Somebody had tampered with the forms and changed the wording of a prohibition notice signed by the county commissioners, which had been running two weeks, the intention being evidently to make the publication illegal. To fustrate this scheme a second and corrected edition of the Observer appeared on Saturday. Editor Hart thinks a tramp printer, who has since left town, was responsible. - Tribune-Chief.




