



Stalled Front Dumps More Rain

The spring monsoons continued to overnight, and checkpoints across the area reported appreciable moisture for the second straight day today.

Heavy rainfall was again concentrated in the northwest sector of the county. although rainfall last night was general over the entire county.

Persistent overcast conditions and intermittent rainfall call to mind a prolonged period of wet weather which descended on the area at much the same time period last year, beginning with the Memorial Day holiday

That storm flooded local playa lakes, inundated roads and center pivot sprinkler systems, and left up to 14 inches of rainfall in some locations in a period of only a few days.

The moisture accumulation from the The moisture accumulation from the current wet spell is still far from that whopping total, but recurrent showers and persistent cloud cover serve to jog the memory.

Clements May Include Primary On Agenda for Special Session

AUSTIN: Texas (AP) - Gov. Bill Clements has resurrected the presidential primary issue by saying he might include it in a special legislative session if other states join Texas in a regional

"If things start bearing fruit, ... it's possible that I will consider it sufficiently important that we might call a special session to accomplish this," the governor told a weekly news conference Thursday.

Clements said a regional primary would give Southwestern states greater influence in national politics.

"It would realign the focus and perspective of what's happening in a state like New Hampshire," he said of its importance.

A presidential primary bill died in the regular legislative session that adjourned Monday. However, the state Republican Party officials say they will hold a 1980

primary under their own rules regardless whether the Legislature passes a bill in special session.

The governor earlier announced he would call a special session sometime before 1981 on initiative and referendum. Clements called Spraker Bill Clayton from the audience and invited him up to the microphones.

"It depends on a lot of legwork," Clayton said in assessing chances for holding a presidential primary on the same day as Oklahoma and Arkansas.

The speaker said he has talked with his counterparts in both states. Oklahoma officials especially are interested in holding their primary with other states in March, he added.

"Texas has 26 electoral votes and with Oklahoma and Arkansas, that would be sufficient strength to get the attention of any presidential candidate." Clayton

with officials in Louisiana. Alabama and Georgia, but those states were less interested than Oklahoma and Arkansas.

A bill that would hold a presidential primary separately from the May general primary elections died largely because of the five-day boycott by 12 "Killer Bees" senators who broke a quorum.

The dozen rebels claimed the bill would encourage cross-over voting and was rigged to help former Gov. John Connally's campaign for the Republican presidential nomination.

The Killer Bees also said the proposal, pushed strongly by Lt. Gov. Bill Mobby, would continue the edge that conservative Democratic legislators hold in most districts over liberal Democratic and Republican challengers.

Clements agreed furor over the primary was a fight between liberal and conservative wings of the Democratic (See PRIMARY, Page 2)

Hereford Independent School District has been allocated \$796,100 more from the state for the 1979-80 fiscal year than it received for 1978-79 but more than two-thirds of the gain will be consumed by local implementation of the Tax Relief Amendment, according to figures received by the superintendent of schools

Superintendent Harrell Holder said the figures, taken from a state-mandated impact study of the Tax Relief Amendment, were close to actual "but we won't know the exact figures until we see the bill."

The study showed that HISD will receive \$4,725,100 for its foundation program, which includes teachers' salaries, transportation and maintenance and operations. That would represent an increase of \$317,800 from the present fiscal year.

Local fund assignment, which is based by the state on taxable values, will decrease from \$713,000 to approximately \$582,300-about \$130,900.

Equalization aid payments--new money written into the bill for districts which have less than the statewide average tax value behind each student (based on average daily attendance)--total \$398, 200, according to the figures. That is up \$255,800 over payments received this fiscal year by the school district.

The district's net gain, which represents the increase in foundation program payments and equalization aid, the reduction in local fund assignment and a rebate for HISD's loss of ad valorem taxes, will be \$796,100 if the figures are exact.

The school district will lose approximately \$555,000, Holder said, due to the taxation of farmland on productivity instead of market value and increased homestead exemptions. Homeowners in the school district are now eligible for a \$5,000 exemption (on assesed value), while disabled and elderly persons have an additional exemption of \$10,000.

