



City updating boards, okays NW water well

The process is now underway for updating Hereford's plumbing and electrical codes after action taken by the Hereford City Commission in Monday's regular meeting.

Both existing plumbing and electrical inspection boards had submitted requests to the commission asking for a reorganization of those boards.

"Why the change?" asked Commissioner Irene Cantu.

City Attorney Earnest Langley explained that plumbing and electrical codes are in need of updating. It was believed that changes in the size and make-up of the boards responsible for those codes should aid in the revision process.

Some of the electrical and plumbing ordinances currently on the books have been in effect since 1927.

Commissioners approved the request to alter the size and membership of both the Board of Electrical Examiners from three to five members including two master electricians, a journeyman electrician, a contractor and a member from the general public, and the Plumbing and Mechanical Board of Adjustments and Appeals was changed to six members.

The electrical board includes master electricians Chuck Laing and Lonnie Skelton; Joe Don Daniels, journeyman electrician; Fred Ruland, building contractor; and Joe Soliz Sr., for the general public.

Eventually, each member of the board will serve four year terms. To prevent the expiration of all five terms during the same year, commissioners drew names to determine one, two and three year terms on the board.

The plumbing board was expanded to a six member board. During the first term, three members will serve two years and three members will serve four years. Thereafter, each member will serve a four year term.

The new Plumbing and Mechanical Board of Adjustments and Appeals includes A.M. Hare and Eloy Baros, master plumbers; Raynold Herr, building contractor; Ramon Castillo, journeyman plumber; Don Vasek, air conditioner contractor; and David Hardegre, member of the general public.

Hardegre was appointed pending his acceptance.

On the Building Code Board of Adjustments and Appeals, Herb Delarosa was appointed to fill the seat of Ed Coplen, who resigned.

In addition to the restructuring of the board, the commission also approved a number of other recommended changes to the plumbing code.

House gives tentative OK to DSGH bill

Legislation that would enable Deaf Smith County Hospital District to expand its health-related services won tentative approval Monday in the Texas House, according to Rep. John Smithee, GOP representative for Deaf Smith and Randall counties.

A similar bill had already been approved by the Senate, and the differences in the bills will have to be worked out in a conference committee.

Smithee said one big difference in the House and Senate versions of the bill is that the Senate bill would disqualify doctors from serving as board members. The House added an amendment that would enable doctors to serve as directors.

"I did some checking on other districts, and disqualifying doctors as board members is very unusual," said Smithee. He said doctors are allowed to serve as board members in most hospital districts in Texas.

"My general feeling is that decision ought to be up to the voters," Smithee added. "If voters want to exclude doctors, they can."

The commission voted to change the name of the board to the Plumbing and Mechanical Board of Adjustment and Appeals. A change in fee structure was also approved including raising the fee for issuing a plumbing permit from \$1.50 to \$6.

"The \$1 fee started in 1927," said City Manager Darwin McGill. Prior to Monday's action, that fee had increased only 50 cents in 52 years.

A policy already in use was made official on Monday. Locations which have had gas service disconnected for a year or longer must be inspected before natural gas can be restored to that site.

Commissioners approved a recommendation that PVC pipe be forbidden for use in natural gas plumbing. Policy was also established concerning the placement of shut-off water valves on the property owner's side of city water meters.

Chief Appraiser Fred Fox submitted corrections to the city tax rolls which were discovered during a regular review of those records. Commissioners approved those corrections which included a reduction in tax rolls of \$3,732.46.

Commissioners also approved the removal of \$577.34 from the delinquent tax rolls. Those taxes are barred from the rolls because of their statute of limitations expiration dates.

A contract was awarded to Southwest Aerial Services, Inc. for aerial mosquito spraying. Southwest is the only area business which has the required equipment and permits to provide this service.

Cost of this service will be \$5,326 per application with the city and county dividing the costs according to the distribution of acreage sprayed.

The city engineer was authorized to prepare specifications and bids for a water well to be located near the intersection of Moreman and Kingwood. That well is to be placed on property owned by the Hereford Independent School District.

Funds had already been approved for the drilling of that well.

"If we're going to do it, we should do it now in anticipation of a dry summer," McGill said.

