## THIRD BONUS PRIZE AWARDED

Miss Lena Gregory of Kelso Takes Prize By Big Plurality Vote And Wins Easily.

The first time a Bonus Prize goes out of Hereford was won by Miss Lena Gregory of Kelso by a plurality vote of 603,450, during the three weeks' period which was over 450,000 votes more than the nearest one to her. The gain of votes of all candidates, who secured more than 100,000 votes during the same three weeks ending June 1, are as follows: Miss Gregory gained 603,450, Miss Smith gained 148,900, Miss Pitman gained 143,330, Mrs. Bell gained 129,945. Their total vote to the date of June 1, is shown in the list below. This little Contest for the Third Bonus Prize was by far the most hotly contested yet all in the best of spirit and good will. The losing candidates were anxious to congratulate the young lady from the Kelso community.

### LAST BONUS PRIZE.

This, of course, suggests that we are now entering well into the fourth period of the Contest at the close of which the silver toilet set will be given away. Several of the candidates have had their hearts set on this beautiful premium and there's going to be some strenuous work in collecting the merchant's trade coupons and subscription votes during the time. This last and fourth prize will be awarded according to the gain in votes made during the three weeks ending June 22, 10 p. m. It certainly offers an opportunity to show the kind of "metal" in all the candidates and whether they will "ring" true as the tones of their chimes are heard.

### MORE SUCCESS PRIZES.

Several of the candidates have added to the values for the Success Prizes. The diamond ring and gold watch are in sight for several of them, and next it is hoped that one or more will reach the climax of the

Contest and wear either a beautiful watch or a brilliant diamond. A little more work will accomplish their ambition.

The total vote cast to June 1, by all the candidates is 3,494,765, and the Contest is growing in interest.

### Scholastic Census.

Judge Wright is making up the roll of all children of the county within the scholastic age, 7 to 17. The list will show a total of 642 scholastics, 446 of whom are in the Hereford Independent District. The next two largest schools in the county are the Summerfield county line school with 25 pupils, and the Berve school with 22. There are 17 common schools in the county with a total enrollment of 196.

## PUBLIC SCHOOL FACULTY COMPLETE

Board Finished Work of Electing Corps of Teachers For Public School For 1912-13.

At the last meeting of the school board, the corps of teachers for the public schools was completed. Several new teachers will appear, including two of Hereford's own young ladies. The faculty as it now stands follows:

Douglas A. Shirley will be principal of the High School. He filled this place very acceptably last year. He holds the A. B. degree from Texas Christian University and has held some responsible positions in the schools of Texas, and will teach Science and Mathematics.

Miss Christine Schott of Galveston, Texas, A. B. State University '12, graduate of Ball High School, will have charge of the history and English. She has had several experiences as teacher.

Miss Margret Williams of Laredo, Texas, graduate of Hamilton College, A. B. State University '12, will teach Latin.

Miss Maude McLean will have charge of the 7th grade again. She is a graduate of Clarendon College.

Miss Mary Barton will teach the 6th grade classes again next year. She holds a diploma from Decatur College and is a student in Baylor University.

Miss Sue Montgomery will have charge of the 5th grade for another year. She was a student in the State University.

Miss Francis Dameron has been given the 4th grade. She is a graduate of the Hereford High School and received a diploma from the College of Industrial Arts this term.

Miss Clara Edwards will teach the 3rd grade. She graduated this year from the Northwest Texas Normal College and has had several years' experience.

Miss Annie Price will be in charge of the 2nd grade. She is a graduate of the Hereford High School and a student in the Northwest Texas Normal College, and has had two or three years' experience.

Miss Francis Turrentine and Miss Anna Brown will look after the little tots of the 1st grade. These teachers are a part of the school having been in the work here for some four years.

The last, but really the first and head of the school, Supt. Ben Short. He is a graduate of the State Normal and is a past-master in school work and says he holds the degree of P. S. Mr. Short is a practical school man and has done good work for the Hereford school. With the assistance of the competent corps of teachers which the board has given him, the patrons shall expect some good work.

### A Happy Coincident.

The citizens of Pecos, Texas, are demanding "constructive legislation" and a "square deal" for Western Texas. While Pecos is out of the 123rd representative district, it is a "sign of the times" and a peculiarly happy coincident that the people of that section of the state are of the same mind and purpose as the people of the Panhandle, as shown in the published platform of A. C. Elliott, candidate for representative, whose platform along with other things contains these two "planks":

1. A progressive policy in matters of state and constructive legislation in matters of business.
2. A square deal for the Panhandle and the South Plains.

The idea was expressed for Pecos by Pastor A. Whaley, secretary of the Pecos Commercial Club, when discussing a division of Texas: "All we want is a chance to grow and we hope it will not be necessary to burst the bonds of State in order to develop our resources. We have a new country and in about the same stage of development as East Texas when the state gave away our West Texas lands as a bonus to build railroads for that part of Texas. ## HOLLAND'S CLEAN CITY CONTEST

Hereford Will Be Entered In State-Wide Contest For Cleanest Town in Texas.

