### HEREFORD A HEALTH RESORT.

Sulphur Park to Become the Meca of Health Seekers—Hot Mineral Well a Possibility.

Geo. W. Irwin, Jr. spent a week in central Texas, visiting Fort Worth, Waco, Marlin, and other places. He reports that from Fort Worth to Waco, the crops are in fine condition and that the farmers are pleased with the outlook, though little wheat was made. He enjoyed his stay in the great health city of Marlin and says that more than 2,000 visitors are there each day. They come from all parts of the United States to try the magic waters of the famous hot wells. Marlin, once a mere village and trading post, has suddenly become a city, famous for her waters. Few people realize that Hereford could offer even better advantages to vacationists and health-seekers. Right here within easy

reach, there is stored in the bosom of the earth mineral waters of wonderful curative properties. Besides the strong sulphur waters, flowing cool from the earth, which we already have and enjoy, there is, without a doubt, deep within the veins of a lower stratum, water highly impregnated with medicinal properties. A deep well would demonstrate the statement to be a fact. That the Plains were once the bed of a great ocean basin filled with water charged with saline and other mineral substances and that this water by percolation carried the matter down to lower strata which are impervious to water, can hardly be disputed. All of us know that in Sulphur Park situated within a few feet radius, are located three springs all being different in temperature and mineral properties. This is only surface evidence.

The company who now owns the

Sulphur Park would do well to investigate the feasibility of establishing a summer and health resort on their property. A test well could be put down and if the stratum of mineral water was reached, the enterprise would at once become of general interest. The water already at the surface could be utilized, the grounds beautified, pavilions, cottages and homes erected and provisions made for the entertainment of visitors. The distance from the city would not deter in the least as a street car line could be projected. This also would be a paying investment. One great advantage Hereford would have over all other health resorts in Texas would be the cool summers. While the visitors at Marlin and Mineral Wells are sweltering in the heat, now, we are enjoying a low summer temperature during the day and the most delightful nights. The thermometer this week has not registered above 90. The high altitude and freedom from humidity are two other things which would be to the comfort of the guests. The BRAND does not give this simply to fill space. The visit of Mr. Irwin and what he said to a representative of the BRAND have been the prime causes for this article.  From Hereford Citizen at Battle Creek Keeps The Panhandle in Mind.  
 A personal letter from T. J. Graves to one of the publishers proves to be of such general interest that the Brand takes the liberty of giving it publication. In partial reply, the Brand assures Mr. Graves that his request for samples of grain will be complied with. His friends are pleased to learn of his rapid gain in health and that he is improving the opportunity of saying good word for the state and the Panhandle.  
 Battle Creek, Mich., July 18.  
 The BRAND:  
 We arrived here safely two weeks ago. Secured nice rooms convenient to the Sanitarium and are keeping house. I have improved so rapidly that my physicians think they will be able to cure me without an operation. I feel better than I have for

twelve months and will probably remain here until Sept. 1st. Battle Creek is a delightful city of twenty five thousand inhabitants and is generally known as the Breakfast food town, where Grape Nuts, Corn Flakes, Postum Coffee and many other foods are manufactured. The Postum Cereal Factory is the largest in the world and was quite a show to the children. There they turn out one package of Grape Nuts and one of Postum each second, 3600 of each an hour. If these products of the Plains can be made into breakfast foods rivaling corn and wheat flakes it is possible Hereford may have a breakfast food factory as well as a flour mill. If Mr. Smith has not already sent me the seed express me one-half bushel care of Sanitarium and I'll get test made by C. W. Post and Sanitarium. We all realize that a market for our products is the great thing needed and I promise you to do all I can to help make that market. Give my regards to all friends, yours truly,

**Former Kansas Farmer Talks About Alfalfa in the Panhandle.**

"Raising four crops a year of alfalfa on \$10 an acre land, is a money making proposition," said C. B. Anderson of Canadian, Texas. "But as big and unreasonable as that may seem, it is actually being done down there. A man who owns that kind of land can raise alfalfa, sell it every year and pay for the land every season, and have a nice amount of money left. That part of Texas has been very fortunate, and has produced good crops for several years. This year our crops look especially promising. Corn and forage are good, and in many places the wheat made 30 bushels to the acre. One year with another, that country is just as reliable as Kansas or Missouri. The grass is good now and stock is doing well. The corn crop, which is about made, will be all right." Mr. Anderson went to that country from Bigelow, Kan., about two years ago.—Kansas City Drivers Journal.

