Work on Christmas Day 'just part of job'

Working on Christmas Day is just part of the job for some people.

Capt. Ray Morgan of the Hereford Police Department says he has worked Christmas Day for about 23 years, either on full-time or on-call duty.

His wife, Doris, is also on call with the ambulance crew

"Our family's got an agreement," Morgan said cheerily. We understand these things. It's our job, our living. That's how we buy our presents."

Morgan said the policemen all accept it as part of the job and don't bellvache much because they get a day off later for compensation, since they are city employees and are allowed the same number of days vacation.

The captain said time is pretty flexible on Christmas. Patrolmen may remain on call while spending an hour or so with family.

Morgan recalls one Christmas he was home for about an hour to open presents. Mrs. Morgan got an ambulance call and didn't return for several hours. Morgan went back to work and the whole family just waited until everyone was home at about 7 p.m. to continue the celebration.

Sgt. David Wagner said working Christmas - and he will be - has its good points and bad points.

'You get kind of used to it, though sometimes it's kind of disturbing when your family is meeting somewhere," he said. "It's hard at first, you have your doubts if you are in the right profession.

Snow, high winds menace Christmas holiday travelers

A "life-threatening" storm packing heavy snow and high winds menaced Christmas travelers as it crossed the Continental Divide Friday and took aim at the Midwest, while tornadoes spun across

The storm dumped up to 13 inches of snow on the foothills near Boulder, Colo., and winds gusted to 50 mph as it moved into Wyoming.

"It looks like the snow will spread over much of the central Plains region by late today," said National Weather Service Forecaster Hugh Crowther in Kansas City. "It should be a white Christmas from western Kansas and eastern Colorado to Minnesota.'

The winter storm, which pushed east Thursday into the Rockies from the Pacific Coast, has already caused 14

the lower Mississippi Valley, weather-related deaths and injuring at least three dozen briefly blacked out hundreds of thousands of homes in California, Arizona and Nevada.

> Crews at Denver's Stapleton International Airport struggled to keep one runway clear of the snow, but United Airlines, which estimated today's passenger load at 15,000 people. suspended all flights until at least midaftternoon. Northbound traffic on Interstate 5, the main Pacific Coast highway between Mexico and Canada, was halted late Thursday at the California-Oregon border because of traffic accidents caused by snow, authorities said

Pilgrims gather at Bethlehem

trickled into Manger Square armed Israeli troops today to celebrate the 16th Christmas Eve in Bethlehem under Israeli occupation.

The recession and the Lebanon war prompted a 40 percent drop in pilgrim traffic, with 25,000 expected in the Holy Land this year.

The first pilgrims congregated in the square outside the Church of the Nativity, traditional site of Christ's birth, to await the arrival of the Latin Patriarch, Msgr. Giacomo Giuseppe Beltritti, from Jerusalem.

The square, a parking lot for most of the year, was cleared of evehicles and bedecked with streamers, colored lights and a Christmas tree.

The Israeli army laid on its usual heavy security to prevent Palestinian guerrilla attacks or demonstrations against the Israeli occupation of the West Bank of the Jordan River.

Bethlehem Mayor Elias Freij said that instead of his customary Christmas message, he was issuing a verbal plea for an end to what he called "Israeli colonization of the West Bank."

He said he was using the Christmas spotlight to send "an SOS to the world. The Israelis are taking our land, pushing us Arabs into ghettos and building settlements."

Boy killed, stepbrother injured in fire

WACO, Texas (AP) - Investigators searched today for the cause of a fire that swept through a garage apartment, killing a 17-month old boy and critically injuring his older step-

Danny Dean Sasse was pronounced dead late Thursday at Hillcrest Baptist Medical Center, said Justice of the Peace Joe Johnson.

The infant suffered from burns and smoke inhalation, "but I rather imagine the principal cause of death was smoke," Johnson said.

Ray Eugene Lord Jr., 3, who was pulled from the burning apartment by firefighters, was hospitalized in critical condition with second- and third-degree burns, authorities said.

Two passersby reported the fire, which broke out about 8:45 p.m., investigators said.

The dead child's father, Larry Sasse, told firefighters that he had fallen asleep earlier in the evening and awoke to find the bedroom ablaze.

Sasse's beard was singed and he suffered minor burns to his hands when he threw a burning counch cushion out the front door, according to authorities.

The blaze apparently began on the couch, said fire investigator Walter Stovall.

Sasse's wife was away from home at the time, authorities said.

