Use Steamed Bone Meal A good many farmers are putting bone meal on their lands at the rate of 200 pounds to the acre, for the
purpose of restoring the phosphorus. Many of them are, however, making the mistake of putting on raw bone meal instead of steamed bone meal. In all cases the steamed bone meal
should be used, as it is as rich or should be used, as it is as rich or
richer in phosphorus than the other kind and costs less. This lessened cost is due to the fact that the bones get the value of the nitrogen they contain. All the phosphorus was left in, and that is what the farmer is principally after when he buys bone
meal. Professor Hopkins and other experimenters are continually calling the attention of the farmer to this matter, but there are many that seem to pay no heed and go on buying the
more expensive kind. This is a case where the cheapest is the best.

A Stranger's Opinion of Our County

Representative of Farm And Ranch Throws a

verdure, and field crops, fruits and flowers were flourishing alike in Below the plains, the crops are somewhat more varied than in the ing is becoming an important in dustry; wheat oats and rye have proved more certain, so far,
their yields, and a greater number of cróps have been tested. The population is greater and more ex perimental farming has been done than in the extreme northwester part of the state. Water is nearer the surface than in the higher plains country and throughout the "rainbelt" can be secured by sink ing wells from 25 to 200 feet
There is a breeze at all time There is a breeze at all times raise the water, so that, practically each home has its own waterwork system.
Hall and Donley counties ar very much alike in soil and pro ducts and the two may be well con sidered together. Each produces fine cotton, wheat, corn, oats, milo maize, kaffir corn, sorghum, millet and fruits, vegetable and berries in great abundance. Alfalfa is growing rapidly in favor, and some of the finest alfalfa fields I have seen this year were in Donley county grown without irrigation. Alfalfa in this section can be cut from two to three times during the season and the annual yield for the past two years has been from three to
five tons per acre. Corn, of either five tons per acre. Corn, of either
the common Indian or the June the common Indian or the June
variety, yields 20 to 40 bushels per acre; oats, 30 to 50 bushels; cotton produces $1 / 4$ to one bale per acre; sorghum, 4 to 6 tons; kaffir corn and milo maize yield 30 to 50 bushels of threshed grain, in addition to the roughage used for stalk field pasturage. A very large part of the kaffir corn crop is never threshed, but is used for cattle feeding on the farms where it is grown, for this is a splendid cattle growing country. Years ago it was exclusively given to cattle growing, but as Col. T. S. Bugbee president of the Panhandle Cattlemen's Association, remarked to me: "The cattle men were driven to farming in self-defense." One acre under cultivation, he stated,
was worth 40 acres of grass for
stock raising purposes. About five years ago Col. Bugbee put 10 ment.
