Hard times, crime and corruption in high places, and less authority in the home were reasons for more crime in Hereford as well as the rest of the nation according to Caydon Brush, Hereford chief of police. Brush was commenting on the annual report outlining activities of the Hereford Police Department. Statistically, the report showed that more offenses were committed this year than last, more persons were charged with crimes than last year, more juveniles were arrested but there was only a slight increase in traffic violations in the city.

BRUSH AGREES that major crimes

are increasing in Hereford. "Two or three years ago we had never even heard of armed robbery in Hereford." Hereford had two in 1974. But Brush also points

"We have a better quality of officers now than we've ever had before. The officers are more conscientious in their duties, they are better educated, they are hustling more. The officers we have now are the best we've had since I moved to

Hereford," he said. Brush feels that although proportion-ately, crime has increased, his officers are discovering more crimes and those

who commit the crimes.

That would account for the rise in persons held and charged from 514 in 1973 to 654 in 1974. Except when you look at the increase in juveniles referred to juvenile court jurisdiction. The total for 1973 indicated 90 juveniles were referred.

Brush says the sharp increase in juveniles involved with the police stems from home life. "In some cases the parents are separating and the kids are not being supervised. They're being turned loose to do as they please, and you'd be surprised as to what they're doing.

Turning to traffic violations, 2,520 were charged with violations of one sort or another during 1974, up only 13 charged in 1973 (2,507). One area that showed a decrease was speeding violations. In 1973, 843 citations were issued compared with 659 in 1974. Trouble with radar units may have kept that number down. "We had a lot of trouble with maintenance on our radar sets," said Brush. "Decatur, Ill. is where we have to send them to be repaired, and it takes a while to ship them off and get them back." Officers had trouble with a new radar unit that was eventually replaced by the manufacturer, and then

replaced by the manufacturer, and then the replacement went on the blink.

"Our officers paced speeders with the patrol cars during this time. It is not as effective as radar. People have their eyes out for the police, and it's sometimes hard to get turned around in traffic to catch a speeder."

# Finance Bills To Help Schools

Which ever way the current Texas Legislature goes in solving the financial woes of public education, the Hereford Independent School District could benefit by at least \$600,000 in additional revenue from any of the plans presently pending.

This is the conclusion drawn by Superintendent Roy Hartman in an address to the School Board of Trustees at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday. The statement was based on information gathered by school officials

at a recent meeting in Springlake.

Board members, meeting in both open and closed session, extended Hartman's contract for one year, set election dates, selected election workers,

approved a school personnel policy dealing with promotions, and accepted a program for out-of-school youth.

THE SPRINGLAKE meeting was

designed principally for School district tax assessor-collectors in response to requests by the Texas Education Agency for information on property evaluations.

At the meeting a resolution was proposed to do away with property tax as a method for financing public education and institute state wide income taxes and sales taxes as a more equitable form of taxation. It stated that a combination of the two would be more "equitable and feasible" as opposed to most plans which rely on 100 per cent market value of

Bobby Veigel, board member, said the state sales tax in some form would be fairer combined with some form of property tax at the local level. However, the board agreed the income tax was unfair and decided to take no action.

"We could benefit by \$600,000 under one of the proposed plans (legislative) and by over a \$1 million under another depending on which one is passed by the legislature," Hartman said. "But no one knows what will happen at this point."

Orpha Click, school tax assessorcollector, said he was about the only tax official at Springlake who knew how to prepare a ration study of taxes as wanted by the state.

"SOME SCHOOL districts will be embarrassed when they submit their information if they report lower evaluations as they presently use," Click said. "We now have a tax roll of \$260 million and a \$381 million evaluation based on a 1973 ratio study. I am preparing another one."

"Hopefully, though, the legislature will act fast so I will have enough time to

reassess all the property."

He said that tax collections were good so far and that the cattle market price drop will result in about a \$160,000 revenue drop for the schools.

The contract extension for Hartman was decided after about a one hour closed meeting. It extends the superintendent's employment contract another five years. The vote was five in favor with Jim Arney

and Ron Zimmerman abstaining.

Elections are scheduled for April 5 with the final date for filing being Mar. 5.
Absentee voting is March 17 - April 1 at
the school district tax office. Voting will

take place at the community center.

Jim Holmes, administrative assistant, said the out-of-school student and adult program will involve those seeking a high school diploma as opposed to getting a G.E.D. The Hereford schools will conduct testing in connection with area institutions of higher learning.

The school personnel policy, which had already been discussed was finally approved after no better wording could be derived for criteria on which demotions and promotions would be

THE QUARTER SYSTEM, which the schools move to as of the 1975-76 school year was explained at length by high school principal Jerry Don George and Stanton principal Ray Todd.

Basically it will move the school to a "tri-semester" course of study with summer school providing an additional semester. Although the transition is expected to move smoothly, a few

#### **Local Officials** Allot Revenue **Sharing Funds**

Appropriation and allotment of city and county revenue sharing funds for the last quarter was announced by local governing bodies this week.

