

"The JA ranch didn't have any cattle on exhibition," said Mr. Walsh, "but the calves that won the Hereford sweepstakes were from JJ cows, which brand wealso own, and were exhibited by Bob Bishop of Tulia The shorthorn sweepstakes carload yearlings that won the first prize were bred by Col. Hughes from JA cows, so that taken as a whole we are perfectly satisfied with the results.

"The Texas cattle showed up well at this show; in fact Texas today has as fine cattle as any part of the country. Practically all the good bulls that were sold at the show were purchased by Texans and will be shipped to this state.'
