in my packing, so will tonight begin another.

We had a very fine annual meeting, and all enjoyed Bishop Hoss very much. The reports of the work done this year were fine and joyous. The appointments were, we think, as wisely and justly made as could be, though it meant the changing of some of our best workers.

Choon-chun our newest and most inaccessible station having been left vacant on the departure of Rev. Moose and family for America just a few weeks before Annual Meeting on account of the quickly developed tuberculosis of his daughter made it necessary for other workers to be sent to this place. It is about seventy miles overland from Seoul, not nearer than that to railroad or steamer, only little Korean boats can go down the river within four or five miles of the place.

Though Mr. Moose and his faithful little wife have had a lonely time of it for two years in this station, they have opened up a great work, and there is such an opportunity there now that it seemed that we could not afford to leave it with no one in charge, so even though each of our other stations are so much in need of workers, the work is heaped upon the few in each station and some workers sent to Choon-chun. Mr. and Mrs. Hitch from Wansan, Dr. and Mrs. Mayes, who have been in Choon-chun a little while but who will in a few months leave for the U. S. A., Miss Noyes one of our new missionaries just landed here and I are to have the privilege of working in Choon-chun. Miss Nichols from Songdo and Miss Smith the other of our new ladies are to be here in Seoul.

I am all packed ready to start to my new home as soon as Mr. and Mrs. Hitch can get packed and ready to leave Wansan. They will come by steamer and train to Seoul, and we will all go down through the country to Choon-chun, which will take two days good riding, for we will have some steep mountains passed to go over. Everyone who has been there says it is very beautiful indeed, very high cool and quiet. My work will be with the women, teaching them and going with my bible women into the near by villages and holding classes with them of two or three days each.

Though Choon-chun is not a great city there are many large villages within a radius of five or ten miles, so I will do all the itinerating that I can. I am so happy to have the opportunity of going into this ripe field which is just now being touched.

Mr. Moose and his family are going to be somewhere in the west. I think they mean to try Albuquerque, N. M. They may land in West Texas. They are in search of a climate in which Mary's health can be restored or at least her life prolonged. You may have an opportunity of hearing Mr. Moose tell something of Korea and of Choon-chun.

Miss Noyes and I will not keep house in Choon-chun, we will board with Mrs. Hitch.

I enjoyed your letters from New York very much. The day I received the one telling of your visit to the training school, I also had

one from Mrs. Hargrove telling how much she enjoyed seeing you all. I am glad you have seen the building but I only wish you might see everything in running order and all the lovely young ladies. Don't you think you would like to spend a term there. We need somebody about like you out here to teach music so much.

I suppose you and Hattie have your hands full now in Hereford, and I suppose Letha is somewhere away in school. I know it seems lonely without her at home.

My birthday came during our annual meeting while I was at Songdo. So Miss Lowe had me a lovely birthday dinner prepared without my knowing it until I came into the dining room. The table was so pretty, a beautiful big rectangular cake with candles all around it in the middle of the table, and quite a number of little gifts at my plate.

I have been in Korea now almost a year, and it has been a happy one. I am so anxious to know this language so I can use it readily. I long to do some hard work for my Lord during this next year. He has taught me more of his love and I have realized privileges in him this

year that I never before felt that I could claim.

On Sunday mornings I often think of the congregations in Hereford, and almost imagine I can see the Sunday schools. I suppose my little Elizabeth and all my other little girls are just as sweet as ever. Give her a hug for me. Give my love to all my friends whom you may meet.

Texas Boundary Line Again.

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 29.

Editor El Paso Herald:

I have noticed the many articles in many of the newspapers, both in the great state of Texas, and last, but not least, the greatest state-to-be in the union—New Mexico, apropos boundaries.

As chairman on preamble and boundaries, it necessarily became my duty to 'bound' the territory of New Mexico, and I did. The boundary of New Mexico as submitted to the constitutional convention, and adopted, is correct. Texas can look at it any way it wishes; it may laugh at the idea—but Texas better get ready to either move from the strip or come through with \$12,000,000.

The strip added to New Mexico by my method of "bounding" only adds 600,000 acres of land and that land is only worth \$20 and \$25 per acre.

Texas admits the 103 parallel as correct. If she does, she has no case.

I assure you and the people of the great Star state, among whom I have many friends and admirers, that it was not my intention as chairman, the intention of the members, or of the convention to get into print. We meant business. We do not want an inch of Texas land that does not belong to us, and Texas should not want, I hope, an inch of land that does not belong to it.