This Kansas farmer speaks the truth. He has no land to sell when four crops of alfalfa will bring him more than \$40 per acre on ten dollar land. Can this be done? Can it be done in the Hereford country? On the Sulphur Park farm, mention of which was made last week, at least four crops will be made this season. The first cutting made a little more than a ton per acre, the second cutting now being taken up, will make about one and one-quarter tons, and two more crops are assured if the winter does not set in too soon. But counting that only three crops could be saved, get your pencil and figure. Three crops with an average of 1 1/2 tons per acre will give just 3 3/4 tons. The market price of alfalfa is now \$18 per ton; then, 3 3/4 tons at \$18 will give a return of \$70 per acre. And this in the Panhandle, a country supposed to be fit only for prairie dog towns and an uninhabited

Time is a great arbiter—a tyrannical judge. Ten years ago a certain political party had for one of its cardinal principles the government ownership of railroads. The two great parties opposed vigorously such a doctrine, the leaders were buffeted, the rank and file were scoffed. Now comes the president from his study at Oyster Bay and proposes to recommend to congress a form of modified governmental ownership of the railroads. He is following as a model the German government. The president will propose that the government purchase stock in a number of the trunk lines of the country sufficient to gain some representation on the board of directors. This scheme is in accord with the utterances of Mr. Bryan that the government should exercise full control of the roads until the time of complete ownership arrives. This change of front on the part of both the great political parties seems strange to the friends of the departed Weaver. The bewhiskered Populists have been deprived of the last plank, sill and sleeper in their platform. Time has brought this unseemly change. The study of political economics under varying conditions have brought about the change. In the next presidential campaign the Populists can take their choice, whether it be Bryan or Roosevelt, and will still be in line with their platform demands. Will it not appear that the political millennium has come, to see the Populists and Democrats voting together in the Democratic states; and the Republicans and Populists in the Republican states? There is to be a readjustment of political lines within the next two years. The advance of the industrial, civic and political affairs of the American

government has brought about the necessity of a change in the attitude of the government towards the institutions of the country. Such changes are natural in republican forms of government; it is the result of growth and development. Time is a great arbiter—a tyrannical judge.

MANY of the metropolitan papers are making a great a-do about the movement of the Atlantic squadron and the order of the president that it proceed at once to the Pacific coast. To the Denver Post, it means a bluff to Japan; to other papers, a high-handed gallery play on the part of our chief executive. The BRAND does not believe that the United States, thru its war department, is making a demonstration of war nor offering a bluff to the little island government. The sensational dailies are stretching their editorial imaginations in seeing that Japan has designs upon the Philippines or any of our island possessions. The Japanese know that the great majority of our citizens were in sympathy with them in their unequal struggle with the Russians; they must remember that they owe much of their national progress to the American government, hence would not go to war over a matter that is purely local, as in the San Francisco school question. The BRAND believes in the superiority of the American people and in their ability to treat others with justice. Cunning Japan will not provoke war without cause.

TEXAS citizens are confronted with a peculiar situation in the new laws that went into effect July 12. As all know, ignorance of the law excuses no one, but inasmuch as the laws were not published and in the hands of the people before that date, some may have violated the most stringent laws unwittingly. The office of the State Department has been flooded asking for rulings and copies of the new laws. Judges and attorneys have crossed up in their interpretations so that the laymen hardly know "where they are at." The BRAND expresses the opinion that we are approaching a period of too much regulation. The autoist is prohibited from running his mashine at a high rate; the Mexican is prohibited from enjoying a rooster fight; the politician can not ride on a free pass, nor the thirsty traveler imbibe liquid refreshments on the train; the goods-box citizen must now support his wife and children or go to jail. The last legislature passed many good laws and made a good many mistakes. Time and experience will relegate to the rear all laws that are contrary to public policy, and in the end the State will enjoy its usual prosperity and happiness.