The apartment landlord, Bob Nagel, said the fire was the second at the residence in the past two months. Cigarettes were blamed for the earlier blaze, which caused about \$2,500 in damage, he said.

State suspends four welfare workers

DALLAS (AP) - Four employees of the Texas Department of Human Resources have been suspended without pay following allegations they stole toys intended for needy children, a department spokesman said.

The four were accused of stealing or aiding in the theft of an unknown number of toys from the Division of Child Protective Services, said John Polk, an assistant regional administrator for the state welfare

The department refused to release the names of the employees, but Polk said they included a secretary and a senior social worker.

Since 1970, the division has collected toys from corporations, civic groups and citizens and distributed them to needy or abused children on the department's case rolls, according to

Supervisors were alerted to the thefts Dec. 17, when one of the accused asked another employee to join the scam, Polk said Thursday. Instead, the woman reported the offer to a supervisor, he said.

The four were suspended this week after supervisors conducted interviews, Polk said. No criminal charges were expected to be filed, but the employees face punishment ranging from reprimands to firing, he said.

"I hate to see something like this happen," Polk said. "We depend on the generosity of people, and it doesn't take much to dry it up.'

Court throws out indictment against immigration inspector

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - A federal appeals court has thrown out a new and expanded indictment issued against an immigration inspector at Eagle Pass, Texas because the addition of a charge could be seen as vindictive.

In a 2-1 split, a three-judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said Thursday the new charge added to an indictment against Herman V. Krezdorn could be viewed as vindictiveness on the part of the prosecution.

Therefore, the judges said, the indictment was unconstitutional.

The opinion said there was

.10 evidence of vindictiveness. Still, the court said, what mattered was the defendant's view.

"Since our focus is on the defendant's perception rather than the prosecutor's pure heart," it is up to the prosecution to prove that the new indictment was based on previously unknown facts that changed the situation existing at the time of the original indictment, the opinion added.

Krezdorn, a federal immigration inspector, was accused of forging about 300. border crossing cards for Mexicans. He was convicted on four counts of forging immigration documents, but the 5th circuit later reversed the conviction.

In dissent, Judge John Brown of Houston said the opinion makes no sense because no vindictiveness was shown to exist.

Brown said the opinion creates precedent that will "foreclose for all time the prosecutor's option to bring additional charges against a criminal defendant who has been successful on appeal unless it can be shown that the new charges arise from facts totally different from and unrelated to those upon

which the original indictment was based."

The reversal said Assistant U.S. Attorney John Murphy erred in introducing evidence of 32 other instances of forgery that were not

specified in the indictment. The superseding indictment named the four counts on which Krezdorn had been convicted, and added a charge of conspiracy to forge immigration documents.

Dog pack kills child

PAOLI, Ind. (AP) - The family of a 10-year-old girl who was killed by a pack of dogs decided not to ask that the dogs' elderly owner be sentenced to jail, and he was fined \$500.

Clifford Bird, 72, pleaded guilty, to criminal recklessness Thursday in Orange County Circuit Court after the prosecutor and the family agreed not to press for a jail term. He could have receved six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine.



Digital guitar has odd sound

NORTHAMPTON, Mass. (AP) - Pat Metheny shook back his shaggy hair, as his fingers spidered along the neck of a stringless guitar.

The undulating melody he produced rode above the hollow, plodding acoustic bass, its player invisible on a darkened stage

Two spotlights converged on Metheny, his lips pressed in concentration as he sat and carefully placed the tips of his fingers onto small strips of metal that glowed on the instrument's neck.

"This strange-looking thing is a digital guitar," Metheny told the audience, whose initial murmurings evaporated as tones sounding more like a vibraphone than a guitar filled Green Hall at Smith Col-

'It's kind of a weird thing," he said of his instrument, a computer-based guitar with metal touch-plates and plucking bars instead of frets and strings. "Some nights it sounds better than others, but I'm feeling kind of brave

The guitar is the latest experiment in the career of Metheny, a musician known for carrying jazz beyond its traditional confines by fusing melodies drawn from jazz, rock 'n' roll and Third World music into acoustic, electric and electronic textures. It was built by Oncor Sound of Salt Lake City, and was

adapted for use with a digital synthesizer by New England Digital Corp. of White River Junction, Vt.

Metheny, a 28-year-old native of Lee's Summit, Mo., entered the world's jazz elite in an unorthodox way. He had been teaching guitar at the University of Miami, in Florida, when he met vibraphonist Gary Burton at the Wichita Jazz Festival in

He asked Burton if he could sit in on a few tunes.

