

### J. B. POPE IS LUCKY ONE.

He Held the Lucky Number Which Drew the Big \$65 Charter Oak Range Given Away by Daily & Kerbow.

The biggest crowd which has ever assembled in a Clarendon store was in evidence at the hardware and furniture house of Daily & Kerbow last Saturday afternoon. Some time ago this enterprising firm advertised through the Banner-Stockman that they would on Dec. 23, at 2:30 p. m., give away absolutely free a \$65 Charter Oak Range. The only condition imposed was that the holder of the ticket must be present in person on the day of the drawing in order that his number be not void.

That this method of advertising was a success was proven by the crowd that assembled at the store on the 23rd. Soon the store was packed and jammed as full of people as it could be. Then the sidewalks filled up; the streets on either side were congested with the wagons and buggies of people from the country. People in every walk of life swarmed to Daily & Kerbow's that day, each with his ticket, anxious to be declared the winner of such a handsome prize. ## CLARENDON IS SECOND.

Freight Statistics of the Denver Road Show 182 Immigrant Cars Brought Into Panhandle in Last Few Months.

W. F. Sterley, general freight agent of the Fort Worth and Denver City road, has just compiled a statement showing the movement of immigrants' property handled by that company for period from July 1 to Nov. 30, to points on that line, principally in the Panhandle country.

The report shows a remarkable influx of immigrants into the territory along that line.

Quannah leads the list with 39 cars, Clarendon follows with 30, Memphis 26, Amarillo 24 and Channing and Vernon with 21 each. The total number of cars of immigrant movables was 182. These were distributed at different points along the road.

This total of cars does not include the immigrant movables handled by the Denver Road destined to points on other lines, of which there was also a large amount.

A conservative estimate by Mr. Sterley places the number of families brought into the Panhandle as a result of the above movement at about 350, representing at least 2,000 persons.

The above shipment of cars takes no account of less than car-load lots. Smaller movements were also quite heavy. In addition to these movements there was considerable movement into that section by wagon during the earlier months. Of the railroad movement the larger portion was during November.

Mr. Sterley anticipates that the

spring movement will probably be heavier, because farmers are compelled to dispose of their crops before they move to a new country. Mr. Sterley says the newcomers into the Panhandle are of the thrifty and well-to-do class, with plenty of money in bank. He cited two instances where new settlers had made good deposits.

The heaviest movement into the plains country is from the northern state, and the direct lines have brought in, perhaps, as many or more cars as did the Denver Road, to junction points. It is known that the movement of immigrants to local points east and west of the Denver Road has been heavy. —Ft. Worth Telegram.





A Breezy Letter From the Nation's Capital by our Former Assistant Postmaster—Not Married Yet.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 17, 1905.  
BANNER STOCKMAN,  
CLARENDON, TEXAS.

Dear Editor:—What have you done with all my letters sent Washington, etc.? Consigned them to the waste basket? I have found that letter writing is not my strong point and one week home is about all I can manage. I also discovered that there were lots of people better qualified to write interestingly and learnedly concerning the various happenings here and so I "passed it up" to them. I have a very nice position here and received a little promotion a couple of days ago, which makes it still nicer. I rather regret the Post Office, however, as I liked that work in parts, but not specially struck on the hours of service. I see it has been moved from the little "cubby hole" of old and was rather sorry to hear it for though small, it was a conveniently situated place. I have missed but one Banner-Stockman since I have been here, that of Dec. 1, but I MISSED THAT, for I look to their coming with much anticipation. I don't think the "Star" and the "Post" have taken a bit of notice of me since I "got in" and I am sure the B. S. (bromo-seltzer) wouldn't treat me so shabby. I am living here with Mr. & Jefferson, a former postmaster at Clarendon and well known to some of the Clarendon people, and who has been very ill for more than a year. It helps me to feel at home by being in such good hands. With best wishes to you yours, and the force.
