PEANUTS FOR HOGS.

Comanche County Farmers Finding Out Their Merits.

We quote this article from a Comanche county correspondent of the Dallas News. It tells a story that is new to most Texas farmers, which all should know, that peanuts are a fine hog feed, and very cheap. The correspondent writes:

J. S. Barmore, Jr., who lives near Mayfield, brought to town this morning eighty-nine hogs which he sold for the sum of \$775. He said that last spring he had 100 head of small hogs and planted twenty acres in peanuts. He has fattened the whole drove on the peanut patch without any corn, and sold the eighty-nine this morning for \$775 and has twenty-one more hogs at home for stock hogs and meat for next year. H. L. Atkison of the same community also sold a large drove today, and reports about the same success with his venture in the hog business. A negro by the name of Bunk Rosamond sold twenty-four head this morning for \$205, and said that there was no need for a negro starving in this county, lieve him perfectly honorable in all buswhen he could raise hogs on peanuts. It is true there is some trouble connected with hog raising, but there is also good money in the business.
