Carter: Wait Until 1981 To Cut Taxes

Grain Scandals Prompt Change

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress is tinkering with federal grain inspection procedures that were set up a few years ago to prevent some of the scandals that had plagued the huge U.S. export industry.

Lobbied heavily by grain companies, some of which were indicted by federal grand juries during investigations of the mid-1970s, the Senate Agriculture Committee next week is scheduled to begin the last round of changes of a bill that would exempt official federal weighing of some grain in the export pipeline.

The House, on a voice vote, passed a similar measure on Aug. 18. Its chief sponsor was Rep. Thomas Ashley, D-Ohio. In the Senate, the bill's chief sponsor is Sen. Bob Dole,

If Congress gives final approval, there is "a good chance" President Carter will veto the measure, an administration source, who asked not to be named, said Thursday.

Doie, whose home state is the nation's leading wheat producer, was joined in bipartisan sponsorship by others whose states' interests include major grain production and export movement by elevator companies, large and small.

Those include: Sens. Jesse Helms, R-N.C.; David L. Boren, D-Okla.; Roger W. Jepsen, R-Iowa; John Glenn, D-Ohio; S.I. Hayakawa, R-Calif.; Edward Zorinsky, D-Neb.; Milton R. Young, R-N.D.; Richard G. Lugar, R-Ind.; and Rudy Boschwitz, R-Minn.

The bill would amend the U.S. Grain Standards Act to allow "grain delivered to export elevators by any means of conveyance other than barge" to be moved into those elevators without official weighing.

It also would exempt from official weighing grain shipped out of an export elevator to destinations within the United States. Grain shipped out of elevators to other countries would still have to be weighed, however, as the current law

After years of complaints by many foreign buyers of shortweighted shipments and adulterated grain, investigators uncovered a skein of problems in the grain export business, ranging from briberies to threats against those in charge of inspecting, grading and weighing grain.

That led to the U.S. Grain Standards Act of 1976 and the creation within the Agriculture Department of the Federal Grain Inspection Service to administer the tight new rules.

Among the new requirements was one that for the first time set up an official weighing program for the grain trade. It requires that all grain going in and out of elevators doing export business be weighed and recorded accurately.

But the grain companies say the "in" weighing of grain puts an unnecessary financial burden on the elevators.

The National Grain and Feed Association, which includes many of the nation's large and small elevator companies as members, has been among the leading advocates of changing the law.

Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland protested both the House and Senate bills after those were introduced and on Aug. 26 sent a letter to Sen. Herman Talmadge, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, that outlined his objections again.

The bill, Bergland said, would "seriously diminish the reliability of our grain-weighing system" and "will lead to inherent conflicts of interest" in unofficial grain weighing "similar to those which prevailed before the reforms of

Bergland told Talmadge the bill "is not needed to cut industry weighing costs" and that the USDA plans to help ease those costs under existing law.

"I oppose this bill because of its potential risks, and because another remedy is available," he said.

A background memoradum circulated in the agency and made available to The Associated Press outlined some of the

Communists Order Strike Conclusion

GDANSK, Poland - The leader of the Polish strike committee called for a brief cooling-off period to let the stricken nation gather food, then increased walkouts if the government fails to agree to the key demand for free trade unions. But the Communist regime warned the strike "cannot last longer."

Lech Walesa, chairman of the Inter-Factory Strike Committee, told thousands of his followers at the idle Lenin Shipyards: "It is not good to have Poland terrorized. The people must have food. If we don't get results in three or four days, then let the strikes spread.

"...We will go back to work the day after tomorrow if the government will agree on Point One + free trade unions." He said that workers could afford to give the government

some more time. Then the strikers sang the hymn, "Poland is Not Lost."

Walesa is considered a moderate among the strike leaders, and it was unclear whether all his colleagues would go along with the idea of briefly halting new walkouts, which government negotiators suggested during heated talks Thursday.

