Census - Where Have All the People Gone?

The early returns from the 1980 census are in, and local officials across the country are crying that the count is too low. Census takers, they say, missed individuals, households - even whole neighborhoods.

"We have 4,000 or 5,000 people that either disappeared or something," said Wally Jahraus, the assessor in Aberdeen, S.D. According to the preliminary figures, Aberdeen has a population of

25,007 - down 5.5 percent from 1970. Jahraus had estimated the population at near 30,500.

The Census Bureau began distributing figures on population and housing units to 39,000 municipalities last week. The figures are not final. Counting is still going on. The bureau says it expected an outcry and wants local authorities to look at the preliminary statistics and help them catch any mistakes.

Billions of dollars hinge on the

outcome of the national count. Federal funds often are allocated on the basis of population. Spokesmen in regional census offices estimated that a city can get up to \$200 for each resident. A population loss of 1,000 would mean a monetary loss of nearly a quarter of a million dollars.

Critics of the census have complained about its cost and its heavy reliance on the mails. Director Vincent Barabba accused one major critic, Rep. Robert Garcia, D-N.Y., of having "reached a verdict on the 1980 census without waiting for it to be finished ...'

An Associated Press survey showed no geographical pattern to the accusations of undercounting. Complaints came from the big cities of the Northeast and from smaller, newer communities in the West and South.

The president of the Chamber of Commerce in Newport, Ore., said the preliminary count of 7,153 is too low by 1,000. "When you look at the increase in traffic and the increase in people

The census tally shows Binghamton with 50,971 residents, down 20 percent from the 1970 total of 64,123. Libous said he quickly found at least one error, responsible for about 4,000 people. map they're using is cut off,'

Officials in Ithaca, N.Y., discovered that a city neighborhood known as West Hill wasn't included in the count. They issued a tongue-in-cheek press release: "Several thousand lost people were discovered late yesterday on West Hill....These people...may have been wandering for days, without shelter or

THE PRELIMINARY CENSUS figures being released around the country are bringing howls of protest from city and

county officials. It's no different here. The preliminary total for Hereford of 14,814 is almost 3,000 short of even the most conservative projections by city and chamber leaders. The Bureau's printout sheet shows 575 vacant houses in Hereford, which sounds a bit much.

An enumerator came by our house two weeks ago, and we explained that we had filled out the form and mailed it in. "Well, I'd better fill out another form," she explained, "because we have your address down as a vacant house."

Makes you wonder how much the count is actually off. The best suggestion we've heard on handling the census count is to have people fill out a small card which only counts heads. Then a survey could be made, maybe every five years, on all the other information the government is trying to put

Heat Death Toll Reaches 300 Mark

A sizzling heat wave that has baked much of the Southwest and Plains for 20 days apparently has claimed almost 300 lives, officials say.

Health officials say elderly people living in poorly ventilated houses are the most frequent victims of the triple-digit temperatures, which also have taken a heavy toll of crops and livestock.

Through Thursday, unofficial reports of heat-related deaths numbered 87 in Texas, 83 in Arkansas, 33 in Oklahoma, 27 in Tennessee, 16 in Missouri, 12 in Mississippi, 10 each in Georgia and Kansas, six in Illinois, four each in Louisiana and Alabama and one each in Indiana and

Some state officials contended the latest death figures were exaggerated. Arkansas' state medical examiner, Dr. Fahmy Malak, said in most cases other health factors were more significant in the deaths. But other medical officials argued the heat could not be discounted as a factor in the deaths.

James Hankins, coroner of Leflore County in Mississippi, said six elderly people who died in his area since Sunday had various illnesses, but "the heat had to be a contributing

Meanwhile, health authorities warned blacks with sickle cell anemia to cut back on activities and drink plenty of fluids during the hot weather.

"Dehydration is bad or even worse for those with sickle

Queen, 28, told reporters as he was put aboard a flight to Zurich, that his illness was 'something with the brain. Some sort of virus or something. I'm not sure," CBS News reported.

"I feel a lot better right now, in the last hour," he said. "I'll just be coming home as soon as possible. That's all I can say.'

In Washington, the State Department refused to say whether he would be put on the next plane for the United States or would be taken to a U.S. military hospital in West Germany.

Queen, 28, had been treated at Martyrs' Hospital in northern Tehran, where a medical duty officer said he "seemed to have a psychiatric problem," The Washington Post reported from Iran.