A right-of-way dedication was approved for a street to extend from Ranger on east between the Senior Citizen's Center and the Golden Plains Nursing Home.

Although the commission approved the dedication, it was with the understanding that Rick Brown, current owner of the property, clears all claims of easement rights prior to building the road.

Commissioners approved a contribution of \$2,000 to the Kids, Inc. baseball program.

The legislation was initiated by the board last year when directors were faced with some legal restrictions. One concerned the recruitment of doctors, and another related to expanding facilities.

Smithee said other provisions in the enabling legislation will allow the countywide district to acquire and manage other medical and health-related facilities and activities.

The House bill also would allow the district to:

- *Spend funds for recruiting appropriate qualified medical personnel.
- *Enter into contracts with fulltime medical or nursing students to pay tuition and other costs for continuing education.

- *Hold an election for the dissolution of the district upon petition by qualified voters.

- *Increase the number of directors from six to seven with staggered terms of office; and

- *Change the election date for directors from the first Saturday in April to the first Saturday in May.

Court upholds DSEC decision

The Seventh District court of Appeals has upheld a 1988 civil judgment in favor of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative against Melvin Lewis, and assessed additional penalties of \$1,310.85 against Lewis for undue delay of the case.

Lewis had filed suit against the utility in 222nd District Court here, disputing a claim in 1985 that he owed a \$13,000 bill to the cooperative. He was asked by a DSEC employee when he planned to pay the bill in October 1985, and Lewis

said he did not have the money because he only owed \$4,300.

The trial court found in favor of DSEC in last May's trial. Then, Lewis' attorney, Frank Gaston of Planview, filed for appeal but Gaston failed to appear for the

appellate court hearing.

"We can only conclude that this appeal was taken for delay and without sufficient cause... and we will award appellee (DSEC) ten percent penalty," wrote Judge John T. Boyd.

WASHINGTON - Ethics charges against House Speaker Jim Wright include new details about how he sold thousands of copies of his book, "Reflections of a Public Man," to special-interest groups, and several colleagues called the deals the most troubling of 69 charges against the Texas Democrat.

WASHINGTON - Failure to improve the U.S. educational system could saddle America's economy with "enormous long-term costs," the congressional Joint Economic Committee said today in its first bipartisan report since 1980.

VALDEZ, Alaska - Imagine a road from Los Angeles to Phoenix, Ariz., 30 feet wide and coated with 4,200 gallons of oily black slime per mile. Now slice the goo into 50 pieces and pour it over the remote beaches and coves of Prince William Sound. Exxon says it can all be cleaned up by the end of summer, but some state officials just smile sadly at the assertion.

WASHINGTON - Texas Democrats say an ethics committee report charging Speaker Jim Wright with numerous violations of House rules appears based on fragments of evidence that won't stand up to scrutiny.

FORT WORTH - Opinions about House Speaker Jim Wright and the ethics allegations against him fall on both sides of the political fence in his hometown, where residents are known for putting forth blunt opinions.

WASHINGTON - Rep. Ralph Hall says the ethics troubles of House Speaker Jim Wright have dealt a "hard blow" to Texas' hopes of convincing Congress to build the \$4.6 billion super collider south of Dallas.

BROWNSVILLE - Federal authorities say they have arrested a man and issued arrest warrants for two others in the growing international investigation of a cult of drug smugglers who allegedly slaughtered 15 people.

MATAMOROS, Mexico - Family members of two men whose remains were found on a communal farm disagree with police, who say the victims had connections with drug traffickers suspected of performing human sacrifices on 13 other men.

FORT WORTH - After a monthlong recess in the federal trial, a witness for Delta Air Lines has testified that the crash of Delta Flight 191 would have been even worse had the crew had aborted a landing attempt because of wind shear.

LUBBOCK - Two of the defendants in a real estate fraud trial issued instructions that financial statements in financing packages were to be falsified for purchasers of land along Interstate 30 who were in unound financial shape, a key government witness has testified.

BASTROP - Bastrop County authorities are continuing their investigation in to the shooting death of rare book dealer and publisher John Holmes Jenkins III.

