## SENATOR'S RACE STILL UNDECIDED

Both Slaton and Johnson Claim Victory—Will Take Final Count to Decide.

In a phone message from W. A. Johnson of Memphis this morning at 11 o'clock to this office, he claims that he has won the race by a plurality over Slaton by 1800 votes. When seen Mr. Slaton said "I believe I've got him yet; but a final count will show who's the man."

Mr. Johnson said that he had reports, some complete and some partial, from 32 counties and that it showed him in the lead 1154 votes over Mr. Slaton. Seven counties held no election and 10 were unreported.

Taking all the reports available, the count shows Johnson in the lead 994 votes.

There are no reports from 15 counties.

Mr. Gough's vote is not given as full as the others for the reason that Mr. Johnson did not tabulate his vote, from whom The Brand received a part of the information. As far obtainable Mr. Gough's vote is given. A complete vote will appear next week.

Oh, yes! the polls are about to be closed and are now closed!"

These contestants met in the end of the day's battle and were friends. A good lesson to all who have engaged in this bloodless contest of ballots.

### City Election.

On account of the election of J. H. Head as mayor this made his place on the board of Alderman vacant. In consequence, an election has been ordered to fill his unexpired term.

The election will be held tomorrow, Saturday, July 30. R. E. Cook has been appointed election judge and the polls will be open at the court house.

## NURSERY SALES EXTRA LARGE

Over 150,000 Trees Sold Past Season of 1909-1910 Is the Report of Nurseryman Landrum

In conversation with L. P. Landrum of the Hereford Nursery, it is learned that the sale of trees, shrubs, vines, etc., of the year ending June 1, exceed 150,000 plants, divided as follows:—Fruit trees, 62,200; grape vines, 10,000; forest and shade trees 23,700; nut trees, 240; berries, 58,500; total 154,640.

This is certainly a fine showing for the nursery business of Hereford. Orchardists have been convinced that the soil is eminently fitted for all kinds of fruit and barring the late frosts which nip the crop too often, the fruit growers have little with which to contend. There are no pests and insects of consequence, the trees are free from ravaging diseases. As to the late frosts, that calamity should not visit this section with damaging effect any more, as the orchard heaters will prevent the loss of the crop. Wherever tried this method proves effectual, and next spring every orchard owner will be prepared to head off "Jack Frost."

## CLUB DIRECTORS HOLD SESSION

Authorize Payment of McDonald's Contract—Wells Prove Abundant Water Supply

At a meeting of the directors of the Commercial Club Wednesday afternoon a resolution was introduced authorizing the payment to D. L. McDonald on a contract which he had with the Club. This contract pertains to the sinking and operation of two test wells upon the consideration of \$3000 to be paid by the Club. This fund was subscribed by various citizens and about \$1,100 has been paid in. This was turned over to Mr. McDonald and the balance will be collected as soon as possible. The directors urge that all who subscribed to this fund, please pay into the treasurer at once. Eli Dunlap is treasurer.

The two wells have proved to be all that was expected of them. The south well has been pronounced by experts as an extra good one. The north well is still undeveloped but indications are that it too will prove good. Both wells indicate that Hereford has an abundant water supply. A number of land owners are figuring on putting down wells. The question of power is the important thing. Some think electric power will be the most economical.

### Mother Dead.

Mr. and Mrs. D. O. Stallings of Bovina who formerly resided in Hereford passed through on the morning train Wednesday enroute to Tulia in response to a message stating that Mr. Stallings' mother, Mrs. J. T. Stallings had passed away on Tuesday.

## UNION REVIVAL OPENS SUNDAY

Large Tabernacle 80 x 100 Feet Ready for First Service Sunday Morning.

A choir platform 24 x 60 feet occupies one side of the structure. Seats have been built and provision made to take care of the large crowds to hear the famous divine, Rev. Jno. B. Andrews of Arkansas. Prof. R. E. Huston, a noted singer and chorus leader, will have charge of the song service. A chorus of 100 voices will be called in.

The revival service will begin Sunday. All the churches will cooperate in the services. The usual Sunday School services will not be dismissed but the night services at all the churches will be suspended, and all christians will join hands and hearts in this religious work. Pastor Story of the Methodist church anticipates a spiritual feast.