Remember what I tell you: New Mexico will not only own that strip, or its full value in good American gold, but the interest on said sum since 1859, to the date of settling the suit in the courts.

I am gathering some data which I will send you as soon as I receive same from Washington, which if used in the columns of your paper will open the eyes of all Texans; and for once set Texas right on "boundaries."

In the meantime, just get Texas ready to do the sensational, and get busy raising that pile of money and the interest thereon, or else surrender 600,000 acres of the best on earth, or \$20 per acre.

There is no politics in this—just come to hard-pan and deny the 103d meridian, is not correct. If it is correct, we will proceed to claim all on this side of it, and hold and stick to it.

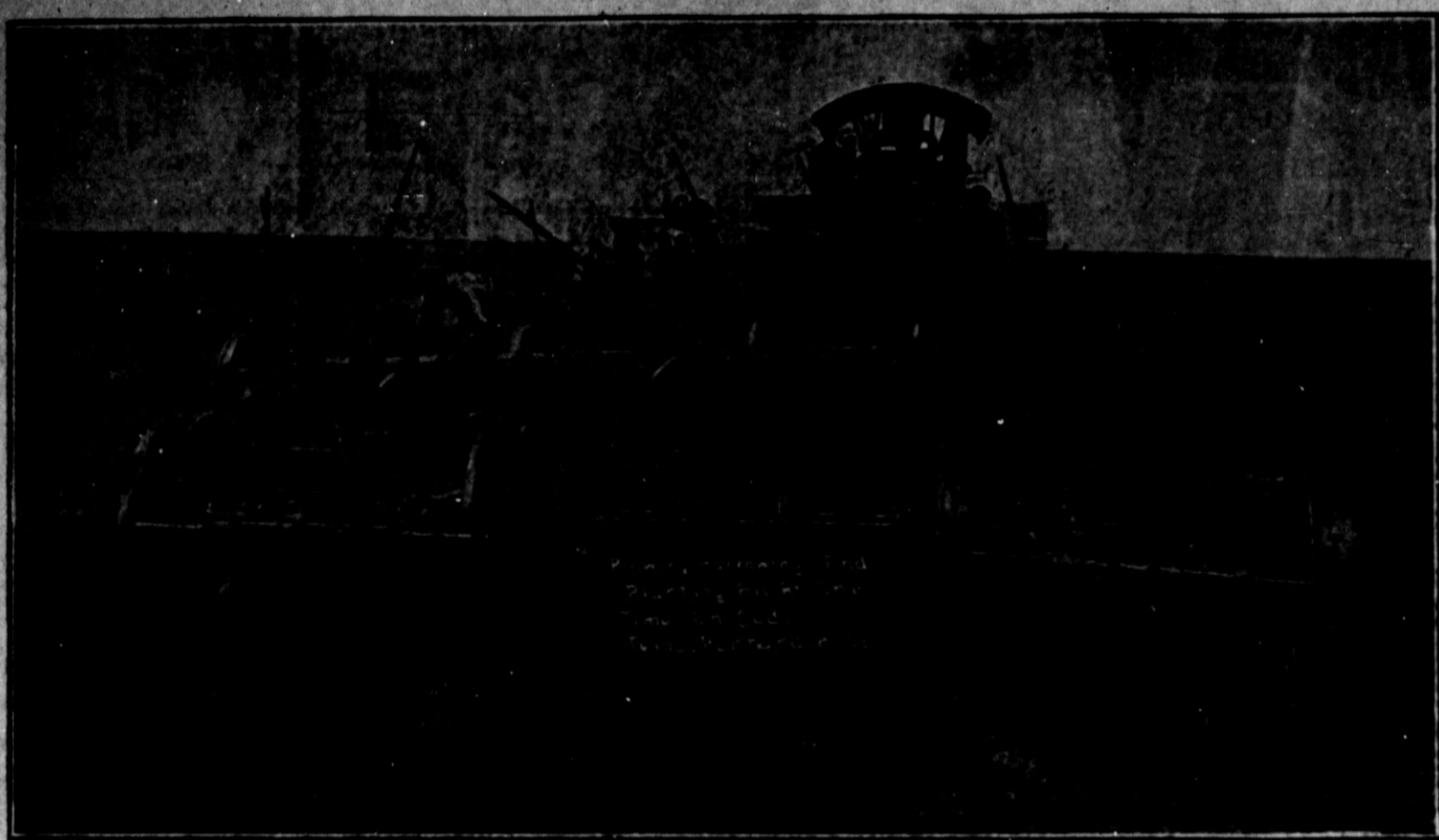

Texas Highways.