Prior to implementation of the Tax Relief Amendment by the State Legislature in its recent session, elderly persons received a \$3,000 exemption, while other homesteaders got nothing off their taxes.

The Legislature left it up to individual school districts whether they would exempt two cars from each family. The school board will discuss the option at its next board meeting.

"We've got to look at that from a budget standpoint," Holder said. The district would lose more than \$100,000 if two cars per family are exempted from taxation.

Holder said the figures "are about what we expected," adding that the district should be in good financial shape with the increased state aid.

"I feel we will be able to fully pass the tax savings mandated by the people last November on to the citizens of the Hereford Independent School District," Holder said.

"We should be able to collect enough additional state monies to absorb our inflated cost over the next two years and keep our tax rate at the current level."

Holder said the difference between the net gain and money to be lost by the district by complying with the amendment--about \$240,000---should be enough to maintain the current tax rate. The school district, which has a no-surplus policy, will continue to live within a tight budget, especially if vehicles are exempted, he said.

"If Jimmy (Carter) has an austere budget, this one will be super austere," Holder said, making reference to a Carter

Commodity Prices **Show Another Rise**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Farm commodity prices, after dropping in April, edged up again in May, the fifth increase in the last six months.

The Agriculture Department said Thursday the increase in May averaged 0.75 percent, following a 1 percent drop in April, the first decline since farm prices began a steady upward swing last December. The four-month bulge was a key factor in a sharp boost in retail food prices in the first quarter of this year.

Farm prices, on the average in May, were up 14 percent from a year ago.

In a related report, the department said farmers' net income this year could total around \$32 billion, up 13.5 percent from \$28.2 billion in 1978.

It also said retail food prices might go up slightly more than the department has predicted.

The department's Crop Reporting Board said higher prices for hay, wheat, corn, citrus, potatoes and broiler chickens contributed most to the increase in raw product prices from April to May.

Lower prices were reported for cattle,

hogs, soybeans, eggs' and tomatoes, which partly offset the gains for the other

Officials said it was the first decline in monthly cattle prices since last November. However, cattle prices had been at record levels and the drop in May still left them at 41.6 percent above a year

Hog prices dropped 1.6 percent during the month and averaged 9 percent below a year ago.

Overall farm prices in May averaged 246 percent of the 1967 base used as a standard. The index was 244 percent in

The monthly price report said prices paid by farmers to meet expenses, meanwhile, rose 0.5 percent in May and averaged 13 percent more than a year

The May parity ratio for farm commodities was 73 percent, the same as in April. It was 72 percent a year ago, the Crop Reporting Board said.

Carter Lost \$50,000 In Peanut Warehouse

WASHINGTON (AP) . President Carter's latest financial disclosures show he is worth about \$1 million, despite heavy losses from the family peanut warehouse business that had been managed by his brother Billy.

The disclosure statement released. Thursday shows that Carter's Warehouse, which is owned 62 percent by the president, lost more than \$50,000 last Billy Carter has been removed from

recently completed treatment for alcoholism at a U.S. Navy hospital in Long Beach, Calif. Charles Kirbo, the president's

financial manager, has said he is seeking a buyer for the business.

The disclosure statement, now required of all high-ranking federal officials, was filed late Wednesday with the Office of Government Ethics.

The Carter statement does not give precise financial details, but does disclose assets, liabilities and income in general ranges.

For example, Carter disclosed that he received last year between \$101 and \$1,000 in interest from the White House credit union. His account there had a cash

USDA Ups Estimates

Of Farm Receipts

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department has boosted sharply its estimates of how much farmers may sell this year.

Referred to as "cash receipts" by economists, those are now estimated at between \$124 billion and \$133 billion, compared to \$110.2 billion in 1978.

The new estimate was announced Thursday. In previous reports, farmers' cash receipts were forecast in a range of \$118 billion to \$128 billion.

