On Last Saturday, W. M. Martin with his father, who is engaged in stock farming several miles south of Hereford, in Castro County, brought to this office a bundle of flax which had just matured sufficiently to harvest. Mr. Martin applied to the Three good driving and work government for a few seed last spring and in response received three. bushels which he sowed on three acres. He now has an excellent crop which will thrash out about, 50 bushel of seed which at the market price of \$1.50 per bushel will bring him \$75 from his first experience with three acres of flax: In addition the fiber of the weed, as is well known, is valuable in the production of fine linen.

Mr Martin thinks this a safe crop for the Panhandle and will' continue his experimenting next year. The crop is a good drouth resister and is quite responsive to special care given it, such as careful preparation of soil, etc., and matures perfectly in the climate which we have here. Mr. Martin will soon have seed to sell those of his larmer friends who wish. to join him in testing further the merits of the flax crop in the Ran-

This year the stalk grew about two feet in height and was well loaded with well developed grain.





Panhandle News

Amarillo is long on bonding schemes. They bond for schools, bond for court houses and some more court houses and jails, bond for water works, bond for sewers, bond for city hall and now propose to bond good and strong for a bridge across Canadian river. They are going to have a burden of tax if they keep on .- Hall County Herald.

A petition, signed by the greater part of the tax payers of the City of Dalhart, was presented to the city council asking them to call an election to vote on the proposition of bonding the city in the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of purchasing fire apparatus. Acting on the suggestions of the petition the mayor, by order of the council, has called the election for Tuesday, October 24,-Dalhart Texan.

Up to yesterday evening in the neighborhood of 200 bales of cotton had been ginned at the two gins in this city, and according to the estimate of Mr. Geo. Wigham the crop for this section is about half gathered. Last year nearly 1000 bales were ginned in this city. Not more than half that number, if that, will be ginned this season. Since last week the price of cotton has dropped more than \$2 per bale. Wichita Times.

The banks are reporting growing business these days. Monday and Tuesday were the best days since the banks were organized, that is more checks were cashed and a greater number of deposits made, while the aggregate, amounts were not so large as at other times. This is an indication that the farmers are getting in better condition and are able to save some money from the crops now being gathered and sold. -Childress Index.


