Candidates Now Getting Down to Real Work in Trade Campaign -Heaviest Vote Polled.

The largest vote polled in any one week during the Contest was found when the count was made last Monday morning by the committee. This large vote, no doubt, was occasioned by the lively and earnest work on the part of all the candidates, some of whom surprised even themselves in the result. Mrs. Bell and Miss Davidson again changed places, the first leading with 221,585 votes. Miss Eddith Smith, by hard law. 
State Political News.