Nearly all of the predicted increase from the early estimate will come from higher values of livestock products, including cattle, hogs, poultry and dairy products, the report said.

Former LBJ Advisor

Favors Synthetics

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rising oil prices should prompt the nation to start a high-gear effort to develop synthetic fuels, says W.W. Rostow, former presidential national security adviser.

Rostow, adviser to the late President Lyndon B. Johnson and now director of the University of Texas' Bureau of Economic History, reminded a House subcommittee Thursday that the U.S. produced its first synthetic rubber 287 days after the decision was made during World War II.

He said the all-out energy production necessary to counter shortages should include "a massive drive to exploit the potentialities of coal and shale synthetics."

Rostow testified with Texas Lt. Gov. William Hobby before a House Commerce Committee panel studying President Carter's plan to phase out domestic oil price controls.

There are indications that the costs of synthetic fuels are "coming close" to conventional sources, Rostow said.

Lockheed Guiltyof

Payoff Charges

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Lockheed Corp. pleaded guilty today to federal charges stemming from payoffs to former Japanese Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka and other Japanese officials and agreed to pay \$647,000 in fines.

The Justice Department filed a 10-count criminal information in U.S. District Court here and Lockheed admitted guilty to four counts of wire fraud and four counts of making false statements to the government to conceal the payoffs.

The government said the payoffs were made from October 1972 to August 1974 and including \$1.8 million to Tanaka.

Lockheed also pleaded guilty to two misdemeanor violations of customs law in condition with transporting \$17,000 in Japanese currency from Los Angeles to Tokyo and \$37,000 in U.S. currency from Atlanta, Ga., to Mexico in 1974.

Today's settlement ended a 21/2-year criminal investigation in which the government decided not to file charges against former Lockheed Board Chairman Daniel J. Haughton and former Lockheed President A. Carl Kotchian.

According to Lockheed's previous admissions to the Securities and Exchange Commission, the company paid at least \$30 million secretly to government officials, military officers and consultants in 19 countries.

Expert Says Bolt

Didn't Cause Crash

WASHINGTON (AP) - A member of the government agency that investigates plane crashes says he would not fly on a DC-10 until experts get answers to some questions about its safety.

Philip A. Hogue, one of the five members of the National Transportation Safety Board, made the statement Thursday after the board was briefed by an expert who knocked down the idea that a broken bolt caused the fatal crash of a DC-10 a week ago.

The bolt, an early suspect in the accident, turns out to have been a victim. "As far as can be ascertained so far, the bolt broke as a result of the accident," chief staff metallurgist Michael Marks told the board. The bolt. recovered from the runway of Chicago's O'Hare airport after the crash there, "had broken in an overstress condition, rather than a fatigue condition." Marks

After the briefing. Hogue was asked if he would be a passenger on a DC-10. "No. No, I would not," he said, adding that if it were up to him, he would be strongly tempted to ground the big jets.

Oil Execs Praise Decontrol

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter, facing prospects of prolonged oil shortages and skyrocketing OPEC prices, is meeting with consumer advocates who oppose his order to lift price controls on domestic petroleum starting Friday.

Carter summoned consumer representatives and environmentalists to the White House today following a session Thursday with oil company executives who praised decontrol and warned that Americans will struggle with petroleum shortages for years to come.

Oil decontrol gets underway just as the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries appears primed to increase prices as much as \$3 per barrel. according to Saudi Arabian officials.

Meanwhile. Carter's problems were complicated on Capitol Hill Thursday. Top congressional leaders, while claiming they want to de-emphasize differences with the president, torpedoed a White House attempt to stage a Camp David "energy summit" this weekend.

The president still plans the session, but House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill and House Majority Leader Jim Wright said they turned down the invitation. because of other commitments.

A White House official, who refused to be named, said. "I'm sure if they did it, it was for good reasons."

At least three consumer advocates attending today's White House meeting strongly oppose oil decontrol, claiming it will punish low-income Americans by increasing gasoline and home heating oil prices.

