Tornado Damage Estimated at \$2 Million

Tornadoes and terrential rain from three waves of ominous black clouds that swept across North Texas Thursday injured at least eight persons, none seriously, and left a trail of destruction estimated at \$2 million.

Two afternoon tornadoes that tore through the Dallas suburb of DeSoto, destroyed nine homes, damaged 12 businesses and DeSoto High School.

The approximately 1,300 students, who had undergone a tornado drill only hours earlier, spent a nervous but safe two hours huddled in the dark hallways of the school, which received only minor

"The wind was blowing so hard, I couldn't hear the tornado coming," said Carolyn LaFlower of DeSoto. "But I saw a table and the porch swing on the patio blow over and things started flying

through the air.

"I grabbed my son and ran into the shower. I figured it was the safest place ... as it turned out, that was about the

only part left standing when it was over." Thousands of Dallas residents scrambled for shelter, others rushed to the streets to gawk at the boiling clouds when Civil Defense sirens echoed their

eerie warnings. The flurry of tornadoes came less than a month after a massive twister killed 48. and injured hundreds in Wichita Falls.

Several tornadoes touched down within minutes of each other near Wilmer and Hutchins, about 10 miles south of Dallas, injuring four persons in a demolished mobile home, tearing the roof off a Wilmer-Hutchins school and collapsing the roof on a supermarket.

Three men were slightly injured with the roof collasped under the weight of collected water on a top-floor coffee shop at Dallas' Le Baron Hotel.

"It got black as pitch and I heard the crash of falling debris," said hotel manager Frank Fry.

Fifty mobile homes in two trailer parks were damaged when a tornado roared through the tiny town of Red Oak, 20 miles south of Dallas.

Almost four inches of rain fell on parts of Dallas and surrounding areas as the

three severe weather systems rolled across the state.

The deluge threatened homes and forced evacuation of residents in some areas of south Dallas, Grand Prairie and Arlington. Flooding also was reported in Fort Worth.

Assistant City Manager Steve Nordholt said 15 to 20 families were evacuated in Grand Prairie. An additional 14 to 15 (See WEATHER, Page 2)

GM had 45 percent rise to the record \$1.26 billion and Ford, with sharply higher foreign earnings, had a 27 percent gain to . a record \$594.8 million.

Rep. John Dingell, head of the House Energy Committee, deplores . the economics of the oil companies at every opportunity, but he didn't have any comment on the auto industry profits in his state. Nor did we notice President Carter jumping on the auto industry."

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's unemployment rate rose slightly in April to 5.8 percent, despite the largest drop in total employment in more than a decade. the government said today.

The jobless rate had been 5.7 percent in March, according to the Labor Department report. In fact, it has ranged from 5.7 percent to 5.9 percent for the

Car Accident Injures **HHS Senior**

A Hereford High School senior was listed in guarded, but stable, condition today at St. Anthony Catholic Hospital in Amarillo after his car left U.S. Highway 60 and rolled over several times before landing upside-down in a field east of

Hereford around 11:30 p.m. Thursday. Brent Allen, 18, of 203 Sunset, was taken to Deaf Smith General Hospital then transferred by ambulance to Amarillo following the one-car accident.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Allen. According to Texas Department of Public Safety troopers who worked the wreck, Allen was driving a 1979 Datsun at a high rate of speed six miles east of the city on U.S. Highway 60. He was in the

westbound side of the highway DPS reports stated that an unidentified vehicle pulled from the left land into the right lane in front of Allen's vehicle. causing it to leave the highway, break threw a barbed-wire fence and roll several times in a field on the north side of the road.

DPS troopers Ken Britten and J.C. Lambert arrived at the scene minutes after the accident and found the car several hundred yards from the road. Allen apparently was thrown out and was found about 10 yards from the car.

Steve Sauter, 18, of 249 Centre, a passenger in the car, was not injured, according to the DPS. Sauter also is a senior af Hereford High School.

The other vehicle had not been located by law enforcement officers this morning. The accident is still under investigation.