Burton agreed and later arranged for Metheny to become a teacher at Boston's Berklee College of Music. He was 19 - the youngest instructor in the school's history. Soon, he was invited to join the Gary Burton Quintet.

The Pat Metheny Group was formed in 1977, marking the young guitarist's departure from the quintet and Burton's musical influence.

Metheny still plays acoustic guitars. His keyboard player, Lyle Mays, still plays a seven-foot Steinway piano and his bass player, Steve Rodby, often hammers on a huge, acoustic bass. But, combined with exotic and expensive electronics, they produce melodies unusual in popular



Man relives a burden

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - It was the day when Jason Miller was adding the last touches to his film, "That Championship Season," and he seemed like a man relieved of an awesome burden.

No wonder. For 10 years he had been striving to put his award-winning play on the screen. Now it was done, and he seemed relieved, happy, exhausted and apprehensive.

"Now the selling begins," he sighed over coffee in the commissary of MGM, where the production was being completed. "But, truthfully, a picture sells itself. You can do 6,000 interviews and appear on the ("Tonight" show host Johnny) Carson show, but if the film doesn't move people and entertain people, the rest is academic.'

His concern for "That Championship Season" is deep and real. It was not merely a hit play that established his fame and reputation. It sprang from his Catholic childhood in Scran-

The story is simple: Four members of a high school basketball team that won the Pennsylvania state cham-

pionship meet with their coach 25 years later for an evening of booze and reminiscence. Complications arise when the five men start talking of their own lives, their successes and failures, their old antipathies.

Miller wrote the play when he was a struggling New York actor. It opened off-Broadway in 1972, soon moved to Broadway, captured the Tony, Critics Award and the Pulitzer Prize.

Warner Brothers bought the movie rights for \$250,000, and Miller was hired to write the screenplay. Meanwhile, William Friedkin cast him in "The Exorcist" as Father Karras, a role that drew an Oscar nomination for best supporting actor.

Miller's acting career prospered, but "That Championship Season" foundered.

"It succumbed to a difference of opinion on casting and location," Miller said. Warner Brothers wanted to shift the locale to California or Seattle.

He and Warners parted ways, and the project moved to Columbia Pictures, where Miller wrote another screenplay. Again, there was a difference on where to film

Championship Season," and it fell victim to executive in-fighting. Next, producer Ely Landau took over the property and commissioned another script writer. Nothing.

"Finally I bought it back from Landau for the original purchase price," said the 43-year-old Miller

Friedkin agreed to direct. The cast included the late William Holden, Nick Nolte, Martin Sheen, Paul Sorvino and Miller. Production was to start in the fall of 1981 in Scranton. But delays caused postponement. Then Holden died and Friedkin dropped

Miller decided to direct it himself. Robert Mitchum took over as coach, with Sheen, Sorvino, Bruce Dern and Stacy Keach as his former players.

Network has little faith in programing schedule

NEW YORK (AP) - CBS News turns 14 talking heads into a remarkably lively hour of television in "Eye on the Media: Business and the Press," a panel free-for-all of ideas and opinions.

CBS, the network, however, seems to have little faith in this forum, having scheduled "Eye on the Media" for 10 p.m. EST Saturday of the holiday weekend, when many Americans are thinking more of Christmas, the Caribbean, or grandma's pumpkin pie than they are of television.

The network has hidden this program in an off-peak period because "Eye on the Media" is devoid of car crashes, bedroom scenes or goofy comedy situations. All it will do is enlighten viewers with articulate advocates of different points of view and perspectives.

All of them get to be themselves in some hypothetical role-playing, through which the mutual distrust between the press and business is examined. The panel talk, held last month and edited in sequence by CBS News, was cosponsored by CBS News and Columbia University.

Between the Covers

Faraway settings provide background for family sagas

County Librarian Family sagas head the list of new books available this week at the Deaf Smith County Library. "Heritage" by Peter Driscoll heads the list of new books. It is the story of what happens to a big family, and a nation, when they are torn apart by modern war.

The Lombard family is the first family in the country. Their huge wine-producing plantation with its magnificent home, Bellegarde, is the rich heritage of the four Lombarde children at the end of World War II.

The Algeria they have always known is about to erupt into one of the most dramatic wars of our time. The Algerian War of Independence, 1954-62, destroys the loyalties of a lifetime.

'Heritage' is the panoramic story of a family and a nation torn asunder. Driscoll is also the author of five previous novels, one of which, "The Wilby Conspiracy," became a successful motion picture.

"Golden Hill" by Shirley Lord is set in the tropics on the exotic island of Trinidad. It traces through six decades the devastating effect of one woman's betrayal of her family.