Carter's order is expected to cost an average family of four between \$100 and \$175 a year, according to different government projections.

Oil prices will rise even higher with the latest flurry of increases announced Thursday by Saudi Arabia and Iran. They said a barrel of their highest-grade crude will rise \$1.40 and \$1.30, respectively.

This could lead to a 3-cent-per-gallon increase for gasoline and home heating oil in the United States, analysts said.

More significantly, Saudi Arabia indicated it wouldn't stand in the way of future price boosts when OPEC meets in Geneva this month.

Saudi officials said the cartel may raise the base price of oil to \$17 or \$18 per barrel, compared to \$14.45 now.

Even before this news, gasoline prices. while relatively stable last week, were rising more rapidly than ever, the American Automobile Association re-

Its weekly Fuel Gauge Report said average gasoline prices rose 1.5 cents per gallon last week. Prices exceeded 90 cents in at least 19 states, representing an average 16.5-cent increase since Christmas.

In addition, the average price of diesel fuel jumped 2.3 cents to 78.5 cents a gallon, the AAA said

Skylab Estimated To Return July 9

WASHINGTON (AP) . The space agency, revising its estimate by one week, said Thursday that July 9 is the most likely date for the 85-ton Skylab space station to break up and fall to Earth.

The space agency still refuses to hazard a guess what part of the globe will be showered with the 400 pieces of Skylab that are expected to survive the space station's plunge through the atmosphere.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said there is a 95 percent chance the pieces will hit Earth between June 27 and July 21.

The prediction is based on the tracking of the house-size space station by the North American Air Defense Command in Colorado Springs, Colo., NORAI says the chance of "decay" is 50 percent before July 9 and 50

The space station, launched in 1973 and occupied by three different teams of astronauts, already has entered the thin upper atmosphere of Earth.

Weight Control Climate Fights Calories

'sneaky' calories. Set a reading. weight-control climate, says a foods and nutrition specialist.

Unwanted calories "sneak" into the diets of many overweight people who add them without even realizing they're doing so, explains Frances Reasonover with the .Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

Overweight people are very sensitive to the sight, taste, smell and thought of food -especially when it's clearly in sight and readily available.

In addition, they eat almost as much food when they're thinking about something else as when they reathinking about food.

For example, they don't realize how much they are eating when their attention is on

Finally, some overweight people eat less when they have to prepare their own food -- but others have a habit of tasting while preparing foods.

In order to set a climate forweight control, one battle plan is: know when we eat food without realizing it and then re-order eating habits to avoid 'sneaky' calories. Miss Reasonover says.

Below are her suggestions for changing eating habits.

1) Put snack foods (crackers. cookies, cakes, soft drinks, candy) on a high shelf or in a

NEW YORK (AP) - CBS attracted a substantial and apparently regular audience for the last three chapters in its four-part miniseries based on John Dean's "Blind Ambition," and the boost helped the network break ABC's 19-week run in first place in the weekly

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday night installments in the CBS miniseries compiled ratings ranging from 20 to 21.2, indicating people who began the week with "Blind Ambition" stayed on through the conclusion. Ratings for Part I were included in the previous week's accounting.

ABC, nonetheless, won each of the three nights, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. show.

Monday night went to ABC with the help of a movie. "Vacation in Hell." Tuesday night with its comedy lineup. including the week's mostwatched show, "Three's Company," and Wednesday night with a boost from "Barry Manilow's Third Special."

"Blind Ambition" did win head-to-head competition Monday and Tuesday with the concluding chapters in NBC's "A Man Called Intrepid"

ABC listed eight of the Top 10 programs in the week ending May 27, but CBS scored with a couple of specials, "Body Human: The Sexes" and "Dummy," tied for seventh with ABC's "Happy Days."

The rating for "Three's Company" was 25.3. Nielsen says that means of all the homes in the country with TV just over a quarter saw at least part of the show.