The number of persons without jobs rose only slightly in April - from 5.87 million to 5.93 million.

But Labor Department statisticians were at a loss to explain apparently conflicting data on total employment.

As measured by a survey of households, the number of persons employed declined by 670,000 to 96.2 million pesons. It was the largest drop since January 1968, when the number of persons with jobs declined by 700,000, said John Bregger, a department economist.

But according to figures collected from industrial payroll records, "non-farm payroll employment was about unchanged over the month at 88.3 million."

Deaf Smith General Receives \$7,500 for Ultrasound Purchase

Deaf Smith General Hospital kicked off its community fund-raising campaign for a \$75,000 ultrasound unit after administrator Jim Bullard accepted a \$7,500 check toward the machine's purchase from Amarillo Area Foundation.

Foundation Executive Director Jim Matthews and board Vice President Mrs. Lee Bivins, both of Amarillo, presented the donation to Bullard. Ed Reinauer Jr. of Hereford, a director of the foundation, also attended the presentation.

"Their main reason for wanting to help us was they saw a need for this particular service to be given in the Hereford area. The foundation itself really wants to help outlying Panhandle towns and they saw a need that could save people a trip to Amarillo to have this procedure done." Bullard said.

"Also, they know that this particular piece of equipment we are installing is unique in that there is no other piece of equipment like it in Amarillo or in the area," the administrator

Dr. Evangeline Archer of Canyon, the radiologist who will

operate the ultrasound unit for Deaf Smith General Hospital, agreed with Bullard that Hereford will be ahead of Amarillo in the area of utilizing sound waves to obtain images of structures inside the body.

"Hereford's ultrasound equipment will be much better because it has a modification called real-time, which allows us to see motion and activity in the body which otherwise cannot be recorded with plain X-rays," Dr. Archer said.

She explained that Amarillo's ultrasound unit, unlike Hereford's could not provide a film-like sequence of a baby moving inside the mother or the aorta pulsating in the abdomen.

"This one's rather unique, too, in that it has a small digital computer with it. It helps produce a better image on the screen and it gives much better diagnostic information. It's just a very fine piece of equipment," Dr. Archer said.

The ultrasound unit is a diagnostic tool which uses no radiation. "It only uses sound waves, which makes it safe for any age group." Dr. Archer explained.

She said the machines value to Deaf Smith General could go as

Britain's Thatcher First Woman Named Prime Minister in Europe

LONDON (AP) - Conservative Party leader Margaret Thatcher, champion of free enterprise and curbs on union power. swept to power today in Britain's general election, making her Europe's first woman prime minister.

Prime Minister James Callaghan's office announced he was going to Buckingham Palace at 2:30 p.m. (9:30 a m. EDT) today to tender his resignation to Queen Elizabeth. The queen would then ask the 53-year-old Mrs. Thatcher to form a new government.

By early afternoon, Mrs. Thatcher's Tories held a commanding lead over Callaghan's Labor Party as the vote count continued from Thursday's election.

Mrs. Thatcher refrained from making a immediate claim of victory, saying on arrival at her jubilant headquarters, We're coming up for the finishing

straight, but we're not home vet." But then, relaxing her traditional caution, she added, "I am aware of the very great responsibility ... it is very exciting, but somehow one has to be very

calm about it. I feel it will be all right." With 534 of the 635 seats in the House of Commons declared, the Conservatives. the traditional party of big business, had won 271 seats, needing only 47 more which appeared certain - for an overall

Computer projections said the Tories could expect an overall majority of 25 to-

Though Mrs. Thatcher was withholding a victory statement until the 318 seats for majority were declared, the pro-Tory London evening papers pushed

her into the premiership. "The First Lady," shouted an Evening Standard headline. "I've done it," blared the evening News.

The standing of the parties at 12:20 p.m. (7:20 a.m. EDT) was Conservatives 271, Labor 250, the small Liberal Party 8, (See ELECTION, Page 2)

3-Car Limit Debated For Gasoline Coupons

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's standby gasoline-rationing plan may be modified to bar owners of more than three cars from reaping additional rationing coupons.

