SENATOR BALLEY

Announces Decision to Retire From Office Next Year-No Reasons Assigned.

From Daily News. Tex., Sept. 6.—Following Senator J. W. Bailey's announcement that he would not be candidate again for United States Senator from Texas, it was learned authoritatively today that the Senator expects to remove to New York where he will reside permanently.

There he will become a member of one of the strongest law firms in the country and will devote most of his time to the practice of corporation law. His income will be ten times that of United States Senator. name of the firm with which he will become associated has not been announced.

While Senator Bailey has not given definite reasons for his retirement, it has become known that during the last year he and other democration leaders in Washington have not been in accord over important legislation and much legislation has been enacted over his vigorous protest. Only a few months ago it will be recalled, he resigned from the Senate, but leaders of that body insisted upon including the recall feature in the Arizona constitution. Friends prevailed upon him to withdraw his resignation.

Senator Bailey's announcement came suddenly, and while it causes great disappointment to his friends great surprise.

The Senator has not said whom he will favor to succeed him and he may not make any announcement in this direction.

Soldier, Statesman and Lawmaker Who has Served Texas Long and Well.

Corsicana, Sept. 2.-Col. Roger Quarles Mills, ex-United States senator and Corsicana's most distinguished citizens, died at his home here this morning at 10:30. His son, Major Charles H. Mills, and daughter, Mrs. Carrie Wood of California were with him at the time of his death. His other daughter Mrs Fannie Richards is traveling abroad.

Colonel Mills was 79 years of age, being born in Todd county Kentucky, in 1832. > He came from Kentucky to Texas and stopped first at Palestine, the home in the early fifties of his uncle, Judge Reekan Reeves. His stay in Palestine was of short duration. He moved to Corsicana, Navarro county, where he ever since resided. He was a typical son of Kentucky, full stitution, well proportioned frame, a pleasing, intellectual face, prepossessing address, with an ambition to of his adoption. In his Corsicana home he industriously devoted himself to the profession of the law, and extended to many of the counties in the Thirteenth Judicial District. He He, characteristic of his Kentucky blood, took a keen interest in all the

being o fluent speaker, he embraced every opportunity to make his views known by public addresses. Being of the old Kentucky whig stock, he, on the first introduction of knownothingism, fraternized with this new party, more, the writer presumes because it was in opposition to the Democratic party, than from any conscientious belief in the correctness of its principles. During the short career of this party Mills had many an oratorical bout with its opponents, and in those contests he was a foeman worthy of the steel of any of them and none of them could boast of having lowered the plume of the gallant gentleman from Na varro. On the breaking out of the civil war he entered the ranks of the Confederate army and rose to the rank of colonel. He remained in the service during the entire war and was surrendered at Appomattox. At the close of the war he returned home, renewed his practice and helped to build up his devastated and impoverished country. 


Obituary.

The death of Emily F. James Mathis at the home of her only daughter, Mrs. N. H. Highsmith of Hereford, Texas, Tuesday, July 18, 1911, removes another and the last old land mark of the James family of Jamestown, Virginia. Her grandfather, Capt. W. M. James, first settled in Jamestown, and her father, Rev. W. M. James, was among the first settlers of Alabama. Her one sister and only brother were pioneers of Texas. They were born in Paladigger county, the brother in 1825, and the sister in 1830. Mrs. E. F. Mathis was born April 24, 1835, and had therefore reached the ripe old age of 76 years. To depict truly what manner of men and women they really were it is only necessary to give a simple statement of their brother's, W. M. James, public career.