Fellow strike leader Bogdan Lis told reporters that representatives of the government and the strikers would meet again today, and that the free trade union issue would be the only topic.

Lis said there was "partial agreement" on the free union question but the precise form of the new labor organization was not worked out. Lis said one possible solution would be parallel unions, one state-run and one run by the workers. He said the regime had not responded to the latest proposal.

Congressional Democrats, while defending President Carter's new economic revival plan from partisan Republican attacks, already are debating how to rewrite the package once it reaches

Capitol Hill Carter, pressured from all sides to develop a tax-cut plan before the Nov. 4 election, Thursday unveiled a proposal for \$27.6 billion in tax reductions for individuals and business, effective in

The president said his proposal would lead to "a more productive, more competitive and more prosperous American economy," while not rekindling the fires of inflation. He claimed it would create 1 million new jobs over two years.

But he said Congress should wait until next year to enact the program to avoid election-year pressures that might result in economically unwise tax cuts.

"I will not accept a preelection bill to cut taxes," he declared.

Key features of Carter's plan would reduce 1981 income taxes to offset the increase in Social Security taxes that will take effect Jan. 1. and provide new incentives for business to invest in modern equipment.

At the same time, however, it would push the 1981 budget deficit to more than \$35 billion, a major break from the president's March proposal to balance the budget to fight inflation.

The plan was promptly de-

charged it was an illconceived economic ploy intended to buy votes.

GOP presidential nominee Ronald Reagan called the program a "short-term political quick fix."

"If you analyze it carefully, it is the first step into trying to help bail out Social Security with general tax funds," Reagan said in Middleburg, Va. He said simply returning in one tax what people pay in another "just doesn't make sense. That just is not a tax

Reagan has proposed an immediate \$37 billion tax cut, including a 10 percent acrossthe-board reduction for individuals


Democrats, while praising the plan as a step in the right direction, also said it needed improvement.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., who was Carter's chief rival for the Democratic presidential nomination, said the president's proposal "offers real hope to American workers and significant prospects for economic renewal."

But Kennedy was clearly not fully satisfied. "I will. work to strengthen and enact this program," he said.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, chairman of the congressional Joint Economic Committee and leading advocate of tax cuts to spur business investment, was even more obvious in his intention to revise Carter's recommendations.

While praising them as "positive proposals," Bentsen said: "Frankly, I think he could have done more."



WASHINGTON (AP) -The government's barometer of future economic activity rocketed by a record 4.6 percent in July, offering strong evidence the recession may be nearing an end.

Last month's surge in the Index of Leading Indicators follows a revised 1.5 percent increase in June, the Commerce Department said. Before then, the index had fallen a total of 12.6 percent for eight straight months beginning last October.

"Two consecutive increases are highly encouraging," said Feliks Tamm, a Commerce Department economist. "The combined 6.1 percent rise in June and July have been very broadly based, and upward movements of this magnitude usually signal a new future

trend." Nine of the 10 leading indicators available for July showed marked improvements, with the greatest change occurring for the layoff rate. Only the average workweek did not

Troopers On Alert For Weekend

Extra Texas Department of Public Safety troopers will be on the alert for drunks and speeders in Deaf Smith County during the long Labor Day Weekend beginning at 6 p.m. Friday.

The DPS has predicted that 45 persons will die on state roads and highways during a 78-hour period, which ends at 12 midnight Monday.

"In order to provide maximum protection for the driving public, we are placing additional troopers on the highway," DPS director Col. Jim Adams said.

Other positive indicators were: vendor performance, the change in producer prices, stock prices, new orders for manufactured consumer goods, new orders for plant and equipment, the change in liquid assets and building permits.

Despite the two-month trend, Tamm cautioned that July's figure is "still preliminary" and subject to significant revision. In fact, June's rise originally was pegged at 2.5 percent before being re-evaluated by the Commerce Department.

The sharpest, recent drop in the leading indicators occurred in April, when the index fell 3.9 percent. The recession turned out to be at its worst between April and June, with overall economic output dropping 9 percent, nearly the worst quarterly fall ever.

