### Educational Column.

The idea has become prevalent in the minds of many today that all the education a child needs is that which will fit him to make a living. If the boy can read and write and cipher some, and has a little smattering of a few other things he is equipped for life.

Life is more than a living. Learning has a value of its own in life even when it does not appear to make increase of bread and butter. Many hundreds of boys and girls that pass through our institutions of learning may never consciously use their higher mathematics, knowledge of many of the sciences, their latin and greek, but they use every thing else with richer enjoyment because the knowledge of these principles and truths has become a part of them.

The student is the better not because of what he will do with much of his knowledge, but because of what this knowledge will do for him.

A large part of God's revelation of Himself is denied the man who has neglected his botany, his biology, his geology, his astronomy and his chemistry. David, the shepherd boy, as he guarded his flock on the Judean hills, studied the stary sky as it unfolded its beauty to him, and in after years was enabled to say, "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the firmament showeth his handiwork."

With what increased delight and interest will the farmer plow and plant his fields when he understands the constituents of the soil, and the peculiar adaptation of certain grains and plants. When the boy has learned the different songs and habits of the birds, he will cease to fling a

stone at them as they pass him on missions of joy to the world, but will delight in watching and studying them.

"Thanatopsis," one of our great master pieces of American literature, was the production of a boy who had communed with nature, and studied her from many standpoints.

Let the student, therefore, make the most of his opportunity. Much of the knowledge he acquires may seem to have but a remote bearing upon the issue of getting a living; but every item of it will have its bearing upon the enrichment and sweetening of life.

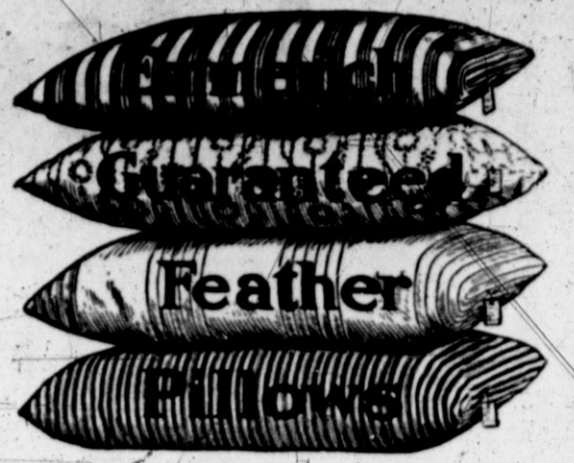
### "Rip Van Winkle."

### IRRIGATION A SUCCESS.

#### Prominent Wichita Falls Man Gives Dallas News Facts and Figures.

"You hear of hard luck stories about the Panhandle and in many instances they are very much exaggerated and now I want to tell you a story of our section that is backed by the cold, clammy facts," said J. It is the difference of between a bale to the acre and a half bale or less, and the difference between sixty bushels of corn to the acre and thirty or forty."

Mr. Kemp states that his section of the country has every mark of prosperity, and he states that this year the wheat acreage will be fully 25 percent over that of last year.

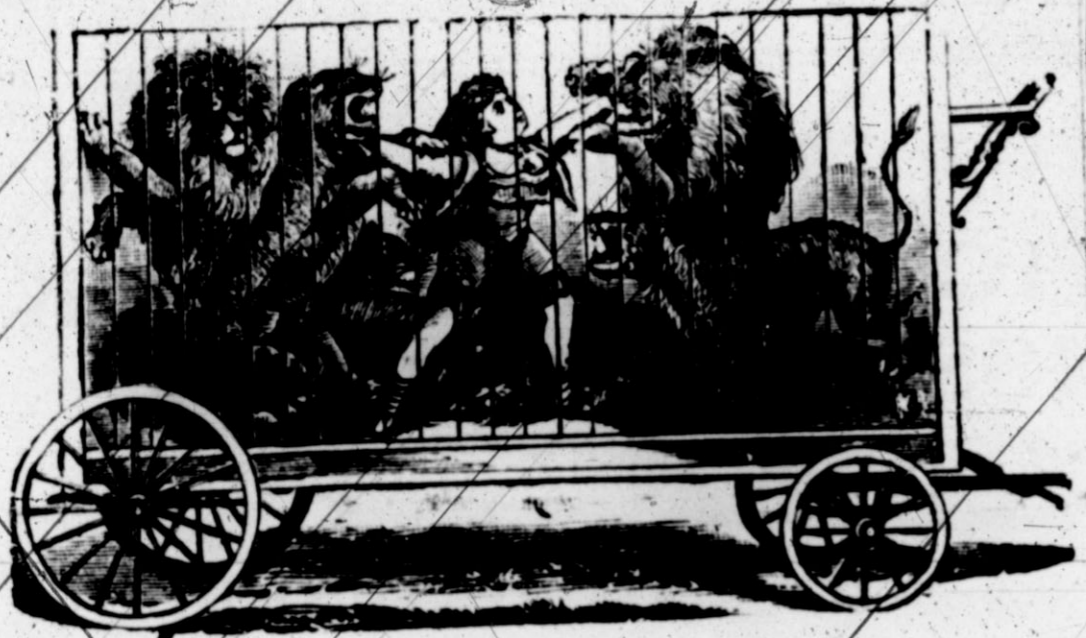

## Panhandle News

Amarillo is long on bonding schemes. They bond for schools, bond for court houses and some more court houses and jails, bond for water works, bond for sewers, bond for city hall and now propose to bond good and strong for a bridge across Canadian river. They are going to have a burden of tax if they keep on.—Hall County Herald.