**County Commissioners opted Monday** to expend \$53,870 in Certificates of Deposit. Eighteen thousand dollars will be stipulated for one month CD with the remainder being earmarked for a three month deposit. This was included in a financial report read by county treasurer Vesta Mae Nunley.

These amounts will be used eventually for road improvement projects and salaries for highway employees.

CITY MANAGER Dudley Bayne announced that Hereford's revenue sharing funds, amounting to \$46,001 the last quarter, have already been spent for traffic signals at the intersection of Park Ave. and 25 Mile Ave. Part of this amount was forwarded to state offices for the purchase of right of way at this site.

# Commissioners Begin New Year

The three new members of the Deaf Smith County Commissioner's Court had questions and a few opinions on just about every corner of county business at their first regularly scheduled meeting

The curious members included County Judge Sam Morgan and Commissioners James Voyles and Austin Rose Jr. They met with holdover Commissioners Earl Holy and Bruce Coleman. The court met Jan. 7 in a special session to consider investigations into the local Food Stamp Program.

During the 51/2 hour meeting, commissioners approved a new overtime policy for the sheriff's department, recommended the county for crop disaster loans through the Farmer's Home Administration, appointed the Historical Survey Committee and approved a contract for the collection of nquent taxes.

THE COURT APPROVED Bruce Coleman for another year term on the area Juvenile Board and accepted

the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC). Dues of \$759.96 to

the PRPC also were approved.

Even though, other area counties aren't members of the PRPC, Coleman said Deaf Smith benefits by membership in receiving federal funds the county might not otherwise properly apply for and in getting advice on such matters as jail improvements.

The new Commissioners were concerned with subjects ranging from the county's insurance coverage to the collections of taxes. Although no action was taken in all these areas, requests were made for more information to be presented at the next meeting set for Jan.

Under two separate agenda items, discussion arose on a possible tax percentage change and personal property evaluations and collections.

Vance Crume of the county tax office told the court that they had until April 30 to decide whether a tax rate or percentage increase was needed.

However, Vesta Mae Nunley, county treasurer, said, "We have more on hand at this time than we did during the same time last year. Our present tax rate

should handle our present expenses."

MORGAN NOTED that it is no time to be thinking about a tax increase and that the county has fared well with the revenues it has received especially with the help of income from federal sources such as Revenue Sharing

Commissioners Holt and Voyles were concerned about personal property tax renditions including what property is specifically recorded.

"Of course, all property should be reported but not all persons do. By law, all property is to be rendered at 100 percent evaluation," Crume explained.

He said, when asked, that some property is rendered two or three times (by renters, owners and caretakers) but that "no problem exists since we have all the records so that it is taxed only once."

The county's insurance program and the court's relationship with Criminal District Attorney Andy Shuyal also were discussed. Written information on two subjects was requested by the next meeting.

SHUVAL LISTED his responsibilities to the court, but noted that his main function is to represent the State of Texas in legal cases. Besides offering advice to the commissioners, he noted that he can represent any county official in legal suits when asked and if the alleged offense is in connection with county business.

Shuval told the commissioners of a plan by the area bar association to sponsor a bill in the Texas Legislature to create a new judicial district court out of Deaf Smith and Oldham Counties. Presently, this county is in the 69th judicial district made up of six counties. Its presiding judge is Archie McDonald of

Gwen London, county librarian, reported that complaints had been received on the unclean carpets and windows of the library. The Commissioners met with Jack Nunley, county maintenance engineer, and decided that he was responsible for the library.

THE OVERTIME policy for the sheriff's department was established to avoid any extra pay.

It states that no overtime will be paid for "240 hours in a work period of 28 days (60 days in a work period of seven days), or in the case of any work period between seven and 28 days, in the same ratio of 240 hours to 28 days."

Appointed to the Historical Survey committee were Mrs. Lee Newman, Mrs. Henry Sears, A.J. ### Rules Outlined For Stock Show

Rules and regulations for the annual Hereford Young Farmers Junior Livestock Show have been announced by Joe Shultz, HYF president.

The show will be held Jan. 23-25 in the Bull Barn with judging of steers, barrows and lambs. Entry is open to residents of Deaf Smith, Parmer, Oldham and Castro co unties who are between the ages 9-20.

General superintendents are Shultz, Layton Sawyer and George Muse. Division superintendents are: steers Tommy Sparkman, Jack Andrews and Roy Carlson; barrows - Jimmy Christie, Joe West and Connie Urbanczyk; lambs - Robert Higgins, Jim Bob Perrin,

Ronnie and Rocky Andrews. SHULTZ SAID entry cards were mailed to exhibitors before Jan. 1. These cards and entry fees must be returned to the Hereford Young Farmers, Box 1091, Hereford, prior to Jan. 18. Shultz stressed that no animals will be accepted in the show unless entry forms and fees

are received before the 18th. Entry rates are \$7 per calf and \$3 per hog or lamb, Bedding expenses are included with this fee, Shultz stated.

