While of late years our steers have not the weight formerly, they are in demand, for the weight made by the finished steer of about 1350 pounds is now much more desirable than the 1500 to 1800 pound beef steer which was formerly in demand, and there is never a surplus of any of the best brands of Panhandle steers of any age. Many have been contracted for spring delivery.