IRVING - The Dallas Cowboys aren't scheduled to play here again for a few months, but Texas Stadium was a bustling place nevertheless as the IRS deadline approached.

AUSTIN - The state wildlife department should have new policies controlling game stocking on private property before yearly stocking efforts start in December, says the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission; It is "an insult" to victims for law enforcement agencies to require a lie detector examination before pursuing a sexual assault complaint, a lawmaker says; A bill authorizing the construction of pre-release facilities for state prison inmates will now go to Gov. Bill Clements for consideration; A bill tentatively approved by the House would provide an emergency \$100,000 allocation for research on killer bees, which are migrating northward and could hit South Texas late this year.

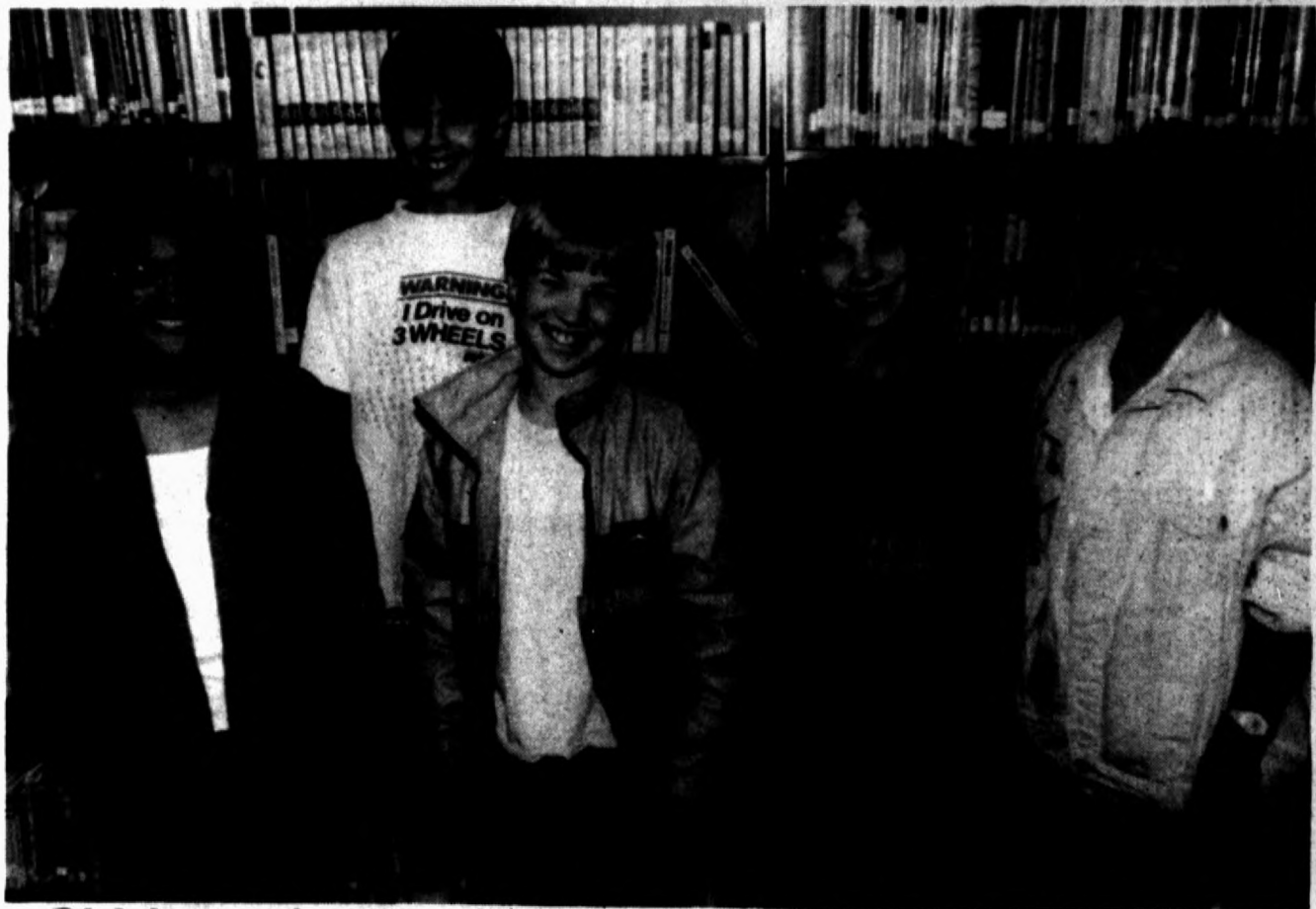

Education woes hurting economy

WASHINGTON (AP) - Failure to improve the U.S. educational system could saddle America's economy with "enormous long-term costs," the congressional Joint Economic Committee said today in its first bipartisan report since 1980.

America is falling behind the rest of the world in promoting literacy and job skills even though it already spends more money per student than any other country in the world, the committee said.

While the panel did not break any new ground in recommending solutions to education problems or others facing the economy, it was able for the first time in nine years to issue a bipartisan report, supported by both Democrats and Republicans on the 20-member committee.

During the Reagan years, the panel of senators and House members became a battleground of warring economic ideologies with Democrats and Republicans unable to reach any common ground.

Members of the panel gave credit for the show of unity to Rep. Lee Hamilton, the new chairman of the committee. Hamilton had pushed hard for a joint report as the proper congressional response to President Bush's calls for a bipartisan effort to address the huge federal budget deficit and the country's other economic problems.

Hamilton, D-Ind., said members of the committee agreed that the most crucial thing Congress and the administration need to do is address the federal budget deficit.

"Realistic and prudent budgeting should be our top economic priority," Hamilton said.

'Forbivorous' spelling wins regional bee

Casey Weiss of Randall County correctly spelling "forbivorous" and "excedent" to capture the championship of the Regional Spelling Bee Saturday on the WTSU campus.

The 11-year-old, a fifth-grader at Sundown Lane Elementary School, went 28 rounds of spelling to win the title over Amanda Medlock of White Deer and 43 other contestants. David Vermillion represented Hereford in the regional bee.