THE Hereford BRAND has changed hands, being now owned and edited by D. W. Hawkins and A. C. Elliott. Both of these gentlemen are well known in the Panhandle, Mr. Hawkins being former superintendent of Hereford schools and Mr. Elliott Ex-President of Panhandle Christian College. The paper under Mr. Ray was second to none in this country, and their initial work shows promise of an equally high standard under the new management. — Claude News.

located on the Cheateau grounds in cottage No. 41. This is almost at the foot of Green Mountain which is braced by immense rocks called the flat irons, and is a little over 8,000 feet above sea level.

Last Saturday, the 15th inst., was the excursion over the "Switzerland Trail" to Ward, a little mining town in the mountains, 26 1/2 miles by rail from Boulder, but only 18 miles by wagon road and about 12 miles on an air line. At 9:15 a. m., 192 people left Boulder on this excursion. The railroad from Boulder goes up Boulder Canyon and tributaries to Sunset, a distance of thirteen miles. At Sunset the road forks, one prong curves to the left and goes to Eldora, the other curves to the right and goes to Ward. From Sunset to Glacier Lake it is 1 1/2 miles by mountain trail and 13 miles by rail. We turned to the right and about one mile from Sunset began climbing the "Giant Stairway," which goes up and around the mountain side for about six miles to Mt. Alta, 800 feet above Sunset and you can look down and see five tracks, one above the other, over which you have come. We arrived at Ward at 12:30, 9,450 feet above the sea level, most of the party then climbed up the mountain to the snow banks and played snow-ball to their hearts' content. At 5:45 p. m. the whistle blew for the return trip, and about the same hour a heavy rain, almost a sleet and snow came up and as the observation cars have no windows to shut, we got the full benefit of the shower for about six miles. Along this line of road there are numerous mines of all kinds, the most noted are Wall Street, Elk Horn and C. & M. Twenty years ago the best engineers said these mountains were impassable, but later engineers performed the feat. At 6:40 we again reached Boulder, feeling that we had seen some of the grandeur and beauties of the "Rockies" and had some experience of the weather in "Kool Kolorado."

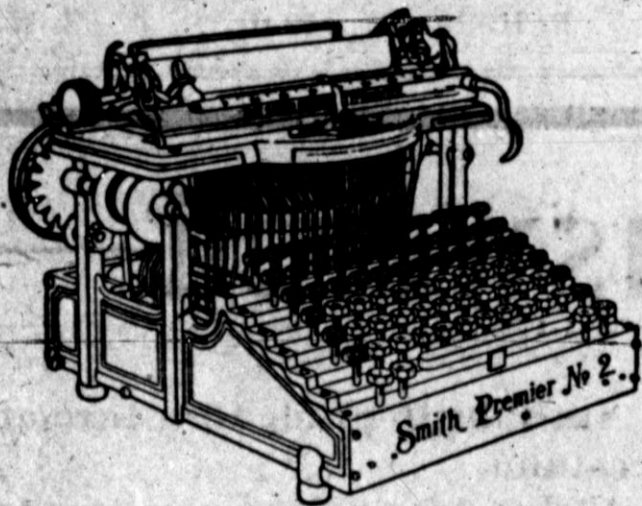

### THROUGH CALIFORNIA.

Judge Baker Tells of the Coast Country—Visits San Francisco.

The writer, in company with a friend and his family consisting of wife and two children, left Hereford on the 13th of June on a trip to California, Oregon and Washington and returned by way of Idaho, Montana, Nebraska and Colorado. It is quite difficult to form a just conception of the social, political and economic condition in any state while you are passing through it under lightning speed traveling by rail. Still more difficult is it for one to contrast with an impartial mind the economic conditions of his own state with a foreign state. It matters not how much we try it is almost impossible to divest his mind of preconceived notions, however, the writer will try to give a few impressions he received while visiting in California and contrast them with the same economic conditions he finds in Texas.