High-level negotiations were underway today to rescue the plan from what some @ congressional leaders see as likely rejection when it comes up for floor votes in the House and Senate next week.

Unless both houses approve the standby plan by the end of next week, it

One modification that seems to be gaining support would impose a three-car cap on coupon eligibility, said House assistant Democratic leader John Brademas, D-Ind.

As submitted to Congress, the president's plan would allocate gasoline during serious fuel shortages based on the number of registered vehicles in a

Critics say this would give people who can afford many cars an automatic advantage over those who can't. They also argue that cars could be rescued from junk heaps and qualify for coupons.

Portales Man Killed In Rollover

A Portales, N.M., man was dead on arrival at Deaf Smith General Hospital Thursday afternoon after his pickup flipped, threw him out and rolled over his body at the intersection of U.S. Highway 60 and farm road 1057 in Summerfield.

Paul Ray Hendershot, 52, may have seen killed at the scene, according to. Texas Department of Public Safety troopers from Friona and Hereford, although he was officially pronounced dead at the hospital.

Troopers said that Hendershot's pickup was southbound on 1057 when it apparently skidded past the stop sign on U.S. Highway 60, went sideways across the highway, hit a culvert on the opposite side and threw the driver out. The pickup apparently rolled over Hendershot and landed on all four wheels just across the railroad tracks on the south side of the highway.

Ex-Mental Patient Charged in Stabbings

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - A 300-pound recluse and former mental patient, claiming to be Hitler's son and father of the Dallas Cowboy cheerleaders and "Charlie's Angels." has been jailed without bond in connection with the brutal stabbing deaths of his parents.

Patrick O'Brien, 36, whom officials said had been committed and released from the San Antonio State Hospital eight times since 1965, was charged Thursday with two counts of murder in the slaying of William O'Brien, 66, and his 56-year-old wife, Mary.

Justice of the Peace Rudy Esquivel ordered the man held without bond.

The couple's slashed bodies, each stabbed "hundreds of times" with two steak knives, a screwdriver and an ice pick, were discovered inside their blood-spattered northside apartment late Wednesday night by their 24-year-old daughter, Peggy.

"He is a very, very sick man," Robert Pugh, head of the Bexar County Mental Health Department, said of O'Brien.

Clements Supports Floating Ceiling

AUSTIN. Texas (AP) - Gov. Bill Clements Thursday backed a proposal for a "floating" interest rate ceiling on home mortgages not to exceed 12 percent.

Clements reversed his earlier position of two weeks ago when he vowed to veto any bill raising the state's 10 percent limit to 12 percent.

"I can assure you that without Fannie Mae's action I would not have changed my position," the governor told a news conference.

The Federal National Mortgage Association, nicknamed Fannie Mae, said last week it no longer would purchase VA or FHA mortgage loans in Texas if buyers were charged the traditional "points" or special processing fees that exceeded the 10 percent usury limit.

Brezhnev's Health

May Delay Summitt

WASHINGTON (AP) - New reports that Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev is frail and weak have raised the prospect that his impending summit meeting with President Carter may be curtailed.

At 72. Brezhnev was said to be mentally alert in his recent talks in Moscow with French President Valery Giscard d'Estaing. But his many physical ailments were evident. U.S. officials were

The assessment here is that Brezhney cannot manage more than an hour's detailed discussion before tiring visibly. "If you tried to push him more than two hours, you'd be asking for trouble." said one U.S. official.

But the official, who asked not to be identified, said Brezhnev's stamina varies from day to day.

One indication of Brezhnev's slipping strength is that the struggle over succession already has begun in the Kremlin. The situation is said to be similar to the periods around the deaths of Lenin and Stalin.

The main purpose of the Carter-Brezhnev summit is to sign a U.S.-Soviet treaty limiting long-range bombers and inter-continental ballistic missiles.