Weiss wins an all-expense paid trip for two to Washington, D.C. to compete in the National Bee. Brandon Henslee of Pampa was third, followed by Edythe Park of Plainview, Jamie Dunkin of Dumas, Anthony Tran of Amarillo, John Garten of Liberal, Kan.; Dara Boatman of Camargo, Ok.; Leah Rohrer of Buffalo, Ok.; and Shayna Sells of Forgan, Ok.

The report, however, did not provide any specifics on how the gap between revenues and spending should be narrowed.

On education, the report cited statistics showing that the country has an overall dropout rate of 25 percent, with rates for blacks hitting 40 percent and for Hispanics exceeding 50 percent. Partly as a result, approximately 13 percent of 17-year-old Americans cannot read, write or count, the report said.

The committee said "education is perhaps the most prominent area where our nation's shortcomings threaten to impose enormous long-term costs."

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Several of the sheriffs I visited with are reticent to express approval of the plan for fear that it might wind up making their lives tougher and their jails even more crowded with state prisoners. In light of recent TDC action restricting the number of prisoner our counties can send to TDC, I can't say as I blame them. I believe the new TDC admission plan was designed to relieve the major overcrowded urban county jails at the expense of rural jails.

I have pointed this concern out on several occasions to Senator Robert McFarland, R-Arlington, Chairman of the Senate Criminal Justice Committee. I believe that he understands the dilemma of our rural counties. He has assured me that he will work with me to include a provision in the criminal justice reform package that will mandate the new Department of Criminal Justice to base prison admissions on factors other than simply the number of prisoners a county has admitted in the past.

elements. First, we simply must create more capacity to house violent criminals. Today in Texas incarceration is simply no longer a deterrent to crime. Second, we must come up with creative alternatives to incarceration for non-violent first offenders. Third, early identification of those at risk of entering the criminal justice system will help get at the root causes of crime and not just treat its symptoms.

The principle feature of the plan is construction of some 10,800 new prison beds. These new beds would be financed through existing bonds that have been approved by the voters and an additional bond issue to be approved by the voters in November. The plan also envisions paying counties directly to house inmates in community facilities. The community programs would include drug counseling, education programs, community service and other work programs. These new facilities, when combined with provisions that would grant the judiciary greater latitude in sentencing, would allow for cheaper, less restrictive and more rehabilitative alternatives to incarceration. If that does not work, prison would be the next option.