Capt. James was a remarkable man. His character was moulded in the heroic, hardy, sturdy pioneer period of Texas. He was a man of the character of the times of Sam Houston, Three-legged Willie Rusk, Hemphill and A. J. Hamilton. His face and head, with its thick suit of hair tinged with gold, have a striking resemblance to John C. Calhoun, and his courage and determination were not exceeded by those distinguishing traits of old Hickory Jackson. With no school advantages he had reached his majority before he could read or write, but without aid and by his own endeavor, he succeeded in hammering out an education. For a time he taught school, and in 1850 he was elected justice of the peace in Madison county, his commission bearing the signature of Gov. P. H. Bell. In 1852 he was elected district surveyor for the Houston district. He was elected in 1854 sheriff of Houston county and his commission was signed by Gov. E. M. Pease. In 1862 he was elected district attorney and was elected to that office three times thereafter, in 1880, 1886 and 1892. His commissions for district attorney were signed by Governors Frank R. Lubbock, O. M. Roberts, L. S. Ross and J.S. Hogg. It was during the years of 1881-2 while district attorney that he made a state-wide reputation as a prosecutor. He succeeded in breaking up some of the most powerful bands of horse and cow thieves that were ever formed in Texas, convicting some of the most notorious criminals ever brought to justice in the state. At that time Texas was overrun with a lawless element which had given the state an unsavory reputation abroad and held the lives and property of our good citizens in a condition of dread and insecurity. The fearless and vigorous discharge of his duty at that time was of great value to this portion of Texas. Indeed his services in every position in which he was placed were rendered with great credit to himself and resulted in great value to the state. In all his public service no suspicion was ever cast upon his honesty or integrity while courageous and determined in the discharge of duty his heart was always filled with the "milk of human kindness."

There are thousands of friends and many relatives throughout Texas. Alabama and Mississippi who will be filled with genuine sorrow at the departure of the last surviving sister of Col. Washington M. James. Though she had drifted to the far west, she found hosts of hospitable friends who administered to her and the bereaved family in the last sad hours. They extend their best wishes to the good people of Hereford.



Out of his gnte comes Cap'n Miller; he's plumb forgot his cane: His crippled leg ain't hurtin' him now-he's a gray clad boy again; He loudly yells to Sargent Brummett, who sits dozin' in his door: For he's been prayin' hard to hear ole "Dixie" played once more. He beckons wild to Corporal Wright to make him hurry along. An' soon the crowd knows they're playin that gran' ole song.

There aint so many o' us, but we can make the welkin' ring. Some yells out Hooray! Hooray! an' some begins ter sing; The Cap'n hits some so hard they feel like they've had a beatin' Majah slaps his hands jes like it was a big campmeetin' Ole private Warren sets right down on anything that's nigh An' you had better turn your head or you will see him cry; For that is allus what he does, when in fancy he can see, The sufferin's of the vanquished hosts that follered Gen'l Lee.

The Cuhnel, he throws his hig hat way up in the air, An' uses every bit of breath that he has got to spare; An' little ole one arm Hainey-well, he cuts some capers too. He was as brave a "Reb" as ever faced a line of blue. "A way down South in Dixie", the music burst out gran' If you can keep from hollerin', you aint but half a man! Hooray! Plow Fire Guards.

This and adjoining counties are in great danger of fire. The heavy growth of grass this year makes the danger of a big prairie fire something fearful to contemplate. All remember the big fire of November 1906 when 3 million acres of grass were burned over and how the people of Hereford became frightened on account of the near approach of the blazing billows. A fire would be a great calamity to the stockmen and farmers, the loss of the grass being equal to the loss of a feed crop. Therefore every body should plow fire guards right now. Another thing which may make the danger of fire more certain is the presence of the tumble weeds. Let every one be careful about burning these weeds. Don't attempt to burn weeds on a windy day. One of these big tumblers might get away and start something that you couldn't stop. The railroad men burned weeds along the right-away last winter and they will use every precausion to prevent the engine sparks from firing the pastures. Let every body be careful. A few signs of warning put along the roads throughout the county and other counties might prevent some camper from leaving a fire which would become a burning brand in case the wind came up.

The Struggle for Power.

The outstanding ambition of the numan race today is power. Financiers. with the inventive genius of an Edison. are seeking to associate capita! in such way as to multiply power, Labor, with the mighty trend of a nation marshaling its army, is seeking to arrange its forces so as to increase power. To acquire the highest degree of efficiency in civilization, we must develop every pound of energy and power for usefulness there is in all things and multiply this power as many times as human ingenuity can devise, minimizing, as far as possible, the element of danger without weakening the source of power.

The problems in the industrial horizon today are gigantic and their sotution awaits the patriotic and careful consideration of men of noble minds and big hearts as they sit by the fire-


