1400 PERSONS

Passenger Ship, Titanic, Collides With Iceberg and Sinks-Only 700 Saved.

Out of a total passenger list of ver 2,000 persons, including the crew, only about 700 are reported to have been saved. These were transferrd to the Carpathia, which answered the distress signals. Most of the saved are women and children. The giant ship with its load of human freight was on its first trip and was expected into New York this week. When in the iceberg field, 400 miles off Newfoundland, a huge iceberg crashed into the ship and she foundered. According to the news dispatches, there were enough life boats to save one third of those aboard. In three hours after the collision, no trace of the ship could be found. Many notable and famous persons were on the illfated ship. William Stead, the noted journalist, Major Butt of the U.S. Army, F. D. Millet, famous French artist, John Jacob Astor and his

The ship was the largest ever built and every modern convenience had been arranged for the comfort and safety of the passengers; but it seems the owners and builders overlooked the necessity of life-boats. Boss Rule Vs. Rule of People. In refusing to provide for a primary for the selection of delegates to represent Texas in the Democratic convention at Baltimore the Executive Committee placed itself on record as favoring boss rule against the rule of the people. Of course the Committee claimed that it could not be done under the provisions of the Terrell Election Law, but that is a favorite resort of politicians when something objectionable to them is proposed. Nobody was fooled by their quotations from the law and constitution because it was done only to conceal the real reason for refusing to let the Democrats of Texas express their choice for President. The truth is, most of the men who voted to have the delegates to Baltimore selected by the bosses instead of the people are supporting candidates for the nomination whose only hope of capturing the Texas delegation lies in star chamber conferences. It is significant that the men who opposed the presidential primary are to a man opposed to the nomination of Gov. Woodrow Wilson, who is apparently the strongest candidate in Texas. - Vernon Record.

Willingham moved a four-room residence with a porch across one end, from one half mile east of Vega to three miles north of Yarnall, a total distance of about sixty miles. 