NBC's top-rated program, the first installment in a two-part movie-for-TV, "The Best Place to Be," was No. 18 in the ratings.





lawn mower because we moved to a house on a two-acre lot with plenty of grass. At one place on the property, there is a slope that falls off very gradually about 4 feet. While I was mowing the lawn the other day the first time I used the mower), my 16-year-old son told me I was making a mistake riding the mower down the slope. He said that I should go uphill or sideways. Was he right?

A. - You should never ride a slope from side to side. That's

the mower topple over. On a slope of that size, you should be able to go up or down without any danger. But be sure to go very slowly and without ever making a quick or sharp turn. If, while going down, you find little and being uncomfortable. confine yourself to mowing while going up the slope even if you have to ride 20 or 30 feet out of the way so that you can do the cutting in this manner. When riding either up or down, be certain the mower blade is set high enough so it doesn't dig into the soil.

of protein in the diet. DEAR DR. LAMB About 15 years ago a urologist diagnosed a growth on one of my testicles as a spermatocele and said not to worry about it unless it became much larger. Several years later, after it had enlarged, I consulted another doctor who aspirated fluid from it and said it was non-cancerous but advised

Recently I developed a small growth on another testicle and a third urologist advised it might never get any larger because of my age. I'm 58. He said it was immaterial if I had surgery. I'd like to know whether or not I am risking my health by not having elective sur-

gery. What causes such a

surgery if it continued to

growth like this anyway? DEAR READER - Having the unanimous agreement of three urology specialists about your condition ought to be very comforting. In medicine we don't always get such a unanimity of opinion. Often there is some difficulty in deciding what something is that you can't look at under a microscope.

I'm certain that with the agreement of all three specialists that the diagnosis is correct. These are really little cysts that develop in the tubes that carry the sperm cells away from the testicles. These little cysts are not really important as long as they're not large enough to create mechanical difficulties. They do not become cancer.

DEAR MRS. H.G. - You should take the leather

DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm a 13-year-old girl and very much overweight. I've tried to diet. I start good but after a few weeks, I start eating. I have gone to exercise clubs and that failed. I've started to get interested in boys but they all want to be my friend. They never ask me out on a date. Please help me lose weight. I'm almost hopeless

DEAR READER -You're not hopeless because you have the motivation to lose weight. You won't be the first girl who lost weight to improve her appearance so she could have a boyfriend. The only thing I would like to caution you about is not to overdo it.

You didn't tell me how much overweight you were or what your height and weight are. A lot of young girls get so excited about losing weight that they lose all sense of reality about whether they are or are not fat. This can end up with such persons literally starving themselves to the point of having serious medical problems. I don't want you to do that.

I will send you The Health Letter number 4-7, Weight Losing Diet, as a guide that you can use to provide you a balanced diet while you're losing weight. build up your physical activity as much as possible. That will help you use calories and actually improve your figure as well. Remember it's the constant, repetitive effort that helps. Crash diets or sudden weight loss can be dangerous. If you stick to this regularly day after day, month after month, you will achieve your goal. When you get a little older and boys are even more important to you, you can have an ideal

It is important for people who have obesity problems to learn which foods they can eat when they're hungry that won't add a lot of calories to their system. High on this list are the leafy vegeta-bles and carrots and kinds of foods that commonly go into salads. Don't add any calorie rich salad dressings to such a mixture. Popcorn is fine as long as it's not popped in a lot of fat and you don't add butter to it.

Learn to cut the foods out of your diet that contain lots of calories, specifically fat. There are nine calories per gram of fat and only four calories per gram of carbohydrate or protein.

Unfortunately, many of the so-called high protein foods contain lots of fat so you have to watch out for that. Any meat that you eat should be lean meat. Chicken breasts are excellent particularly if you re-move the skin. What's left is a very low-fat, good protein food. Of course, you'll want to avoid the concentrated sweets, such as found in sugar and desserts.

If you develop a good eating pattern now that eliminates unnecessary calories and still provides all the basic nutrients that you need, you may develop a life style that will help prevent you from having obesity for the remainder of your life.