Joe Gormley, leader of the National Union of Mineworkers whose strike brought down the previous Tory government in 1974, said: "Just when we have got things going right for Britain. we are changing horses in midstream."

Mrs. Thatcher got little or no sleep

overnight but appeared cool and crisp on her London doorstep at 9 a.m. to wave triumphantly to supporters. They offered her three "hip-hip-horray" cheers. She wore a blue two-piece suit and pale blue blouse

Dubbed the Iron Maiden by the Soviets for her tough stance on defense. Mrs. Thatcher has promised to curb the power of Britain's labor unions, cut income taxes and unshackle private enterprise.

And after five years of Labor's moderate socialist rule, the voters turned to the Conservatives for the answers to strike-plagued Britain's many problems.

The turnout was heavy 75.9 percent of the 41 million voters on a wintry, snowy day. That was 3.3 percent more than in the last general election in October 1974 when Labor took office with a slim three-seat majority.

Mrs. Thatcher, 53, is a country grocer's daughter who took university degrees in science and law. Callaghan. 67, is a sailor's son and long-time Cabinet member.

The campaign was an almost presidential-style contest, both parties

miles east of Dallas. Forney Police Chief Bondy Gichman said 30-40 homes had been damaged in Kaufman County at \$500,000.

DeSoto city officials estimated \$1 million damage to homes and \$200,000 to businesses.

A tornado that skipped through the Dallas subdivision of South Oak Cliff caused an estimated \$140,000 damage. At least 22 homes were destroyed and

50 to 115 damaged in the areas hit by tornadoes. More than 150 mobile homes were damaged or destroyed.

Numerous other tornadoes, heavy rainand large hail were reported in East Texas as the thunderstorms that spawned the tornadic activity near Dallas sped eastward. Flooded streets stranded hundreds of

National Weather Service to issue numerous severe thunderstorm and special marine warnings early today.

A flash flood watch remained in effect early today in Southeast Texas.

Bad weather ranged from the tornadoes and flash flooding to sub-freezing temperatures in northern sections of the Texas Panhandle. Dalhart reported a chilly 30-degree reading before dawn today, compared with a sultry 78-degree reading at Brownsville in the Valley.

Forecasts called for the thunderstorms activity to end statewide by afternoon. It was to be mostly cloudy and cooler today with a warming trend expected to begin from west to east today. Highs were to range from the middle

50s in North Texas and the Panhandle to the 80s in the Valley and in the Big Bend area of Southwest Texas.

The official rainfall amount in the Dallas-Fort Worth area was only 1.99 inches, but unofficial reports indicated some portions of the area got as much as nearly 10 inches of rain. Other amounts ecorded during the night included 2.29 inches at Longview, .82 of an inch at Corpus Christi and .99 of an inch at Victoria.

Brademas also predicted as likely a provision aimed at appeasing western states' House and Senate members by guaranteeing extra gasoline use is heavy - often because of long driving distances and tourism.

Brademas said various ways are being considered to permit changes designed to win support - including possible resubmission of the plan with

modifications. A 1975 law severely limits the possibility for amendment to the Carter proposal, Brademas said.

The rationing plan is seen only as a last resort during times of severe fuel shortages, such as another Arab oil embargo. The president says its availability is "imperative" for the nation's energy future.

The House Commerce Committee rejected the plan earlier this week, but agreed to send it to the House floor without a recommendation

Meanwhile, House Ways and Means Chairman Al Ullman, D-Ore., formally introduced Carter's "windfall profits" tax in the House Thursday.

But he said the plan is only "a starting point" and his committee may decide to strengthen it - as House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill has advocated.