The Texas Commercial Secretaries Association has prepared a road map showing the number of miles of public highway in each county, the number of miles improved; the annual expenditure on public roads other than the bond issue and the bonds issued during the past twelve months.

The reports show that we have 140,101 miles of public highway in actual use in the state: 4,652 miles of improved public highways. We spend \$3,235,468 annually by regular taxation, in construction and maintaining our public highways and we issued \$4,015,000 of bonds during the past year. We are now preparing to spend \$25,000,000 on our public highways in 1911. The average cost of public highways is \$13.05. Interesting tables bringing out distinctive and instructive features of road building are also shown. Tarrant County is the banner county in miles of improved public highways and Ellis county leads in bond issue, having issued \$805,000 bonds within the past year. Hill county has the largest mileage of public highways, having 3,500 miles. Harris county spends the largest amount by annual taxation per annum, the amount being \$250,000. El Paso county has spent the greatest amount per mile, \$450 per mile. Collin county has the largest mileage of public highway per sq. mile of area, 3.6.

The maps are for free distribution and can be secured on application to the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association at Fort Worth.

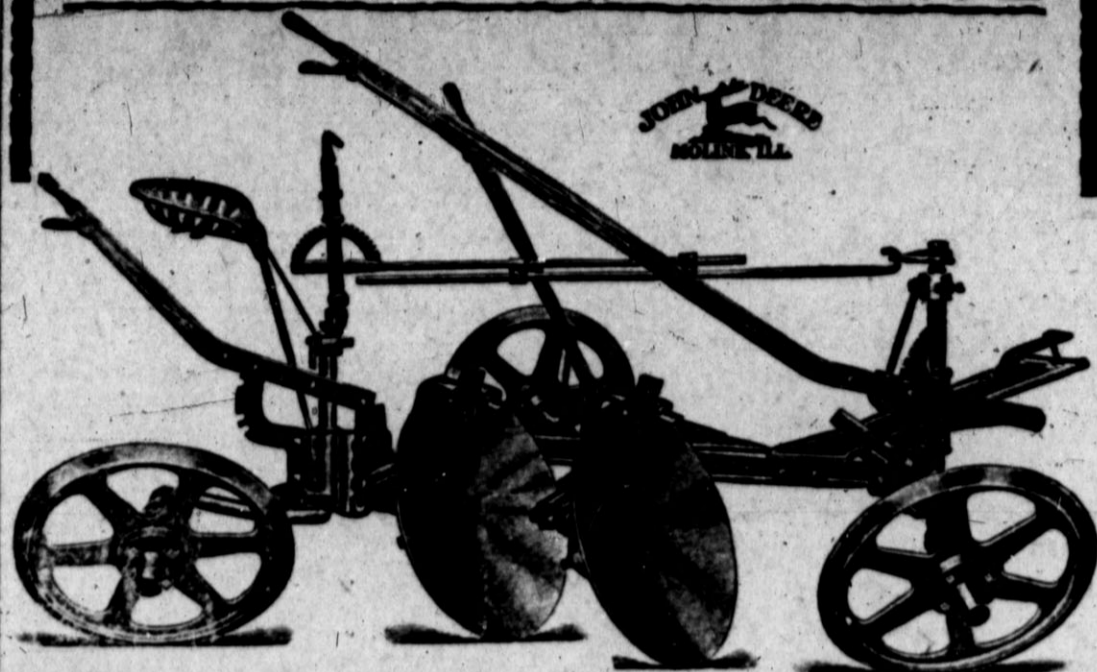

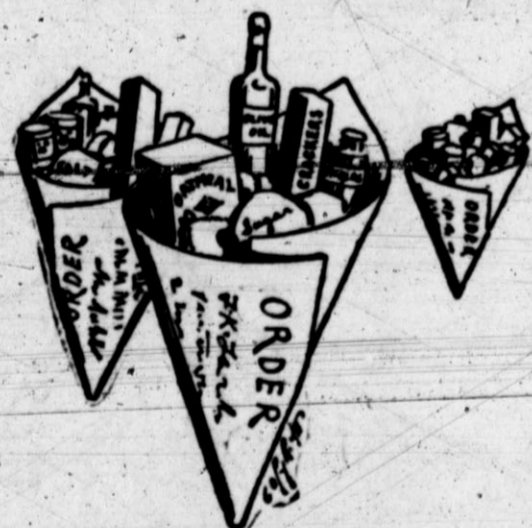

Increasing Production.