A petition, signed by the greater part of the tax payers of the City of Dalhart, was presented to the city council asking them to call an election to vote on the proposition of bonding the city in the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of purchasing fire apparatus. Acting on the suggestions of the petition the mayor, by order of the council, has called the election for Tuesday, October 24.—Dalhart Texan.

Up to yesterday evening in the neighborhood of 200 bales of cotton had been ginned at the two gins in this city, and according to the estimate of Mr. Geo. Wigham the crop for this section is about half gathered. Last year nearly 1000 bales were ginned in this city. Not more than half that number, if that, will be ginned this season. Since last week the price of cotton has dropped more than \$2 per bale.—Wichita Times.

The banks are reporting growing business these days. Monday and Tuesday were the best days since the banks were organized, that is more checks were cashed and a greater number of deposits made, while the aggregate amounts were not so large as at other times. This is an indication that the farmers are getting in better condition and are able to save some money from the crops now being gathered and sold.—Childress Index.

While at Fort Worth this week the editor of The Index had a talk with Mr. A. A. Glisson, general passenger agent of the Denver Road, in regard to bringing laborers into this section. He said the policy of the road was to help the Panhandle country in any way possible. He promised and authorized a rate of \$4.75 for laborers from Fort Worth to Childress in squads of five or more. Mr. Glisson also stated that the road would assist the farmers in obtaining laborers, and if the farmers wished to send a man to Fort Worth or other points the road would do the right thing.—Childress Index.

### Will Practice at Hereford.

Dr. W. C. Moughon has written to the homefolks from the beautiful little city of Hereford stating that his health has so greatly improved during his stay there that he has decided to remain indefinitely and will open up an office for the practice of his profession. 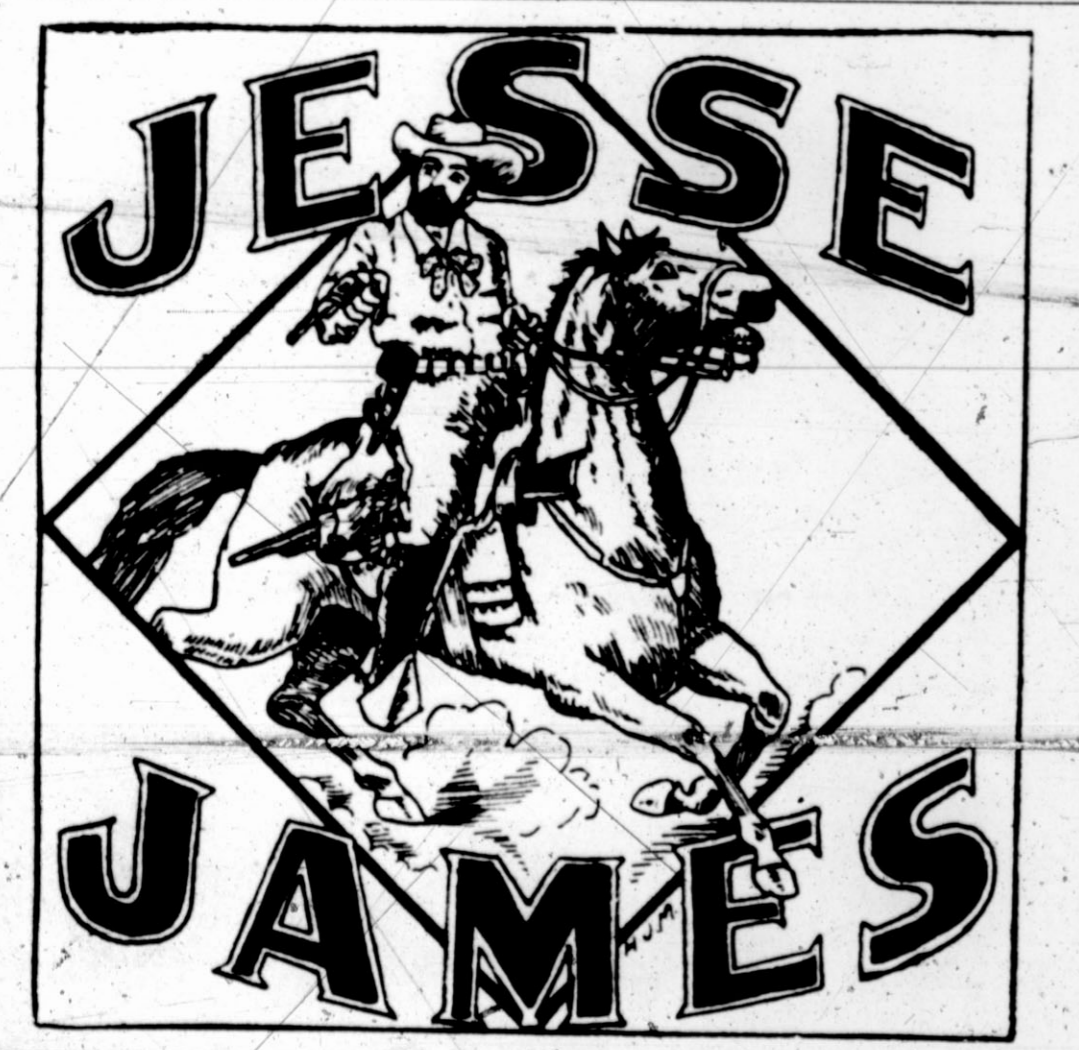