A series of measure supported by Lt. Governor Hobby make up another major element of the criminal justice restructuring plan. These measures are all directed at an attempt to keep kids in school. As I have often said, two things happen when a kid is in school. One, he is not out on the street stealing hubcaps, and two, with each day he is in this structured environment he is statistically less likely to turn to criminal behavior.

In what I believe is one of the most positive aspects of the plan, the Texas Department of corrections, the Board of Pardon and paroles and the Adult Probation commission would be reorganized under a single agency called the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. This move combined with significantly improved computer tracking of criminals, will result in a more efficient and economical way to deal with criminal justice in Texas.

One aspect of the proposal that is criticized by some is merging the duties of adult probation officers and parole officers. The parole officers that argue against this claim there would be a local bias on the part of probation officers. I disagree. I think that is a positive step as opposed to a negative one. Furthermore, the plan envisions significant case load reductions for these new probation/parole officers. The idea here, of course, is to allow probation and parole to have more teeth. As it stands now, a monthly check-in with your probation or parole officer is often the extent to which either of these systems work.

A *Miracle in the Wilderness* was the book reviewed by Ruth Fish for Veleda Study Club members during their recent meeting.

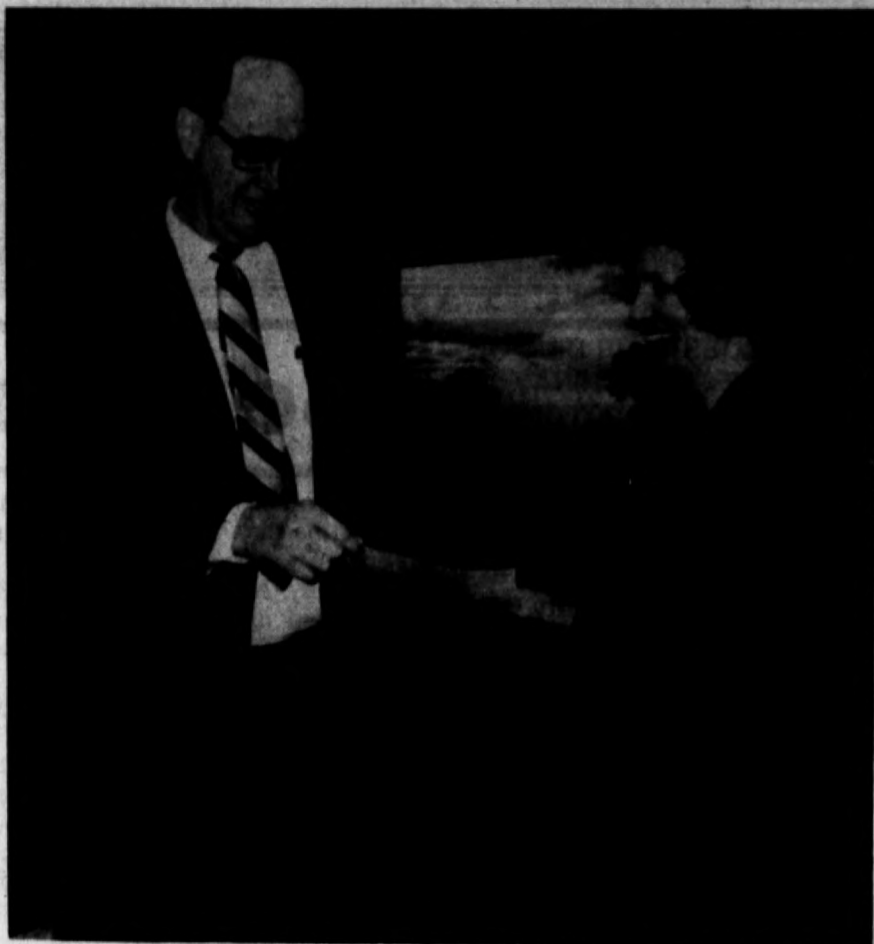