Tehran Radio announced Wednesday that Khomeini, the leader of Iran's revolutionary regime, ordered the young American's release after the militant students occupying the U.S. Embassy since last Nov. 4 informed him the vice consul was "confined to bed in one of Tehran's hospitals because of illness" and needed "better medical facilities" in another

country. Khomeini "ordered that, considering humane issues which are seriously observed by Islam, the man should be handed over to his parents, so that they may provide treatment for him wherever they wish," the an-

nouncement said. The Iranian Foreign Ministry said Queen was the "transferred to

representative of the Swiss Embassy in Tehran." which has been handling American interests in Iran since President Carter broke diplomatic relations with Khomeini's regime on April 7. The embassy's physician determined that his physical condition permitted his being flown to Europe, the ministry

"We're tremendously excited," said Harold Queen, the freed man's father, who was visiting a niece in Scarsdale, N.Y. "We are just waiting to hear. We're standing by the telephone."

"We just pray," said Queen's mother, Jeanne. "We just ask that we all be brothers and that God will help us.'

Mrs. Queen was one of four relatives of hostages who went to Europe in April to try to work up pressure for their release. The family moved from Briarcliff Manor, N.Y., to Lincolnville, Maine, in December to get away from reporters.

President Carter told reporters in Anchorage, Alaska, if Queen was "well after adequate treatment, we will be thankful." He added: "The proper thing for the terrorists to do is to release all the hostages."

Queen and 97 other people were taken hostage at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran while Shah Mohammad Reza ousted Pahlavi, Khomeini's revolution nine months earlier, was undergoing cancer treatment in New York. Three other American diplomats were taken prisoner at the Iranian Foreign Ministry.

The militants holding the embassy soon released all non-American captives and within three weeks freed 13 Americans — five because they were women and eight men because they were black. The other 53 were held in an attempt to force the United States to return the shah and his fortune to Iran.

AUSTIN. Texas (AP) - Agriculture commissioner Reagan Brown says Mexico and Texas need each other's food trade but this summer's dry spell might force some Texas farmers to cancel their contracts with Mexican buyers.

Texas Won't Lose Funds over Speeding

AUSTIN. Texas (AP) - Texas officials apparently have convinced a Federal Highway Administration representative the state should not be Penalized for the huge number of drivers who ignored the 55 mph speed limit last year.

David Oliver, an attorney in the office of the administration's general counsel, said Thursday he was satisfied Texas was close enough to the federal compliance goal to avoid

Oliver chaired a meeting at which he voiced displeasure with Texas' efforts but listened to reasons why the state was not doing better.

Last year's federal requirement was that no more than 70 percent of the cars monitored could exceed the 55 mph highway limit. Failure to reach that goal would cost a state 5 percent of its federal highway funds in 1980, or \$8 million in Texas' case.

Man Says He Plans To Assassinate Carter

DALLAS (AP) - A self-proclaimed officer in the Palestine Liberation Army, claiming to be under orders to kill the president, is the object of a Secret Service manhunt, federal agents said.

The man, described by assistant U.S. attorney Mark Elliston as "believed to be armed and dangerous," told witnesses he was a captain in the PLO with 100 murders to his credit, and was under orders to kill "Carter or Sen. Edward Kennedy or whoever is elected president."

Secret Service agent Gerald Kluber filed an affidavit Thursday alleging the man made the statement on June 29, and later took the witnesses to an apartment in Irving. Texas, where he displayed a cache of weapons.

He also showed them a poster of Carter with a bull's eye drawn on the face and told them he practiced throwing knives at the picture. according to the affidavit,

"It strikes one as being a bit peculiar because they say we have had a 13.4 percent increase in the number of housing units," said Harold Yungmeyer, the city administrator.

Mayor George Athanson of Hartford, Conn., said the city estimates there are 2.83 people per housing unit. Census officialte count was undertaken," said Athanson.

Nicklaus, Palmer Favored In British Open

LONDON (AP) - The British pitch tents for their 109th Open golf championship in Muirfield, Scotland next week with the old geezer full of vim and vinegar and up to his flagsticks in prestige.

It didn't look so good for the great-grandpa of the game nearly a half century ago.