The increase in agricultural production has both an individual and community interest. The farmer is vitally interested in increasing the yield, as it costs no more to cultivate an acre of land that produces two bales of cotton than it does an acre of land that produces one bale of cotton, and the second bale is clear profit to the farmer. The farmers who have followed the advice of our agricultural departments in selecting seed, methods of culture, character of crops, combating pests, etc., have been able to double production. The farms of Texas are yielding an average of \$1,540,000 per day, and by doubling production in that portion of the land now under cultivation we can produce \$1,122,678,000 instead of \$561,339,000 per annum as shown in the figure below.



Increase in Production.

A concrete example would perhaps be more satisfactory than an imaginary standard, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association, and we will, therefore, compare Texas with Illinois. Our lands are more fertile, our seasons more reliable and our climatic conditions more favorable to farming than in Illinois. In Illinois the average farm contains 124 acres and yields \$1,300 per farm. In Texas the average farm contains 357 acres and yields \$681 per farm.

The cut shown below illustrates the growth the Texas farmer must make to reach the Illinois standard.



The Farmer Must Grow.

To build up the Texas farmer we must improve our public highways, build railroads, build factories, open mines, build cities, and otherwise increase our markets and facilities for reaching the market. We must look to our Agricultural Department, A. & M. Colleges, Experimental Stations and agricultural agents to build up the farm and instruct the farmer. These institutions ought to be liberally supported by appropriations and co-operation in their work.