When one sits down in Los Angeles for the first time, the strongest impression made on him is the delightful climate of Southern California. The climate conditions of Southern California have been a great inducement to invite wealth to

Los Angeles and adjacent cities. If you will allow the writer to express his own opinion, he does not believe that the money could be made in California by the gradual process of developing the soil and producing the conditions by means of the slow progress of traffic and commercialism confined to California. But the money that is now in Los Angeles was made in New York, Chicago, St. Louis and other cities of our nation. Millions have been spent by wealthy people from the North to beautify Los Angeles and the adjacent sea-side resorts.

With all that money can do, and in conjunction with the delightful climate and the natural resources of the country, it is the Paradise of luxury and pleasure. Los Angeles this spring voted twenty-three million dollars in bonds for the purpose of constructing more perfect water-works in the city. But one soon learns before he spends an hour in that part of California that every convenience offered you and every display of beauty spread out before you, costs you money, to use a homely expression "Every time you turn around it costs you a quarter."

The next thing that impresses one strongly is the condition of social affairs of Southern California. If

one will allow the writer to express his own opinion, he does not believe that the money could be made in California by the gradual process of developing the soil and producing the conditions by means of the slow progress of traffic and commercialism confined to California. But the money that is now in Los Angeles was made in New York, Chicago, St. Louis and other cities of our nation. Millions have been spent by wealthy people from the North to beautify Los Angeles and the adjacent sea-side resorts.

San Francisco is another one of the cities we visited on our trip to the West. It makes your heart ache to fully take in the conditions of poor old San Francisco. The newspapers are inclined to suppress the real conditions that exist in San Francisco. I suppose it is largely attributable to their love for the city and to their intense desire to see San Francisco come out of its ruins. The writer has always had an admiration for the city of San Francisco, especially so, on account of the immense volume of business that has been transacted there; but notwithstanding his strong bias for San Francisco, it is the opinion of the writer that San Francisco will not rise above its disaster in twenty years. Many people who were worth forty thousand, fifty thousand and even two hundred thousand dollars before the earthquake are now entirely bankrupt and unable to rebuild. This the writer learned by inquiry and studying conditions while he was in San Francisco. The impression is made on the outside world that much of the ruined district has been rebuilt, if there is more than fifty houses completed in the ruined district the writer failed to see them. On many of the lots on which stood many fine buildings perhaps worth before the shock two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, including the value of the lot, one now sees a board bearing the advertisement "For Sale." The political and social conditions are even worse in San Francisco than the physical appearance. The readers of this article, I presume, will not object to a suggestion to the restless spirit who seems inclined to change his base of operation and who really believes that the good country is just ahead. That suggestion is "Where you are doing well, be satisfied with your present condition."

Texas today has the greatest opportunities and possibilities for enterprise, industry and economy, of any state with which we are acquainted. Our millions haven't been made yet. Tow-headed boys who now run our streets and bound around on the base-ball grounds of our state will some day in the future be worth millions of money, and they will make it by gathering the arteries of trade and husbanding the home possibilities of Texas. When the Panama Canal has been opened and the traffic of the East shall filter through the state of Texas, our state then will become one of the great financial factors of our nation. We have every climatic condition in the state, and soil equal to that in any of the Pacific or Western states. In all portions of our state all kinds of fruit and vegetables can be produced. We have all the minerals of any other state except gold and silver, we have our coal, granite quarries, marble quarries, oil fields, Orange and fig orchards, bananas, in fact anything that makes Southern California attractive is also here to make Texas attractive. When the enterprising and industrious people of Texas decide to spend their money to beautify her seaside resorts that California has spent, we will invite capital to our state as they have to theirs. The Panhandle has not only an ideal location for the farmer, but it can be made one of the great Boulevards for the wealthy man's automobile drives and other pleasurable attractions. Many other things we would like to say but the editor sagely suggested to the writer that he desired an article of just so many words, hence we had to take the hint and close for great content.