Since June, however, the economy has begun to show signs of improvement, particularly in the housing industry, as revealed by constant rises in building permits.


The record increase, while offering a bullish signal for recession-weary Americans, does not represent all good news, some analysts say.

Much of the jump was be due to money supply, which increased by the largest amount - 0.65 percent - in the history of the index, Tamm said.

"In the 13 weeks up to early August, M1B (the broadest measure of currency and checking accounts) soared by \$21 billion," said Ian McAvity, a Toronto-based market commentator.

"To put this in what I consider the most appropriate

Hostages Spend 300th

The U.S. hostages in Iran are well but their situation has not changed, one of their captors said today as the 52 Americans spent their 300th day in captivity. President Bani-Sadr Abolhassan reiterated his opposition spy trials for the hostages.

Seven more people were executed in Iran, meanwhile, despite Amnesty International's appeal to stop the firing squads that have killed as many as 1,200 in the last 18 months. Two Pakistanis were among the latest executed. and they were believed the first foreigners put to death for drug offenses.

"This is just another day for us, there is nothing special about it," a militant student told Associated Press correspondent Alex Efty, who phoned the U.S. Embassy in Tehran from Nicosia, Cyprus, to inquire about the hostages.

Bani-Sadr, who outlined his position on the hostages in an interview with the Tehran correspondent of the French

Refugees Storm

U.S.-Bound Plane

LIMA, Peru (AP) - Cuban refugees stormed aboard a Los Angeles-bound Braniff International jetliner during a stopover here in an attempt to force the crew to fly them to Miami, a spokesman for the airline said today.

The Federal Aviation Administration in Washington, D.C., said 300 refugees tried to board the plane, but about 150 succeeded. The Braniff spokesman here said "dozens" of refugees were aboard.

The crew and several passengers were taken hostage by the refugees. who were led by three men armed with pistols, the airline spokesman here said. He said the plane arrived Thursday night and was still at Jorge Chavez Airport this morning surrounded by armed policemen.

The refugees broke some windows in the airport terminal to get onto the runway where the plane was, he said. Witnesses said some of the refugees suffered cuts from the broken windows and others were prevented from boarding the plane by policemen firing shots into the air.

To End Fire Danger

LUFKIN, Texas (AP) -Thunderstorms and widespread rain hasn't extinguished a fire alert in the dried-out woodlands of North and East Texas, says a forest service

"It (the rain) didn't really help one Texas Forest Service spokesman Lou Sloat said Thursday

The 52-county area of East Texas, nine counties around Wichita Falls and Tarrant County remained under "extreme fire hazard alert," Sloat

"There's been really no rain in the western areas and we had a 21,000 acre fire out around the Edwards Plateau Thursday," he said. "The rain over East Texas was sporatic and the majority of it was runoff - only 10 percent did the vegetation any good."

Sloat said lightning started four fires near Lufkin Thursday, "and when lightning is starting 20 to 30 percent of your fires, you know the rain hasn't helped one bit."

Reagan Told

To Stress Economy

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republican presidential nominee Ronald Reagan has been told in no uncertain terms by the governors of five key states to get the party's bull elephant out of the China shop and back to economic battleground on the home front.

Reagan arrived from Columbus, Ohio, and drove a temporary home in Middleburg, Va., where he will reside for the duration of the campaign. On hand to welcome him were Gov. John Dalton of Virginia and Reagan's new neighbor, Sen. John Warner, R-Va.

Reagan talked politics over dinner Wednesday night in Columbus with the chief executives of five Great Lakes states that hold 110 of the 270 electoral he needs to win the White House

"On the street corners of Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Scranton and Erie they're not much concerned about China policy," said Gov. Richard Thornburgh of Pennsylvania. "They're concerned where their next paycheck is coming from."