### Electric Mill.

The enterprising firm of Jarrott & Wilkinson has installed an up-to-date coffee and grain mill, same to be operated by electric power. The motor is connected direct to the two mills one on each end of the shaft. On one coffee and other grains will be granulated, on the other sugar may be pulverized and spices ground. The mill will also be used to grind wheat into graham flour and milo maize into milo flour. The last named cereal is just coming into prominent notice as a bread substitute or rather as a good bread maker. Those who have tried milo pronounce the loaf good. The entire machine is a model of convenience and mechanical construction.

The uncultivated area of Texas exceeds the total area of the thirteen original colonies excepting Georgia and North Carolina. The uncultivated area of Texas exceeds the total area of all states bordering on the Atlantic Ocean from Maine to North Carolina inclusive. The uncultivated area of Texas can support all the people in the United States using as a basis of calculation two acres of cultivated land per capita which is the world average. This land is not lacking in fertility but in farmers to cultivate it. If all the people in the United States were to move to Texas our population would be less per acre than that of Massachusetts. 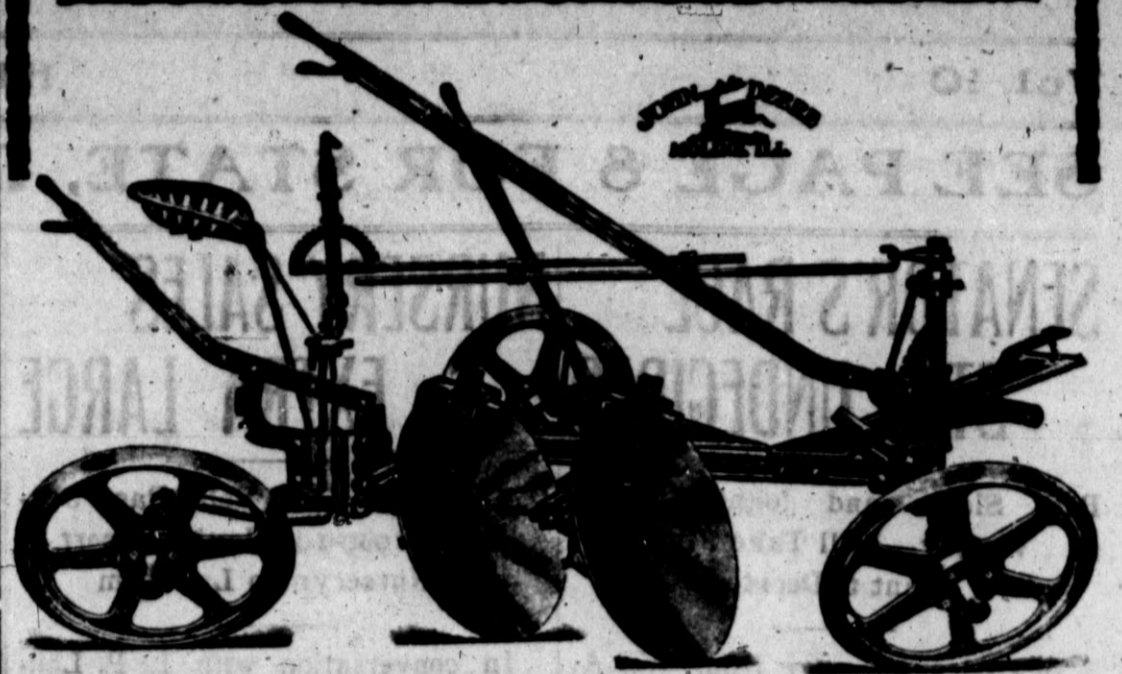

**The Cow Man's Friend.**

She might establish such a claim by calling attention to the fact that from her product and from carcass man manufactures more of the necessities of life than from any other similiaa source. She furnishes these necessities to him from infancy until such a time as temporal things are no longer associated with his existence, and she does it ungrudgingly and constantly.

In addition to contributing to man's necessity and his pleasure, the prosperity of an agricultural community is more closely identified with her than with any other of the domestic animals. The horse is quite essential in tilling the soil, but where necessity requires it the sturdy son of the cow can take his place, as he has done in every agricultural section on earth. The horse can only furnish labor and can only return a profit to his owner when conditions are right for returning satisfactory grain crops. It is a well known fact that the dairy cow is the salvation of the farmer in times of poor crops as she is able to convert the rough crops which are never a total failure, into dairy products which always have a cash value.

In addition to this she furnishes skim milk and butter milk for the calves, pigs and poultry and fertility for the soil, without which a farm becomes less valuable each year and the whole country less prosperous.