At a meeting of the "men" of the city Wednesday afternoon, strong and ringing resolutions were adopted encouraging the ladies of Hereford in the laudable efforts to make Hereford the cleanest town on the map and concurring in the move to enter the city in Holland's State-Wide Cleanest City Contest. The mass meeting was called to order by Mayor Knight, who explained the object of the "call." He stated the ladies had taken the initiative in the matter and that he did not want the men to fall short of their duty. He explained the details of the proposed contest, the conditions and the prizes offered. Messrs. Shirley, Dunlap and others heartily endorsed the move. The resolutions adapted follows:

Whereas, we have learned with pleasure of the public spirit and patriotic desire of the ladies of our town that Hereford be entered in the contest for the prize offered by Holland's Magazine to the town that is cleanest and in the best sanitary condition, and of their wish and desire that Hereford should be made sanitary and clean in order to prevent an outbreak of typhoid and other preventable diseases incident to warm weather;

And whereas it has been made known to us that the ladies of Hereford are willing to organize and to assist in making and maintaining clean and sanitary conditions in our town to the end that our food supply may be handled and cared for in a proper, sanitary manner; that our water supply may be kept pure; that our sewage and garbage disposals may be efficient and up to date, and above all sanitary; that our vacant lots and unoccupied premises may present a tidy, well kept, and attractive appearance, and that our town may present in every way the appearance of being inhabited by a progressive, cleanly, sanitary and well-informed citizenship;

First. That we appreciate the public spirited sentiment and thoughtful solicitude concerning the sanitary conditions of our town expressed and manifested by the excellent women of Hereford.

Second. That we endorse and approve of any and all efforts made by them along the lines indicated, and pledge them our support, assistance and cooperation.

Third. That we request them to organize the community for carrying on this work to the best advantage and in the most efficient way, and promise them to take an interest in the work with them, and to serve faithfully on any committee to which we may be appointed, and to assist and support them in all their endeavors to make and maintain our town in a clean and sanitary condition, and to help in every way possible in their effort to win the prize offered by Holland's Magazine.

One matter of great importance discussed at the meeting was that of sewer connections. It was learned that many houses within easy reach of the sewer lines had not been connected with the system. It was explained that it was unfair to the tax payers "outside" of the system for those "within" to neglect to connect their premises. The object of the sewer system has practically been thwarted by the refusal and neglect of those who are near enough to use the sewers. The claim is made that many, even "within" the system, still permit their open closets to get in a fearful condition. But this move to "clean up the town" will bring the desired results. Filth and flies must go to the dump. Diseases must be prevented and the health of our people protected.

#### What the Democratic Platform Declares For.

That the recall, initiative and referendum are not national questions, but should be left to the people of the various states to determine for themselves.

That delegates from Texas vote for Woodrow Wilson for President.