Gov. William Milliken of Michigan, where unemployment is running 14.4 percent, said he told Reagan to "go with the big ticket items...the emphasis has got to be on jobs "

Bandidos Arrested

For Drugs, Weapons

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Police waylaid a convoy of Bandido motorcyclists early Thursday, arrested eight on drug and weapons charges and confiscated a small arsenal of pistols, shotguns and a rifle.

A dozen men and four women were in the convoy, which consisted of 12 motorcycles and a van. They were enroute to Houston after attending a motorcycle event in South Dakota.

They found officers from the Department of Public Safety and the Austin, Leander and Cedar Creek police departments awaiting them when they reached the northwest city limits of Austin at 2 a.m.

The DPS had broadcast an alert after a Lampasas convenience store attendant saw a motorcyclist in the convoy with a pistol.

Weapons seized included two sawed-off shotguns, a double-barreled shotgun, a new AR-15 rifle, an assortment of knives and five pistols, including a .357 magnum.

Two Bandidos were wearing bulletproof vests.

prevailing thoughts in the department's Federal Grain Inspection Service, which calls itself FGIS.

"The grain trade's public reasons for seeking diminution of official inbound weighing at export is to cut elevator costs," it said. "FGIS estimates the cost to an elevator for official inbound weighing is around one-fifth of a cent per bushel.

"Such costs are not burdensome and are generally passed back to the shipper and, in many cases, the one-fifth cent is profitably increased by the export elevator."

The memo was written as the House version of the legislation, sponsored by Rep. Thomas Ashley, D-Ohio, was under consideration.

"Given the low costs of weighing, the reliability of the FGIS supervised weighing system and the buccaneer history of the grain trade, the Ashley bill can then be more accurately viewed as the nose of the camel under the tent, rather than a cost-saving device for a 'beseiged business'," it said.

The National Grain and Feed Association, representing the industry, commented on the FGIS criticism of the Ashley bill, including an agency claim that the measure would lead to a "duplication and proliferation of unofficial weighing agencies, and confusion and complaints in the weighing of

Industry officials said there is "no justification" for that claim and that elevators "are looking for ways to reduce costs by doing away with unnecessary duplication" of weighing functions.

"FGIS should realize by now that the grain merchandizing system is self-policing in a highly competitive market," the association said. "Merchandizers dissatisfied with weights and grades of a buyer or seller go to other markets."

Boxes stacked in the hallway are stuffed with letters postmarked from West Germany, England, Canada, Mexico and New Zealand, as well as from all over the United States.

They've been arriving since Nov. 4, 1979.

Kindness and concern from people around the world have helped ease the anxiety, anger, sorrow and sleepless nights which the family of 22-year-old Marine Sgt. Jimmy Lopez has experienced the past 300 days - the time Lopez and 51 other Lopezes. The family is Americans have been held hostage in Iran.

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - A federal jury has awarded \$30,000 in damages to the parents of a youth who claimed he was slugged by a McAllen policeman in 1976.

Jurors decided Wednesday that former policeman B. T. Wilson used excessive force in arresting Eddie Longoria, 15, and unjustly struck him later at the McAllen police

The teenager died in a car accident in 1978, but his father continued the civil suit. The case is one of several police brutality actions filed against the department in the last two years.

The FBI is investigating the police department, which has been without a chief since Jack Caldwell resigned in

June in a dispute with city commissioners.

MISSION, Texas (AP) -Mission school officials say they will cooperate fully with an FBI investigation into the district's lunch program.

FBI Agent Howard McCook said the probe involves possible violations of federal laws governing the \$1 million yearly operation.

School Superintendent Kenneth White said his office has looked into allegations of wrongdoing in the program for several months and an internal investigation cleared the program.

A former supervisor at the time of the allegations is no longer employed by the district, he said.

McCook said he did not know who had requested the FBI investigation.

EDINBURG, Texas (AP) - A former foreman of a large Hidalgo County ranch has filed \$9 million lawsuit against seven witnesses who testified against him in a cattle theft trial last year.