Bob Jones had retired from competition after his fabulous Grand Slam. American pros got so busy building up their own developing tour that they had neither the time nor inclination to cross the Atlantic in boats to play.

The result was that in the next three decades the British Open lost a great deal of its glitter and glamour. Byron Nelson, one of America's legends, never played in it. Ben Hogan made a single stab — at Carnoustie in 1953 — where he won. Sam Snead also snubbed the event but was persuaded to make a foray in 1946 when he also won at St.

Thus the British Open, despite its rich tradition, deteriorated over the span, becoming a secondary event confined largely to players of the Commonwealth plus a few of the lesser-known Yanks and a handful of other overseas

That's when Arnold Palmer came in - Arnie and an eminent British doctor, merchant and patron of British

The latter was Dr. Leonard Simpson, internationally renowned endocrinologist and chairman of the family's mercantile empire, Daks-Simpson's Piccadilly.

The late Fred Corcoran, the man credited with building the U.S. tour into a multi-million-dollar enterprise, contacted Dr. Simpson with the idea of establishing a trophy to be given annually to the personality contributing most to U.S.-British

London's crown jewelers, Garrard's, were consigned the task of designing a unique silver trophy. It was to be called the Hagen Award, named for the great American professional, Walter Hagen.

Hagen himself was the first winner in 1961. After the Haig came Bob Jones and then a list of some of the most distinguished personalities in golf.

Meanwhile, Paimer had become America's golfing idol, winning the first of his four Masters in 1958 and the U.S. Open in 1960. Palmer became the first premier American golfer in years to put the British Open on his annual agenda. What Palmer did, others followed as a natural course.

Jack Nicklaus, the game's greatest all-time winner, picked up the tradition and now all of Uncle Sam's golfing elite yearly flock to those old seaside links which rocked the cradle.

Now Palmer and Nicklaus are reported to be leading candidates for the 1980 award, picked by an international

panel headed by Guido Cribari of the Westchester-Rockland (N.Y.) Newspapers.

"I am very pleased - both are worthy men," said Dr.

Dr. Simpson is a remarkable individual in his own right. Lightweight boxing champion and team captain at Cambridge, he went on to become a distinguished physician (37 lines in Who's Who) and patron of sports.

He once hosted one of the most lavish pre-tournament parties for tennis players at Wimbledon, abandoned when the grass court schedule became a conflict. He has long been active in golf.

He is a friend of the royal family, particularly Prince Phillip and Princess Margaret, and Princess Anne may ride one of his jumping horses in the Badminton Equestrian Classic.

Married to a Hungarian baroness, he resides at 28 Hyde Park Gate, the home where Winston Churchill lived while Prime Minister and where he died. Churchill's nephew painted the murals for the doctor's Picadilly store.

"I will never forget presenting the trophy to Hagen in 1961." the doctor said. "He was such a big man, goodnatured, fun-loving man. But when someone asked him to sign a picture, he borrowed six pens before he found one suitable for the surface. He wanted it to be just right. And he signed with a tremendous flourish."







DEAR DR. LAMB - My problem is with mood swings or energy swings. I believe I've had them all my life. I'm 22 years old. They've become rather severe in the last couple of years. Eventually I wound up in the hospital for a

The first couple of weeks after getting out I experi-enced around three days of blue feelings; I was tired, weak and down. Then about four days of feeling elated and full of energy, basically happy with everything. Then the cycle would repeat. When I was down I didn't care to do anything. I had apathy toward everything. I could sleep for 10 hours, get up and feel just as bad as when I went to bed the night before.

When I'd have a high wanted to do all kinds of things. I've lost a lot of good friendships because of these swings and I would sure appreciate any help you might have. Doc, I can't take this much longer so I'm in extreme need of some help.

DEAR READER - You're giving me a very good description of manic depressive swings. I assume from the rest of your letter that your doctor thinks so, too, and that's why you're receiving

the medicines you're taking. All of us have some normal mood swings. There are days when we feel up and full of energy and days when we feel low. In normal people these can be significantly influenced by life style and the events that occur in one's life. Usually when a person is on the low side of the swing, if something occurs that's interesting or that he really wants to do, his level of energy is suddenly and markedly increased. It's normal to be depressed when some unfortunate event or disappointment occurs.

While people can do a lot about the ups and downs of their life if they choose to do so, it's more difficult to do anything on your own about the more severe swings that you're describing.