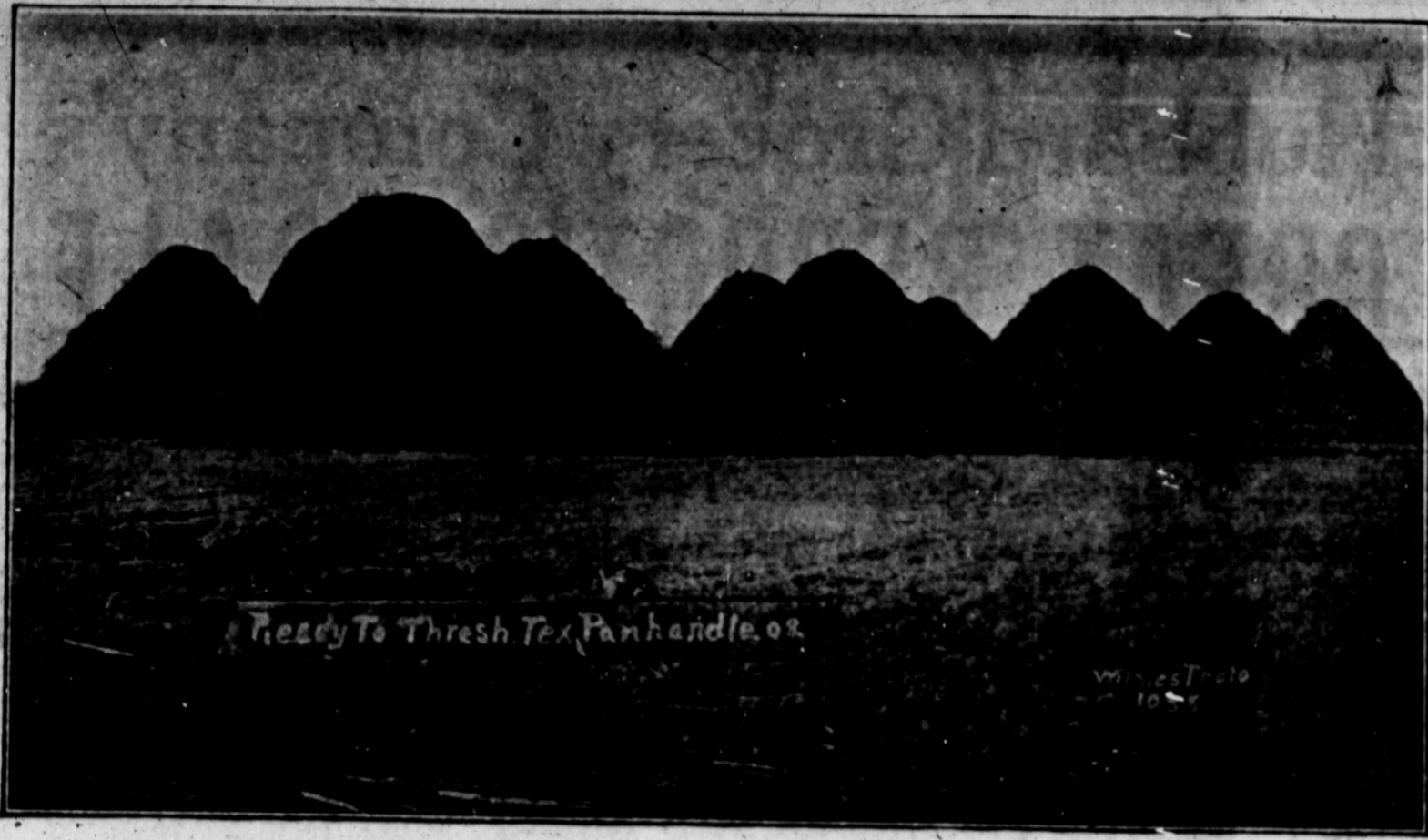

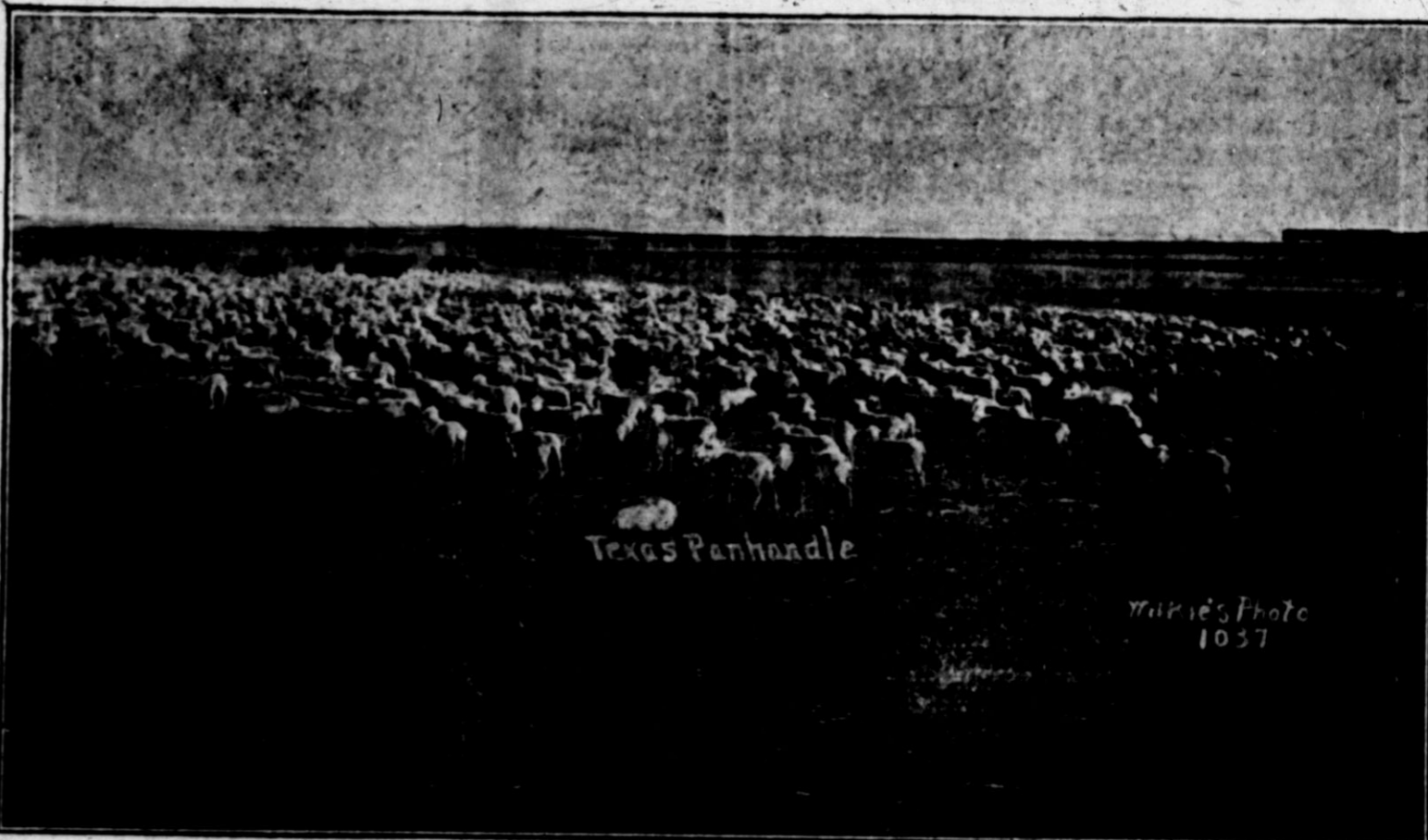