Floor price will be set on all animals before sale on Saturday, Jan. 25. Animals which are not eligible for auction (to be sold at floor price) will be moved to pens. outside of the barn.

Before an entry can be pulled from the sale floor, the superintendent of that division must be presented with a release obtained from the show office within one hour after judging. All animals not-pulled from sale will be sold and delivered to the

EACH EXHIBITOR entering livestock in the show gives permission for the animals to be used in the 4-H and FFA judging contest. This does not include the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand

Ribbons will be awarded to individuals ranking in the top 10 places in each category. Recognition will be given to the best entries from Deaf Smith County and to the best in a four-county region (Deaf Smith, Oldham, Parmer and

All animals will be classified according to breed characteristics. Any infraction of show rules will be subject to a \$25 fine per animal.

According to Shultz, all barrows and lambs must be in place by 10 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 22. All calves must be in place by 10 a.m. Thursday, Jan. 23. Market hogs will be judged at 2 p.m. Thursday by Bob Robinson, assistant county agent for Parmer County. Lambs will be shown at 8 a.m. Jan. 24 for judge Ed Garnett, district supervisor from Vernon. Steer winners will be determined on the 24th by Larry Schickendanz, head of the ag department at Frank Phillips Junior College.

The FFA and 4-H judging teams will classify animals at 9 a.m. Saturday. Sale will begin at 1 p.m. that afternoon.

All animals will be tagged when weighed. Only two calves, two lambs and two pigs may be shown by an individual. All show livestock must have been raised under the supervision of the County Agent or vocational ag teacher for the

following terms: calves-more than six months, lambs-more than two months, pigs-more than two months.

Eligible steers must weigh a minimum of 850 pounds. Show hogs should exceed 190 pounds but not surpass 240 pounds. Lambs must weigh over 80 pounds and under 120 pounds. pounds lower on Southdown

Exhibitors must be enrolled in elementary or secondary schools. CALF ENTRIES

All animals will be classified according to weight.

First and second place winners in each class will compete for Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion Calf. No steer showing wear on permanent

incisors will be allowed to enter. Health papers must be presented at time of weigh-in.

#### LAMB ENTRIES

There will be four classes-(1) Finewool (2) Finewool-Crossbreed (3) Southdown and Shropshire (4) medium wool and all prominent crosses and all remaining breeds.



## Fish Collection Makes Hobby For All Family

TROPICAL fish are fascinating little animals, Mrs. Charles Boyd says as she studies and collects them in a hobby which proves interesting also to her usband and seven-year-old son

In the Boyd home, 211 Centre, aquariums are focal points in decoration of the living room and there is another in Stephen's room. What Mrs. Boyd really wants is an 85-gallon glass tank to fill an entire corner and hold the dozens of varieties of colorful fish she would like to own.

At present she enjoys taking care of two lighted tanks and adding to the interesting collection that swims about in flashes of silver, gold, scarlet, pure white, pastel pink and blue, among green plastic plants on natural gravel bases.







Vegetables Consumers who don't use the liquid from canned vegetables miss about one-third of the nutrition from that canned food, according to Mrs. Gwendolyne

Clyatt. She's consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

"To get the full value of the minerals and vitamins in the vegetable liquid, use it in gravy, soup, or in a cream sauce or

stew," she suggested. The drained solids, which usually make up about twothirds of the can's total contents, also contain about twothirds of the soluble nutrients. Mrs. Clyatt noted.

She reminded consumers that canned vegetables are already cooked. To serve them with the most flavor and food value, drain off the liquid and boil it down to one-third of its original volume. Add the vegetable to this concentrated liquid and heat, she advised.







Under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), the remium payment is man-latory for covered plans, which nclude most private defined enefit pension plans. An initial premium covering

he balance of the plan year which was in progress on the late of enactment of ERISA, ept. 2, was due before Dec. 2, o avoid interest and late payment charges. ERISA further requires a full year's premium to be paid within thirty days of the beginning of the first full plan year sub-

The form, PBGC - 1, and accompanying instructions are identical for both the fractional and the full-year payment, but the current mailing contains a new message from the Acting Executive Director, Steven E. Schanes, with pointers for saving interest and late payments charges (copy attached). These pointers include suggestions for plan administrators to review their initial premium payment filing. Failure to have filed, or erroneous claims of noncoverage, will not excuse interest and late payment charges if the plan is eventually determined to be covered. Accordingly, unless a plan administrator is certain about non-coverage of his plan under Title IV of ERISA, it is suggested that he consider paying the premium, along with a statement of his reasons for

doubting the plan's coverage. In the event the plan is found to be not covered, it will be entitled to a refund of the premium paid. Additionally, some errors of computation have been detected in initial premium payment returns. Accordingly, plan administrators are advised to review their computations and, in the event of underpayments, submit an amended return to minimize any possible interest and late