Ullman announced hearings on the tax would begin May 9.

said. This job creation has occurred despite higher interest rates, which are intended to discourage business borrowing, and a dramatic drop in the nation's economic growth during the first three months of

But the economy, as measured by its gross national product, grew at an annual rate of only 0.7 percent in the first quarter of 1979 after a booming 6.9 percent annual rate in the final three months of

At the retail level, prices went up at an annual rate of 13.3 percent in the first

The Commerce Department announced Thursday that wholesale food prices declined in April for the first time in eight months. But the drop was not enough to offset hefty price increases in other goods

such as gasoline and home heating oil. As a result, wholesale prices in April rose 0.9 percent, the Labor Department reported. That works out to an annual rate of 11.5 percent. Labor statisticians said.

In other economic developments Thursday:

-The Commerce Department announced that the nation's trade deficit was \$6.2 billion in the first three months of the year, the lowest quarterly deficit in more than two years

.- The Federal Home Loan Bank board proposed modifications in its lending rules that could make it easier for mobile home buyers to get financing. The proposal would allow savings and loan associations to invest more of their assets in mobile home loans. The loans could be made for 20 years and could cover such fees as freight and set-up charges, the





Now, one week later, Ed announces that he is old enough to make his OWN decisions. He left the house to meet friends.



POULTRY .. Egg prices are attractive, along with turkey prices, especially on turkey parts. Fryer chickens have higher prices, but they are still a protein bargain, so buy extras and freeze for later.

Some markets offer boned chicken breast, but check the prices before buying. It may be more economical to bone chicken at home

PORK - Prices are a bit lower as supplies increase. More supply increases are expected later in the year forcing prices down even further. Specials include end and loin chops, quarter-loin cut into chops, rib-end roasts, frankfurters and liver.

Oilers Stress Defense In 44th Annual NFL Draft

HOUSTON (AP) - Houston Oiler defensive coordinator Ed Biles finally is back among the ranks of the Oiler decisionmakers in the National Football League draft after a two-year

Biles could have played dominoes throughout the last two NFL draft sessions while the Oilers searched the college ranks to compile a long list of offensive players.

But Biles returned to action Thursday when the Oilers, after trading away their first round selection, picked up a pair of beefy defensive lineman in the second round--Mike Stensrud of lowa State and Jesse Baker of Jacksonville State.

They are the type of people who will be hard to block coming through on the pass rush." Biles said. "They'll have a chance to develop into great defensive linemen in la Cedric Hardeman, Dwight White and L.C. Greenwood.

Biles projects the pair as able replacements for Houston's solid three-man front that now includes ends Elbin Bethea and James Young and middle guard Curly Culp.







DEAR DR. LAMB -Thank you for the fine advice to throw laxatives into bowels naturally. I did just that and I'm very grateful

for the advice. All my life I was taught to chew my food well to digest the sugars and starches. My daughter worked for a fine doctor until his death who advised this but my present physician says that this is not true - that the entire body handles sugar. Who's

New York doctor interviewed on TV about milk and he said milk caused gas in the upper digestive tract and often caused ulcers of the stomach. A woman asked him about mother's milk and he said not more

than for two years. I'm on a diet for diabetes and I'm supposed to use a half cup of milk four times a day with meals and with a bedtime snack. I asked the doctor if I should drop the milk and use calcium tablets and he looked at me crossly and said, "Drink your milk." What do you think? DEAR READER - First I

think you were very smart to throw away the laxatives. I'm sending you The Health Letter number 12-8, Laxatives, Enemas and Suppositories, to give you a complete understanding of this problem.

That doesn't matter too lar enzymes from the pan-

creas enter in the small intestine and break down all the starch and carbohydrates for you.

Perhaps one of the better reasons for chewing your food quite a little while is that it prolongs eating. People who wait long enough will find they're satisfied with less food and that sometimes helps avoid eating too many calories.

Now about milk. It's perfectly true that it can be irritating to the digestive tract in many adults." The milk sugar may not be absorbed and this may cause gas and diarrhea - symptoms very similar to those noted for spastic colon. That does not mean that milk isn't a good food or that people shouldn't use it. Milk is our major source of calcium.

Calcium found in some vegetables actually can't even be had no symptoms of difficulties from milk, I see no reason why you shouldn't continue it. You certainly