Rose Bracken, born with perfectly white skin to an impoverished black family as the result of an earlier interracial liasion, determines to escape her life of humiliation.

When Rose becomes Mrs. Piper Pollard, the lives of the two Pollard brothers change drastically. Drum and Roger Pollard grow up to hate each other, obsessed by the same inheritance and by the same woman.

"Golden Hill" moves from their verdant sensual plantations in the tropics to the drawing rooms of Belgravia in London. The true heroine is Rose's -granddaughter, Margaret, who brings the story to a startling conclusion. "Golden Hill" is Shirley Lord's first novel.



The number of American households has jumped more than 30 percent in the last 12 years, but the size of the households has grown steadily smaller. First Lady will not miss 'fishbowl' at mansion

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Rita Clements will leave public life and the Governor's Mansion she helped restore with "mixed emotions" in January, but she will not miss the fishbowl existence that goes with the big white house across the street from the Capitol.

"I have mixed emotions. I look back on these four years as being a unique and rewarding experience," she said as. she sat in one of the delicate antique chairs that decorators found and reupholstered for the house during a 212-year renovation pro-

"But there are lots of demands of public life. Bill and I are both very private people, and there are the demands of our schedules, being pulled in a hundred different directions, the feeling that your life is very structured and you don't have time to take out and smell the flowers. We're looking forward to having a private life again.

Perhaps more than any other Texas first lady in recent history, the wife of Republican Gov. Bill Clements will leave a lasting mark on the state - the \$3 million refurnishing and repair of the long-neglected

Texas Governor's Mansion. The Clementses moved out

of the nouse shortly after Clements took office in 1979. They moved back in only last April, but had little time to enjoy the new furnishings, non-falling plaster and now dependable plumbing. Both took to the campaign trail. Then Clements lost the November general election.

In January, when new Democratic Governor Mark White takes office, Bill and Rita Clements will move back to Dallas, leaving behind the brocade draperies and hand-crafted quilts that adorn the once dilapidated colonial-style house.

"I never considered that the Governor's Mansion belonged to Bill and me," said Mrs. Clements. "It belongs to the people of Texas. We were only one family of temporary residents here. I have left a big part of myself-here in this restoration, but I'm pleasedthat I did it and I think we're leaving a legacy to the people of Texas. I'm very proud of







Gifts still in closet for girl who disappeared eight years ago

By LAURA RICHARDSON **Associated Press Writer**

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Leslie Wilson's presents are still in the attic of the small white frame house. The new clothes are out of style, and she is too old for the toys. Everything was bought for a 14-year-old girl who disappeared eight years ago while Christmas shopp-

If she's still alive, Leslie is now 22. Her little brother has grown up, married, and become a father. Her greatgrandmother, who took care of her while her mother worked, is dead.

Her Pekingese grew old and sick and had to be destroyed four years ago.

But the gifts are still in the attic, and her mother, Judy Wilson, now 40, still hopes.

Would you please assist in our search for our children?" The Associated Press. "When I read in this morning's paper about President Reagan's Missing Children's Act, it gave me a new hope.'

The bill signed by Reagan in October permits parents to ask the FBI if the name of their missing child is in its computer files. If local police decline to enter the name, the act permits parents to do so on their own.

"Oh, I dream about her quite often. I know what she hasn't changed," Mrs. Wilson said, gazing at the last school picture of her daughter. 'She'd be tall, and headstrong, spoiled, you

The car was not dusted for fingerprints because officers did not think they were dealing with a crime

"I could have told you that night that they hadn't run away," Mrs. Wilson said. "Leslie wanted to go to that party. And no 9-year-old is go-Christmas. Everybody knows

The families of the missing girls have sent 70,000 handbills with their daughters' photographs throughout the United States, Mexico and Canada. They sent the pictures to 45 newspapers. They hired a private investigator, and followed up every tip from seers and psychics who claimed to know where the children went, or where their bodies could be found.

We went around knocking on people's doors, asking them to let us look in their basements. We went out to a field in West Texas, we dug in ditches all over the place, and looked up and down creek beds. I have no idea how much money we spent," Mrs. Wilson said.

case over to the homicide detectives.

Major Case Investigator ing to run off two days before George Hudson has helped look for the girls for seven years. He has a file almost two feet thick, full of leads that went nowhere.

