A Little Scheming Beats the Beef Trust-Names and Dates Supplied on Demand.

If a man was robbed in Kansas City, Mr. Neff, mayor, and proprietor on the side of the Drovers' Telegram, one of the best market stock papers, would call out all the machinery of the police department of which he is ex-officio head, to arrest the robber.

The whole stock yards, packers and all connected with the yards in Kansas City, are worse than hold-ups.

The why and wherefore of the above is that the best fat cows of the Panhandle have been bringing \$2.50 @ \$2.60 as the highest price in Kansas City and St. Joseph.

Last week three loads of cows slipped by Kansas City and St. Joseph and went direct to Chicago with the instructions to the commission house in Chicago that the buyers were not to know whence these cattle came. The result was \$3.35 per cwt., which shows that the producers are being robbed of about \$4 per head on nearly all cows shipped from the Panhandle, or about \$50,000 per week, which amounts to several millions in a

Of course the men who thus rob the producer are honorable men and gentlemen, and call it "legitimate business," but the trouble was that these cattle slipped by the legitimate channels so that they could not be spotted, and the poor producer robbed the packer.

The aerator is the coming dairy utensil. Cannot afford it? How many cans of milk spoiled through the heat of some July night would it take to pay for the aerator? Sometimes we cannot afford to go without the best there is in the line of dairy and farm equipments.

If you let the young stock stop growing you may not be able to figure up your loss in dollars and cents, but you may be sure it will not be a trivial matter to deal with. All the rest of an animal's life is determined by the treatment it received before it is two

Calves being raised on skim milk should be fed ground feed, not in the milk, but dry, so that it will be mixed with the saliva. They should have access to oats, wheat, bran, clover hay or alfalfa, as soon as old enough to learn to eat it.

Tell those fellows who are quarreling over whether to have the cow's teats wet or dry while milking that if they would try greasing them with a little fresh lard in winter, or tallow in summer, they would milk with neither wet nor dry teats, but greased, and the cow's teats would not be warty or sore, either.

Temper in a man answers to temper in edge tools. A man destitute of that heaven-born principle would find it rather difficult to handle all difficulties without the correct temper. No man or woman, boy or girl, ever inherited too much temper, grit or spunk. The great trouble has always been the controlling of it. 