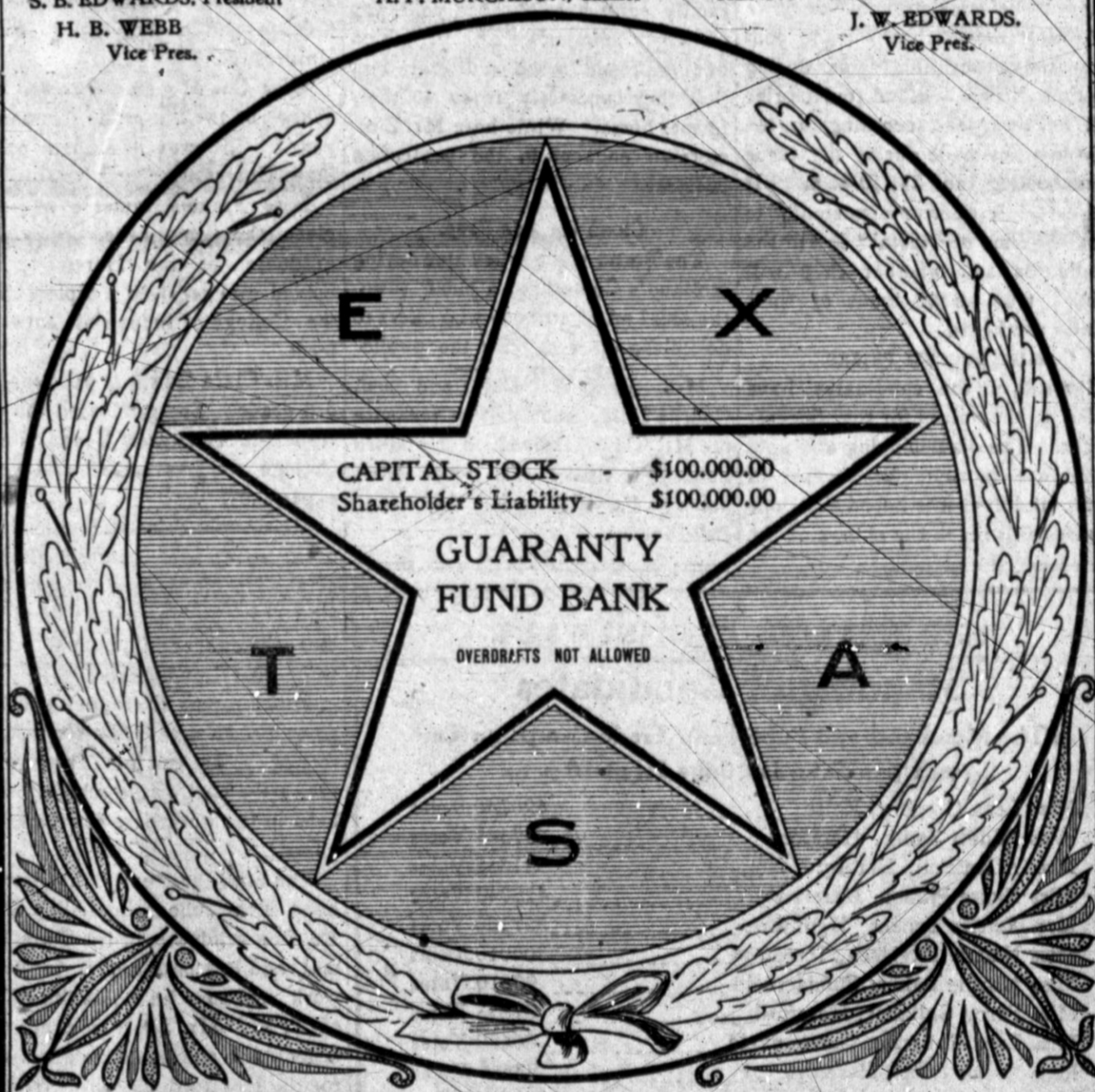

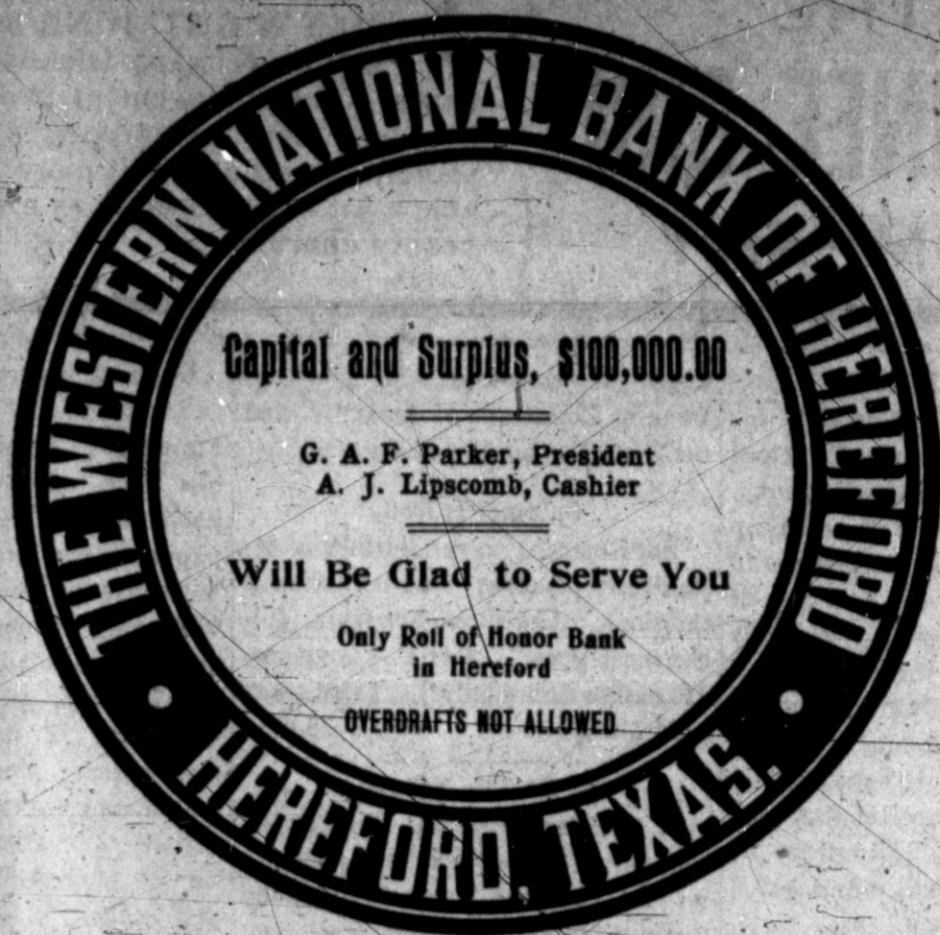