"Probably the only way we'll ever solve this thing is if somebody just comes forward and says what happened to them," Hudson said. "There's no evidence, no nothing:

Last year bits of human skeletons were discovered in a swamp near the southeast Texas town of Alvin. Hudson, a team of convicts from the state prison, and dozens of volunteers dug in the muck for two months, finally finding enough teeth in April 1981 to identify the bodies.

They were two girls from Dickinson, Georgia Geer, 14, and Brooks Bracewell, 12. They also had vanished in


"It was a relief that it wasn't Leslie, but ... you know, it was ... well, at least those other girls' families know what happened to them," Mrs. Wilson said.

Mrs. Wilson and her husband Richard have tried to go on. Three years ago they finally threw away Leslie's old clothes, gave her bedroom furniture to her cousin, and put the rest of her belongings in the attic with

the Christmas gifts. "I'd be so grateful - I just can't tell you how grateful if someone would tell me what happened," Mrs. Wilson says. "I dream about her so often. I just have to know."

Bulldozing of homestead 'eyesore' postponed 6 months

PINE SPRINGS, Texas (AP) - The federal government has postponed - for at least six months - plans to bulldoze Mary Hinson's homestead high in the West Texas' Guadalupe Moun-

"Frankly, we got lucky," said Van Horn lawyer Steve Mitchell, who decided to battle big government over its plans to evict Mrs. Hinson by Dec. 31 so they could tear down her Pine Springs Store.

Now it makes a nice Christmas story because she

doesn't have to pack up and leave," he said.

Last fall, the U.S. Park Service in nearby Carlsbad. N.M., ordered Mrs. Hinson, 67, to leave her wood-planked store below the old Butterfield Overland Mail Route at Guadalupe Peak.

The government said the store, which also had been her home for 44 years, was "an eyesore" and only a bulldozer would do it justice.

"I didn't like the way they were treating her," Mitchell said this week.

The park features Texas' highest mountains - up to 8,749 feet, and El Capitan, a massive upthrust of stone that is

Yosemite National Park.

Her parents, the Walter Glovers, first came to the area in 1909 and built a home amid 5,000 acres of land. Most of the land became part of the newly created park in 1967. Under terms of an agreement the right of domain would fall to the government - except for about 84 acres - when the Glovers died.

After her mother's death last August, Mary Hinson became the sole survivor; but her mother neglected to leave a will, and the government exercise their right of domain. Park superintendent Bill Dunmeyer wrote her the week after her mother died to

Food value after processing

Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm very upset because I just heard that you can't use the raw food tables to determine your daily nutrient intake for prepared foods. For years I have fed my family by using food tables that list most of the values as they occur in raw food. Now I find out that when the food is cooked it doesn't have the

same nutritive value. If you'll excuse the expression, this opens up a whole can of worms, and I understand even the canning affects the nutritive value. I'd really like to hear from you about this. Just how

serious is this problem? DEAR READER - It is one you should be aware of but it may not be such a great disaster as you imagine. Food preparation will cause many foods to lose important vitamins, and it can add sodium while causing the foods to lose potassi-

The same applies to storing foods, raw or canned. An apple, orange or a potato stored for long periods of time may lose a great deal of its vitamin C.

Even preparing fresh strawberries may destroy a reasonable amount of vitamin C. The longer a fresh fruit stands after cutting or processing, even in a mechanical way, the more likely it is that it will lose

Holding food over heat may cause foods to lose vitamin C rapidly. All of this is an argument for preparing fresh foods and eating them right away. I think it is also a good excuse for raising a lot of your own vegetables in a pot or window box. Besides it's fun. Thiamine, vitamin B-1, is

also very labile and you can lose a lot of it in food processing. Sunlight can be an important factor in losing some of the important vitamins. That is why those cardboard

glass or clear plastic containers.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I have been diagnosed as having temporal arteritis or inflammation of the arteries. It seems to have everyone baffled. I am taking prednisone, a very strong medication, along with Inderal to stop my rapid heartbeat. I feel very weak in the arms and knees. I have been told it may go on for weeks or perhaps months. I would appreciate

anything you can tell me. DEAR READER - The most important thing I can tell you is that you are lucky to have the diagnosis made and that you are being treated in the usually approved manner. It is an inflammation of the temporal artery. If the inflammation is allowed to progress it can cause blindness in the eve dependent on the involved temporal artery. That is why the prednisone is so important early in the course of treatment

The problem often starts with a low grade fever. fatigue, anorexia or loss of appetite and a nonspecific headache. It can involve one side of the head. It is related to polymyalgia rheumatica which produces pain and stiffness of the muscles.

The arteritis may eventually cause painful cramping (claudication) of the jaw muscles when talking or eating.