Pete Stout, once foreman of the Monte Christo Ranch, was indicted in 1979 in the alleged illegal sale of 167 ranch cattle.

Stout testified at the trial that he owned the cattle along with an El Paso cattle dealer. J. T. Marchant.

State District Judge Joe Cisneros stopped the trial and ordered a verdict of innocent. He said the prosecution lacked enough evidence.

DALLAS (AP) - American Airlines may lay off as many of 5 percent of its employees this fall, officials say.

The reductions, beginning next week, could number "as many as 2,000, possibly more," the airline said Wednesday.

"This is a very sad process," said David Frailey, vice president of public relations. He said the cuts would be made across the board.

(AP) - The Fort Worth school board Wednesday night approved a seven-cent tax rate increase in a \$159.9 million budget for 1980-81.

The budget includes a 14 percent salary increase for all employees.

By a 4-4 vote, the board also turned down the hiring of Eugene Gutierrez, former Chicago school finance administrator, as associate superintendent in charge of financial affairs. Gutierrez was asked to resign his Chicago post after the school district there encountered financial troubles.

DALLAS (AP) - A 62-yearold Van Zandt man is suing a Dallas doctor for prescribing steroids that he claims caused him to develop breasts and high blood pressure.

Lenard A. Durrett said he took the injections for three months after Dr. Harold H. Varon diagnosed his back pain as arthritis.

Durrett said the doctor did not disclose side effects of the steroids and used "the plaintiff as a guinea pig on which to experiment with unaccepted, unapproved and highly controversisal steroid drugs."

ALLEN, Texas (AP) - An Exxon Corp. subsidiary has purchased more than 68 Collin County acres to construct an electronics divison.

Exxon Enterprises, Inc., bought the undeveloped tract for the headquarters of InteCom, which develops, manufactures, maintains and markets a synergistic switching device for Exxon's automated electronic office products.





"WE FELT LIKE WE DID some things very well and some things not so well,"Cumpton said. "We were able to play a lot of our personnel and that was a key benefit in that we'll be able to evaluate what we've got, and final changes needed before our season opener against Pampa."

"We're going to play a bunch of teams that are a lot better han Sweetwater was, and that indicates we need improvement in certain areas of our game, but a scrimmage is a scrimmage and nothing more or less,"he related. "There are

some things you try to do in a scrimmage that you don't in actual game situations, and therefore you don't look as effective - and we used it for what it was, a good workout against someone other than ourselves."

SWEETWATER, COMING OFF A NOT SO respectable 1-9 season this past year and favored to win only its season opener this fall, scored early in the contest as the first-team offense mounted an 80-yard scoring drive under the direction of quarterback Vance Sims.

Despite the ongoing efforts and sterling performances by the Whiteface defense prematurely in the engagement (namely linebacker Chris Shumacher, defensive end Aubrey Richburg, and the front line stoppages by Josserand brothers, Barry and John to name a few), the Mustangs managed to eek out 9 yards per carry in later segments by utilizing option plays in the wishbone offense.

"We really needed this scrimmage, and although we weren't as pleased as we thought we might be, we still got a lot of good out of it," Cumpton said. "We got a look at how we could handle the wishbone offense which is what Pampa runs, and considering the amount of preparation we had going into the contest, we thought we did quite a few things pretty well on every squad we had out there."

"WE ONLY WORKED ON SWEETWATER a day or two. and you just don't treat a scrimmage as you would a game. You prepare differently for one than you do the other. We experimented with different things on defense that could be successful against the wishbone and we may end up using some of them and we may not - that's what a scrimmage is for, to see what works and what doesn't and how your team handles different situations.





DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm a 57-year-old man. I've had psoriasis for many years and have tried many medicines under very careful supervision if it's used at all.