The elimination of the dairy cow would necessitate an almost revolutionary readjustment of man's tastes and requirements. It would mean untold suffering and hardship. Of course she will not be dispensed with but her value can perhaps best be appreciated by contemplating such a loss.

She will continue to be man's best friend as long as the human family exists and will keep on supplying him with his greatest needs just as she has done through all the ages.

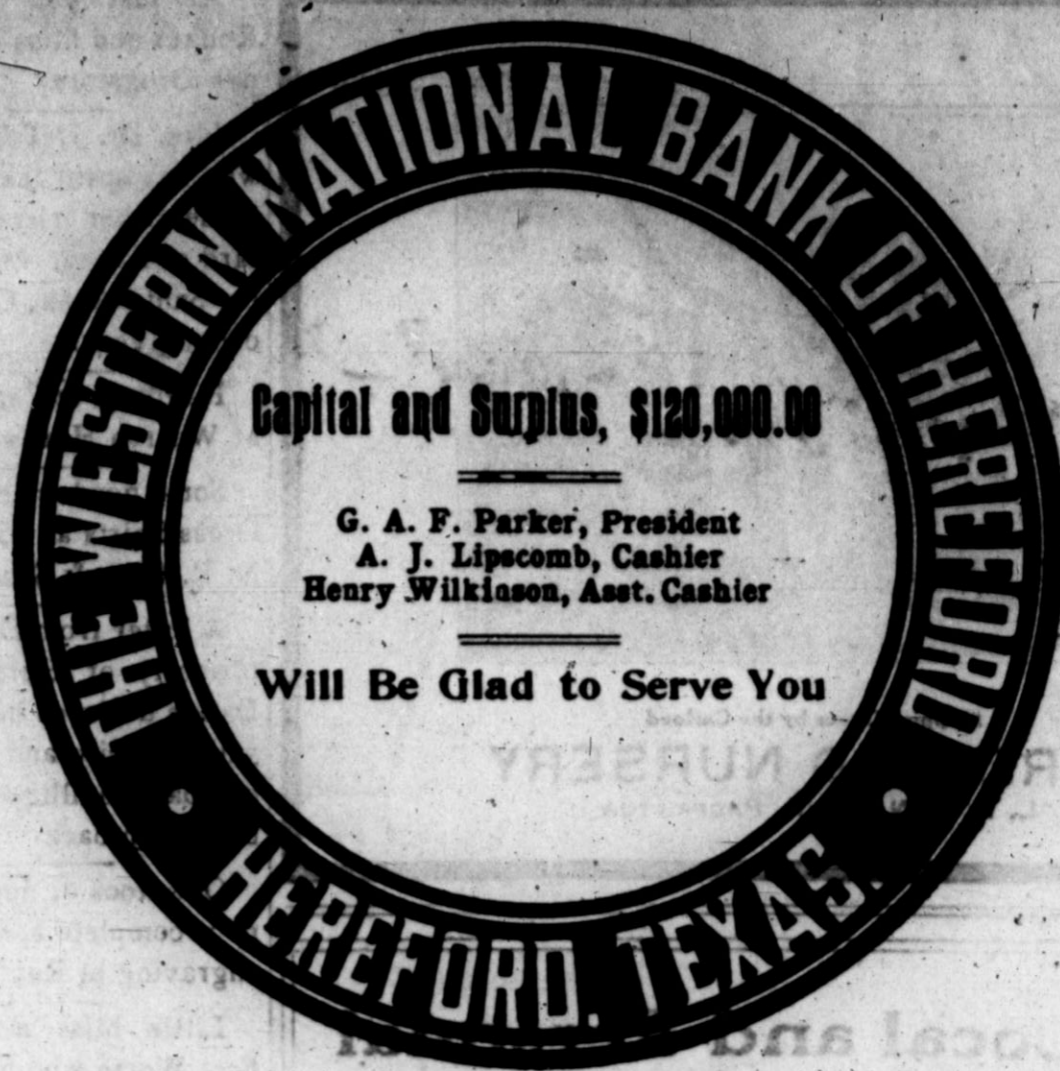
## MISS CLYDE WILSON ENTERTAINS.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a Home for Wives and Widows of Confederate Soldiers and Sailors.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7.**

Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION I. That Section 51 Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to march 1, 1880; provided said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose herebefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provided further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SECTION II. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of the State officers, in November, 1910.

The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.