DEAR READER - Psoriasis is a difficult medical problem. Estimates vary from 1 million to 8 million people in the United States who have this skin problem. In its severe form, it can cause unsightly scab-like lesions that are grayish in color and may have reddish rings

spreading daily.

around the edges. For some reason, the regeneration of skin cells is accelerated. Normally the outer layer of your skin is replaced about every four weeks, but in psoriasis new cells are formed approximately every week. The old dead cells stay on in the silvery scab-like lesions on the skin surface. If the silvery layer is removed, a reddish area is seen underneath the scab-like formation.

Psoriasis may be mild or severe. It does have a habit of having remissions and exacerbations. That makes it difficult to evaluate treatment.

The treatment of psoriasis varies so much with each individual case and is so complicated that I really can't give you good advice in the column other than to follow scrupulously what your doctor tells

For the thousands and perhaps millions of people who do have psoriasis, I would point out that cold tar and ultraviolet radiation is successful in some cases. Corticosteroids applied on the surface are useful in some

You may have read about PUVA therapy which is a combination of medicine and long-wave ultraviolet radiation. This has proved to be very useful in a number of patients but it does have hazards, including a possibility of burning the skin, increased incidence of skin cancers and increased likelihood of developing cataracts. A recent study shows that skin cancers are about 21/2 times as common in patients who have received this therapy as in other people. This shouldn't be surprising since we know that sunlight in excessive amounts also increases the chances of having skin cancer. In very severe cases, Méthotrexate is sometimes used successfully. This medicine is commonly used in the treatment of cancer because it inhibits cell growth. It's this action that inhibits the rapid growth of the skin cells that makes it useful in psoriasis. Unfortunately, this medicine has a lot of undesirable side effects, including affecting blood-cell formation by the



Abscam Trial Begins for Rep

NEW YORK (AP) - Prosecutors say Rep. Michael Myers was "caught red handed." Defense lawyers say he was "play acting." Today, the jury in the nation's first Abscam trial was going to court to begin deliberating the fate of Myers and three other men accused of sharing a bribe from undercover FBI

The nine-woman, threeman panel was to begin deliberating after receiving instructions from U.S. District Judge George C. Pratt.

Myers' bribery-conspiracy trial, which began in Brooklyn on Aug. 11, is the first for six congressmen indicted on charges stemming from the FBI's investigation, code-named Abscam. The others will stand trial later this year.

Pennsylvania The Democrat, Camden, N.J., Mayor Angelo Errichetti, Philadelphia City Councilman Louis Johanson and Philadelphia attorney Howard Criden were accused of sharing \$50,000 from undercover FBI agents posing as representatives of an Arab sheik in return for Myers' promise to help the sheik in

immigration matters. They were charged with bribery, conspiracy and traveling in interstate commerce to commit bribery. The bribery count included two subsections, one carrying a possible 15-year prison term and a lesser "criminal gratuity" offense carrying a possible two-year term. The conspiracy count carried a possible five-year term.

Pratt ruled earlier that the jury must find Myers guilty of either subsection of the bribery statute in order to convict on the conspiracy and interstate travel counts.

He also ruled that if the jury acquitted Myers it had to clear the other defendants. "If it was play acting for him it was play acting for everyone," Pratt said.

The government argued that videotapes and sound recordings played in court showed Myers was "caught red handed" and was "in need of a story." In closing remarks, federal prosecutor Thomas P. Puccio called "split personality nonsense" Myers' testimony that he had been "play acting" when he promised to help the sheik.

Myers testified he had no criminal intent when he took the money and no plans to exert influence on the sheik's behalf. His lawyers argued that no private immigration bill ever was introduced and that there had been no followup by the government after the payment.

Myers said he had been assured he would never have to do anything for the sheik. Puccio scoffed, "Did he believe an Arab sheik was going to dole out \$50,000 for doing absolutely nothing?"

The defense said promises Myers made in the "play acting" conversations came from coaching by Mel Weinberg, the convicted con man credited with setting up the sting.

Defense lawyers concentrated on discrediting Weinberg's testimony, and the government's summation was directed at Myers'
